The Office of Hawaiian Affairs <u>supports</u> SB 2082. Our interest in this legislation is primarily based on our concern that 45% of women incarcerated in both in-state and out-of-state correctional facilities are Native Hawaiian.

OHA support for this bill is primarily based on growing evidence that children whose

parents are incarcerated are more apt to encounter socialization problems in school and

the community and exhibit deviant behavior as they grow older.

In the case of women

offenders who are incarcerated in mainland correctional facilities, loss of regular contact

with their children makes it very difficult for them to reconnect and reintegrate with their

children and families once they are released.

With that said, however, we strongly recommend that in developing a plan to return all

female offenders to Hawaii by 2009, the State include reentry and reintegration programs

for these women that will increase their chances of successfully transitioning back to

their families and communities. OHA has heard from several sources, including

offenders themselves, that opportunities for program services are more available in

mainland correctional facilities than in Hawaii, and as such, they would prefer to stay in

the mainland facilities. We need to ensure that these services are accessible to our

Hawaii women offenders when they are returned home.

The Drug Policy Forum of Hawaii supports this measure which would provide funds for the Department of Public Safety to develop a plan to return all female Hawaii prisoners currently in mainland prisons back to Hawaii by July 1, 2009.

The vast majority of women are convicted for non-violent drug or drug-related offenses. We believe that their needs would be better served by community-based treatment programs rather than incarceration. Community-based programs are less expensive than incarceration and provide an opportunity for offenders to address their pathways to crime and drug use.

This plan will help establish much needed community beds for treatment; will help reduce recidivism; and will facilitate and improve family relationships. There are many unintended consequences of mainland incarceration. Please end those harmful consequences by requiring the Department of Public Safety to return the women to Hawaii.
