The Office of Hawaiian Affairs **supports** SB 2546. Our interest in this legislation is primarily based on our concern that approximately 45% of men, women, and juvenile offenders incarcerated in both in-state and out-of-state correctional facilities are Native Hawaiian.

Last session, OHA supported the establishment of the offender reentry program because of

the need for more programs, whether they are treatment type,

job training and placement, or affordable housing to help ease reintegration

and prevent recidivism for both men and women offenders. We believe a comprehensive

reentry program and system will substantially reduce the staggering financial and social

costs associated with incarceration and recidivism.

SB 2546 provides clarification to the reentry program. OHA supports this measure

because it identifies several public and private entities that should assist the Department of

Public Safety in carrying out the mandates of the program. We believe this type of

collaboration is necessary to make the program a comprehensive one that addresses all the

needs of ex-offenders and helps them successfully reintegrate into society.

We believe that reentry programs are essential to reduce recidivism and that these programs must be implemented effectively.

Thank you for your past support for reentry programs. We hope you will continue to improve the programs and provide the mechanisms for them to work efficiently.

I support the mandate that this Bill is a directive, not an option. My only objection to this Bill is in regards to Section 2 (b), "in conjunction with the Hawaii Paroling Authority, Department of Health, Department of Human Services, and the Probation and Family court divisions of the judiciary."

The Federal Government recognized the failure of differing agencies with the same responsibilities when it created The Homeland Security Agency. Presently, there's nothing that prevents the Department of Public Safety from reaching out to other agencies for assistance. I'm concerned that if we let them off the hook by distributing their responsibility, then they'll pass the buck later.
