SENATE BILL NO. 2643 RELATING TO IRRIGATION

Chairperson Tokuda and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Senate Bill No. 2643. This bill makes an appropriation to the Department of Agriculture (DOA) for capital improvements and positions. The department supports this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our Executive Biennium Budget and offers comments.

The DOA recommends that the special-funded positions described in the bill be appropriated to AGR 141 in HB 2500 (Relating to the State Budget). Should the legislature add the positions into the budget bill, the DOA requests that: 1) the irrigation district manager, four irrigation system service worker II's, one third of the engineer VI, and one third of the clerk-typist III's salaries be paid out of the irrigation system revolving fund; 2) one third of the engineer VI, and one third of the clerk-typist III's salaries be paid out of the agricultural park special fund; 3) one third of the engineer VI, and one third of the clerk-typist III's salaries be paid out of the non-agricultural park lands special fund; 4) the ceilings for the respective programs be increased accordingly; and 5) the grade of the four irrigation system service worker II's be corrected to "BC-7" rather than "WC-7". To continue the level of service, the converted clerk-typist III

position should be made permanent. To create optimal program efficiency, we recommend that all the position counts and salaries be allocated in this manner and language related to these positions be deleted from the irrigation repair and maintenance special fund.

If funds for the Agricultural Water Use and Development Plan are being appropriated, the name of the special fund may need to be broadened. In that case, the department respectfully requests the following revisions regarding the irrigation repair and maintenance special fund: 1) the name of the "irrigation repair and maintenance special fund" be changed to the "agricultural infrastructure improvement special fund" to allow agricultural land improvement projects access to this Act.; 2) revise §167-24 (b) to read "Moneys in the [irrigation repair and maintenance-special fund] agricultural infrastructure improvement special fund shall be used to fund [repair and maintenance of the following irrigation systems:] improvements for the following agricultural projects:; 3) add paragraph "(18) Studies for agricultural water and land planning" to §167-24 (b); and 4) change the wording where appropriate in this bill to reflect the revised name of the special fund.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2643. The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) supports the intent of this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact the priorities in the Executive Biennium budget.

The passage of this bill would help to ensure that irrigation water continues to be available to farms throughout the state. Since the Legislature over the past several years has required the ADC to expend \$50,000 to \$100,000 to assist with routine maintenance of the East Kauai irrigation system, we are aware of major repairs that are needed to this system and others. Completion of major repairs such as those needed for East Kauai would allow

Chair Tokuda, and Members of the Senate AHW Committee:

My name is Paul Koehler. I am a Maui resident, Past-President and sitting Board Member of HCIA. The HCIA represents seed production and research facilities operating in Hawaii. The HCIA is comprised of five member companies that farm an estimated 8,000 acres on four islands, valued at \$97.6 million in operating budget (2006/2007 HASS). We are proud members of Hawaii's diversified agriculture and life sciences industries.

Your support is needed for this request for general obligation bonds to be deposited into the irrigation repair and maintenance special fund. With the closing of the large plantations, much of Hawaii's irrigation systems and infrastructure has fallen into disrepair. Yet, many farmers and residents are dependent on these systems for water use. Support for added personnel is also critical to make sure that repairs and maintenance can occur on a timely basis, to include a mobile disaster emergency response team.
