Chair Ige, Vice Chair Fukunaga and Committee Members:

I am Jean Evans, Executive Director of the American Lung Association of Hawaii (ALA of Hawaii.) and strongly oppose SB 2792. Our mission is to prevent lung disease and promote lung health through research, education and advocacy. We are dedicated to fighting for clean air both indoors and outside. Everyone has a right to breathe clean air no matter where they work, dine or are entertained.

When State legislators enacted the 2006 public places smoking ban, they did so knowing there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke. Some businesses now claim the law has harmed them. Whether or not that's true, the law's overriding public benefit is that smoke no longer damages the health of employees and patrons alike.

I have spoken to several entertainers recently who have shared their experiences performing in smoke-filled venues. One is multi-award winning Keahi Conjugacion who relles on her lungs for her livelihood. Along with her beautiful voice, she also happens to have asthma. On several occasions prior to the implementation of the law, she required emergency room visits immediately following a performance in nightclub that allowed smoking. These experiences proved to be very frightening, because she well knows that people can and do die from asthma.

The ALA of Hawaii strongly disagrees with those who say smoking licenses should be available to willing establishments and that prospective employees would be informed as a condition of employment that smoking is allowed. Employers can never know if their employees agree to work in a smoking environment because they are doing so freely or because they are fearful of losing their job

As a society, we strive to improve working conditions and eliminate threats to health and safety. The no-smoking law has done that for all Hawaii residents and must stay intact to protect everyone ... and everyone means everyone!

Chair Ige, Vice Chair Fukunaga and Committee Members:

I am Debbie Odo the Director of Tobacco Control from the American Lung Association of Hawai`i (ALA of Hawaii.) and strongly oppose SB 2792. Everyone has a right to breathe clean air no matter where they work, dine or are entertained.

As the Director of Tobacco Control for the American Lung Association of Hawaii, I believe everyone has the right to work in safe environments, especially those who work in Bars and Clubs. Workers and patrons should not have to risk their health to earn a living. Bar employees are at particular risk, so to take steps backwards by allowing smoking in selected venues would highlight that Hawai'i, the Health State, does not protect the health and welfare of their people.

I work with many people from various radio stations who have reported to me that the law has helped them to reduce their asthma episodes, headaches and have noticed less sick days.

When the scientific evidence about the health consequences of involuntary exposure to tobacco smoke reports were released by the Surgeon General, the Hawaii State Legislators learned that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke. Research indicates that smoke-free policies are the most economic and effective approach for providing protection from exposure to secondhand smoke.

I strongly disagree with those who say smoking licenses should be available to willing establishments and that prospective employees would be informed as a condition of employment that smoking is allowed.

I urge this committee not to pass SB 2792 out of committee due to the health consequences.

American Heart Association testimony <u>STRONGLY OPPOSING</u> SB 2792 "Relating To Smoking"

The American Heart Association STRONGLY OPPOSES SB 2792, "Related To Smoking."

The body of research on the dangers of smoking has long been acknowledged by health and science experts. However, in recent years, research focus has been extended to the dangers of being exposed to secondhand smoke and that growing body of research has been eye-opening to the point that many, including the tobacco industry itself, have shown that breathing secondhand smoke is not only deadly, but that it is more dangerous than smoking.

The California Environmental Protection Agency released in late 2005 a report on the health effects of secondhand smoke based on a body of more than 1,000 research studies that went through four years of intense scientific, public and independent review. In the report, among other things, the report found a causal link between secondhand smoke exposure and pre-term delivery, asthma induction in adults (the link between asthma induction in children had already been well established), a 70 percent increase in risk for breast cancer in younger, primarily premenopausal women, and altered vascular properties. As a result of the report, in 2006 California became the first state to declare seconhand smoke a toxic air pollutant. The decision by the California Air Resources Board puts secondhand smoke in the same category as diesel exhaust, arsenic and benzene and blamed it for 4,000 deaths each year in California from lung cancer and heart disease alone.

In 2005, a study done at the University of California at San Francisco (UCSF) found that non-smokers exposed to secondhand smoke are negatively affected in a much higher dose to response ratio. Another UCSF study released in November 2006, showed that Philip Morris Tobacco Company had done extensive animal research on secondhand smoke at a secret laboratory in Germany and found it to be more toxic to non-smokers than inhaled cigarette smoke is to a smoker. The three-year review of Philip Morris documents made public by the multi-state settlement with the tobacco industry showed that the company did experiments on rats, which are less sensitive to smoke than humans. The documents show that Philip Morris scientists learned that secondhand smoke is chemically different than mainstream smoke inhaled by a smoker. The smoke drifting off the lit end of a cigarette releases larger, more poisonous molecules than those inhaled at the filter end. The heating that takes place in the process of smoking a cigarette helps to break down some toxins. Secondhand smoke was found to be three times more toxic to tissue culture cells than mainstream smoke.

The effects of secondhand smoke on the cardiovascular system are substantial and immediate. Within 5 minutes of exposure to secondhand smoke blood platelets become stickier. Within 15 minutes of exposure, scarring of the blood vessel walls occurs causing plaque that leads to atherosclerosis to adhere more easily. Within 30 minutes of exposure, the risk for heart attack doubles. As an EPA Class A Carcinogen, there are no safe exposure levels to environmental tobacco smoke.

Studies done in Helena, MT, and Pueblo, CO, New York State, and Ireland further illustrate the dangers of secondhand smoke to the heart. In Helena, the city council passed comprehensive smoking restrictions on all indoor workplaces. Upon the law's implementation, the lone hospital in the city that treats heart attack patients recorded an immediate 40 percent decline in heart attack admissions. When the state government preempted the city law and allowed smoking to begin again 6 months from the date of the city law's implementation, heart attack admission rates at the hospital climbed 40 percent back to their original levels. The Montana State Legislature recognized its original error and in 2005 became the 12th state to enact comprehensive smoking restrictions. Another study completed in Pueblo in 2005 after implementation of smoking

restrictions there found a 29 percent decrease in heart attack admissions. In New York, the State Department of Health reported a 3.813 drop in hospital admissions attributed to heart attacks, or an eight percent decrease one year after implementation of its comprehensive smoke-free workplace law. Researchers in Ireland studied data at public hospitals in southwest Ireland and showed an 11 percent fall in heart attack admissions at hospitals there the year after that country's comprehensive smoke-free workplace law went into effect. Since Hawaii legislators passed the state's smoking restriction law in 2006, voters in Ohio and Arizona overwhelmingly passed public referendums restricting smoking in all indoor workplaces, including bars and restaurants. In fact, twenty-four states have now passed smoke-free restaurant laws, and 18 states have passed comprehensive smoke-free workplace protection laws that include both bars and restaurants. A growing number of countries have enacted comprehensive smoking restrictions, inlcuding England, Northern Ireland, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Italy, Spain, France, Norway, Australia, New Zealand, Uraguay Bhutan, the Maldives, Canada and Bermuda. Even in Japan smoking restrictions are becoming the norm, with a number of its larger cities, including even highly populated outdoor areas of Tokyo, being governed successfully by smoke-free laws. And in Hong Kong restaurants and karaoke lounges are 100 percent smoke free, while bars will go smoke free in July 2009.

An estimated 53,000 non-smokers die each year in the United States as a result of secondhand smoke exposure, including over 35,000 from coronary heart disease associated with secondhand smoke exposure. In Hawaii, the costs of smoking and secondhand smoke exposure combined costs the state an estimated \$575,000 annually in healthcare-related costs and lost productivity.

After Hawaii's smoke-free law was implemented in November, 2006 the Hawaii Quitline experienced a four-fold increase in the number of calls that it received from smokers seeking help in quitting. To change the law now would cut short positive health changes that have been successfully modeled in other states and send Hawaii backwards. Our goal should be to free Hawaii taxpayers from having to subsidize tobacco industry profits by paying the exorbatant health bills related to smoking and secondhand smoke exposure. Our goal should also be to eliminate the hundreds of horrible losses that Hawaii families must endure each year due to tobacco use and exposure.

The American Heart Association urges legislators to oppose SB 2792. Please continue to protect all Hawaii workers and the public from involuntary exposure to the deadly health menace that is secondhand tobacco smoke. Providing business a license to again allow smoking in their workplaces would be giving them a license to kill.

ENVIRONMENTAL TOBACCO SMOKE AND HEART DISEASE

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT ENVIRONMENTAL TOBACCO SMOKE (ETS)

- ETS contains the same toxic substances as the smoke inhaled by smokers (mainstream smoke). Of the more than 4,000 chemicals in ETS (including nicotine, formaldehyde, cyanide, arsenic, carbon monoxide, methane, asbestos, ammonia and benzene), at least 40 are considered carcinogens. Many of these toxins are actually found in higher concentrations in ETS than they are in mainstream smoke.

 [U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, 1992. "Respiratory Health Effects of Passive Smoking: Lung Cancer and Other Disorders."]
- The EPA has classified ETS as a Class A carcinogen (known human carcinogen) containing asbestos and benzene.

 [EPA, 1992]
- The U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) estimates that ETS accounts for an increase in workplace death risk of 7 to 16 per 1,000 workers. This increased risk far exceeded OSHA's acceptable excess risk level of 1 per 1,000 workers. [U.S. OSHA, 1994; Steenland, 1999]

ETS INCREASES HEART DISEASE RISK

- Environmental tobacco smoke (ETS) is a major cause of cardiovascular disease and death.
 - ETS exposure results in about 35,000 deaths from coronary heart disease (CHD) among nonsmokers each year.
 [American Heart Association's Council on Cardiopulmonary and Critical Care, 1992; American Heart Association, "Heart Disease and Stroke Statistics – 2003 Update"]
 - ETS increases the risk of coronary events by about 30%.
 ["Immediate Reduction in Acute Myocardial Infarctions After the Implementation of a Comprehensive Smokefree Ordinance", Presented to the 52nd Annual Scientific Sessions of the American College of Cardiology, March 30 April 2, 2003]
- ➤ Epidemiological evidence linking ETS to CHD, stroke and atherosclerotic disease has been mounting since 1984.

 [Glantz and Pamley, 1991]
- Nonsmokers absorb approximately 1% of the nicotine that active smokers absorb and experience as much as 50% of an active smoker's increased risk for heart disease.

 [Law et al., 1997]
- ➤ Inhaling ETS from just one cigarette actually increases the growth rate of plaque -- the buildup of fatty substances on artery walls that leads to arterial hardening and blockages. [Penn et al., 1994]
- ETS increases the ratio of total cholesterol to HDL (good) cholesterol by 7% to 9%. [Feldman et al., 1991; Moskowitz et al., 1999; Mizoue et al., 1999]



- ➤ A Clean Indoor Air ordinance in Helena, MT produced a 55% decrease in hospital admissions for acute myocardial infarction over a six-month period.

 ["Immediate Reduction in Acute Myocardial Infarctions After the Implementation of a Comprehensive Smokefree Ordinance", Presented to the 52nd Annual Scientific Sessions of the American College of Cardiology, March 30 April 2, 2003]
- ➤ Women who are exposed to ETS at home have a 23%-24% increased risk of cardiovascular disease.

 [Thun et al., 1999; He et al., 1999]
- Exposing a spouse to ETS from 20 cigarettes a day results in a 58% increased risk of heart attack.

 [Rosenlund, 2001]
- Exposure to ETS impairs cardiac performance, especially in heart attack survivors.
 - ETS exposure decreases time to exhaustion in aerobic activity and increases post-exercise recovery time for everyone. [Leone et al., 1991; Glantz and Parmley, 1995]
 - o For heart attack survivors, exposure to ETS also results in a 33% decrease in peak exercise power.

 [Leone et al., 1991]

EVEN BRIEF EXPOSURE TO ETS IS HARMFUL TO YOUR HEART

- > 5 minutes of ETS exposure is equal to smoking one cigarette.
- > 20 minutes of ETS exposure does as much damage as smoking a pack a day.
 - 20 minutes of ETS exposure activates clot-forming platelets in non-smokers as much as smoking a pack a day would, increasing the chances of a heart attack or stroke.
- > 30 minutes of ETS exposure results in stiffened, clogged arteries.
 - A half-hour of breathing ETS stiffens non-smokers arteries as much as smoking a pack a day would. Thirty minutes of breathing ETS also reduces the body's ability to manage LDL cholesterol for several hours after exposure.
- > 2 hours of ETS exposure produces a greater risk of irregular heartbeat.
 - Two hours of ETS exposure results in an increased heart rate as well as increased chances of developing an irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia) which could be fatal or could trigger a heart attack.

TESTIMONY IN STRONG OPPOSITION

My name is Valerie Chang and I am the volunteer executive director of the <u>Hawaii</u> COPD Coalition. I strongly oppose SB2792 and urge this committee not to pass this bill out as it will significantly undermine the health progress that has been made in our state to date in tobacco cessation and prevention.

COPD is Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (which includes emphysema and chronic bronchitis), the fourth leading killer in the US, projected to rise to 3rd in the US & world by 2020. 85-90% of those with COPD are current or former smokers. It is also a major cause of disability, right behind heart disease. For more information about COPD, visit learnaboutcopd.org.

The legislature took a good and progressive in passing the tobacco-free law for the benefit of the health of <u>Hawaii</u> 's people. It would severely undermine the progress made if a permit could be purchased to circumvent the law protecting the health of the <u>Hawaii</u> 's people. Basically, what is being sought is a <u>permit to kill</u>. Testimony in the briefing session in January 2008 (prior to opening day) highlighted the many terrible health consequences of smoking—heart attacks, asthma, COPD, cancer, other increased heart risks and more.


The license fee set in the bill of \$1000-3000 in no way approaches the cost to the people of <u>Hawaii</u> in allowing smoking in these establishments--health risks to employees and other patrons, as well as to the smoker. The argument of "individual rights" falls when the individual can't pay for the consequences of exercising his or her rights--the entire extended costs of tobacco exposure to the individual and everyone who comes in contact with him/her--premature disability, illnesses, hospitalizations, and more.

Hawaii has one of the highest rates of asthma in the US. In addition, the American Lung Association of Hawaii estimates that Hawaii has over 50,000 people with emphysema or chronic bronchitis! Smoking is a major cause of and trigger for both of these debilitating conditions. It is ironic that this bill attempts to donate some of the proceeds of the permit to the organ donation fund, since ultimately, people who smoke may indeed need new organs because tobacco destroys what they have.

As an asthmatic who has severe emphysema and mother of asthmatic children and wife of an asthmatic, we are all extremely sensitive to smoke and even inadvertent exposure can trigger a major attack in any of us. Especially for folks like me with emphysema, lung function that can be lost from a severe attack is lost forever.

I urge this committee not to pass this bill out of committee as it is far too costly to the lungs and heatih of the people of Hawaii. As a state, we cannot afford to allow tobacco to rob our people of their lives, health and breath.

To the honorable members of our Senate Health Committee:

Please do not pass SB 2792 out of your committee! As a women's health care provider and volunteer of the American Cancer Society, I strongly oppose this bill. I have been a Physician Assistant for over 34 years.

During that time, I have known and heard of many individuals who have died prematurely due to smoking-related diseases. I have had patient's and co-workers who were advised numerous times to quit smoking, but who were unable to overcome the addiction, and then years later, suffered lung cancer or heart attacks. There have been numerous patients who had miscarriages and other complications of pregnancy due to smoking. Many patients have reported that their parents who smoked, died with lung cancer. A research study in Japan published last year revealed that women who were exposed to second-hand smoke regularly had higher incidences of breast and lung cancer.

Pregnant women who smoke have a higher risk of miscarriage, low birth weight infant, premature labor, heavy vaginal bleeding and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. Passive smoking is related to increased incidence of respiratory infections and asthma flareups in children and SIDS. Our tobacco cessation counselor recently spoke to intermediate students with asthma at Kalama School in Makawao. She discovered that 100% of these students had a smoker in the home! Smoking is now linked to increased incidence of cancers of the breast, cervix, lung, stomach and kidney; aneurysms of the brain and abdomen; early heart attacks and strokes; emphysema, chronic bronchitis, pneumonia and cataracts. There are an estimated 4,000 toxins per cigarette! Smoking is a stronger addiction than alcohol, heroin and cocaine.

SB 2792 would erode workplace protection enacted by our Smoke-Free Hawaii Law! With all the overwhelming evidence of the deleterious effects of tobacco, we must not allow exceptions. Those who support this bill are placing economic gain above the health of their employees and patrons. Thank you for supporting the Smoke-Free Hawaii Law! Please do not allow any exceptions to this law!

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on SB 2792 which would allow smoking in properly licensed establishments. HMSA opposes this measure.

HMSA is dedicated to providing Hawaii's community with the provision of quality, affordable health plans. Smoking and involuntary exposure to tobacco smoke are strongly associated with cancer-related illnesses, heart disease, respiratory disease, asthma and other debilitating and costly medical conditions. Testimony in Strong Opposition...

Dear Honorable Chair Ige and members of the Committee on Health:

I am in strong opposition to SB 2792.

Here's why:

1. smoke and 2nd hand smoke IS harmful to everyone's health and having exceptions to the Hawaii-smoke-free law, as this bill is trying to get, will be harmful to people's health

There is no excusable reason to expose our workers and the public to secondhand smoke. Since its enactment, Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law has saved hundreds of lives and protects all of us from the health hazards of secondhand smoke.

- 2. one person's rights should end where another's begins (example: noise violations, health violations) Smokers are inadvertently harming and killing themselves and other non smokers around them. Secondhand smoke is a known *cause* of lung cancer, heart disease, chronic lung ailments such as bronchitis and asthma (particularly in children) and low birth-weight.
 - Published studies from reputable medical journals have demonstrated a connection between the establishment of smoke-free laws and a reduction in hospital admissions for heart attacks.
- 3. I am a musician working in these environments. I have had to expose myself to uncomfortable situations in order to make a living but it is sooooooo much easier to sing and play since the Hawaii- smokefree law has been enacted. I used to cough while I was singing and leave the venue during breaks just to breathe and catch my breath. The smoke made it so difficult to sing, I lost my high range on many nights, developed nausea when the smoke cloud was like a curtain I would peer through and the next morning, all morning would be a hack-a-thon, as if I had been smoking, myself. I am a non-smoker, but I wouldn't doubt that something shows up in my lungs later on in life.

Please do not take away our safe workplaces and public places. Please please please do not let this bill slip by, oppose it by any means possible. It will open up a floodgate of possibilities for exceptions and all the efforts to make Hawaii's establishments and public places smoke-free will have been in vain.

4. I know that Bartenders and waitresses have complained about the smoky environments and the general disregard of patrons who literally "blow smoke in their faces" even as a joke, sometimes.

Enforcement of the Hawaii-Smoke-Free law is still in its infancy. The very people who are asking for this hearing are disregarding the current laws. And I have not seen any policemen

enforcing this law. I ask you to visit these opposer's venues on ANY night. They (bar owners who disregard the law) post a sign by the entrance that states smoking is not permitted by law, but yet, they are serving ashtrays in the venue, musicians still sing in a smoky mist, bartenders and waitresses empty and replenish these ashtrays and no one is saying anything because no one wants to lose their job or get blacklisted.

In fact, one of the opposers of the smoke-free law was a bar owner that I really like. He gave me my start as a musician. I was so thrilled to play there, that I took the smoky environment as a small sacrifice to fulfill my dreams. By writing in opposition to this bill I will probably lose a good venue to play at in the future. Most musicians will not speak out about issues like these because in the music world, it's all about who you know and who your friends are. I really like this bar owner as a person, but this is such an important matter that I am speaking out even though there may be repercussions to my career.

5. selling a license to select bars for smoking permits would open a can of worms that the city can't afford to pay for

-it will be similar to the ridiculous law that tried to regulate smoking in covered / non covered venues (there was an amazing calculation done by a mathematician that would govern and enforce which venues could have smoking and which couldn't

-it will generate complaints by folks who are expecting a venue to be smoke free and come to find out that it's not, exceptions to the rule will end up in more laws governing these permits and cause more headache for everyone, law-makers included

-the liquor commission may get more fees for the state, but it will cost more to regulate, and the city could make more money by just making law breakers of the Hawaii-smoke-free law pay the fines they should have been paying for a year now. They have not stopped smoking in their venues by any means. (That would be a great assignment for freshly graduated policemen who patrol Waikiki and are assigned with "light" crime like making sure people don't violate parking laws.)

6. Since our smoke-free law went into effect, I have personally seen the positive impact the law has had on my family and the people with whom I work.

More people who normally wouldn't go out, do go out because they enjoy going to venues that are enjoyable to be at and are smoke-free.

Allowing restaurants, bars and clubs to allow smoking again would be taking a huge step backwards.

It is critical that we keep Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law strong, especially now, in light of a few outspoken individuals who disregard the public's right to breathe. The law is working! It is saving lives and creating a cleaner, healthier work and public environment. But there is still so much work to do.

7. Opposers of the law are clearly motivated by the profitability of tobacco - it doesn't matter that they sell products that are proven killers. Bar owners/restaurant owners may claim that they are losing money....but I assure you they are not. They are thriving. Even venues that are abiding by the law are thriving because people that didn't go out before are going out more often now that they can breathe.

Tobacco companies are making desperate efforts to weaken these laws especially since smoke-free laws are rapidly becoming the norm around the world. Hawaii was the 14th state to pass a smoke-free law. Now there are 24 smoke-free states with even more pending. They are losing a bigger and bigger market share, and they are trying everything they can to prevent healthy progress.

Hawaii is seen by the world as a "healthy" place to be. People come from around the world to "enjoy" a peaceful, relaxing atmosphere. Smoke free laws don't impede on a person's right to smoke, they can still smoke in many areas, and in private areas. The good news is that it makes smokers aware that what they are doing is

harmful to others around them and they in turn will be more considerate.

Dear lawmakers, Please keep Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law strong, and do not pass SB 2792, it is critical, especially now, in light of a few outspoken individuals who disregard the public's right to breathe.

Chair Ige and members of the Committee on Health: Thank you for this opportunity to express my strong opposition to SB 2792.

I am a long-time ?smoke free advocate,? having worked during the 1980s and early 1990s with Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, MD, and former surgeon generals to spread the word about the devastating dangers of exposure to tobacco products. A decade of advocating for people with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), which affects an estimated 28,000,000 people (only about half know they have COPD), increased my commitment to protecting people with impaired lung function from the dangers of second-hand and residual smoke.

Worldwide, the entire countries of Ireland, Italy, England, Norway, Sweden, New Zealand, Uganda, Malta, Uruguay, Peru, and Bhutan have enacted smoke free workplace legislation that includes restaurants and bars. The State of Hawai?i now has an opportunity to restate its commitment to providing people who work in bars and restaurants with the same right as workers in other public places to breathe smoke free air.

Mayor Kim, who testified 5 years ago in favor of exempting stand-alone bars from the Hawai?i Island ordinance, has since acknowledged that all employees in public places deserve protection from secondhand smoke. Permitting smoking in bars would imply that bar workers are second-class citizen, unworthy of the protection provided to all other residents.

Hawai?i residents have repeatedly stated a preference for smoke free public places. At its first committee hearing on Bill 224 on February 5, 2008, the Hawai?i County Council received almost unanimous support and voted 8 to 1 to make County beaches tobacco free. Only one Council person called for designated smoking places, citing concern for the safety of smokers who might endanger themselves trying to sneak a cigarette.

Please don't allow a small group of vocal individuals, most of whom are unfortunately addicted to nicotine or who fear personal financial losses, to put Hawai?i in the unfortunate position of ignoring public health and equity issues. More evidence emerges daily about the negative health, environmental, and economic impact of second hand and residual smoke.

You may also receive testimony supporting SB 2792 from people who claim that smoke free legislation violates human rights. But the right to breathe clean air trumps the rights of people to pollute shared space with tobacco smoke.

I urge you to fulfill your oath to promote public health by retaining restrictions that reduce exposure to the known hazards of secondhand smoke and by refusing to exempt certain businesses or permit designated smoking areas. This form of ?segregation? was not effective; smoke cannot be legislated to stay in one area.

CDC survey indicates intimate partner violence may lead to chronic health problems.

Reuters (2/8, Dunham) reports that a Centers for Disease Control (CDC) survey indicates that approximately "a quarter of U.S. women suffer domestic violence," and a number "of these women have other long-term health risks," according to the Feb. 8 issue of the CDC's *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report*. Rita Smith, of the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, said that the survey "confirms...that living in a dangerous and stressful environment has long-term health impacts," because "[i]t's like living in a war zone." The "CDC said 23.6 percent of women and 11.5 percent of men reported being a victim of what is called 'intimate partner violence' at some time in their lives." The agency defines intimate partner violence "as threatened, attempted or completed physical or sexual violence or emotional abuse by a spouse, former spouse, current or former boyfriend or girlfriend or a dating partner."

Females who had such experiences "were 70 percent more likely to have asthma, 40 percent more likely to have heart disease, and 26 percent more likely to have arthritis, compared with women without a history of abuse," adds <u>Bloomberg</u> (2/8, Randall). After surveying "70,156 people in 16 states" who took part in the 2005 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, the researchers also found that "[b]oth men and women who had been abused also were more likely to smoke, binge drink, and engage in sexual activities

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such as prostitution or sex without a condom."

But the survey also indicates "that the prevalence of intimate partner violence was significantly higher among women than men," notes HealthDay (2/8, Reinberg). Specifically, "it was more common among multiracial, non-Hispanic and American Indian/Alaska native women, and among women with low incomes." Intimate partner violence, however, "does appear to be on the decline overall, according to U.S. Department of Justice figures." The rate of intimate partner violence in 1993 "was 9.8 per 1,000 women, and 1.6 per 1,000 men." By "2005, both rates dropped, to 3.6 per 1,000 women and 0.9 per 1,000 men."

WebMD (2/8, DeNoon) reports that Peter Sherman, M.D., from New York's Montefiore Medical Center, attributes the declining figures to the fact that "[I]aws have been changed to make it easier to get a response from police, and in many areas, there are more resources ranging from domestic violence services to hotlines and shelters." Still, Sherman said, "If this were an infectious disease, we would have a treatment center in every neighborhood." Sherman added, "There is a huge disconnect between the prevalence of domestic violence, and what is done in the health system."

Research suggests protein may induce cell apoptosis at first sign of melanoma.

The U.K.'s <u>Guardian</u> (2/8, Jha) reports that researchers at the University of Massachusetts say that a protein called insulin-like growth factor binding protein 7

(IGFBP7) "seems to help melanocytes decide what to become, inducing them to enter a programmed hibernation or kill themselves at the first signs of becoming cancerous," according to results appearing in the journal *Cell*. Approximately "70 percent of melanomas are partly caused by mutations in a gene called BRAF." However, "this variant also occurs in benign moles — though why a melanocyte turns into these as opposed to melanomas has been a mystery until now."

During the study, the research team "identified seventeen genes that were needed by the BRAF protein to cause cell suicide," but they also discovered the "secreted protein" -- IGFBP7, adds Canada's <u>CBC News</u> (2/8). They noted that IGFBP7 "seemed to be released when a melanocyte began expressing BRAF." After the team exposed the protein to rodent melanoma cells, "the growth of their tumor cells was halted."

According to <u>HealthDay</u> (2/8, Preidt), "[i]f this IGFBP7 protein can be produced and delivered to tumors, it may prove effective as a targeted treatment for metastatic melanoma, which is currently untreatable."

Protein that regulates gene transcription may play role in tumor suppression, study suggests. The UPI (2/8) reports that researchers at the Burnham Institute for Medical Research "have discovered a specific gene can suppress skin cancer development," according to a paper appearing in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. The research team "found genetic evidence that Activating Transcription Factor 2, or ATF2 — a protein that regulates gene transcription — responds to extracellular stresses, such as ultraviolet light and ionizing radiation."

Study suggests gene linked to

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inflammatory arthritis may boost cardiovascular risks.

HealthDay (2/8, Preidt) reports that HLA-DRB1, a "gene...that's a associated with an increased risk of developing inflammatory arthritis," might "also increase the chances of premature death from cardiovascular disease (CVD)," according to a study published in the February issue of Arthritis & Rheumatism. Dr. Tracey M. Farragher at the University of Manchester and researchers "looked at 1,022 people with inflammatory polyarthritis, including 751 people with rheumatoid arthritis." Nearly one-quarter of the patients died during the study, "and CVD was the cause of death in 76 (31.4 percent) of those patients." The researchers "found evidence that implicates HLA-DRB1 genotypes...as a predictor of premature death from CVD in patients with inflammatory arthritis."



Environmental toxins may be linked to early onset of puberty, study suggests.

The <u>UPI</u> (2/8) reports that Italian researchers "suggest environmental toxins may be linked to areas where girls have a high incidence of early puberty," according to a paper detailed in the journal *Pediatrics*. After studying participants affected by the onset of early puberty, the team found that the girls had "elevated levels of" mycoestrogen zearalenone, or ZEA, which is "produced by the Fusarium fungus species." ZEA "has properties similar to the female reproductive hormone estrogen, and is structurally similar to anabolic growth agents used in animal breeding."

ACOG releases recommendations for managing asthma during pregnancy.

Medscape (2/8, Barclay) reports that the "American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) has issued a practice bulletin for management of asthma during pregnancy." According to the new recommendations appearing in the February issue of *Obstetrics & Gynecology*," "[d]uring pregnancy, the main goal of asthma treatment is to maintain sufficient oxygenation of the fetus by preventing hypoxic episodes in the mother." ACOG advises pregnant women with asthma to use "inhaled albuterol," but for patients who suffer from persistent asthma, the organization recommends "inhaled corticosteroids" like budesonide. The bulletin's authors note that "[i]n general, only small amounts of asthma medications enter breast milk," therefore the "use of prednisone, theophylline, antihistamines, inhaled corticosteroids, beta2-agonists, and cromolyn is...not contraindicated." ACOG also says that "[a]sthma self-management" is critical because "[s]evere and poorly controlled asthma may be associated with increased prematurity, need for cesarean delivery, preeclampsia, growth restriction, other perinatal complications, and maternal morbidity and mortality."

Study suggests Lactobacillus may decrease HIV load in vaginal tract.

Medscape /Reuters (2/7, Mitchell) reported that researchers at the University of Seattle said that "Lactobacillus, a key regulator of the vaginal ecosystem, also significantly reduces HIV-1 load in the vaginal tract, either directly or by suppression of pathogenic bacteria." At study start, "31 women were on antiretroviral regimens, and 22 had undetectable plasma HIV RNA." But after evaluating the "change in cervicovaginal HIV RNA," the team found that the "[a]cquisition of hydrogen peroxide-producing Lactobacillus correlated with a...decrease in cervicovaginal HIV RNA levels, while the loss of hydrogen peroxide-producing Lactobacillus correlated with a[n] ...increase in cervicovaginal HIV RNA."

Researchers may have identified unrecognized abnormalities associated with Hutchinson-Gilford progeria syndrome.

MedPage Today (2/8, Bankhead) reports that researchers at the National Human Genome Institute say that a "detailed phenotypic evaluation of patients with the rare Hutchinson-Gilford progeria syndrome has revealed previously unrecognized abnormalities that could provide insights into the normal aging process," according to a study appearing in the Feb. 7 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine. These newly documented abnormalities included "prolonged prothrombin times, elevated platelet counts and serum phosphorus, reduced range of motion, hearing loss, and functional oral deficits." For the

study, the research team "identified and described clinical characteristics of 15 children with Hutchinson-Gilford progeria syndrome, about half the world's known population of affected patients." The team found "molecular overlap between the syndrome and normal aging and fibroblasts from an older person contain more progerin than fibroblasts from a younger person."

Early antibiotic course may curtail onset of pneumonia in patients with ventilatorassociated tracheobronchitis, study suggests.

MedPage Today (2/8, Phend) reports that according to findings detailed at the Society of Critical Care Medicine meeting, researchers at France's Calmette Hospital found that "[t]reating ventilator-associated tracheobronchitis in the ICU before it progresses to pneumonia may improve outcomes." For eight days, the researchers administered "intravenous antibiotics" to 22 patients who were diagnosed with "first-episode ventilator-associated tracheobronchitis (fever, purulent sputum, and positive endotracheal aspirate culture, but no new radiographic infiltrate)." The trial's 36 other participants "receive[d] no antibiotics." The team found that the "duration of mechanical ventilation overall was similar between



groups," however, "the number of days alive without mechanical ventilation was substantially greater with antibiotic treatment." Additionally, "the ICU mortality rate was substantially reduced by" the antibiotic therapy, and "[a]ntibiotic-treated patients were also more than three times less likely to go on to develop ventilator-associated pneumonia."

Healthcare technology

Analysis suggests acupuncture may improve IVF outcomes.

The <u>AP</u> (2/8, Marchione) reports that according to findings published in today's issue of *BMJ*, "acupuncture might improve the odds of conceiving if done right before or after embryos are placed in the womb." Lead author Eric Manheimer, M.S., a researcher at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, and colleagues, conducted a meta-analysis of "results from seven studies on 1,366 women in the United States, Germany, Australia, and Denmark who are having in vitro fertilization, or IVF." Participants "were randomly assigned to receive IVF alone, IVF with acupuncture within a day of embryo transfer, or IVF plus sham acupuncture, in which needles were placed too shallowly, or in spots not thought to matter." The researchers found that "three of the studies found acupuncture beneficial," another "three found a trend toward benefit, and one found no benefit."

By combining the study results, the researchers found "a 65 percent increase in pregnancy, and an 87 percent increase in the continuity of the pregnancy," <u>AHN</u> (2/8, Duerme) adds. The results also showed a "ninety-one percent increase" in live births.

The analysis indicated that "in studies where pregnancy rates were high, the benefit of acupuncture was small and non-significant," <u>HealthDay</u> (2/8, Reinberg) reports. Manheimer noted that while "[a]cupuncture may be useful adjuvant treatment in the IVF process," he believes "there needs to be more studies to confirm these findings, because they are still preliminary."

Legislative news

Kentucky House committee passes bill requiring HPV vaccinations.

Kentucky's <u>Louisville Courier-Journal</u> (2/8, Ungar) reports that the state's House committee "approved legislation to require girls to be vaccinated against a sexually transmitted virus that causes most cervical cancer." Sponsored by state Rep. David Watkins (D-Henderson), the bill "would allow parents to opt out on behalf of their daughters by signing a 'refusal to vaccinate' statement." The Courier-Journal notes that "[s]imilar legislation passed the House last year, but died in the

Senate."

Access to healthcare

Florida's percentage of uninsured children higher than national figure, study indicates.

The <u>Orlando Business Journal</u> (2/8, Bandell) reports that according to a study conducted by the University of Florida's Institute for Child Health Policy, the "percentage of uninsured children in Florida is increasing, even though most of them are eligible for government health coverage programs." Moreover, approximately "62 percent of the uninsured children in Florida haven't had coverage for more than a year." The study also revealed that "12.6 percent, or 547,984, of the children under 18 in Florida are uninsured," compared to the national figures, which indicate that "10.5 percent of children are uninsured." Specifically, "eight percent of non-Hispanic white children, 19 percent of Hispanic children and 22 percent of black children are uninsured in Florida," and many "uninsured children live with at least one working parent, but they have low income."

Pharmaceutical news

House committee continues to probe advertisements for cholesterol drug.

The New York Times (2/8, C3, Saul) reports that the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee, which is "investigating the Lipitor (atorvastatin) advertising campaign featuring Dr. Robert Jarvik, wants information about payments to people who might have served as stunt doubles for the doctor in televised ads." On Thursday, letters from Reps. John Dingell (D-Mich.) and Bart Stupak (D-Mich.) were mailed to "nine advertising firms thought to be involved in Dr. Jarvik's advertising campaign for" the drug. The letters said that the aforementioned committee and its "subcommittee on oversight and investigations were investigating 'false and misleading statements and the use of celebrity endorsements of prescription medications in direct-to-consumer advertising." The Times notes that it had reported earlier this week that "Dr. Jarvik does not row and that a Seattle rowing enthusiast and professional photographer...had served as a stunt double in" one ad for the drug.

According to an article on the <u>ABC News</u> (2/7, Owens, et al.) website, "a contract uncovered in the probe has revealed Jarvik was guaranteed \$1.35 million for appearing in the advertisements." The <u>Wall Street Journal</u>'s (2/7, Goldstein) Health Blog also covered the story.

Also in the news

WHO says one billion may die by 2100 due to tobacco.

The New York Times (2/8, A6, McNeil, Jr.) reports that "[t]obacco could kill up to a billion people during the 21st century, as cigarette sales soar in poor and middle-income countries even as they drop in wealthier ones," according to a report issued Thursday by the World Health Organization (WHO). New York City mayor Michael R. Bloomberg's (I) foundation financed the study, which "suggests a six-point program for fighting the tobacco industry's influence." The recommended strategies include "raising cigarette taxes, banning smoking in public places, enforcing laws against giving or advertising tobacco to children, monitoring tobacco use, warning people about the dangers, and offering free or inexpensive help to smokers trying to quit."

According to the <u>Washington Post</u> (2/8, A15, Brown), the study "provides the first comprehensive look at tobacco use, as well as smoking control and taxation policies, in 179 countries." The investigators concluded that "[t]obacco use is a risk factor for six of

the world's eight leading causes of death, and causes about one in every 10 deaths of adults now." If current trends continue, the "toll is expected to rise steeply as tobacco companies target new customers, particularly women, in low-income countries, WHO officials said."

The <u>Wall Street Journal</u> (2/8, B4, McKay) reports that the study "represents the WHO's toughest stance in the fight against tobacco." Currently, the WHO "has an antitobacco treaty that requires 152 participating countries to restrict tobacco advertising, impose tax increases on cigarettes, and smoking bans." Furthermore, the "treaty also encourages countries to explore litigation against tobacco firms." The agency "hopes that governments can replicate at least some of the success Mr. Bloomberg has had in New York City with a tough and highly publicized campaign against tobacco." Mr. Bloomberg's campaign "has included bans on smoking in restaurants and workplaces, tax increases on cigarettes, antitobacco advertising, and other measures."

The <u>UPI</u> (2/8) points out that the American Cancer Society says that it "strongly supports" the WHO's stance on tobacco, since the drug "is the leading cause of preventable death in the world, killing an average of one person every six seconds." The <u>AP</u> (2/8, Lederer), <u>Bloomberg</u> (2/8, Goldman, Varner), <u>Time</u> (2/7, Sharples), <u>HealthDay</u> (2/8), and <u>WebMD</u> (2/8, Hitti) also covered the story.

Good afternoon. My name is Tina Clothier, I am the Chief Staff Officer, Organization and Development, for the American Cancer Society Hawaii Pacific Inc. Thank you for the opportunity to express the Society's opposition to SB 2792 which would weaken Hawaii's comprehensive smoke free law.

The American Cancer Society has over 2 million volunteers working to conquer cancer in over 3,400 community-based units nationwide. In addition to its cancer research, prevention, and control initiatives, the America Cancer Society's advocacy initiative strives to promote beneficial policies, laws and regulations for those affected by cancer. Passing and protecting smoke-free laws is a major nationwide priority for the American Cancer Society because of the indisputable dangers that secondhand smoke poses to public health.

This year approximately 650 new cases of lung cancer will be diagnosed in the State of Hawaii and 440 residents will die from this disease. Lung cancer is caused primarily from smoking and leads to more deaths every year in Hawaii than do breast, prostate, and colorectal cancers combined. In addition to the human pain and suffering associated with lung cancer, tobacco use costs the state over \$644 million in healthcare costs and lost productivity every year. Reducing the public's exposure to secondhand smoke will ultimately reduce the incidence of lung cancer and other diseases. In fact, secondhand smoke is the third leading cause of preventable death. As early as 1986 the Surgeon General's Report, *The Health Consequences of Involuntary Smoking*, concluded that exposure to secondhand smoke caused diseases, including lung cancer. In short, clean indoor laws have been a long-time coming and now that Hawaii is smoke-free we cannot allow a vocal minority to carve out exemptions to this important public health policy.

The vast majority of peer-reviewed studies demonstrate that smoke-free laws do not harm restaurant sales, negatively impact bar revenues, or reduce tourism¹. In fact, smoke-free laws save businesses money and are quickly becoming the norm across the nation and the world. We should strive to uphold Hawaii's global reputation as a clean, beautiful, healthy destination by remaining smoke-free.

Chair Ige and Vice Chair Fukunaga, and members of the Health Committee. My name is Deborah Zysman and I am the Executive Director for the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in strong opposition of SB 2792, which would allow smoking in properly licensed establishments.

The Coalition for a Tobacco Free-Hawaii (Coalition) is a statewide association of nonprofit organizations, large and small businesses, and 2,000 individuals committed to working together to reduce the negative impact of tobacco on the health of Hawaii's children, adults and visitors. The seven founding members of the Coalition are the American Cancer Society, Hawaii Pacific, Inc. (10,000 community supporters); the American Heart Association of Hawaii (30,000 members); the American Lung Association of Hawaii; the Cancer Research Center of Hawaii; the Hawaii State Department of Education; the Hawaii State Department of Health; and the Hawaii Medical Association.

Two years ago, the Coalition, its organizational partners and thousands of individuals from all over the State vigorously advocated for the passage of Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law. This law, as it currently exists, provides comprehensive protections to all of Hawaii's employees, residents, and visitors from the hazards of secondhand smoke in both the workplace and public places. The Smoke-Free law is VERY popular among voters. In a 2007 poll conducted by Hawaii Department of Health, 85% of Hawaii's registered voters supported this law.



After reviewing the provisions of SB 2792, we clearly believe that this is an attempt by a vocal few to bypass Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law. Passing Bill 2792 would once again **expose over** 85,000 of our bar and restaurant workers to the toxins of secondhand smoke. We should not erode the protections we now have in place.

The Health Impact of Secondhand Smoke

I would like to offer some comments on the health science behind Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law. This law was not enacted by the legislature based on "speculation" that this would be a good idea. It was enacted because of the overwhelming health data that had been collected over the past 25 years. The evidence behind the law is staggering and indisputable. As of January 31, 2008, there have been at least 469 scientific studies on the negative health impacts of secondhand smoke.

Two years ago, Dr. Richard Carmona, the U.S. Surgeon General issued a report, titled "The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke." Shortly after releasing his report he visited Hawaii, and while here, Dr. Carmona offered several comments on the efforts to pass Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law, stating that the smoke-free law "would be one of the most effective and comprehensive ways to protect the public health of the people of Hawaii." Quoting from his report he noted, "An environment free of involuntary exposure to secondhand smoke should remain an important national priority in order to reach the Healthy People 2010 objectives."

With regards to the involuntary exposure of nonsmokers to tobacco smoke in the workplace the Surgeon General's report offered the following major conclusions:

- The workplace is a major source of secondhand smoke exposure for adults.
- Exposure of adults to secondhand smoke has immediate adverse effects on the cardiovascular system and causes coronary heart disease and lung cancer.



openings and closings. In 2007, 12 bars closed and 6 opened, for a net loss of 6. In 2006, for the year prior to the smoke-free law going into effect 20 bars closed and 8 opened. Clearly the law did not increase the closure rate.

The results of all credible peer-reviewed studies show that smoke-free laws do not have any negative impact on business revenues. We would point out that in 2002/03, each of Hawaii's county's passed ordinances prohibiting smoking in restaurants. At that time, restaurant owners complained that they would go out of businesses. This did not happen! We have for the members of the Health Committee copies of the Executive Summary of the 2006 Surgeon General's Report which discusses economic impact.

Also, covered on the January 9th legislative briefing was a presentation by Andrew Hyland, PhD, who had been contracted by the Hawaii Department of Health to conduct an economic impact study on the Smoke-Free Law. The Honolulu Advertiser reported "Andrew Hyland, an epidemiologist from the New York-based Roswell Park Cancer Institute, said he will soon submit a report on the effects of Hawai'i's smoking ban, but told lawmakers that the state is not different from other states with similar bans: emotional reaction at the outset, but no negative economic impacts over the long term."

In closing, I would like to commend this legislature for the passage two years ago of one of the most effective public health measures in the nation. Our Smoke-Free Law is a good one. It is fair and equal to all business owners. It is improving our health, saving lives, and has no impact on Hawaii's economy.

Other States that do not have this law are still paying dearly with lives. This past Friday (February 8, 2008) Reuters news service reported "A woman in her late teens died of an acute asthma attack triggered by secondhand cigarette smoke shortly after arriving as her job as a waitress in a bar in Michigan...This is the first reported acute asthma death associated with work-related ETS. Recent studies of asthma among bar workers before



- Eliminating smoking in indoor spaces fully protects nonsmokers from exposure
 to secondhand smoke. Separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air,
 and ventilating buildings cannot eliminate exposures of nonsmokers to
 secondhand smoke.
- There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

It is the role and responsibility of government to regulate businesses when the health and safety of the public is concerned. Our current law does just that. It is also fair and equitable for all businesses.

On January 9, 2008, this Committee along with the House Health Committee held an informational briefing on the impact of Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law one year after implementation. One of the presenters was Dr. Paul Ho, Chief of Cardiology at Kaiser Permanente who noted that heart attack admission for the first quarter of 2007 were down approximately 25% compared to the first quarter of 2006. Preliminary data from HMSA indicates a drop in heart attack admissions at other hospitals in the state. This decline in admissions compares favorably with those of Helena, MT (40% reduction) and Pueblo, CO (27% reduction). Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law is saving lives.

Economic Impact

One of the tactics that the tobacco industry uses is to create dissent and fear by convincing business owners, usually owners of restaurants and bars, that they will lose business. The vocal few who are attempting to amend the Smoke-Free Law with proposed legislation like SB2792, claim economic harm.

The reality is gross liquor sales have been up every year since 2003. In 2003 gross liquor sales in Honolulu, as reported by the Honolulu County Liquor Commission, were \$592.5 million. In 2007 gross liquor sales were \$773.2 million. In addition, employment is up from 19,323 in 2004, to 20,270 in 2007. The liquor commission also reports on liquor establishment



and after smoking bans support this association. This death dramatized the need to enact legal protections for workers in the hospitality industry from secondhand smoke."

We can not take a leap backwards and give some businesses a license to kill.

Aloha Chair and Committee,

The Tobacco-Free Oahu coalition strongly opposes SB 2792 regarding allowing a new license class for restaurants, bars, and nightclubs that would allow them to have an exemption to the smoke-free workplace law that was put into place in November 2006. DO NOT change the current law, it is accomplishing its purpose – to protects people from secondhand smoke.

This bill would be taking a step backwards while the rest of the world is moving forward to protect workers and the public from secondhand smoke. Not only are more states in the US passing and implementing laws similar to Hawaii, but other countries as well, such as France where workplaces, restaurants and bars recently went smoke-free.

Our current law is working, it is providing workers equal protection, as well as a level playing field for all businesses. It has been shown throughout the country that businesses are not adversely affected over the long term. Such as in

- Florida: An analysis by the University of Florida's Bureau of Economic and Business Research, released in June 2004, found that restaurant sales were up 7 percent one year after state's the smokefree law that made all public places and restaurants 100% smokefree took effect on July 1, 2003.
- NewYork: Contrary to arguments of smokefree opponents that smokefree air puts bars and pubs out of business, there was no reported sharp decline in the number of bars following the law's implementation. In fact, the number of bars in the state increased by 3.5%, from April 2002 to May 2004. New York's comprehensive law took effect on June 23, 2003.²
- California: According to the California Board of Equalization, the Golden State's hospitality sector continues to grow since the California Clean Indoor Air Act was enacted in 1994. Sales tax data show an increase in annual sales from \$7.16 billion in 1997 for establishments selling beer and wine to \$9.6 billion in 2002. For establishments selling all kinds of alcohol, sales increased from \$8.64 billion in 1997 to \$11.3 billion in 2002. In 2003, the Board's Employment Development Department reported that the number of individuals employed in California's bars and restaurants had about 200,500 more employees than they did in 1995, before the smokefree policy took effect.³

- Delaware: An economic impact study presented at the 2004 American Public Health Association's Public Health and the Environment Conference found that, one year after implementation, Delaware's comprehensive smokefree law "increased state revenue from gaming by \$5.7 million. The \$5.7 million is equivalent to a 3% increase in state revenue from gaming."4 One year after the state's smokefree law became effective, data showed the number of restaurant, tavern, and taproom licenses in Delaware had increased from 3,291in November 2002 to 3,323 in October of 2003. Employment within the hospitality industry increased, as well, from 27,900 individuals employed in food service and drinking establishments in September 2002 to 28,100 in September 2003.5
- Massachusetts: A Harvard School of Public Health report found that the Massachusetts
 Smoke-Free Workplace Law that made all workplaces, including restaurants and bars, 100%
 smokefree, has not adversely affected statewide meals and alcoholic beverage excise tax
 collection. In addition, the law has not affected keno sales or the number of those working
 in hospitality since the law went into effect on July 5, 2004.6

Tobacco-Free Oahu is comprised of concerned individuals, local businesses, the Department of Health, Kaiser Permanente, HMSA, and non-profit health organizations, such as American Lung Association, American Cancer Society, and Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies. Tobacco-Free Oahu's mission is to be a strong community-based coalition committed to eliminating tobacco use by means of policy change through legislative action, community initiatives, education, prevention and cessation programs.

Chair Ige and members of the Committee on Health: My name is Barbra Pleadwell, and I am in strong opposition to SB 2792 which will harm Hawai?i workers and the public.

Our smoke-free law is a shift in social norm. People are upset, especially people who are addicted to tobacco. So upset, that the opposition has personally attacked the director of the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii this time last year and since.

Last year, with the Senate, I saw perhaps the most disgusting intimidation tactics I have seen in my professional life. These attacks were focused on gender and race, and they reflect the desperation of an addicted population. I am hopeful that the Senate displays zero tolerance for this behavior for the duration of the 2008 session.

There?s been a great deal of noise regarding whether smoke-free laws are pro-business. In a state where unemployment is low and recruitment and retention of a qualified workforce is a top priority, protection of our workers from environments that are hazardous to their health is a no-brainer.

Amazingly, the folks opposing the law have made statements that secondhand smoke is not actually harmful. Workers who rely on paychecks from people who don?t acknowledge the very real threat of tobacco in the workplace are in need of protection.

My family has owned and operated a bar-restaurant in Talofofo, Guam since I was a child. Secondhand smoke and the negative impacts of tobacco on our establishment became more and more apparent over time. A family business required each of us to spend time working, and dealing with temporary and long-term health issues related to a tobacco smoke-filled environment.

Before Guam passed its own legislation, we did our best to minimize exposure by phasing out smoking in our establishment. When my sister, who worked full time at the bar, became pregnant, the mandate became pretty clear and the ashtrays were close to gone. Shortly after, the law was passed and it was a great relief to have the weight of the law behind our philosophy to clean up the air for our family and our fellow workers.

From their intimidation tactics to their earnest promotion of false information, those advocating for exemption to the law have demonstrated clear irresponsibility. This is not pro-business, and it?s certainly not pro-health.

A former staffer for the Department of Health (1990s), I helped perpetuate the nationally known slogan ?The Health State.? It?s time to live that message and protect our law that protects our workers and residents from secondhand smoke. This is a far more appealing and appropriate message for attracting visitors to our state. Any perceived benefit of promoting smoking in Hawai?i is made at the expense of our island health.

My view on Sam's Hideaway, is that it is much like that t.v. show "Cheers!" We have good people who come to our bar. They are like my Auntys



Allowing restaurants, bars and clubs to allow smoking again would be taking a huge step back.

We must keep Hawaii?s Smoke-Free Law strong. The law is working! It is saving lives and creating a cleaner, healthier work and public environment.

Since our smoke-free law went into effect, I have personally seen the positive impact the law has had on my family and the people with whom I work.

Since its enactment, Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law has saved hundreds of lives and protects all of us from the health hazards of secondhand smoke.

Secondhand smoke is a known cause of lung cancer, heart disease, chronic lung ailments such as bronchitis and asthma (particularly in children) and low birth-weight.

Published studies from reputable medical journals have demonstrated a connection between the establishment of smoke-free laws and a reduction in hospital admissions for heart attacks.

Smoke-free laws are rapidly becoming the norm around the world. Hawaii was the 14th state to pass a smoke-free law. Now there are 24 smoke-free states with even more pending. And many countries in Europe and other places are going smoke free.

A few people with special interests are trying to amend the law. Please do not let this happen. The overwhelming majority of Hawaii residents and visitors want to breath smoke free air. Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law is a good one.

The Hawaii Medical Association is opposed to SB2792.

HMA strongly supported the passage of Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law. which is one of the best public health measures the Hawaii legislature has approved.

We oppose SB 2792 because it will weaken Hawaii's comprehensive smoke free law by allowing smoking in bars, nightclubs, and restaurants.

SB2792 will result in no protection from secondhand smoke for the employees of bars, nightclubs and restaurants. Secondhand smoke leading cause of preventable death in Hawaii and it is imperative that we protect employee and individuals from this avoidable health hazard.

In 1982, the Surgeon General reported, "Cigarette smoking is the major single source of cancer mortality in the United States." This statement remains true today and smoking is responsible for nearly 1 in 5 deaths in the United States.

It is important that the Hawaii legislature reject attempts to gain exceptions to Hawaii's Smoke-Free Law.
