Member Guy Kaulukukui Ph.D. Repair and maintenance is a serious and ongoing concern for all public schools. In fact it is a particularly acute one for charter schools in that they are forced to pay for their occupancy costs out of a per pupil allocation that is already substantially lower than that provided to Department of Education-operated schools.

The Department of Education routinely spends many tens of millions of dollars annually on repair and maintenance. Except for the five conversion charters, none of the other 23 charter schools have access to this funding.

Please consider alleviating this difficulty by including charter schools in this measure. One vehicle to make sure that this money would get to all charter schools efficiently would be to direct a portion of it to the proposed Hawaii Charter School Facilities Fund.
