SB2831 SD1 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII CENTER ON AGING EDUCATION AND RESEARCH

Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify. The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa supports Senate Bill 2831 SD1, which would allocate funds to the University of Hawai'i Center on Aging for program expenses and faculty positions in an effort to bolster research and education on issues related to eldercare in the State of Hawai'i.

The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM) is deeply committed to education, research, and service across multiple disciplines in the area of aging. The Center on Aging was established by the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents in 1988 to address the needs of the elderly in the State of Hawai'i, and Hawai'i's demographics underline the importance of such a center. Therefore and in response to legislative requests, we have prepared a funding proposal for a Center on Aging that is sustainable, inclusive, transparent, and interdisciplinary to address the needs of the elderly across the state.

The Center will bring together people and resources within the State of Hawai'i to advance healthcare, public policy, education, legal concerns, research, and other issues associated with the process of aging. Its focal point will be to strengthen efforts dedicated to understanding the aging process and addressing the needs of the elderly in Hawai'i. To provide this focal point, the Center will maintain both a multidisciplinary UHM and statewide scope of activities.

I hope you will agree that this is an important endeavor that will greatly benefit the State of Hawai'i's growing elderly population. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

POSITION: As a citizen and member of the PABEA., I support the appropriation for the UH Center on Aging Research and Education.

RATIONALE:

_ The UH Center for Aging Research and Education (CARE) is currently without a director or any faculty positions and has been unable to admit students for 3 years to its academic programs. Several of us from the Legislative Committee of PABEA have met twice with Chancellor Virginia Hinshaw, who began after the UH Manoa Supplementary budget request was developed. She has indicated her strong support for CARE and has drafted a plan calling for similar resources as proposed in this bill. _ The UH Center constitutes the principal resource for technical consultation for agencies serving the elderly, training programs and workshops for professional and Para professional staff working in the community and academic programs to prepare students to enter this growing field In conclusion, the UH Center on Aging in the past provided important service to the state of Hawaii and these resources are needed to regain its momentum in serving this important role.
