TESTIMONY OF THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

On Senate Bill 2871, Senate Draft 1 – RELATING TO AQUATIC RESOURCES

BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

February 25, 2008

Senate Bill 2871, Senate Draft 1 proposes to create a Makai O Ke Kai program to promote community based marine stewardship in collaboration with the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department), appropriates unspecified amounts to support the program and an advisory committee, and sets an effective date of July 1, 2050. While the Department appreciates the intent of this measure, the Department nonetheless has concerns with the fiscal impacts it will have on the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

The Department would like to acknowledge the valuable contribution of locally coordinated coastal stewardship programs that provide communities concerned with the health of our nearshore marine resources the opportunity to become directly involved in their protection. We recognize that for these types of stewardship activities to grow and be better coordinated there needs to be a framework set in place.

The Department notes that a common framework is preferable to advancing numerous smaller measures independently, which might result in significant inconsistencies, and thus a confusingly disparate web of local regulations along the State's coastlines.

The Department also notes that the adoption of this program would significantly increase the workload of the Department's Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR). Specifically, much of the DAR's existing expertise available for such efforts is already devoted to developing similar community-based fishing areas at Milolii on Hawaii Island and Haena on Kauai, which were mandated in previous legislative sessions. The Department therefore requests that the Legislature should recognize the fact that it will take a considerable period of time for the DAR to properly address all of these community-based management mandates in an effective fashion, and that expectations for action should be structured accordingly. If, however, actions on the part of the Department were coordinated with those of non-governmental organizations that have in the past provided useful interface between coastal communities and the State, then implementation of the goals set forth above could be facilitated in a more timely fashion.

Support for SB 2871 SD 1 Relating to Aquatic Resources



Mālama Hawai'i, a hui of organizations and individuals, whose shared mission is to inspire the people of Hawai'i to care for their island home, **supports** S.B. 2871 Relating to Aquatic Resources.

For the past three years, we have been actively involved in developing a community-based program at Maunalua Bay, Oʻahu (Mālama Maunalua) and have helped start a "makal watch" program there consisting of approximately 25 volunteers and a part-time coordinator. While the Maunalua Makai Watch program is less than a year old, it is showing great potential to develop into a sustained program involving residents from students to senior citizens, fishers, surfers, and anyone who loves and respects the ocean.

But without a strong partnership with the State DLNR and grant funding, programs such as this could become ineffective and short-lived. S.B. 2871 wisely offers a grant program to registered maka'i o ke kai community programs and a direct connection to the DLNR.

The community-based marine management advisory committee could be an effective tool in engaging ocean stakeholders in marine resource and fisheries management throughout the state. Mālama Hawai'i, which specializes in social marketing and effective communications, has experience in stakeholder outreach and would be honored to assist in this effort.

The quality of our lives clearly depends on the health of our living reefs. In this international Year of the Reef, let us do all we can to demonstrate that we ALL are stewards of the ocean and reefs.
