Chairman Ige and members of the Committee on Health:

Life Foundation, Hawaii's oldest and largest AIDS organization, would like to be recorded **In support** of this timely bill.

Hawaii can be proud of its early and effective response to the AIDS epidemic. The AIDS system here is a model of how the branches of government, working in close collaboration with the private sector, can successfully confront something as terrifying and stigmatized as AIDS.

As a result, we have a statewide system of HIV counseling/testing, HIV prevention and case management, in addition to programs that provide needed housing and nutritional assistance. We also have a statewide sterile needle exchange program and a university based clinical trials program that was rescued from near oblivion last year by the legislature.

I am writing in support of SB # 2890

I am both a client of the Hawaii Island HIV/AIDS Foundation, (HIHAF) and a member of the Board of Directors from East Hawaii.

I used the services of HIHAF to help meet my needs. Currently I use the Food Bank at the Kea'au office. I soon will be accessing Ryan White Funds to help with the copayments of my HIV Meds.

Unfortunately as the needs of our clients increase due to many factors including Hawaii's high cost of living, funding is being cut, and our client load continues to increase, as more people are testing HIV positive and are coming to our Foundation for services.

Just this past year, for our Food Program we have had to cut what the clients can receive each week, from two bags of groceries per week down to one bag per week. There are a good percentage of our client bases that is poor and use our food program as their main source of food.

More and more of our clients also need dental work. Lack of dental treatment especially in HIV/AIDS patients makes them more susceptible to other diseases which wear down the body's immune system.

Clients on disability also need help with meeting their rental obligations. They cannot work, so they must rely on this service to keep them in homes, and not living on the streets, jungle or a homeless shelter.

Increasing the funding to HIV/AIDS services will be a great step in assisting our clients with not only their living circumstances, but also less stress, which means better health.

Senator David Y. Ige, Chair Senator Carol Fukunaga, Vice Chair; and Committee on Health Members,

My Name is Jon Berliner, and I serve as executive director of Gregory House Programs, Hawati's only statewide HIV/AIDS housing program.

I strongly urge for passage of SB 2890. Over the years, particularly from 1995 – 2002, state funding for HIV care services was continually reduced through budget restrictions, while at the same time case loads continued to increase. Hawaii will see a reduction in Federal Ryan White CARE Act (now called the Ryan White Modernization Act of 2006) funding due to newly established formulas that penalize smaller states with lower incidence rates. However, the need is till tremendous. Additionally, due to the federal budget for FY '09, just released by the president, funding for housing services for persons with HIV/AIDS is proposed to be level funded, while at the same time three new jurisdictions will be eligible thus meaning that all other jurisdictions will experience funding reductions, under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's HOPWA – Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS program.

Appropriate and adequate maintenance of funding is needed for the areas addressed in SB 2890. Specifically, without housing and support services, it is challenging for persons / families living with HIV/AIDS to access primary medical care. The services funded under SB 2890 are essential in providing stability in the lives of persons challenged with living with HIV/AIDS.

I urge the committee to pass S.B. No. 2890. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

Dear Committee Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and distinguished Members of the Health Committee:

As the Director of the Clint Spencer Clinic, our clinic provides clinical care and education to a large number of Hawaii's HIV infected adult and pediatric population. We treat all individuals infected with HIV the same, regardless if they have insurance or not. Antiretroviral medications have dramatically improved the lives of our patients. However, for these life saving medications to be effective, these medications need to be taken regularly in the day. These medications need to be stored appropriately, often requiring refrigeration. In addition, many of these medications need to be taken with food. These expensive medications and therapy will not mean much if these patients are not able to take them appropriately. It is therefore essential that housing and food be supplemented for these infected individuals to achieve productive and healthy lives. The danger is that without food and housing assistance, many of these infected individuals may have worsening of their disease. The cost savings from removing the current food and housing assistance may be offset by the raising health related costs of worsening disease. There will be no savings and the health of our patients will be worse off.

I strongly support SENATE BILL SB 2890, which proposes state funding to supplement the federal funds received from the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill (HR 6143). This bill would assist in supporting the care of our patients.

My name is Joseph Rattner and on March 15th of this year, it will be fifteen years since I was diagnosed with HIV; the virus that causes AIDS. The fact that I have 'acquired the immunodeficiency syndrome' is by no fault of my own and regardless of the chronic pain or hurt I may incurr because of the disease I still continue to go on living a life filled with two loving parents and a wonderful Family.

Five years ago, SB1227 was passed through the Legislature to supplement for Federal Ryan White funding, which was cut, and Patients living with HIV in Hawaii was then able to continue with Clinical Trials at Leahi Hospital and secure the ADAP Medication Program.

Now in 2008, we need to supplement funding again.

Peter Whiticar, the Chief of the STD/HIV Branch of the Department of Health released information from 2004 through 2007. Not only will we be in the red by 5% or 59,000 this year but essential programs and services needed for people living with HIV such as The Food Basket, Gregory House Programs, Life Foundation, West Oahu Hope For A Cure Foundation (WOHFAC), Maui AIDS, Malama Pono and Big Island AIDS are suffering in many different ways.

Dental Services are extremely scarce because there is no money to take care of HIV patients teeth which if treated early and properly could save the State much money and the patients less pain. The only <u>Wellness Center</u> in the State of Hawaii for people living with HIV/AIDS closed last year leaving many who are recovering so WELL that they can work out with no 'home' for their regimen.

The FoodBasket was suffering last year almost closing their doors. Not only do Clients get food, but also they get healthy and appropriate food. Even the Vitamins were cut to only a few kinds.

Early Testing and Treatment is still waiting for approval and as the State waits, the populous of HIV Diagnoses grows. The fact that AIDS is having such an impact on the 50 and up age bracket really makes for a future Nursing Home problem!

The Clinical Trials Program is again in the need of Funding. Gregory House has a wait list of people, which without the passing of this Bill <u>Homelessness</u> will be inevitable with no place further for their Medications or their lives as they know it.

Is that fair? No

How many more people have to die because the State isn't **akamai** enough to make the right move. Please let <u>SB 2890</u> be the turning point in HIV Care in Hawaii. We sure need it.

Dear Committee Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and distinguished Members of the Health Committee:

I strongly support SB 2890.

I am currently conducting a needs assessment of HIV Medical Care in the state of Hawaii. Part of the assessment is a survey of HIV infected people living in Hawaii which asks about various things, including income. It is a convenience sample which in no way represents all HIV infected people in Hawaii, however, it is large enough that the data is meaningful. Of the 327 responses received so far, 40% are living on a combined annual household income of less than \$12,000 and an additional 30% are living on a combined annual household income of less than \$25,000. Without programs which supplement their housing and nutrition they would not be able to afford a stable living arrangement and adequate diet. Through health insurance and a State program called HDAP most people in Hawaii can access life-saving medication (antiretroviral therapy), but it needs to be stored properly and taken on time every day for the rest of their lives. This is difficult in the best of circumstances, but impossible if they do not have a stable living situation. Likewise a balanced diet is necessary to boost the immune system. I do not need to tell anyone who shops here how expensive groceries are in Hawaii!

I have seen some of the programs the would be funded (Save the Food Basket and Gregory House) at work and I was impressed at the quality of services they provide and how they keep their costs and overhead to a minimum. Please support them in their work.

Dear Committee Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and distinguished Members of the Health Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in strong support of SB 2890, (MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HEALTH CARE SERVICES).

My name is Debra Ogata-Arakaki. I was born and raised in Hawaii, and have spent the past 21 years working as an HIV research nurse and coordinator. I began my research career in 1986 at the National Institutes of Health, at a time when AIDS was at its infancy. There were no anti-HIV drugs available at that time. A diagnosis of AIDS was a death sentence. It was only through the tireless efforts of many researchers and nurses, dedicated and willing research participants that new drugs to treat HIV and its many infections were developed. Today, a diagnosis of HIV is no longer an ominous sentence and with proper care and treatment, people living with HIV can maintain healthy, productive lives.

I support this bill because it will help to support programs that have done, and can continue to do, valuable work for the people in Hawaii living with HIV. Programs such as HIV counseling and testing, HIV drug assistance programs, housing and food assistance, AIDS surveillance, and dental assistance are already under-funded. Federal funding for many HIV-related programs has decreased sizably over the past few years. Many programs can't continue to provide the level of services they have been able to provide in the past due to the continued cuts in funding. This bill will help to supplement the federal funds received through the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill and help to maintain these valuable programs.

The state can chose to support the health and welfare of HIV-infected individuals so they may be contributing, productive citizens, or they can turn away and pay for it on the backend, supporting them financially in the hospital once they are ill.

In summary I would like to restate my strong support for passage of SB 2890. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony for the committee.

Honorable Senators and Committe Members:

Thank you for allowing me to offer my urgent support of SB 2890 at this time.

As a past President of PWA Coalition Hawai'i, a non profit 501 c 3 advocacy organization, and currently a health advocate for chronic and terminally ill individuals living and residing on O'ahu, I am well aware of past, present and future anticipated federal funding cutbacks regarding services to persons living with HIV and AIDS in Hawai'i.

Unfortunately, as you may know, the number of persons living with HIV and AIDS continues to rise on our islands. However, the available funding for said individuals continues to be deficient to cover core needs as determined by a statewide needs assessment and plan of 2006 through 2009 by the Department of Health and the STD/AIDS Prevention Branch.

Housing is a number one concern and funding is lacking to cover the shortfalls for disabled and low income individuals who are living with HIV and AIDS. Comprehensive dental care is a necessity and we find that deep tissue cleanings and root canals may not be covered under existing Medicaid programs offered by the State. Shortfalls are readily apparent in this area. Additionally, the need for funding to cover food assistance to support the basic nutritional needs of low income and terminally ill individuals remains a priority.

Prevention and maintenance of well being and vital health concerns go a long way to forestall more serious health issues for individuals in the future. Now is the time to allow funding to stem further more costly services.

My Name is Raymond Alejo, Nurse Case Manager for the Life Foundation,

Please add the need for medical housing for people diagnosed with AIDS and HIV. We have HIV clients in the hospital that are homeless. Hospitals are pressured to discharge patients without adequate housing plan for continued medical care and recovery.

Hospitals often threaten patients that they will charge them \$500-\$1000 dollars a day if

the hospital decides to change the patient's status to ICF and DC with out adequate housing plans done for that patient.

Often the patient has no housing resources and will need time to re-cooperate. But with the threat of being charged \$1000.00 a day, the client is forced to leave the hospital or face being in debt without money, to pay for their hospital stay.

This can be often avoided with appropriate DC planning but at times it is not the case. Patients are often too weak at that point to defend themselves against being charged that and many have no family to take them.

Please add the need for medical housing for people diagnosed with AIDS and HIV, and fund this important need.
