Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair English, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Andrew Hashimoto. I serve as the Dean of UH Mānoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) and an ex-officio member of the Board of Agriculture. I am pleased to provide this personal testimony on Senate Bill 3208, which establishes a state organic program under the direction of the Department of Agriculture and appropriates funds to the Department of Agriculture to implement a state organic program. This testimony does not represent the position of the University of Hawai'i or of CTAHR.

I support SB 2925.

The popularity of agricultural products grown using organic agriculture practices has increased remarkably in recent years. According to the Organic Trade Association's 2006 Manufacturer Survey, U.S. retail sales of organic food are growing at close to 20 percent per year, from \$3.6 billion in 1997 to \$13.8 billion in 2005. Here in Hawai'i, consumer demand for organic goods outpaces supply. Because organic farmers use only a proscribed set of pest control options, imported organic produce is an important route by which new pests and diseases organisms can enter the state, and replacing those imports with locally grown organic goods can remedy this risk. Expansion of organic agriculture production in Hawai'i will also provide consumers with the freshest organic produce and enable local farmers to benefit from consumer demand for organic goods and receive a price premium for their crops.

A state organic agriculture program administered by the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture and developed in partnership with stakeholders in the organic agriculture community will expand the resources available to organic growers and help expand of the market for goods grown organically in Hawai'i. For these reasons, I support SB 2925.

My name is Gary Maunakea-Forth, I am a resident of the Wai'anae community, and an organic farmer. In 2001, I helped to establish the MA'O Community Food Security Initiative, a non-profit project of the Wai'anae Community Re-Development Corporation (WCRC) in order to create a community food system, that fights hunger, improves nutrition, strengthens local organic agriculture and empowers local families to move towards self-sufficiency. WCRC developed a series of interconnected youth leadership development activities as a core objective with MA'O Organic Farms established as both the primary training venue and the long-term source of sustainability. Our products are highly sought after, sold at top restaurants like Town, Alan Wong's and Nobu; and available to local consumers at natural food stores and at the KCC farmer's market. We have dozens of local customers demanding our products, but presently we farm only 5-acres. With the help of the support of the Legacy Lands Conservation Program will hopefully expand this year.

I am writing in strong support of SB 2925, it is imperative for the future of local agriculture that the State becomes actively involved in programs that especially support Hawai'i's small family fams. In my 8-years as an organic farmer I concur with the points made in the bill, I would like to highlight that local demand is enormous, while local supply is miniscule. In Hawai'i, there are numerous pressures on small farms, and the few young people that desire this lifestyle are not supported. A cohesive strategy to make the most of the organic opportunity needs to be implemented. I urge the State to commitment resources before we lose this economic, environmental and culture opportunity.

The HCIA is comprised of five member companies that farm an estimated 8,000 acres on four islands, valued at \$97.6 million in operating budget (2006/2007 HASS). We are proud members of Hawaii's diversified agriculture and life sciences industries.

HCIA believes in co-existence of all farming practices, whether it might be organic, conventional and biotechnology methods. We continue to be supportive of increasing the organic agriculture sector. Certainly, with a robust organic agriculture sector there will be less reliance on imported organic produce, which contributes to the importation of invasive species into Hawaii. Consumer demand for organic produce is at an all time high and Hawaii grown organic produce will increase its contribution to the general revenue of the State.

My client Monsanto has concerns about the preambles to the bills (SB 2925 being heard tomorrow) above. The preambles, likely unintentionally, seem to imply that organic farming is somehow better for human health and sustainability of the environment than other farming methods — not necessarily true.

In one place in all three bills the language is of special concern: "without the use of toxic substances, such as pesticides and fertilizers." In actuality, organic farming, though it does not use most so-called synthetic pesticides and fertilizers, depends heavily on pesticides and other farm chemicals. The difference between pesticides used by organic and modern farmers is not their toxicity, but rather their origin, i.e, whether they are extracted from natural plants, insects, or mineral ores (organic) or are chemically synthesized (modern). Organic farming involves the use of toxic chemicals.

Our suggestion is to amend the above bills by deleting the preamble language ending with "such as pesticides and fertilizers." This removes contentious language without harm to the preamble's "pumping up" of organic farming.
