In Support of SB 3137 Making an Appropriation to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for Akule Fish Monitoring

Chair Hee and members of the committee:

I am Cynthia K.L. Rezentes, a resident of the Wai'anae Coast, and I am in support of SB 3137.

For generations the fishermen of Wai'anae have relied upon the *akule* as a source of subsistence living, whether to directly feed their families or to provide a commercial fishing livelihood.

Over the years near-shore activities have placed pressure on areas once depended upon for harvesting the fish. Some of the fishing grounds have been given up to be able to live, work and play in harmony with one another, e.g. Makaha Surfing Beach area.

Today, we are seeing increasingly more pressures being placed upon traditional harvesting grounds like Makua, Nanakuli, and Kahe Point. These areas are seeing increases in wild-life viewing (i.e. dolphins, snorkeling, diving, etc.) and other activities, e.g. sailing, overnight anchoring, etc. The commercial fishermen who rely upon these areas to harvest the *akule* have noticed declines in catch sizes and opportunities for harvest in the area.

Since a significant amount of the commercially available *akule* in state markets are harvested from the Ka'ena Point to Pearl Harbor region, it is imperative that we understand the current behavior of the fish to better understand how to manage these resources for today and the future.

Therefore, I urge the committee to support SB 3137.

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TESTIMONY OF THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

on Senate Bill 3137 – Relating to an Appropriation to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for Akule Fish Monitoring

BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WATER AND LAND

February 13, 2008

Senate Bill 3137 would appropriate \$25,000 for an akule tagging study along the western and southwestern shores of Oahu. While the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports the intent of the measure, the Department nonetheless has concerns with the fiscal impacts it will have on the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

The Department notes that it prepared a report in 1973 analyzing akule data from 1960–1970. The tagging portion of the study looked at movement along the southwestern and western shores of Oahu from 1965–1967. Tagging stations were set up at Waikiki, Honolulu Harbor, Ewa Beach, Pokai Bay, and Haleiwa Bay. From over 10,000 fish tagged with over 800 recoveries, the data indicated that there was little along-shore movement with the majority of fish staying within the area where they were tagged and released. Fishers report to us that the fish will normally move inshore during the day and offshore during the night.

While the Department recognizes that changes have occurred in the nearshore environment over the past 40 years, we feel that the basic behavior patterns of akule as indicated in the above study are still likely to prevail. Therefore, we feel the Legislature should carefully consider whether such work needs to be repeated as proposed in the current measure.
