URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, OFFICE OF PLANNING, LAND USE COMMISSION, HONOLULU CITY COUNCIL, AND CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU TO SUPPORT AND FURTHER THE DESIGNATION OF GALBRAITH LANDS AS IMPORTANT AGRICULTURAL LANDS, AND PRESERVE AND PERPETUATE THEM AS AGRICULTURAL LANDS.

Chairs Tokuda, Hee, and Inouye, Vice Chairs English, Kokubun, and Tsutsui, and Members of the Senate Committees on Agriculture and Hawaiian Affairs, Water and Land, and Intergovernmental and Military Affairs.

SCR 144 and SR 76 urges the City and County of Honolulu to initiate the process to identify the Galbraith lands for designation as important agricultural lands (IAL), and urges the City Council, the Department of Agriculture, the Office of Planning (OP), and the Land Use Commission (LUC) to support the delineation of these lands as IAL. The resolutions further request the LUC and the City and County of Honolulu to restrict use of the land to facilitate the long-term dedication of the Galbraith lands as agricultural lands.

OP supports the intent of the resolutions, since the Galbraith lands meet many of the criteria in Section 205-44, HRS, for the identification of important agricultural lands. However, we note there are several obstacles to the achievement of the objectives of SCR 144 and SR 76.

Under current law, the LUC cannot designate IAL based on county-approved maps until three years <u>after</u> the enactment of the agricultural incentives. Thus, the passage of agricultural incentives legislation this year is critical to the eventual designation of Galbraith and other lands as IAL.

Even so, current law (paragraph 205-49(a)(3)) bars the designation of more than a majority of Galbraith lands as IAL, unless the landowner files a voluntary petition under Section 205-45 to designate more of their land as IAL. This provision is a significant impediment to designating all of the Galbraith lands as IAL.

While IAL is a first and necessary step in the protection of landmark agricultural land like the Galbraith lands, it is important to recognize the limitations of the current law in ensuring long-term dedication of the lands to agricultural use. Chapter 205, HRS, lacks use and density standards for IAL that would restrict the lands to purely agricultural use with strict farm dwelling limitations.

In closing, it will be difficult to secure the long-term dedication of the Galbraith lands as agricultural lands without enacting legislation that: (1) establishes restrictive permissible uses and development standards for IAL; and (2) establishes State programs for the transfer of development rights or purchase of development rights, and funding, that would enable land to be protected for agricultural use in perpetuity.

On the cultural concerns, I'd like to see that the buffer zone for Kukaniloko Birth Stones be increased for further protection. As you know Kukaniloko is known as the Piko of Oahu and this suggestion for expanding the buffer zone for futher protecting this wahi pana is highly deserving. My Kupana were cultural informants of Walalua Moku for Bishop Museum and featured in their publication entitled Archeology of Oahu – Bulletin 104 (McAllister 1933) where they shared information about Kukaniloko. They also had a special relationship with Elizabeth Lahilahi Webb who was also the historian of The Daughters of Hawaii which was formed at Dillingham Ranch in Mokulei'a
