Purpose:

To determine whether an extension of the school day, designed to provide increased academic and socio-

cultural opportunities for students in kindergarten

through grade twelve, is an affordable and sound

investment for the State of Hawaii.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) does

support S.C.R. 72. The Department supports the need

to re-assess the appropriate level of instructional time

allotted and the proper learning environments offered

within the school day. The Department concurs with the

fact-finding approach and the wisdom in the proactive

stance. A well-designed and executed feasibility study

would help frame future policy discussions related to an

extended school day and to promote well-informed

policy decision-making. To ensure that the findings from such a study are construed as credible, we recommend the study be carefully developed and conducted by an independent and well-respected research organization, and it would incur costs that have neither been budgeted nor appropriated. Finally, should such a study be undertaken, the Department recommends that fact finding efforts integrate the examination of an extended or modified school year be considered as an option.
