A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LANGUAGE ACCESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Hawaii is a melting pot of diverse
- 2 nationalities and cultures. Diversity defines Hawaii's
- 3 residents and makes this State a unique place to live.
- 4 According to the 2000 United States Census, over twelve per
- 5 cent of the State's residents speak English "less than very
- 6 well." These residents face daily challenges, whether it is
- 7 struggling to consult with a school counselor about their
- 8 child's performance at school or to understand a notice
- 9 regarding public housing benefits.
- 10 In a movement to reinforce Title VI of the 1964 Civil
- 11 Rights Act barring discrimination on the basis of race, color,
- 12 or national origin, President Clinton issued an executive order
- on August 11, 2000, directing all federal agencies to publish 13
- 14 written policies on how recipients can provide access to persons
- of limited English proficiency and improve language 15
- 16 accessibility to its programs.
- 17 The legislature finds that as one of only four states to
- 18 enact a statewide law on language access, Hawaii is on the HB813 CD1 HMS 2009-4028



- 1 leading edge of breaking down language barriers to enable its
- 2 diverse population, particularly persons who are limited in
- 3 their English language proficiency, to gain equal access to
- 4 much-needed government services at no extra charge. Whether the
- 5 State provides access to its services and programs through an
- 6 interpreter or translates key documents needed to access its
- 7 services, residents with limited English proficiency benefit by
- 8 being able to fully participate in the community as self-
- 9 sufficient and productive members of the community. Ongoing
- 10 education and efforts are needed to ensure that language access
- 11 becomes the norm in the provision of government services.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to designate the month of August
- 13 as "Language Access Month" to promote awareness of language
- 14 access for government services and emphasize the importance of
- 15 and need for language access in Hawaii's diverse society.
- 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 17 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
- 18 read as follows:
- 19 "S8- Language access month. The month of August shall
- 20 be known and designated as "Language Access Month" to promote
- 21 awareness of language access for government services and
- 22 emphasize the importance of and need for language access in



- 1 Hawaii's diverse society. This month is not and shall not be
- 2 construed as a state holiday."
- 3 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 4 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
