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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII TOURISM AUTHORITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 201B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§201B- Applicability of Hawaii public procurement code;
5	convention center contractor. The private contractor that
6	operates the convention center, by its direct or indirect
7	receipt of, and its expenditure of, public funds from the
8	department of business, economic development, and tourism or the
9	Hawaii tourism authority, or both, shall be subject to chapter
10	103D."
11	SECTION 2. Section 102-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
13	"(b) The bidding requirements of subsection (a) shall not
14	apply to concessions or space on public property set aside for
15	the following purposes:
16	(1) For operation of ground transportation services and
17	parking lot operations at airports, except for motor
18	vehicle rental operations under chapter 437D;

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- (2) For lei vendors;
 (3) For airline and
- 2 (3) For airline and aircraft operations;
- 7 (5) For operation of concessions set aside without any charge;
 - (6) For operation of concessions by handicapped or blind persons; except concessions operated in the public schools by blind or visually handicapped persons in accordance with section 302A-412;
 - (7) For operation of concessions on permits revocable on notice of thirty days or less; provided that no such permits shall be issued for more than a one year period;
- 17 (8) For operation of concessions or concession spaces for a beach service association dedicated to the preservation of the Hawaii beach boy tradition, incorporated as a nonprofit corporation in accordance with state law, and whose members are appropriately licensed or certified as required by law;

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1	(9)	For operation of concessions at county zoos, botanic
2		gardens, or other county parks which are
3		environmentally, culturally, historically, or
4		operationally unique and are supported, by nonprofit
5		corporations incorporated in accordance with state law
6		solely for purposes of supporting county aims and
7		goals of the zoo, botanic garden, or other county
8		park, and operating under agreement with the
9		appropriate agency solely for such purposes, aims, and
10		goals;
11	(10)	For operation of concessions that furnish goods or
12		services for which there is only one source, as
13		determined by the head of the awarding government
14		agency in writing that shall be included in the
15		contract file; and
16	(11)	[For operation of concession or concession spaces at
17		the convention center under chapter 201B; and
18	(12]	For any of the operations of the Hawaii health systems
19		corporation and its regional system boards."
20	SECT	ION 3. Section 201-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended t	o read as follows:

4		(F)	Make grants or contracts as may be necessary or
5			advisable to accomplish the foregoing;
6	(2)	Land	development. The department shall [encourage]:
7		(A)	Encourage the most productive use of all land in
8			the State in accordance with a general plan
9			developed by the department; [encourage]
10		(B)	Encourage the improvement of land tenure
11			practices on leased private lands; [promote]
12		<u>(C)</u>	Promote an informational program directed to
13			landowners, producers of agricultural and
14			industrial commodities, and the general public
15			regarding the most efficient and most productive
16			use of the lands in the State; and [make]
17		(D)	Make grants or contracts as may be necessary or
18			advisable to accomplish the foregoing;
19	(3)	Cred	it development. The department shall [conduct]:
20		(A)	Conduct continuing study of agricultural and
21			industrial credit needs; [encourage]

1		(B) Encourage the development of additional private
2		and public credit sources for agricultural and
3		<pre>industrial enterprises; [promote]</pre>
4		(C) Promote an informational program to acquaint
5		financial institutions with agricultural and
6		industrial credit needs and the potential for
7		agricultural and industrial expansion, and inform
8		producers of agricultural and industrial products
9		as to the manner in which to qualify for loans;
10		and [make]
11		(D) Make grants or contracts as may be necessary or
12		advisable to accomplish the foregoing;
13	(4)	Promotion. The department shall disseminate
14		information developed for or by the department
15		pertaining to economic development to assist present
16		industry in the State, attract new industry and
17		investments to the State, and assist new and emerging
18		industry with good growth potential or prospects in
19		jobs, exports, and new products. The industrial and
20		economic promotional activities of the department may
21		include the use of literature, advertising,
22		demonstrations, displays, market testing, lectures,

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1		trav	el, motion picture and slide films, and other
2		prom	otional and publicity devices as may be
3		appr	opriate;
4	[-(5)-	Tour	ism research and statistics. The department shall
5		main	tain a program of research and statistics for the
6		purp	ose of:
7		(A)	Measuring and analyzing tourism trends;
8		(B)	Providing information and research to assist in
9			the development and implementation of state
10			tourism policy;
11		(C)	Encouraging and arranging for the conduct of
12			tourism research and information development
13			through voluntary means or through contractual
14			services with qualified agencies, firms, or
15			persons; and
16		(D)	Providing tourism information to policy makers,
17			the public, and the visitor industry. This
18			includes:
19			(i) Collecting and publishing visitor-related
20			data including visitor arrivals, visitor
21			characteristics and expenditures;

1	(ii)	Collecting and publishing hotel-related
2		statistics including the number of units
3		available, occupancy rates, and room rates;
4	(iii)	Collecting and publishing airline-related
5		data including seat capacity and number of
6		flights;
7	(iv)	Collecting information and conducting
8		analyses of the economic, social, and
9		physical impacts of tourism on the State;
10	(v)	Conducting periodic studies of the impact of
11		ongoing marketing programs of the Hawaii
12		tourism authority on Hawaii's tourism
13		industry, employment in Hawaii, state taxes,
14		and the State's lesser known and
15		underutilized destinations; and
16	(vi)	Cooperate with the Hawaii tourism authority
17		and provide it with the above information in
18		a timely manner; and
19	[(6)] <u>(5)</u> Self	-sufficiency standard. The department shall
20	establish	and update biennially a self-sufficiency
21	standard	that shall incorporate existing methods of
22	calculati	on, and shall reflect, at a minimum, costs

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2	health care, clothing and household expenses, federal
3	and state tax obligations, family size, children's
4	ages, geography, and the number of household wage
5	earners. The department shall report to the
6	legislature concerning the self-sufficiency standard
7	no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
8	the regular session of 2009, and every odd-numbered
9	year thereafter. The recommendations shall address,
10	among other things, the [utilization] use of any
11	federal funding that may be available for the purposes
12	of establishing and updating the self-sufficiency
13	standard.
14	The department shall be the central agency to coordinate
15	film permit activities in the State."
16	SECTION 4. Section 201B-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended to read as follows:
18	"§201B-2 Hawaii tourism authority; establishment; board;
19	[staff.] president and chief executive officer. (a) There is
20	established the Hawaii tourism authority, which shall be a body
21	corporate and a public instrumentality of the State, for the

- 7 (1) [Twelve public, voting] The members shall be appointed
 8 by the governor as provided in section 26-34, except
 9 as otherwise provided by law;
 - (2) The [twelve public, voting] members shall be composed of at least one representative each from the city and county of Honolulu and the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui; the remaining [public] members shall be appointed at-large;
- [Of the twelve public, voting members, three] Three

 members shall be appointed by the governor from a list

 of three names submitted for each appointment by the

 president of the senate, and three shall be appointed

 by the governor from a list of three names submitted

 for each appointment by the speaker of the house of

 representatives; provided that if fewer than three

1		names are submitted for each appointment, the governor
2		may disregard the list;
3	(4)	At least six [of the twelve public, voting] members
4		shall have knowledge, experience, and expertise in the
5		area of visitor industry management, marketing,
6		promotion, transportation, retail, entertainment, or
7		visitor attractions, and at least one shall have
8		knowledge, experience, and expertise in the area of
9		Hawaiian cultural practices; provided that no more
10		than three members shall represent, be employed by, or
11		be under contract to any sector of the industry
12		represented on the board;
13	(5)	The governor shall make appointments to ensure the
14		fulfillment of all requirements; provided that any
15		appointments made after July 1, 2002, shall be made to
16		fulfill the requirements in place when the
17		appointments are made;
18	[(6)	The director of business, economic development, and
19		tourism, or a designated representative, shall be an
20		ex officio nonvoting member;

1	(/)	The director of transportation, or a designated
2		representative, shall be an ex officio nonvoting
3		member;
4	(8)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
5		resources, or a designated representative, shall be an
6		ex officio nonvoting member;
7	(9)	The executive director of the state foundation on
8		culture and the arts, or a designated representative,
9		shall be an ex officio nonvoting member; and
10	[(10)]	(6) No person who has served as a member of the board
11		of directors of the Hawaii Visitors and Convention
12		Bureau shall be eligible to sit as a [public, voting]
13		member of the board of directors of the Hawaii tourism
14		authority until at least two years have expired
15		between the person's termination from service on the
16		Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau board and the
17		person's appointment to the authority's board of
18		directors.
19	(c)	[The public members] Members shall be appointed by the
20	governor	for terms of four years. Each [public] member shall
21	hold offic	ce until the member's successor is appointed and
22	qualified	. Section 26-34 shall be applicable insofar as it
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- ${f 1}$ relates to the number of terms and consecutive number of years a
- 2 member may serve on the board.
- 3 (d) The board shall elect a chairperson from among the
- 4 [voting] members. [The director of business, economic
- 5 development, and tourism or the designated representative shall
- 6 not be chairperson of the board.
- 7 (e) Seven [voting] members shall constitute a quorum and a
- 8 minimum of seven affirmative votes shall be necessary for all
- 9 actions by the authority. The members shall serve without
- 10 compensation, but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including
- 11 traveling expenses, necessary for the performance of their
- 12 duties.
- (f) The board shall appoint [an executive director,] one
- 14 person to serve as president and chief executive officer, exempt
- 15 from chapters 76 and 88 who shall oversee the authority staff;
- 16 provided that the compensation package, including salary, shall
- 17 not exceed nine per cent of the five per cent authorized for
- 18 administrative expenses under section 201B-11(c); and provided
- 19 further that the compensation package shall not include private
- 20 sector moneys or other contributions. The board shall set the
- 21 [executive director's] president and chief executive officer's
- 22 duties, responsibilities, holidays, vacations, leaves, hours of

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1 work, and working conditions. It may grant [such] other 2 benefits as it deems necessary. 3 [The board may appoint a sports coordinator, exempt from 4 chapters 76, 78, and 88, who shall provide management services 5 for all sporting events supported through the authority. 6 (q) The authority may employ persons not subject to 7 chapters 76 and 78 to perform and execute the functions of the 8 authority.]" 9 SECTION 5. 10		officer, engage the services of consultants on a
11		contractual basis for rendering professional and
12		technical assistance and advice;
13	(12)	Procure insurance against any loss in connection with
14		its property and other assets and operations in
15		amounts and from insurers as it deems desirable;
16	(13)	Contract for or accept revenues, compensation,
17		proceeds, and gifts or grants in any form from any
18		public agency or any other source, including any
19		revenues or proceeds arising from the operation or use
20		of the convention center;

Tourism; Hawaii Tourism Authority Board; Tourism Emergency

Description:

Makes a technical amendment to tourism law regarding development of measures of effectiveness; removes ex-officio members from the Hawaii Tourism Authority Board and places them in an advisory group to Hawaii Tourism Authority; expands the scope of a tourism emergency to include a national or global economic crisis; transfers tourism-related functions from the department of business, economic development, and tourism to the Hawaii tourism authority; requires the private contractor and concessions of the Hawaii convention center to be subject to the procurement code; earmarks an unspecified percentage of moneys allocated to the tourism special fund from the transient accommodations tax to be used for tourism product development and cultural programs.
