A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that over twenty-five per 1 cent of Hawaii's households have at least one individual 2 providing informal, unpaid care to an adult aged sixty or older 3 4 with physical or cognitive disabilities. This percentage is 5 expected only to increase. Projections indicate that by the year 2020, more than one in four individuals will be aged sixty 6 7 or older, and an individual's need for personal care assistance due to physical, sensory, cognitive, and self-care disabilities 8 increases with age. 9 10 The legislature finds that the average age of family 11 caregivers is fifty-four years of age, which is well below the age of retirement. Over fifty-five per cent of the family 12 caregivers are employed, and of this group, over twenty-six per 13 cent indicate that their employment is affected by their 14 caregiving responsibilities. Reduction in work hours was an oft 15 cited effect, followed by turning down promotions and taking 16 leaves of absence. Nearly all of the family caregivers surveyed 17 18 stated that they frequently rearrange their work schedules, and

- 1 over seventy-seven per cent take time off from work to deal with
 2 caregiving responsibilities.
- 3 The legislature finds that approximately ten per cent of
- 4 the Hawaii workforce, or over eighty thousand employees, may
- 5 currently seek or need to take some form of leave to address
- 6 family caregiving issues.
- 7 The legislature further finds that in seeking to analyze
- 8 and develop improvements to the family leave system there is
- 9 inadequate data about the use of and need for family leave.
- The purpose of this Act is to create a family leave data collection system to:
- (1) Create a data collection system that is capable of analyzing and reporting family caregiving data for public employees;
- (2) Ensure that information about uncovered employees iscaptured by the data system; and
- 17 (3) Create the basis for development of a data-driven paid

 18 family leave system that can complement other care

 19 giver services, especially for elder family members.
