A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

HB983 HD1 HMS 2009-2561

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that almost every school SECTION 1. in Hawaii is plaqued by traffic congestion that results from 2 poor planning and increased vehicular traffic. It is estimated 3 that as much as twenty to twenty-five per cent of morning 4 5 traffic consists of parents driving their children to school. 6 Ironically, safety concerns lead parents to drive their children to school, which increases the traffic and makes it even less 7 safe for others to walk and bike. Unfortunately, fifty per cent 8 9 of children who are hit by cars near schools are hit by cars 10 driven by parents of other students.

11 As part of the 2005 Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient 12 Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, Public Law No. 13 109-59, Hawaii has been awarded \$1,000,000 per year for five years for the Safe Routes to School program. Program funds may 14 15 be used for both infrastructure-related and behavioral projects 16 designed to reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools and provide a safe and appealing 17 environment for primary and secondary school children to walk 18

and bicycle to school. Unfortunately, Hawaii has not made
 optimum use of its \$5,000,000 share of Safe Routes to School
 grant funding. Implementation of the program and distribution
 of funds has been slow, and as a result, \$3,000,000 remains
 unused.

6 Efficient and effective use of Safe Routes to School 7 funding requires planning that includes the full range of 8 community stakeholders so that projects have the support of 9 parents, students, and schools needed to succeed. Planning also 10 needs to deemphasize very expensive engineering changes, like 11 additional traffic lights that can consume one-third of the 12 annual grant budget. Smaller projects involving more stakeholders and more schools are necessary to generate change 13 14 across a broad spectrum of the state. The process must begin 15 with assembling basic information about transportation issues 16 confronting students, parents, and the community.

17 The purpose of this Act is to enhance traffic safety,
18 especially around Hawaii's schools, through the federal Safe
19 Routes to School program.

20 SECTION 2. (a) The director of transportation, through
21 the Safe Routes to School coordinator, shall conduct a statewide
22 pupil travel evaluation to study how students get to school.

1 would need to change for the parent to permit the 2 student to walk or ride a bicycle to school; 3 Identify traffic infrastructure elements in the (4) immediate vicinity of each school, including multi-4 lane roadways, speed limits, and traffic calming 5 features that, either by their presence or absence, 6 7 contribute to the use of automobiles as a student's mode of travel to school; and 8 (5) 9 Prepare a map of the immediate vicinity of each school 10 that can be used to identify alternate locations for 11 students to be dropped off by automobiles and buses 12 and safe routes for students to walk and ride bicycles 13 to school. 14 SECTION 3. The director of transportation shall, in 15 consultation with organizations that have received non-16 infrastructure and pending infrastructure grants, develop a 17 streamlined process for the federal Safe Routes to School grant 18 program that simplifies the application process and expedites release of funding for the school-based workshops and community-19 20 based planning projects required by section 2(a).

21 SECTION 4. The director of transportation shall submit a

required by this Act and the school-based workshops and
 community-based planning projects funded by the Safe Routes to
 School program, no later than twenty days prior to the convening
 of the regular session of 2010.

SECTION 5. Nothing in this Act shall be construed as
requiring actions or omissions that would render the State
ineligible to receive funds for the Safe Routes to School
program under the 2005 Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient
Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, Public Law No.
109-59.
