HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING LANDLORDS TO HELP COMMERCIAL TENANTS MAINTAIN THEIR LEASES IN ORDER TO CONTINUE THEIR BUSINESS DURING DIFFICULT ECONOMIC TIMES.

WHEREAS, small businesses are the heart of Hawaii's 1 economy, comprising 96% of the state's employers, and 55% of 2 3 private sector employment; and 4 WHEREAS, nationally, small businesses account for 99% of 5 6 all employer firms, pay nearly 45% of the country's private payroll, and produce almost a third of the nation's export 7 value; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, due in part to the global economic downturn and 11 falling real estate values, Hawaii has entered into a recession that the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization 12 (UHERO) has called "deep and drawn-out" and has predicted it 13 14 will not end until 2010 at the earliest; and 15 WHEREAS, Hawaii's unemployment has risen steadily from a 16 rate of 2.9% in November of 2007 to a rate of 5.5% in December 17 18 of 2008; and 19 WHEREAS, in November of 2008, Hawaii's visitor arrivals 20 21 fell 15.9 percent, resulting in the State experiencing its worse 22 recorded 11-month drop in arrivals, and harming Hawaii's vital 23 tourist industry; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the downturn in visitor arrivals and the increase in unemployment result in smaller revenue for the state's small 26 businesses and endangers their survival; and 27 28 WHEREAS, the closure of small businesses have a negative 29 30 effect on local communities where friends are co-workers and 31 customers, and result in store fronts sitting empty; and

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1 2 WHEREAS, many of Hawaii's small businesses are endangered from rising rents that have increases from an average of \$2.35 3 per square foot per month at the end of 2003 to an average \$3.47 4 per square foot per month at the end of 2008, a 45% increase in 5 five years; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, the rising rents have forced some businesses to 9 close or relocate, as evidence by Silkwood Wholesale, a plant 10 and flower retailer that was forced to move from its 20 year location near Nimitz Highway after its rent was raised from 11 \$6,000 to \$7,000; and 12 13 WHEREAS, renegotiation of leases is a common practice in 14 commercial leasing whereby tenants can negotiate lower rent 15 16 payments in order to remain in business; and 17 18 WHEREAS, in many instances, it is advantageous for the landlords to lower their rent in difficult times as the value of 19 the owner's property could drop due to an increase in vacant 20 building space; now, therefore, 21 22 23 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 24 of 2009, the Senate concurring, that landlords be urged to help 25 commercial tenants maintain their leases in order to continue 26 their business during these difficult economic times; and 27 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Commerce and 30 Consumer Affairs send a copy of this concurrent resolution to 31 all property rental businesses in this state; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Taxation send 34 a copy of this concurrent resolution to all companies or individuals in the business of real estate rental for businesses 35 in this state; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 38 39 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and the Director of 40 the Department of Taxation. 41 42 43 44



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
