A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§455- Public health emergency; temporary and limited
5	license for licensed out-of-state naturopathic physicians. (a)
6	If a public health emergency or disaster condition is declared
7	by the governor, the board shall allow naturopathic physicians
8	licensed in another state to provide temporary and limited
9	naturopathic medicine in Hawaii under special provisions during
10	the period of the declared public health emergency or disaster
11	condition, subject to limitations and conditions as the governor
12	and the board may prescribe.
13	(b) A limited and temporary license issued pursuant to
14	this section shall be valid only for the period of the declared
15	public health emergency or disaster condition.

(c) Out-of-state naturopathic physicians shall submit to

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the board the following information:

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1	(1)	Verification of a valid, permanent, current, and
2		unrestricted license to practice naturopathic medicine
3		in another state which is not the subject of a pending
4		investigation by a state medical board, or another
5		state or federal agency; and
6	(2)	A valid United States passport or state-issued
7		driver's license for photo identification.
8	<u>§455</u>	Exceptions; scope of chapter. Nothing in this
9	chapter s	hall be construed to prohibit or restrict:
10	(1)	The practice of a profession by individuals who are
11		licensed, certified, or registered under the laws of
12		this State who are performing services within their
13		authorized scope of practice;
14	(2)	The practice of naturopathic medicine by an individual
15		employed by the government of the United States while
16		the individual is engaged in the performance of duties
17		required of the individual by the laws and regulations
18		of the United States;
19	(3)	The practice of naturopathic medicine by students
20		enrolled in a school approved by the board. The
21		performance of naturopathic medicine by students shall
22		be pursuant to a course of instruction or assignments

1		from	an instructor and under the supervision of an
2		inst	ructor who is a naturopathic physician licensed
3		purs	uant to this chapter; and
4	(4)	The	practice by a doctor of naturopathic medicine duly
5		regi	stered or licensed in another state, territory, or
6		the	District of Columbia who is called into this state
7		for	consultation with a licensed naturopathic
8		phys	ician, including in-person, mail, electronic,
9		tele	phonic, fiber-optic, or other telemedicine
10		cons	ultation; provided that:
11		(A)	The naturopathic physician from another state
12			shall not open an office, appoint a place to meet
13			patients, or receive calls within this state for
14			the provision of care for a patient who is
15			located in this State; and
16		<u>(B)</u>	The licensed naturopathic physician of this state
17			retains control and remains responsible for the
18			provision of care for the patient who is located
19			in this state."

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1 SECTION 3. Section 455-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: 3 "§455-1 Definitions. As used in this chapter: "Behavioral medicine" means therapy techniques including 4 5 biofeedback, relaxation training, hypnosis, mindfulness-based stress reduction, and cognitive therapy. 6 "Board" means the board of [examiners in naturopathy.] 7 naturopathic medicine. 8 9 "Common diagnostic procedures" means the use of venipuncture consistent with the practice of naturopathic 10 medicine, commonly used diagnostic modalities consistent with 11 naturopathic practice, taking of health history, physical 12 13 examination, radiography, laboratory medicine, and obtaining 14 samples of human tissue as authorized as a minor office 15 procedure. 16 "Department" means the department of commerce and consumer 17 affairs. 18 "Diagnosis" means using all recognized and accepted 19 physical and laboratory diagnostic procedures including the taking of blood for diagnostic purposes. 20 21 "Disaster condition" means a sudden catastrophic event that 22 overwhelms public order, causes loss of property or life, and SB420 HD1 HMS 2009-3147

- 1 exceeds or disrupts the capabilities of available medical 2 resources to provide medical care within a community. 3 "Homeopathic" means minute doses of [natural medicine.] 4 substances that have been highly diluted and shaken according to 5 standardized pharmaceutical methods. "Hygiene and immunization" means the use of preventative 6 7 techniques including personal hygiene, asepsis, public health, 8 and, to the extent allowed by rule, immunizations. 9 "Legend drug" means any drug falling within section 10 503(b)(1) of the federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act and which 11 is required to be labeled with the statement "Rx only." 12 "Manual manipulation" or "mechanotherapy" means 13 manipulation of a part or the whole of the body by hand or 14 mechanical means. "Minor office procedures" means care and procedures 15 16 relative to superficial lacerations, lesions and abrasions, and 17 the removal of foreign bodies located in superficial structures 18 not including the eye; and the topical and parenteral use of 19 substances consistent with the practice of naturopathic 20 medicine, in accordance with rules established by the board. 21 ["Natural medicine" encompasses substances of botanical, 22 mineral, and animal origin, homeopathic preparations thereof,
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1 and substances whose natural state has been improved by any 2 process that does not substantially alter the molecular structure found in nature, including vitamins, minerals, and 3 amino acids: excluding prescription drugs, with the following 4 5 exceptions: vitamins, minerals, amino acids, and fatty acids. 6 "Naturopathic formulary" means vitamins, minerals, dietary supplements, botanical medicines, homeopathic medicines, 7 8 hormones, and those legend drugs consistent with naturopathic 9 medical practice. 10 "Naturopathic medicine" means the practice of the art and science of diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of disorders of 11 12 the body by support, stimulation or both, of the natural 13 processes of the human body by naturopathic physicians. The 14 practice of naturopathic medicine includes the prescription, 15 administration, dispensing, and use of nutrition and food 16 science, physical modalities, manual manipulation, parenteral 17 therapy, minor office procedures, naturopathic formulary, 18 hygiene and immunization, contraceptive devices, common 19 diagnostic procedures, and behavioral medicine of the type 20 taught in education and training at naturopathic medical 21 colleges.

4	["Na	turopathy" means the practice of:		
5	(1)	Natural medicine, natural therapeutics, and natural		
6		procedures, for the purpose of removing toxic		
7		conditions from the body and improving the quality,		
8		quantity, harmony, balance, and flow of the vital		
9		fluids, vital tissues, and vital energy; and		
10	(2)	Diagnosing, treating, and caring for patients using a		
11		system of practice that bases its treatment of		
12		physiological functions and abnormal conditions on		
13		natural laws governing the human body: utilizing		
14		physiological, psychological, and mechanical methods,		
15		such as air, water, light, sunshine, heat and cold,		
16		earth, phytotherapy, physiotherapy, mechano-therapy,		
17		naturopathic corrections and manipulation, and natural		
18		methods or modalities, together with natural or		
19		homeopathic medicines, natural foods, and herbs, and		
20		nature's remedies of the type taught in education and		
21		training at naturopathic medical colleges. The		
22		practice of naturopathy excludes surgery, application		

1	of x-rays, and prescribing, dispensing, or using
2	prescription drugs except as provided for in the
3	definition of natural medicine.]
4	"Nutrition and food science" means the prevention and
5	treatment of disease or other human conditions through the use
6	of diet.
7	"Parenteral therapy" means the administration of substances
8	by means other than through the gastrointestinal tract,
9	including intravenous, subcutaneous and intramuscular injection.
10	"Physical modalities" means use of physical, chemical,
11	electrical, and other means, including but not limited to heat,
12	cold, air, light, including lasers, water in any of its forms,
13	sound, massage, and therapeutic exercise.
14	"Radiography" means the ordering of radiographic diagnostic
15	and other imaging studies, including but not limited to computed
16	tomography scans, x-rays, magnetic resonance imaging, positron
17	emission tomography scans, and ultrasounds. The term also means
18	and includes the taking and interpreting of x-rays."
19	SECTION 4. Section 455-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
21	"(a) Any person desiring to practice [naturopathy]
22	naturopathic medicine shall be licensed under this chapter. To
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- 1 obtain a license under this chapter, a person shall submit a
- 2 completed application prescribed by the board[7]; provide the
- 3 information required under this chapter, rules of the board, and
- 4 other applicable laws and rules $[\tau]$; and pay a nonrefundable
- 5 application fee and other fees provided in rules adopted by the
- 6 [director] department in accordance with chapter 91."
- 7 SECTION 5. Section 455-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended to read as follows:
- 9 "§455-3 Education requirements. Each applicant shall be a
- 10 graduate of a school, university, or college of [naturopathy]
- 11 naturopathic medicine that has received candidacy status with,
- 12 or has been accredited by, a regional or a national accrediting
- 13 body recognized by the United States Department of Education;
- 14 provided that any applicant who graduated from a college of
- 15 [naturopathy] naturopathic medicine prior to 1987 shall be
- 16 deemed qualified if the college was approved by the board prior
- 17 to 1987 and has been accredited by a regional or national
- 18 accrediting body recognized by the United States Department of
- 19 Education."

- 21 amended to read as follows:

         SECTION 8. Section 455-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended to read as follows:
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         "§455-8 License to practice; biennial registration.
    Licenses to practice [naturopathy] naturopathic medicine shall
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    be issued by the board to those who qualify according to this
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    chapter. Naturopathic physicians licensed under this chapter
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    shall observe and be subject to all state requirements relative
    to reporting births and all matters pertaining to the public
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    health with equal rights and obligations as physicians,
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    surgeons, and practitioners of other schools of medicine.
                                                                 These
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    equal rights shall apply to all matters of public health,
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    including the performance of medical examinations and
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    evaluations. Every licensee shall renew the licensee's license
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    on or before December 31 of each odd-numbered year. Failure to
    renew the license on or before December 31 of each odd-numbered

    year shall automatically constitute a forfeiture of the license;
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    provided that the license shall be restored upon written
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    application therefor together with payment of the renewal fee,
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    all delinquent fees, and a penalty fee."

- 6 or any person who buys, sells, or fraudulently obtains any
- 7 diploma or license to practice [naturopathy] naturopathic
- 8 medicine whether recorded or not, or any person who uses the
- 9 title "natureopath,"[7] "naturopath,"[7] "doctor of
- 10 naturopathy, " "doctor of naturopathic medicine, " "naturopathic
- 11 healthcare, " "naturopathic physician, " "naturopathic medicine, "
- "naturopathy," "naturopathic doctor," or "N.D.,"[7] or any word
- 13 or title to induce the belief that the person is engaged in the

Naturopathic Medicine; Naturopathy; Parenteral Therapy

Description:

Amends the title of chapter 455 to "naturopathic medicine" and amends references therein; defines "naturopathic medicine"; changes the name of the board of examiners in naturopathy to the board of naturopathic medicine and authorizes the board to make rules; authorizes temporary license to licensed out-of-state naturopathic physicians in a declared public health emergency.
