- SECTION 1. Section 846-30.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 1

# Description:

Extends expiration period on the Hawaii State Identification card from six years to eight years; deletes the provisions for transitioning from expiration dates calculated by issue dates to expiration on the cardholder's birthday.

TITLE:

PURPOSE:

This bill amends the present statute relating to the expiration date on the Hawaii state identification card extending it from six years to eight years for cards issued on or after the effective date of the

act. It further seeks to delete the

provisions for transitioning from expiration

dates calculated by issue dates to

expiration on the cardholder's birthday because there is no longer any need for

these provisions.

MEANS:

Amend section 846-30.5, Hawaii Revised

Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION:

This bill will change the Hawaii State ID card to keep it consistent with the Hawaii driver's licenses, which changed to an eight-year expiration date effective November 1, 2008, and the majority of other states. Many states are exploring Real ID Act compliance and section 37.5(a) of its implementing rules requires that driver's licenses and identification cards are not to exceed eight years. Furthermore, we have passed the transition period for expiration dates calculated from issue dates to birthdates and the transitional provisions

are no longer needed.

Impact on the public: This bill will allow the public to have a Hawaii State ID card for a longer period at the same price of \$10.00 for those ages 65 and older and \$15.00 for the rest.
