A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

"(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
established and embrace all personal services performed for the
State, except the following:

7 (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii
8 national guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii
9 national guard that are required by state or federal
10 laws or regulations or orders of the national guard to
11 be filled from those commissioned or enlisted
12 personnel;

(2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
the director of human resources development has
certified that the service is special or unique or is
essential to the public interest and that, because of
circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel to
perform the service cannot be obtained through normal

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1		civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
2		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
3	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
4		with a court order or decree if the director determines
5		that recruitment through normal recruitment civil
6		service procedures would result in delay or
7		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
8		decree;
9	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
10		or any committee thereof;
11	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
12		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
13		Washington Place;
14	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
15	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
16		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
17		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
18		confirmed by the senate;
19	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
20		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
21		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
22		temporary service;

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1 (9) One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court who shall have the powers and duties of a court officer 2 and bailiff under section 606-14; one secretary or 3 clerk for each justice of the supreme court, each judge 4 of the intermediate appellate court, and each judge of 5 the circuit court; one secretary for the judicial 6 7 council; one deputy administrative director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief justice of the 8 supreme court, two law clerks for each associate 9 10 justice of the supreme court and each judge of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for each 11 judge of the circuit court, two additional law clerks 12 for the civil administrative judge of the circuit court 13 of the first circuit, two additional law clerks for the 14 criminal administrative judge of the circuit court of 15 the first circuit, one additional law clerk for the 16 senior judge of the family court of the first circuit, 17 two additional law clerks for the civil motions judge 18 of the circuit court of the first circuit, two 19 additional law clerks for the criminal motions judge of 20 the circuit court of the first circuit, and two law 21 clerks for the administrative judge of the district 22

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court of the first circuit; and one private secretary 1 2 for the administrative director of the courts, the 3 deputy administrative director of the courts, each 4 department head, each deputy or first assistant, and 5 each additional deputy, or assistant deputy, or assistant defined in paragraph (16); 6 First deputy and deputy attorneys general, the 7 (10)administrative services manager of the department of 8 9 the attorney general, one secretary for the 10 administrative services manager, an administrator and 11 any support staff for the criminal and juvenile justice resources coordination functions, and law clerks; 12 13 (11)(A) Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex area superintendents, deputy and assistant 14 superintendents, other certificated personnel, not more 15 than twenty noncertificated administrative, 16 professional, and technical personnel not engaged in 17 instructional work; 18 Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants, 19 (B) educational assistants, bilingual/bicultural 20 21 school-home assistants, school psychologists, psychological examiners, speech pathologists, 22

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1		athletic health care trainers, alternative school
2		work study assistants, alternative school
3		educational/supportive services specialists,
4		alternative school project coordinators, and
5		communications aides in the department of
6		education;
7		(C) The special assistant to the state librarian and
8		one secretary for the special assistant to the
9		state librarian; and
10		(D) Members of the faculty of the University of
11		Hawaii, including research workers, extension
12		agents, personnel engaged in instructional work,
13		and administrative, professional, and technical
14		personnel of the university;
15	(12)	Employees engaged in special, research, or
16		demonstration projects approved by the governor;
17	(13)	Positions filled by inmates, kokuas, patients of state
18		institutions, persons with severe physical or mental
19		handicaps participating in the work experience training
20		programs, and students and positions filled through
21		federally funded programs that provide temporary public

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service employment such as the federal Comprehensive 1 2 Employment and Training Act of 1973; A custodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal 3 (14)Mausoleum, and Hulihee Palace; 4 Positions filled by persons employed on a fee, 5 (15)contract, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform 6 7 their duties concurrently with their private business or profession or other private employment and whose 8 duties require only a portion of their time, if it is 9 10 impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion of time to be devoted to the service of the State; 11 Positions of first deputies or first assistants of each 12 (16)13 department head appointed under or in the manner provided in section 6, Article V, of the State 14 Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants 15 either in charge of the highways, harbors, and airports 16 divisions or other functions within the department of 17 transportation as may be assigned by the director of 18 transportation, with the approval of the governor; four 19 additional deputies in the department of health, each 20 in charge of one of the following: behavioral health, 21 environmental health, hospitals, and health resources 22

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administration, including other functions within the 1 department as may be assigned by the director of 2 health, with the approval of the governor; an 3 administrative assistant to the state librarian; and an 4 administrative assistant to the superintendent of 5 education; 6 7 (17)Positions specifically exempted from this part by any 8 other law; provided that all of the positions defined by paragraph (9) shall be included in the position 9 classification plan; 10 11 (18)Positions in the state foster grandparent program and 12 positions for temporary employment of senior citizens in occupations in which there is a severe personnel 13 shortage or in special projects; 14 15 (19)Household employees at the official residence of the president of the University of Hawaii; 16 (20)Employees in the department of education engaged in the 17 supervision of students during meal periods in the 18 distribution, collection, and counting of meal tickets, 19 and in the cleaning of classrooms after school hours on 20 a less than half-time basis; 21

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

Hawaii National Guard Youth and Adult Programs

Description:

Increases effectiveness and efficiency by affirming that positions in the Hawaii National Guard sponsored youth and adult educational programs are exempt from civil service requirements.

PURPOSE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

Affirms that the civil service exemption for the National Guard sponsored youth education program also applies to the National Guard sponsored adult education program.

MEANS:

JUSTIFICATION:

Amend section 76-16(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The exemption from civil service is necessary to enable the Department of Defense to effectively manage the wage constraints imposed by the federal government and the Master Cooperative Agreements (MCA). Provisions specified in the MCA include manning models with salary limitations based on the federal government GS salary schedule, which are often times higher than the state civil service salary ranges. The exemption will permit the hiring of individuals without regard to civil service salary limitations.

This exemption will also enable the Department of Defense to fill positions necessary to conduct the youth and adult education programs without delays associated with civil service recruitment procedures. This will ensure the continuity of all National Guard sponsored youth and adult education programs.

Impact on the public: None.

Impact on the department and other agencies: Passage of this measure will allow the Department of Defense to employ highly qualified instructors and managers for the National Guard sponsored youth and adult education programs.
