SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF BICYCLING.

WHEREAS, bicycling can provide multiple and cross-cutting 1 benefits in policy initiatives that seek to address 2 3 transportation needs, limit climate change and energy consumption, and improve public health; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, bicycle commuters help reduce traffic by leaving 7 automobiles at home, thus also saving on fuel costs, vehicle maintenance, and parking expenses; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii is home to nearly 1,300,000 11 people; and 12 WHEREAS, in 2007 there were 1,167,240 registered vehicles 13 14 in the State, where the number of motor vehicles nearly equals the number of residents in the State; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, the rising demand for energy in the global economy strains the world's dwindling natural resources and contributes 18 to the increase of harmful environmental pollutants; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the bicycle, as transportation equipment, creates 21 22. zero emissions driven by efficient and abundant human power; and 23 24 WHEREAS, 35.1 per cent of the State's population is considered overweight; and 25 26 WHEREAS, riding a bicycle is an easy way to incorporate 27

cardiovascular exercise into an active lifestyle, especially for

senior citizens; and

29 30 WHEREAS, a bicycle allows children to be "free range" and provides for independence for people too young to drive; and
