## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE STATE AUDITOR TO EXAMINE THE RATIONALE AND MANAGEMENT OF THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY.

WHEREAS, parole provides an opportunity for a convicted felon to serve a portion of his or her sentence in the community as long as the offender abides by certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, the concept of parole has been a controversial one ever since it was effectuated in Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Paroling Authority is an agency administratively attached to the Department of Public Safety and is run by a three-person board, with a full-time chairperson and two part-time members; and

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Paroling Authority is responsible for setting the minimum terms that convicted offenders must serve before being considered for release on parole if those minimum terms have not been set by the courts; and

WHEREAS, the decisions made by the Hawaii Paroling Authority in particular cases have occasionally raised questions about the rationale for the agency's existence or its effectiveness; and

WHEREAS, the decisions made by the Hawaii Paroling Authority in releasing offenders into the community significantly affect the safety and welfare of the public; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2009, that the Auditor is requested to examine the rationale for the creation of the Hawaii Paroling Authority and audit the management and programs of the agency; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the examination and audit include, at a minimum:
