Directs the public utilities commission to prepare a study on the creation of renewable energy zones and report its findings to the

legislature.

HB 254

RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES.

CPC

<u>Status</u> Requires the public utilities commission to treat switched access phone

service as fully competitive.

HB 266

RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES.

CPC

Status Requires the public utilities commission to consider other

telecommunications services when determining competition in the

switched access telephone service market.

HB 365

RELATING TO CONTRACTORS.

CPC

Status Amends the "handyman" exemption to contractor licensing law to

include contracts that are no more than \$1,600 for labor, exclusive of

materials, taxes, and other items.

HB 627 Status RELATING TO CONTRACTORS.

CPC, JUD

Prohibits the resumption of work for any person who is issued a

citation for operating without a contractor's license in good standing until a hearing is conducted, and makes the issuance of citations and

cease and desist orders mandatory. Amends penalties.

HB 239 Status RELATING TO INSURANCE.

CPC, JUD

Repeals the statute that limits insurance coverage for punitive damages

to contracts that specifically provide such coverage.

HB 264 RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE. CPC, JUD Limits assigned claims coverage to those who do not have any motor <u>Status</u> vehicle insurance at all. RELATING TO THE MOTOR VEHICLE INDUSTRY LICENSING CPC, JUD HB 270 ACT. Status Allows motor vehicle dealers of used vehicles to have in their possession reasonable indicia of ownership or right of possession, as an alternative to a legal ownership certificate, when selling the used vehicle. HB 508 RELATING TO INSURANCE. CPC, EBM Status Requires a business to provide commercial motor vehicle insurance coverage for delivery persons who use their own motor vehicles to make deliveries for the business. HB 206 RELATING TO CONSUMER CREDIT REPORTING AGENCIES. CPC Bars credit reporting agencies from charging consumers who are at Status least 65 years old a fee for placing, lifting, or removing a security freeze on their credit reports. Provides an expedited manner for temporarily lifting a security freeze. HB 447 RELATING TO PAYDAY LENDING. CPC, FIN Requires check cashing (deferred deposit) businesses to register with <u>Status</u> DCCA, post and provide consumers with rate, fee, and other information, keep records, and report to DCCA; regulates payment plans; exempts check casher fees and interest from general excise tax; regulates retailers who occasionally cash checks. RELATING TO THE UNIFORM PRUDENT MANAGEMENT OF CPC, FIN HB 618 INSTITUTIONAL FUNDS ACT. Status Enacts Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act to replace and update existing Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act. Provides guidance and authority to charitable organizations concerning the management and investment of funds held by those organizations. Provides additional protections for charities and also protects the interests of donors. Modernizes rules governing expenditures from endowment funds. Gives institutions ability to cope more easily with fluctuations in the value of the
