clarifies lien payment and enforcement.

Transfers the Office of Community Services from the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to the Department of Human Services.

HB 1355 Status	RELATING TO PUBLIC PROCUREMENT. Establishes a preference for bidders to government contracts who pledge to hire individuals with disabilities and certain temporary assistance to needy families recipients.	HUS, EBM, FIN
HB 1435 Status	RELATING TO THE HAWAII STATE GIVING CAMPAIGN. Establishes the Hawaii state giving campaign as the only authorized solicitation of employees in the state workplace on behalf of charitable organizations. Appropriates funds to implement the campaign.	HUS, LAB, FIN
HB 1497 Status	RELATING TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. Prohibits a landlord from evicting a rental housing tenant solely on the basis that the tenant is a victim of domestic violence.	HUS, CPC, JUD
HB 1519 Status	RELATING TO INTOXICATING LIQUOR. Allows the Liquor Commission of each county to undertake substance-abuse-treatment and prevention activities.	HUS, CPC, FIN
HB 815 Status	RELATING TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. Authorizes the counties to impose fees for domestic violence prevention programs upon defendants convicted of domestic violence.	HUS, JUD, FIN
HB 872 Status	RELATING TO THE FEDERAL VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT. Requires the department of human services to establish a pilot project to assist undocumented immigrants who are victims of domestic violence or sexual assault.	HUS, JUD, FIN
HB 1649 Status	RELATING TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. In a case where a complaint, indictment, or information charging a crime of domestic abuse has been filed, authorizes a court to issue a restraining order upon a good cause belief, including results of a criminal history search, that harm to the victim or a witness has occurred or is reasonably likely to occur.	HUS, JUD
HB 819 Status	RELATING TO CRIME. Mandates minors aged 15-17 be tried as adults in cases of first and second degree murder.	HUS, JUD, FIN
