Center for Nursing Advisory Board

1. What skill, qualifications, and experiences do you have that will be an asset to the nursing advisory board?

I have practiced in various roles in the 36 years that I have been a Registered Nurse. I have worked as a nurse at the bedside in acute care, psychiatric and geriatric nursing. I have worked as a Public Health nurse and have worked as a nurse administrator and as a nurse educator. I have a deep love of nursing and believe that nursing is a calling and not a job. I bring my love of nursing and my willingness to use my skills to help others when I serve on the Advisory Board of the Hawaii State Center for Nursing. I was appointed by Governor Lingle as a founding member of the Advisory Board and I have been actively involved in the work of the Center since 2005. I was active in developing the Center's Strategic Plan that addresses bringing groups and individuals together to focus on addressing the nursing shortage in Hawaii. With my input and those of the other members of the Advisory Board, I have worked to ensure that the Center serves as an information resource center that provides workforce data to many different entities. I have lived and worked in Kona on the Big Island for the past 22 years, and I bring the perspective of rural nursing to our Advisory Board.

2. What are the main challenges facing nursing as a profession in Hawaii, and what strategies and recommendations do you have for improving recruitment and retention of nurses in the state?

One serious challenge facing the nursing profession in Hawaii is our aging workforce. Forecast data indicates that Hawaii can expect a very dramatic demographic shift related to our aging nurse workforce over the next 15 years. We learned in our 2007 Hawaii Registered Nurse Survey (developed by the Hawaii State Center for Nursing) that over 60% of active RN's are moving into their 50s and 60s and will gradually retire. This will represent a shortage of approximately 2,670 registered nurses. We also face an uncertain supply of new nurses created by current changes in our economy as evidenced by major hospitals (who are the main employers of nurses) facing problems with keeping their doors open.

My recommendation for improving recruitment and retention of nurses in Hawaii includes continuing to address the limited education capacity issues that our nursing schools face today. This requires continued support from our Legislators and Governor so we can continue to graduate new nurses while encouraging our nursing schools to provide students clinical rotation opportunities in the community. The majority of

working nurses may not always be at the bedside in hospitals as more and more care moves to the community setting where nurses can take a larger role in the care of Hawaii's people.

In addition, the nursing profession is having difficulty retaining nurses in work environments that are perceived as unattractive and unsupportive. This is a huge challenge as hospitals are under much pressure to keep their doors open, at times pushing nursing staff to work under less than ideal conditions, where quality of care issues arise and make nurse retention a real challenge for everyone involved.

I recommend that we continue to develop strategies that promote the retention of mature nurses by looking at shortened work hours, adapting their work environment to jobs/tasks that are less physically demanding. At the same time, we must continue to develop and implement new nurse residency/preceptor programs that allow new nurses to transition into their professional role. New nurses should team up with older nurses, benefiting from the older nurses' experience and support as they progress from novice to expert.

3. What short and long term goals do you have for the board?

Short term goals:

Continue to facilitate partnerships between hospital administration and staff nurses that focus on the nursing shortage, work conditions, and nurse retention in their facilities. Only then will nurses want to stay in hospitals when the work is physically and emotionally demanding.

Increase community and legislator awareness of the role and value of the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) and continue to work to facilitate the APRN's integration into the healthcare delivery system to meet the healthcare needs of the people of our state.

Continue to work with the schools of nursing and our legislators to ensure an adequate number of nursing school faculty is available to continue to graduate new nurses. We need to continue to work to ensure that there is the opportunity for nurses to seek and complete the training required to function as an APRN.

Finally, we need to continue to develop models of nursing practice that emphasize working in community settings.

Long term goals:

Continue to work to build, develop, and sustain statewide partnerships among healthcare organizations, the business community, philanthropy, education, and government and policy makers to ensure engagement and participation in addressing the nursing shortage in Hawaii. The Hawaii State Center for Nursing has a big responsibility and must remain visible and relevant as we all work together to ensure that our nursing workforce meets the needs of the people of Hawaii.

4. During these difficult economic times, what challenges will nursing face, and what recommendations do you have for overcoming these obstacles?

Nurses may face layoffs or work redistribution in the workplace. We are already seeing other areas hit with issues related to slashed budgets. Nurses will need to sacrifice as others are doing to ensure that our people continue to receive the healthcare that they deserve. This includes re-evaluating contracts where we work and partnering with hospital administrators to find ways to work "smarter" without jeopardizing the safety of our patients. I work in a hospital, and I am continually trying to "think outside the box" as all of us grapple with financial issues in our hospital. Our community must be cared for, and nurses play an integral part in delivering health care: we need the best from nursing to continue to deliver the care that our citizens deserve.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to discuss nursing in Hawaii and what I can do to serve the nursing community and the people of Hawaii as a member of the Hawaii State Center for Nursing Advisory Board.
