- 6 Purpose and Justification: To confirm the appointment of Billie Gabriel, Louis M. Kealoha, Michele
- 7 S. Scofield and Steven M. Shiraki to serve on HACDACS.
- 8 HACDACS appointees represent a cross-section of the community, including, but not limited to
- 9 pharmacological, medical, community and business affairs, youth action, educational, legal defense,
- 10 enforcement and corrections segments of the community.
- Billie Gabriel is a self-employed consultant who is engaged in public relations, marketing,
- advertising, event planning and fundraising. Her 30-year career has also involved managing
- comprehensive development, media relations, brand imaging, sponsor recruitment, donor relations and
- legislative lobbying. During 2007 and 2008, Ms. Gabrielle provided management support to the
- producer of the 11-day Hawaii Romance Festival held on Oahu. As Vice-President of Development

with Easter Seals Hawaii between 1993 and 2007, she developed a comprehensive strategy, marketing 1 and media plan to create greater awareness of the organization and its programs and services. Between 2 1979 and 1992, Ms. Gabriel served as Director of Community Relations for Kapiolani Medical Center 3 with responsibilities for managing fundraising events such as the Children's Miracle Network Telethon. 4 Louis M. Kealoha is a Captain with the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), Juvenile Services 5 Division. He is currently on special assignment to the Narcotics/Vice Division. Prior to his current 6 assignments, Captain Kealoha's service with HPD has included: Patrol Officer, Field Training Officer, 7 8 Patrol Sergeant, Training Sergeant, Recruit Class Supervisor, Training/Administrative Lieutenant, and Captain within the Criminal Investigation Division. In addition to his work with the Honolulu Police 9 Department, Captain Kealoha is an Adjunct Professor and Lecturer in courses on criminal law, 10 criminology and the criminal justice system at Chaminade University of Honolulu. He holds dual 11 baccalaureate degrees (in human services and occupational education), a Master's of Science in 12 Criminal Justice Administration, and a Doctor of Education degree. 13 Michele S. Scofield is a Practicum Instructor/Project Junior Specialist with the University of 14 Hawaii at Manoa, School of Social Work, Pulama I Ke Ola Social Work Master's Program Training 15 Project. In addition to academic credentials in the field of social work, she is a licensed social worker 16 and certified substance abuse counselor. Ms. Scofield's experiences in programs that address behavioral 17 health include: classroom experience with special education students at Wheeler Elementary School, 18 Nimitz Elementary School, Pearl Harbor Kai Elementary School and Hickam Elementary School; public 19 and consumer education with the Department of Health, Adult Mental Health Division and Mental 20 Health Association; and clinical experience in the field of substance abuse at Hina Mauka. 21 Steven M. Shiraki is the Administrator/Educational Specialist with the Department of Education 22 (DOE) Student Support Section of the Office of Curriculum, Instruction and Student Support, Student 23 Support Services Branch.
