Support for HB 1221 Relating to Affordable Housing Projects

Honorable Chair and members of the House Committee on Housing, I am Dennis Arakaki, <u>representing both the Hawaii Family Forum and the Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawaii</u>.

Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, pro-family education organization committed to preserving and strengthening families in Hawaii. The Roman Catholic Church in Hawaii, under the leadership of Bishop Larry Silva, represents over 220,000 Catholics in Hawaii.

We strongly support the proposed allocation of \$50,000,000 in general obligation bonds for affordable housing projects. This bill would provide a significant economic stimulus. In addition, the funds may be used to match federal funds that may be appropriated for capitol improvement projects under any federal fiscal stimulus legislation. The United States Congress is moving fast to provide funds to the States to increase jobs and stabilize the economy. Our State must also move fast and be prepared to utilize these federal funds as part of our own economic stimulus package.

We recommend that the funds apportioned to the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation be designated to the Rental Housing Trust Fund. This fund has a successful track record of leveraging funds to create affordable rental projects. The RHTF also mandates that a small percentage of the units constructed (5%) be built for families at 30% of median income. This will ensure that at least some units are constructed for those of our citizens with the most need.

We urge your support for this bill which would create housing for low and moderate income families across the State, as well as provide an economic stimulus and prepare the State to take advantage of federal funds for housing. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

The Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HHFDC) appreciates the intent of H.B. 1221; however, given the current fiscal difficulties, it would not be prudent to pursue enactment at this time.

We would like to point out that the Executive Biennium Budget includes a request for infusion of \$50 million into the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund (\$25 million in each biennium year) and \$50 million into the Rental Housing Trust Fund (\$25 million in each biennium year). The Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund and the Rental Housing Trust Fund may be used to finance the development or substantial rehabilitation of eligible affordable housing projects.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs supports HB 1221.

The growing affordable housing problem is one of the most critical issues faced by our communities, especially our Native Hawaiian communities. This issue seems to have many of our families struggling to find adequate housing near their place of employment in the urban cores in order to make ends meet.

We all recognize housing is the highest cost item for our families and more need to be done to address the affordable housing issue or our families will continue to move down the economic and social ladder.

We recognize that physical solutions by themselves will not solve social and economic problems, but neither can economic vitality, community stability, and environmental health be sustained without a coherent and supportive physical framework. The opportunity to leverage state funds with federal fiscal stimulus legislation is here for our state government to act accordingly with this framework of appropriating funds in general obligation bonds.

We advocate for commitment to reestablishing the relationship between the art of building and the making of community, through citizen-based participatory planning and design.

Dear Chair Cabanilla and Members:

Subject: House Bill No. 1221 Relating to Affordable Housing Projects

The Department of Community Services strongly supports the authorization of \$50 million in general obligation bonds to allow for the development of affordable

housing projects to stimulate the economy and to provide housing for low- and moderate-income families and individuals. We are grateful that the bill includes as eligible uses of the funds, "provision of a grant-in-aid to a county government or private

developer for any of the previously listed purposes."

As you are aware, the affordable housing inventory is inadequate to meet the needs of our residents. Conveyance tax receipts earmarked for the Rental Housing Trust Fund have funded only a small number of new units annually and significant funding must be provided through this and other measures to allow development of much needed housing units statewide. We are optimistic that at least some of the housing projects the City and County has submitted for consideration as part of a federal economic stimulus package will be funded. We look forward to working with the State on these important projects.
