HOUSE BILL NO. 1351, H.D. 2 RELATING TO PRIVATE AGRICULTURAL PARKS.

Chairperson Hee and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 1351, H.D. 2. The purpose of this bill is to create a definition of a private agricultural park for the specific purpose of allowing power generation to take place in an agriculturally zoned district. It also requires that these private agricultural parks register with the Department of Agriculture and collect information that "may be of assistance in promoting the private agricultural park." The department opposes this bill as we believe it is unnecessary since the ability to generate power in an agricultural district is already available. Furthermore, this bill creates an additional unneeded level of government oversight that the Department of Agriculture is unable to provide or enforce. It is our understanding that as the cooperative as described on page 3, lines 11-14 is already exempt from the PUC so the need for this bill at all is not clear.



RE: SUPPORT FOR HB 1351, HD 2, RELATING TO PRIVATE AGRICULTURAL PARKS

Aloha! I am pleased to voice strong support for HB 1351, HD 2. During the past two years, I have worked closely with many determined farmers and community supporters in North Kohala on behalf of the Kohala Ditch restoration project. We are very grateful for state, federal and private funding support that has enabled crews to muck out tunnels and rebuild flumes in the backcountry of Polulu and Honokane Nui. We are also grateful for the keen support and oversight that State Civil Defense has provided to our still ongoing efforts.

Since the devastating Kiholo earthquake in 2006, our ditch steering committee has met bi-weekly (57 meetings to date) to guide the Kohala Ditch Project. Our efforts have mobilized plant nursery operators, dairymen, ranchers, and organic farmers around a common cause: restoration of a historic 14.5 mile irrigation system to serve agriculture in North Kohala. Experience has taught us that commercial agriculture requires shared, affordable infrastructure — water and energy are key examples — that serve many parcels, or is regional in scope.

The creation of private agricultural parks will enable us to connect land, water and energy across contiguous parcels to create an agricultural profit center shared by many. This synergy of resources is fundamental to farm productivity and market competitiveness. If we take the causes of food security and sustainability seriously, we need to give this a try. For many years, we have held to the belief that zoning alone protects agriculture. But our agricultural district needs to be more than a bulwark against development. It needs the resources to make agriculture an economically viable proposition. HB1351 offers us that platform to succeed.

Today, in North Kohala, a new nonprofit agricultural park is taking shape along Upolu Road. Another group of farm lot owners has formed to build a trunk line from the Kohala Ditch to the Pratt Road to support farm expansion plans. A North Kohala Agricultural Water Security Plan is being developed with help from a USDA/CREES grant administered by the Hawai'i Island Economic Development Board. All these efforts are looking at ways to make agricultural lands productive and competitive. The creation of private agricultural parks is one more way to build smart infrastructure for farmers and ranchers.

Please adopt HB1351, as amended in HD2, to give real farmers and ranchers that opportunity. Mahalo!
