Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) supports House Bill 1622, HD1 "Relating to the Small Business Regulatory Review Board." The bill directs the Review Board, which is administratively attached to DBEDT, to work with State agencies to identify rules that need to be amended or repealed in order to conform to the repeal of underlying statutes implemented by those rules and to ensure that the statutory references in the rules are current.

DBEDT believes that it is essential that administrative rules are reviewed and updated on a regular basis in order to remain current with related statutory provisions. This process should help streamline the current processes already in place and eliminate any confusion presently encountered. It should also help solidify the Review Board's role as the primary agent for small businesses that are burdened by out-dated, obsolete and redundant rules and regulations.

Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Tollefson and I am the President and CEO of The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii ("The Chamber"). I am here to state The Chamber's support to House Bill No. 1622 HD1, relating to Small Business Regulatory Review Board.

The Chamber is the largest business organization in Hawaii, representing more than 1,100 businesses. Approximately 80% of our members are small businesses with less than 20 employees. As the "Voice of Business" in Hawaii, the organization works on behalf of its members, which employ more than 200,000 individuals, to improve the state's economic climate and to foster positive action on issues of common concern.

HB 1622 HD1 requires the small business regulatory review board to identify rules that shall be amended or repealed to conform to the repeal of related statutes. The measure also directs the board to work with state agencies to develop a procedure for expediting the amendment or repeal of rules when the changes are required only to comply with the repeal of statutes.

In Hawaii, small businesses are the engine for Hawaii's economy through the creation of jobs which provide innovative products and services, and the generation of economic activity. They reflect all industries and a wide range of employment.

As a result of the rules that are outdated, restrictive, overly complex, and burdensome, small businesses, many who operated on limited resources, financial support, and time, face unnecessary obstacles in their effort to grow to their full potential. With the economy struggling and employers hit with a rising cost of doing business, rules that are not amended or repealed to reflect the recent statutory changes will further undermine the viability and growth of this sector. The impact of regulatory costs on small firms include: economic, workplace, environmental, and tax compliance regulations.

Review and reform are needed so small businesses can better compete in today's increasingly competitive and modernized economy. By keeping the rules consistent with today's regulations, and increasing access to capital, these reforms would stimulate growth, especially at a time when Hawaii needs it most.

Thus, The Chamber respectfully requests HB 1622 HD1 be passed. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
