Testimony of Chiyome Leinaala Fukino, M.D. Director of Health

April 3, 2009, 9:45 a.m.

- 1 **Department's Position:** The Department of Health strongly supports this measure to make the
- 2 State eligible for federal recovery act funds, with no state matching requirements, for grants and other
- 3 financial subsidies for county drinking water and wastewater system improvements. In addition, this
- 4 measure has been amended to enable the establishment of two exempt federally funded Total Maximum
- 5 Daily Load (TMDL) positions required to meet section 303 of the Clean Water Act.
- 6 **Fiscal Implications:** Approximately \$50 million of federal funds with no state matching funds
- 7 requirement, and possibly even more in the future.
- 8 Purpose and Justification: The State needs to change certain loan program statutes in order to make
- 9 grants and loan subsidies of federal recovery funds. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of
- 10 2009 will provide significant funding for wastewater and drinking water system improvements. The
- U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates that the Act will provide \$30.3 million to
- Hawaii's Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (a.k.a., Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund or
- 13 CWSRF) and \$19.5 million to our Drinking Water Treatment Revolving Loan Fund (a.k.a., Drinking
- Water State Revolving Fund or DWSRF) for the construction of new, wastewater and drinking water
- infrastructure improvement projects. Both of these revolving fund programs currently loan funds to

- counties. Hawaii needs to change its Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund and Drinking Water
- 2 Treatment Revolving Loan Fund statutes so they can be used to make grants and loan subsidies and
- other financial arrangements required by the Act and additional potential stimulus initiatives.
- Both the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund and the Drinking Water Treatment Revolving
- 5 Loan Fund were enacted to provide loans to the four major counties for the construction of publicly
- 6 owned, wastewater and drinking water infrastructure projects. Since fiscal year 1991, the Water
- 7 Pollution Control Revolving Fund has loaned out more than \$523 million. The Drinking Water
- 8 Treatment Revolving Loan Fund, which started up in fiscal year 1998, has loaned out more than \$84
- 9 million. As Congress had intended for these funds to revolve in perpetuity, both programs did not allow
- for loan subsidies or grants to be made. Thus, these amendments are now required for the specific
- purpose of allowing for loans with forgiveness of principal, zero or negative interest, and grants using
- the federal stimulus funds.
 - The anticipated federal funds for the construction of wastewater and drinking water projects will
- improve public health, protect the environment, create and retain jobs, and stimulate the economy.
 - The sooner this bill becomes law, the faster we can move on providing monies for projects'
- 16 construction.

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- Part II of this measure is not related to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009
- but is necessary for meeting Clean Water Act, section 303 requirements, relating to water quality. Part
- 19 II of this measure consists of the language contained in Senate Bill No. 934, SD1. This will allow the
- 20 Department of Health to establish and fill not more than two federally funded total maximum daily load
- 21 coordinator positions without regard to chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes to meet federal law.
- 22 Current civil service position series are not sufficient for recruiting and retaining staff with the
- 23 technical expertise and multidisciplinary skills necessary to build and maintain the Department's
- 24 capacity for meeting federal water pollution control requirements that are increasingly complex and

continually growing. Clean Water Act section 303 requires that total maximum daily loads be prepared 1 for waters that fail to meet water quality standards over time. Total maximum daily load coordinators 2 function at a high level in the water pollution control program designing technically based studies to 3 address watershed health problems unique to Hawaii's environment. This requires collaborating with 4 University colleagues to conduct applied research and training, designing and evaluating watershed 5 inventory and water quality assessment campaigns, and synthesizing the results of environmental 6 sampling, regional investigations, and new scientific and policy developments for use by water pollution 7 control engineers, environmental health decision-makers, and land use planners. The department has 8 had difficulty for over two years filling a water quality position with lower technical demands than the 9 total maximum daily load coordinator position. 10 The department has only one total maximum daily load coordinator now but would like the 11 opportunity to hire another if we can secure more federal funding. 12 Hawaii needs highly qualified and experienced total maximum daily load coordinators to protect 13 the State from water pollution and to carefully repair the damages incurred to minimize impacts on our 14 people and economic environment. 15 We will be pleased to meet with any legislator who has objections to or reservations about any 16 part of this bill. 17 Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this important bill. 18 19 20 21 22 23
