In consideration of HOUSE BILL 317 RELATING TO MOBILE MEDICAL CARE

House Bill 317 proposes that the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) receive federal Homeland Security Grant Program funds to provide the people of the southern portion of the Island of Hawaii, who have been heavily impacted by vog, with increased access to suitable emergency and clinical medical care. The Department does not support SECTIONs 3 and 4 of this measure as presently written, and defers comments on public emergency medical care matters in this bill to the Department of Health (DOH).

This bill authorizes the Department to expend federal Homeland Security Grant Program funds in coordination with DOH to provide for a mobile emergency and clinical medical care program for Hawaii County's Kona community. The Department does not receive any funds for public health, emergency and clinical medical care and it is unlikely that we would qualify to receive public health funds for any purpose. And as natural, cultural, and historic resources managers, the Department feels that it may not be the appropriate agency to request, and manage federal Homeland Security Grant Program funding for public health, emergency and clinical medical care purposes.

- 1 Department's Position: The Department of Health opposes this measure to appropriate federal funds
- 2 from the Homeland Security Grant Program for the purchase of a mobile medical van to be based at
- 3 Kona Community Hospital.
- 4 Financial Impact: Appropriates \$500,000 in Federal Homeland Security Grant funds.
- 5 Purpose and Justification: The Department appreciates that there are significant barriers in accessing
- 6 medical services in rural areas such as the southern area of Hawaii County. Mobile medical vans are
- 7 one strategy that could be used to address some of these barriers. However, we are concerned that this
- 8 measure appropriates funds for the medical van, but no funds to provide medical professionals to staff
- 9 the vans. The cost of staffing would be considerable and is not addressed. In addition, we note that
- 10 Homeland Security Grant funding allocations are decided through a grant application process set forth
- by the Federal government with the Department of Defense as the lead agency for the State.

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify in support of HB 317.

HMSA is dedicated to ensuring that all of our members are able to access the care they need, when they need it. We support initiatives to increase the ability of individuals who are in underserved areas to access appropriate revices. Some rural areas on our neighbor islands lack the facilities to provide appropriate levels of medical re. This is especially true of the communities of Ka'u and Upper Puna which are directly affected by volcanic emissions.

This measure would authorize the use of existing federal funds to be used for a mobile care unit to provide medical care to some of the more rural areas of the Big Island.
