Good Afternoon Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify. The Office of the Lieutenant Governor strongly opposes the passage of H.B. No. 444.

Throughout the 1990's, our community engaged in an emotional, decade-long debate over the legalization of same-sex marriage. The Legislature, for its part, had amended HRS §572-1 to clarify that marriage "shall be only between a man and a woman[.]" The Legislature also passed a Reciprocal Beneficiary law where it expressly found that "the people of Hawaii choose to preserve the tradition of marriage as a unique social institution based upon the committed union of one man and one woman."

Ultimately, the decision was put to the public in the form of a constitutional amendment. On November 3, 1998, the people of Hawai`i overwhelmingly made their voice clear on this matter and decided that "the Legislature shall have the power to reserve marriage to opposite-sex couples." Hi. Const. 1-23.

H.B. No. 444 now attempts to circumvent the will of the people by authorizing the equivalent to same sex marriage, albeit under a different name. That is, despite not referring to a civil union as "marriage," this bill would confer all of the rights, duties, and obligations of marriage to participants in a civil union by declaring that "[p]artners to a civil union . . . shall have all the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities under law, whether derived from statutes, administrative rules, court decisions, the common law, or any other source of civil law, as are granted to spouses in a marriage[.]"

Furthermore, Section 3 of H.B. No. 444 provides:

Except for part I of chapter 572, every reference in the Hawaii Revised Statutes to "marriage", or any aspect thereof, shall apply equally to "civil unions", including:

- (1) Every reference in the Hawaii Revised Statutes to "married" shall apply equally to the status of partners in a civil union;
- (2) Every reference to "husband", "wife", or "spouse" shall apply equally to a partner in a civil union; and
- (3) Every reference to marital status, including without limitation provisions pertaining to parties and procedures for annulment, divorce, separation, or dissolution, which shall apply equally and as necessary to civil unions and to partners in a civil union.

In view of the above, this bill clearly seeks to modify all Hawai`i law so that the terms "marriage" and "civil union" are synonymous. If the public is on record as being overwhelmingly opposed to the concept of same sex marriage, how could one conclude that they would support its 'identical twin' just because it goes by a different name? Under this bill, all of the above would occur without the public ever having an opportunity to vote on the legalization of civil unions.

Hawai`i's Reciprocal Beneficiary law (HRS §572C) already confers significant benefits to same sex couples, including but not limited to: health care coverage; hospital visitation privileges; property rights (including tenancy in the entirely rights); worker's compensation; State employee retirement beneficiary rights; and automobile insurance coverage. If there are further rights and privileges the Legislature wishes to convey to same sex couples, we believe it should be accomplished through modification of the existing Reciprocal Beneficiary law, not through the creation of civil unions.

Testimony in Strong Support of HB444

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

One critical element of the Vision Statement of the Hawaii State Board of Education (BOE) is that *all* students become contributing members of society. To this end, the BOE has promulgated Administrative Rules and Board Policies that mandate the equal treatment of all students and employees. BOE Policy 2000, Philosophy of Education, explains the connection between education, equality and a democratic society:

The Board of Education believes that a democratic society is dependent upon the free, full growth of individuals who will participate in the creation and development of the institutions in that society. The institution of government in this society is founded on a secular base, which allows and encourages the development of a pluralistic society that contains many cultures within that society. . . . Students shall have an equal educational opportunity to enroll in programs regardless of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, disabilities, or national origin.

The relevant meaning of this policy is that the BOE does not confer more rights and responsibilities to heterosexual students, or conversely withhold certain rights and responsibilities from gay and lesbian students. In fact, our Administrative Rules and Board Policies allow the Department of Education (DOE) to consequence students and employees for disparate treatment against students or employees on the basis of their sexual orientation. The BOE is committed to prepare all of our students, whether they are straight or gay, for a society that will fully value all of their contributions.

I am here today testifying as a Board member because equality is a public policy issue that directly affects our students, employees and their families. Let me illustrate the impact of discrimination on the school community using another set of factors. Imagine if the BOE came up with an arbitrary policy like: "Japanese are not allowed to participate in any DOE athletic program. No matter how fast you run, how well you handle a ball, how quick your reflexes, no matter how hard you are willing to practice if you are Japanese, you cannot play a sport."

We could easily imagine the direct impact this would have on Japanese students who dream of playing football, basketball, baseball or tennis. This would be demoralizing for *all* Japanese students, employees, and their family members and friends. Regardless

of its intent, no one would deny that this policy would send the message to the entire school community that something is "wrong" with Japanese people.

Recently, I met some high school students who said they had no idea gay families are denied civil marriages in Hawai'i. I was intrigued as these students' shock turned into anger as they processed this blatant injustice - it was as if someone took something away from them they thought had been theirs.

It made me wonder: has the DOE done such a good job ensuring all students are treated equally? Have our students been mislead into expecting that they will be treated equally by the State of Hawai`i?

What are we, as elected officials, saying when we perpetuate arbitrary and discriminatory public policy upon our students, citizens or families?

Let me clarify that I am not testifying today just on behalf of our gay and lesbian students. I am here to also support our heterosexual students, who may have gay parents and family members: What message have we been giving these students about their own families? I am also here on behalf of the gay and lesbian employees of the DOE and Public Libraries: How do we expect our students to treat them with equal respect if our own State laws do not?

In order for the BOE to fully actualize its Vision Statement, that *all students become contributing members of society*, we need to ensure that our society will value the contributions of *all* of its members. I applaud Chair Karamatsu, the co-sponsors and supporters of HB444 for allowing our State to become a society that values the contributions of all its members, students and families.

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and members of the House Committee on Judiciary:

My name is Eric Gill, Financial Secretary-Treasurer of UNITE HERE Local 5, a local labor organization representing over 11,000 hotel and health care workers employed throughout our State.

I come to testify in support of House Bill 444.

HB 444 is controversial. There are many strong feelings generated by the issue that is central to this bill. Some people come before this committee with great hopes, and look at this bill as a way to seek validation and recognition long withheld. Others come before this committee with great fear, seeing in this bill a threat to beliefs they hold dear. There will be much strong emotion, springing from many sources, expressed before you today.

But this bill is not about those things.

This bill is not about validating people's existence, nor is it about endangering social institutions. This bill is about economic justice, and the right of each of us to expect and receive fair treatment from our government.

Equality before the law is not a new concept. The notion that all people have a right to equal treatment from government is at the foundation of our democracy. It is written in our most fundamental law. It is the basic ideal that our government is expected to live up to.

This legislation is an attempt to make our laws live up to the cherished ideals of our society. But at its core, this bill is not about the laws or ideals. This bill is about people.

When my wife got sick, nobody questioned my right to be there in the hospital by her side. When her job was taken away from her, and she lost her health care, no one questioned my right to cover her under my medical insurance. If I should pass away, no one will question her right to her fair share of my retirement fund. I expect these things, because the law provides for them.

But this isn't true for all of my fellow citizens. In a society where our government has solemnly pledged to provide equal rights for all, we have failed to do so for some. This failure demeans us, and makes a mockery of our most cherished ideals.

Equal rights and equal treatment for all is not just the right thing to do. It is key to bringing our society together, so we can work toward a common purpose. Our union has learned this, not from any book, but in practice.

Our union is an organization whose mission, role and existence is founded on the solidarity and concerted activity of our members. Our most fundamental task is to build unity and common purpose among our members. To do this, we must overcome divisions of all sorts that exist among our extended family. We need to bring people whose ancestors have been here for centuries together with those recently arrived from many countries. In order to have the power to protect any of our members, we must unite people of different religions, different languages, different skin colors, different traditions.

And, different ways of living their private lives, and organizing their families.

In order for each person to commit to building our union, we have to fight for every person. Our members need to see us include everyone, for each individual to feel included.

That's why we fight for immigrant rights at the same time we fight for the rights of Native Hawaiians. We fight for equal treatment between men and women, between young and old, between races of people from all over the globe.

That's why we fight for the rights of those of us whose families are different, who have fallen in love differently. If we fail to fight for each, we undermine the unity and power of all.

This legislature is considering this bill at a great turning point in our nation's history. The people of America have once again affirmed our nation's unique commitment to bringing all of us together in our diversity. We have elected a President whose every action demonstrates his intent to ensure that each and every American is included in the American plan and the American dream.

The voters of our country have rejected eight years of division among us, of hatred and fear between us. America has decided to be a better place, the place where we live together, bound together by our common belief that human beings can be more than we have been, and strive for better than we are.

Now is Hawaii's chance to join this historic motion. Now is the time for Hawaii's legislature to take a stand. Bring us together. Care for all of us, equally. Pass HB 444.

H.B. 444 – RELATING TO CIVIL UNIONS

The Hawaii State AFL-CIO strongly supports the purpose and intent of H.B. 444 which would extend the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

Same-sex couples deserve the same rights and benefits as heterosexual couples who are entered into a legal marriage. Unfortunately, same-sex couples and their families are denied hundreds of protections and responsibilities offered by the state of Hawaii. As a result, by refusing the legally recognize same-sex relationships, Hawaii and other States deprive thousands of families the most important attributes of labor: the ability to take care of and provide for their family members.

Furthermore, many same-sex couples are our neighbors, police officers, firefighters, and teachers. Many keep us safe and educate our children. No longer should individuals who choose to have a same-sex relationship be discriminated against. In fact, it was not too long ago when interracial marriage was illegal in a number of states. Today, people would be in an uproar if interracial marriage was illegal. Without civil unions, the family truly suffers. When a partner in a same sex relationship dies, their children and partner are not guaranteed their pensions and other survivor benefits. 1. Circumvention of the Majority Will of the People

In 1998, an overwhelming majority of the people of Hawaii proclaimed by their vote that marriage must remain as one that is between one man and one woman. By passing HB 444, you will be circumventing the will of the 70% of the people who voted... your constituents who sent you a strong and clear message by their vote to preserve traditional marriage.

I strongly urge that you <u>not</u> pass HB 444 as it will reawaken this divisive and controversial battle in our community. Passing HB 444 will be seen as "back-dooring" the agenda of an illicit minority special interest. Your constituency will be enraged because you would have thwarted the will of the people.

2. Equal Rights

This legislation has nothing to do with equal rights. Same sex couples already have the benefits of Hawaii's reciprocal beneficiary law which gives them the same rights that were previously reserved for spouses.

3. Call It What It Is

No matter what you call it, this is "same sex" marriage. HB 444 duplicates the marriage law. The only thing this doesn't do is force religious institutions to perform these marriages.

4. Strength of the Traditional Family

Our nation was founded on the basis of preserving the strength of the traditional marriage and families. In fact, this foundational law has existed since the beginning of civilization. It transcends our modern laws. Every long-standing society has viewed marriage as a union of one man and one woman. Studies of previous civilizations reveal that when societies deviate from this standard of marriage as the foundation of its society, they inevitably deteriorate and eventually cease to exist.

In addition, collected data are clear and irrefutable – children do best in stable, healthy homes with a mother and a father. It would be reckless and irresponsible to rewrite our most basic marriage laws to suit the desires of adults at the expense of our children. The legalization of same sex marriage will weaken and eventually destroy our families and our society.

For these reasons, I strongly urge that you oppose HB 444.

1. Civil Unions = Same Sex Marriage without the Title

Civil Unions (CUs) are simply same sex marriages by a different title. The bill text reads: "Same benefits, protections, and responsibilities as marriage. Partners to a civil union lawfully entered into pursuant to this chapter shall have all the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities under law, whether derived from statutes, administrative rules, court decisions, the common law, or any other source of civil law, as are granted to spouses in a marriage validly entered into pursuant to chapter 572."

2. The People Have Spoken: NO to Same Sex Marriage

Civil Unions re-open the community controversy. The people of Hawaii have spoken on the same-sex marriage issue and have overwhelmingly rejected the idea. The decade of the 90s saw countless hours of debate to finally resolve this contentious issue. Let's not re-argue the same sex marriage fight via civil unions when the people have spoken so clearly (nearly 70% support for the constitutional amendment).

3. Hawaii Confers Significant Benefits through the Reciprocal Beneficiary Law

- a) Part of the compromise during the same-sex marriage debate was passage of Hawaii's reciprocal beneficiary (RB) legislation. The RB law provides significant benefits to many more people in need separate from their sex partner status.
- Under the current RB law, elderly siblings residing together can access important benefits. Under the civil unions proposal, only same-sex couples can access the benefits.

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Some of the RB benefits include:

- health care coverage
- hospital visitation privileges
- uniform health care decision making rights
- property rights, including tenancy in the entirely rights
- probate rights, including survivorship rights
- worker's compensation
- state employee retirement beneficiary rights
- automobile insurance coverage
- mental health commitment approvals and notifications
- family and funeral leave
- disaster relief loans
- public lands leases
- legal standing for wrongful death
- legal standing for victim's rights
- domestic violence family stautus
- University of Hawaii facility use
- Anatomical gift rights
- Government vehicle emergency use
- c) If there is something the Legislature wants to fix with the current set of benefits, like the health insurance provisions, it should simply go ahead and fix the RB statute.


4. Reciprocal Beneficiaries were and are Progressive & Have Been a Model for Discussion Elsewhere - Vast Majority of States Grant NO Benefits

RBs were a progressive solution at the time and still provide many more benefits than the vast majority of states in the country. Hawaii remains progressive. Most states have neither CUs nor RBs. Most states simply provide NO SUCH BENEFITS.

5. <u>Hawaii has many more Pressing Problems — Re-Arguing the Settled Same Sex Marriage Issue is an Unwise</u> Use of Limited Resources

Hawaii is facing serious problems affecting many more people than this narrow, controversial and divisive issue. It is hard to understand why the Legislature would want to re-open this wound that divided our community for so many years without any clear identification of the need for it.





6. Civil Unions Sought Now but Marriage Benefits WITH Title Change Will Be Sought Next

It is absolutely undeniable: if you were to pass civil unions, gay marriage advocates WILL be back arguing "that everything is the same and fundamental fairness suggests you should simply change the title as well." Gay marriage proponents recently in New Jersey demonstrated against civil unions. They declared nothing but same-sex marriage, including the title, was acceptable and demanded both title and benefits.

7. Actual Reason for Bill Still Unclear

Proponents should be clear about the primary reasons for this bill. Many of the items frequently mentioned are already available under the current law. Some benefits not currently available are limited state-only tax benefits and parenting rights.

8. Legally Complicated and Socially Explosive — Children Adversely Affected

The two most controversial aspects of this will be: parenting issues and what is taught to children about the law. How will the law confer parenting benefits and responsibilities to the same sex partner of a mother without adversely affecting the parenting rights of the mother and the parental rights of a birthfather? The civil union aspects related to children and parenting raise extremely complicated issues of family law and are unfortunately focused on the rights of the adults and not on the needs of the children.

This opens a nearly-unending number of legal possibilities, which will require complicated and expensive litigation to resolve. Again, what justification exists to upend our legal system for a very small number of cases?

Finally, what will be taught to children in public school? Will children be taught that the law says same-sex couples are just like married couples but with a different title? If not, why not? That would be the law. If it would be taught, then, we're right back to the heart of the same sex marriage debate and this issue is among the primary reasons people opposed same sex marriage in the first place.

To the Honorable Rep. Jon Riki Karamatsu and the House Judiciary Committee:

It is a pleasure for me to submit this testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of HB 444 as an ordained clergy and as one who also believes strongly in religious freedom. My denomination (Metropolitan Community Church) has been performing Holy Unions for same-gender couples since 1969. We believe the loving relationships of adult, consensual, non- related gay and lesbian couples are blessed in the eyes of God and ought to be celebrated by communities of faith. That is why we provide this rite or ritual to those who seek such an affirmation.

I have had the honor and privilege of performing these Holy Unions in Hawai'i and also legal marriages in California last summer. The one that stands out most in my mind was for an interracial couple in Silverlake, California. They have been together for 39 years! As they were reading their vows to one another, they openly wept — realizing the hardships and obstacles that stood in their way for years — until they were able to finally proclaim their love and commitment in such a public way at that moment. The rest of those gathered there were also crying, empathizing in their struggle for equality and human dignity. Now, their marriage stands in suspension once more. Will they be forced to divorce by a slim majority of Californians who voted for Prop 8? I hope not.

I re alize, however, that not all religious communities share our perspective on marriage equality or even granting civil unions to same-gender couples. They don't have to. That is part of the beauty of the separation of church and state. What the state offers its citizens is not the *rite* I just mentioned, but rather the *rights* to its tax-paying, law-abiding citizens. The constitution is supposed to offer equal protection under the law and pay close attention to "suspect" classes such as gays and lesbians, who are more prone to discrimination and unfair treatment. That is my understanding of the spirit in which the United States was founded.

I would also encourage each of you, out of respect to the aina, to go back to Hawaiian history, when mahu ("two-spirit" people who were ancient equivalents of modern-day gays and lesbians) were treated with the utmost dignity and respect. They were thought to have embodied that delicate balance between the earthly realm and the spiritual realm. They were shamans and chief advisors to ali'i because of their unique sensitivity.

President Obama, during his inauguration speech, calls us to "a new era of responsibility." We are indeed responsible for same-gender couples being able to visit each other in the hospital, sharing insurance policies, and being able to draw from their partner's pension upon retirement. We are responsible for treating each other as fellow first-class citizens, not relegating certain people to the "back of the bus." We are responsible for making sure we broaden our definition of "kakou (we)" to include same-gender 'ohana and truly embody "malama kakou (caring for one another)" in order for there to be "pono (righteousness)" in our land.

Mahalo nui loa for your consideration. It is once again my prayer and my audacious hope that HB 444 will pass.

My name is Rev. Sam Cox. Previous to my retirement 10 years ago, I was the Executive Director of Hale Kipa Youth Services for homeless and runaway youth for 23 years. I am currently the part-time Visitation Pastor of the Kailua United Methodist Church.

I would like to register my strong support for this bill that would extend the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union. It is long overdue.

During my tenure at Hale Kipa, we had a disproportionate number of youth who had same gender-orientation issues. Most were the result of family problems, with parents and other adults in their lives who could not come to terms with their sexual orientation, rejecting them and even throwing them out. The youth themselves often had low self-esteem as the result of the rejection. They also faced the enormous homo-phobia in our society. The prospect of falling in love, finding a life partner and having a happy family life seemed daunting.

We have come a long way over the past 30 years. Our social attitudes have changed, particularly among youth and better educated. Most of us know today that same same gender orientation is not a disease, but is as normal as being left-handed or having a particular pigment of skin.

Everyone deserves to be treated equally under the law, a chance to experience love and happiness with full civil rights, and be part of the American dream.

I hope you will take this opportunity to correct this flaw in our society. It will go a long way in healing our youth and families.

Dear Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

At the request of the vestry of Holy Innocents Episcopal Church in Lahaina, Maui, I am enclosing a letter of testimony in support of the passage of legislation creating civil unions (HB 444) by your committee and the entire legislature. This letter was written in 2007 when this matter last came before your committee and the vestry reaffirms its previous testimony.

We reaffirm that our support of this legislation is based not only on what we perceive to be the best interests of the citizens of Hawai'i but also on our religious faith that we are called to respect and support the dignity of every human being. It is a matter justice and respect for all of our citizens.

Our priest and his partner were married at their home in Massachusetts and living there when we called them to serve our parish in Lahaina. We are keenly aware of the fact that by answering our call and moving to Hawai'i, they gave up significant legal protections. We are aware that if one died they would suffer significantly higher tax consequences that would jeopardize the financial security of the survivor. This is unjust and unwise. Such disparity in the recognition of civil unions among the states puts Hawai'i at a significant disadvantage in attracting qualified people.

In the past five years or so, we have seen civil unions recognized in many States. We are unaware of any instance in these States where families or the institution of marriage have in any way been "hurt or destroyed". Quite the contrary! We recognize that failure to provide legal

recognition and protection for the committed relationships of our gay and lesblan members is what can and does hurt families by such things as denying children health care coverage or denying survivors pension benefits.

We believe that HB 444 supports families and Is beneficial to Hawal's and <u>all</u> its families. We believe that HB 444 in no way impinges upon the free exercise of anyone's religious beliefs or compels them to do anything contrary to those beliefs in the context of their churches or temples.

Dear Senators and Representatives:

We, the undersigned Wardens, Vestry Members and Priest-in-Charge of Holy Innocents Episcopal Church in Lahaina, Maui, respectfully urge you to favorably vote out of your Committees HB 908 and SB 1062 for consideration and vote by the full House and Senate. We also urge you to vote in favor of these Bills when they do come before the House and Senate for the following reasons:

- 1. We believe the existing laws of the State of Hawaii do not provide for the full and equal protection of Hawaii's gay and lesbian citizens and that there is no rational basis for this disparate and discriminatory treatment. We know that our gay and lesbian members have entered committed, loving and supportive long-term relationships. We see no reason for the State of Hawaii to continue to deny the reality of the lives of its gay and lesbian citizens and thus deny them the legal recognition and protections these relationships require.
- 2. We believe the creation and fostering of committed, long-term, mutually supportive relationships with clearly defined benefits and obligations is good public policy. Such legal clarity will benefit not only the parties to such civil unions but also governmental agencies, hospitals, corporations, etc. which deal with the public.
- 3. We recognize with regret that much of the opposition to these bills comes from religious sources. However, there is much dispute within various religious traditions and denominations over this subject. The views of Orthodox Jewish bodies differ from those of Reform and Conservative Jewish bodies. The views of Unitarians and Quakers differ from those of many fundamentalist or evangelical Christians. Lutherans, Episcopalians, Presbyterians and Methodists are divided and struggle with this issue within their own churches. We should also point out that many citizens have no religious affiliations.

4. Given this difference of theological opinion, there is no reason why Hawaii's laws need to be in accord with the views of any particular religious body. Every day, Hawaii licenses and records marriages of divorced people that certain religious denominations would not permit. Every day, wills and contracts are enforced that may not be in accord with the tenets of certain faiths. Every day, the State licenses businesses to sell products that may be prohibited by certain faiths. We see no reason why permitting competent adult citizens to enter into a civil contract of civil union pursuant to HB 908 & SB 1062 should be viewed any differently. Some religious bodies may disapprove of such unions but this law in no way forces them in any way to perform or recognize such unions in a religious context.

Most importantly, we write to you in support of HB 908 and SB 1062 out of affirmation of our faith and out of affection for our gay and lesbian members. As part of our Baptismal Covenant, we are called to affirmatively answer the following two questions: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? These promises compel us to write to you in support of this important legislation.

Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

Thank you for allowing me to testify before this committee. My name is Alan Spector and I am a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and a resident of Kaneohe. I serve as Co-Chair of **Family Equality Coalition**. We are a non-profit group of diverse individuals and organizations (gay and non-gay) working together to achieve equal marriage rights for gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender people and their families in Hawaii. We were founded in late 2007. We collaborate closely with The Interfaith Alliance of Hawaii, GLBT Caucus of the Democratic Party, UNITE HERE Local 5, ACLU-Hawaii, Japanese American Citizens League-Honolulu Chapter, National Association of Social Workers-Hawaii Chapter, and Pride at Work. Our membership is expanding rapidly each day and we have grown from just 40 members in June 2008 to almost 1300 as of today! Family Equality Coalition **strongly supports House Bill 444** as it would extend the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

Passing civil union legislation in Hawaii is long overdue and much has changed since Hawaii began this national discussion during the early 1990s. Public opinion on this issue continues to progress in our favor over time. According to the December 2008 Newsweek poll, 55% of Americans support legally sanctioned unions or partnerships for same-sex couples. This is up significantly from 2004 when only 40% of Americans supported such unions. These figures compare to a survey done of Hawaii residents in December 2007 by QMark Research and Polling that revealed the following:

- 77% agree that "We should not limit an individual's access to social and civil benefits and rights pertaining to relationships based on gender."
- 62% agree that "Couples of the same gender should have access to the legal privileges and protections of marriage as couples of the opposite gender - as a matter of civil rights."
- 73% agree that "Committed couples and their families, regardless of their sexual preference or orientation, should have the same rights. That's the bottom line - we should treat people equally."
- 56% agree to "Giving rights to same-sex partners in the form of civil unions or domestic partnerships."

Since the last time this committee heard a civil union bill (2007), both the Hawaii Government Employees Association and the Hawaii State AFL-CIO have passed resolutions in support of civil unions. As of 2009, civil unions or comprehensive domestic partnerships that grant all state level spousal rights to same-sex couples are legal in Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, New Hampshire, California, Oregon, and Washington, DC. Limited domestic partnerships that offer just offer a small defined set of rights are legal in Washington State, Maine and Maryland. Marriage is legal for same-sex couples in Massachusetts and Connecticut. New York State currently recognizes marriages of same-sex couples validly contracted in other jurisdictions. Most of the USA's civil union, domestic partnership, and same-sex marriage laws have been passed since 2004. Since that time, not a single

legislator has lost his or her seat for supporting such legislation. On the horizon, we anticipate a ruling from the lowa Supreme Court on this issue in 2009. Legislation is currently being introduced in New Mexico and Washington State for comprehensive domestic partnerships and marriage bills have been introduced in New Hampshire and Maine.

We come before you asking not for special rights but for equal rights. This is something required by the Hawaii Constitution as well as rulings by the Hawaii Supreme Court and lower court. Some will claim that the 1998 Constitutional Amendment decided this issue. That is not true. The amendment merely gives the legislature the sole ability to define Hawaii's marriage statutes, something that remains within your Constitutional right. I should stress, however, that HB 444 does not impact or alter Hawaii's marriage laws or the definition of marriage in any way. Civil unions are not the same as marriage. Marriage is more than just a package of rights. It is a social status, understood by all, that tells a community that two people love each other and are a family. Civil unions are an alternative legal structure that attempts to provide the legal rights and obligations associated with marriage without allowing the couple to actually marry. Civil unions do not have the same social meaning as marriage as evidenced by the differences in both public support and legislative support for the two. We currently have widespread public and legislative support for civil unions (32 out of 51 Hawaii House Reps. have signed onto this bill) whereas our marriage bill, HB 878 only has 9 cointroducers and co-signers. If civil unions were the same as marriage, why are there different levels of support for each? If civil unions were truly the same as marriage, how many married people would be willing to trade their marriage for a civil union?

Civil unions represent a significant compromise for the GLBT community of Hawaii as they don't represent our true goal of marriage equality, however, they do represent a significant advancement towards the extending of equal treatment under the law. We are willing to accept this compromise and continue to work in coalition with others to educate the public and the legislature until the day comes that this legislature is ready to grant us full marriage equality.

Our opposition will claim that civil unions are not needed and that we should just "fix" the reciprocal beneficiary laws. I am glad that the word "fix" is used as it validates our claim that the reciprocal beneficiary laws are deficient and broken, however, it is our opinion that they are beyond fixing. According to the 2006 statement by Kelly Rosati, former Executive Director of Hawaii Family Forum, reciprocal beneficiaries were never meant to be a "marriage substitute." Reciprocal beneficiary status offers a very limited set of rights to any two single adults unable to legally marry. This includes same-sex couples as well as blood relatives including two single siblings or a widowed mother and her unmarried son. There are two main problems associated with reciprocal beneficiaries. Firstly, most people have no idea what rights are afforded under reciprocal beneficiaries despite being law since 1997. Again to quote Ms. Rosati from her 2006 statement, "If you asked most people in Hawaii about reciprocal beneficiaries, their response would be 'reciprocal who'." As a result of such widespread confusion, many of the rights afforded to reciprocal beneficiaries are never

realized. Secondly, reciprocal beneficiaries group into the same category same-sex couples living in spousal like relationships, often with children, with blood relatives such a siblings. The needs of each of these two types of reciprocal beneficiary couple vary greatly. No one has every argued that family dyads such as siblings or parent and child should be treated the same as married. Reciprocal beneficiaries excludes such rights as joint taxation, health insurance benefits, parental rights, joint adoption, and anything else relating to family law including spousal support, access to family court, and judicial dissolution (divorce). It is simply not feasible to impose such spousal equivalent rights onto blood relative reciprocal beneficiaries. Are we to require that sisters obtain divorces or be obligated to support one another with alimony if they choose to dissolve their reciprocal beneficiary relationship so one can marry? How will the business community react if it is required to provide health benefits to an employee's sibling, parent, aunt, uncle, etc?

Family Equality Coalition supports leaving Hawaii's reciprocal beneficiary statutes alone and following the "Vermont Model" which offers both a civil union law and a separate reciprocal beneficiary law.

I would like to conclude on a more personal note and share why this issue is so important to me. I moved to Hawaii from a region of the USA that already recognizes marriage for same-sex couples. I moved here with my husband as a legally married gay man, albeit, had my marital status invalidated the moment I landed on this beautiful island. My journey to marriage has been a long one. My parents raised me with a strong sense of family and the importance of a strong solid marriage. In 1999, my husband and I were married by a rabbi in a Jewish wedding ceremony recognized by the Central Conference of American Rabbis and the Union for Reform Judaism, the largest denomination of Judaism in North America. We did not have the benefit at that time of achieving legal status. My parents paid for the wedding and after the rabbi pronounced us married, my parents cried, hugged my husband, and said, "Welcome to the family, now you are one of us." In 2000, we renewed our vows in a legal civil union. In 2005, once again, we renewed our vows, only this time in a legal marriage! It is terribly painful for us that this state invalidates our marital status and denies us the rights for which we are entitled. How would you feel if you were in my place? Would you want your child treated this way?

I ask that you strongly support HB 444. Mahalo for this opportunity to testify.

My name is John Heidel and I am a minister of the United Church of Christ. I began my ministry here in the islands as the Minister of Youth at Central Union Church in 1962 and then served as a Chaplain at Punahou School for 32 years. Today I am representing The Interfaith Alliance Hawaii and offer this testimony in strong support of HB 444.

We affirm that people of faith and good will are bound together by shared principles of compassion, civility and mutual respect for human dignity for all people; we are different branches of a pluralistic society that weave a common thread through the fabric of our nation. The Interfaith Alliance is committed to the guarantee of civil liberties and religious liberties, though they may not always coincide. Civil unions will affirm what kind of interpersonal associations are subject to protection of law within its jurisdiction, civil liberties that should be extended to all Americans. The Interfaith Alliance has neither standing nor intent to evaluate the theology and practice of any particular faith tradition, but affirms its respect for the religious liberties that honor the diversity of approaches to human relationships.

Some of our faiths perform and recognize same-sex marriages, some officially bless unions, and others do neither. We find our diversity to be a source of strength. We firmly believe that the State and Federal Governments have no place in defining the sanctity of some traditions to the exclusion of others, as pertaining to our diverse practices of unions. We affirm the human dignity and worth of all people and we also affirm that civil unions will not endanger our religious traditions nor the stability of our families.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of HB444, which extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of marriage to partners in a civil union.

We appreciate the support given to HB444 by the Speaker, the Judiciary Chair, the 30 additional introducers, and all Representatives who support this bill.

HB444 aligns with President Obama's priorities: "President Obama supports full civil unions that give same-sex couples legal rights and privileges equal to those of married couples."

The Legislative Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawaii considers passage of a civil union bill one of its top priorities. HB444 embodies the essence of Government Operations Resolution 08-04, which reads in pertinent part: "the Democratic Party of Hawai'i supports the institution of civil unions for two people of legal age only as a reasonable step towards full marriage equality for those who wish to enter into such a civil and contractual relationship".

Because Resolution 08-04 supports "the institution of civil unions for two people" regardless of gender, I prefer that HB444 be amended: a) to eliminate subsection (2) of paragraph 2 ("of the same sex as the other partner in the civil union"), and b) to conform paragraph 3 accordingly ("A civil union shall be void if between the following persons: parent and child; grandparent and grandchild; two siblings; aunt or uncle and niece or nephew" and deleting the remainder of paragraph 3). These amendments make HB444 consistent with its definition of civil union as a "union between two individuals".

These two amendments eliminate the gender discrimination in HB444. Without these amendments, HB444 extends the gender discrimination inherent in marriage to civil unions by creating a separate, equally-discriminatory institution limited to same-sexed couples.

CHAIR JON KARAMATSU, VICE-CHAIR TOM BROWER and MEMBERS of the HOUSE JUDIIARY COMMITTEE:

Aloha. I offer this testimony today on behalf of Christian Voice of Hawaii, a network of more than 800 ministers from many denominations throughout Hawaii. The network involves pastors and numerous faith-based ministries that are active in providing support services in communities throughout the islands — from homeless shelters, to food distribution, family counseling, medical care, elderly and hospice care, social and spiritual counseling, assisting un-wed mothers, problem pregnancies, child services, education and so forth.

The members of the Christian Voice of Hawaii network hereby register our **OPPOSITION** to **HB 444 – RELATING TO CIVIL UNIONS.**

In 1998, after a drawn-out seven-year battle, the people of Hawaii decisively and conclusively said NO to "same-sex marriage." The vote to ratify that constitutional amendment emphatically registered the people of Hawaii's disapproval to altering our traditional and cultural system. The people rejected the notion of re-defining the institution of "marriage" to include "same-sex" couples.

This legislature's subsequent passage of Reciprocal Beneficiaries provided that civil benefits available to married couples, would be available to many other types of relationships regardless of the sexual or non-sexual nature of that relationship. This includes "same-sex" couples. Since these benefits are already available, and since HB 444 "Relating to Civil Unions" calls for benefits specific to homosexual couples; it is apparent that HB 444 is not really seeking equal benefits, it is seeking official state validation of homosexual partnerships.

HB 444 is really asking you legislators to recognize homosexuality as a specifically protected class of people. HB 444 is really asking you legislators to recognize "samesex marriage," only this time around calling it "civil unions."

The mark of a civilized society is not how much evil and depravity it can tolerate, but how much good it can maintain for the protection and benefit of the society. Pushing for the approval of special rights based on sexual deviancy constitutes a serious erosion of the foundational principles of this society. The state's crises in tourism downturn, job losses, foreclosures, falling revenues, homelessness, energy instability, high taxes, education, health care, "ceded lands" and so forth, are much more crucial to your constituents than your getting needlessly bogged down in another pitch battle over an issue that the people of Hawaii decisively addressed over ten years ago.

Please do not waste taxpayer's time and resources by starting another "same-sex marriage" war. We the members of the Christian Voice of Hawaii network urge you the members of this committee to vote NO on HB 444.

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee: Aloha. Mahalo for this opportunity to testify before you this afternoon. My name is Laurie Cicotello and I live in Moili'ili. I come before you today in support of House Bill 444 on Civil Unions. I represent COLAGE, Children of Lesbians and Gays Everywhere. Founded more than 20 years ago, COLAGE envisions a world in which all families are valued, protected, reflected, and embraced by society and all of its institutions.

I strongly believe all unions between two consenting adults should be=2 0treated equally under the law and as protected by the United States Constitution. House Bill 444 would provide the same rights, benefits, protections and responsibilities to partners in civil unions as to those people in traditional marriages.

On February 1, 2009, my parents proudly celebrated their 40th anniversary – in a legal, now same-sex marriage. At Sacred Hearts Catholic Church in Milwaukee in 1969, my folks committed in front of God, their family and friends to "Let No One Rend Asunder" their wedding vows. More than 25 years ago, my parent, Dainna, completed the transition from male to female. She and my mom, Mary, decided to stay together and remain married during intensely personal and emotional changes. They are the first couple in the United States to remain legally married following Dainna's transition.

During the past 25 years, various people from all walks of life have had no problem telling me they feel my parent's marriage is null and void. I have been told that children are better off raised in "traditional families," whatever that means. I have had a successful career and even worked as a writer in Governor Linda Lingle's executive offic e. Being raised in a nontraditional family has made me a good and moral citizen and allows me a great deal more compassion for all family structures and understanding of cultural differences.

To that end, I join my parents and countless other 'ohana across the country in fighting for equality and justice within the law. As my parents travel the country, we are never sure which states will still recognize their marriage and their commitment to "Let No One Rend Asunder" their vows.

In 1996, Colorado overturned State Amendment 2 after the United States Supreme Court

ruled 6-3 in Romer V. Evans that "an identifiable group of people could not be walled off from the legal system." Marriage and civil unions, are first and foremost legal contracts and agreements. While many, but not all, weddings take place in churches, ALL divorces must take place in a courtroom. Thus, not allowing a certain identifiable group of people to enter into this legal contract effectively walls them off from the legal system.

There is no way to define the terms, "male," "female," "man," or "woman," legally or otherwise and no criteria to even write those definitions. We are more alike than we are different on every consideration. For example, the International Olympic Committee stopped chromosomal testing in 1994 after finding too many athletes were not exclusively XX or XY.

In addition to supporting the legalization of civil unions, I also kindly ask that Hawaii honor the "Full Faith and Credit" of marriages, civil unions, domestic partnerships or similar legal recognitions between two consenting adults. Mahalo nui loa for your consideration and support of House Bill 444 recognizing Same-Sex Civil Unions.

Support of HB 444 Relating to Civil Unions

Da Moms is a support group for parents of GLBT (gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender) persons. We strongly support HB 444, Relating to Civil Unions which would give couples of the same sex the opportunity to enter into state licensed civil unions. My name is Josephine Chang. I am a co-founder of Da Moms. Like many senior citizens, I am a retired public servant, a long-time community volunteer, and a family care-giver. Most important, I am the mother of three sons, and a grandmother. I am thankful that all of my sons are good and productive adults, but especially thankful that my oldest and gay son has successfully coped with the terrible discrimination he faces daily as a gay man.

For a gay person, a gay youth, a gay adult, a gay senior, life is far more difficult and hazardous because of wide-spread discrimination against gays. Many gays live in fear of harm every day just because of who they are. They may try to keep their gayness a secret from those that matter most to them, their parents and siblings, extended family, friends, and co-workers, because they fear rejection or worse, just because of who they are. They are a vulnerable and at-risk population that often goes undetected and underserved by our social services system because they are afraid of discrimination from them too.

Because of discrimination, when parents learn that their son or daughter is gay, they often experience similar fears for their child and themselves. Some parents speak of traumatizing emotional upheavals, family crises, family secrecy, and depression. Parents may withdraw from each other, from their extended families, and their support systems, because they do not know how to cope with the confusion they feel knowing their child is good and does not deserve the discrimination surrounding them. Parents also go into the closet.

Parents often seek outside support for this very personal matter of a gay child, because they are afraid to risk rejection from family and friends. We believe that the best a parent can do for their gay child is to love them unconditionally. However, a parent's love cannot dispel the very real, harmful discrimination in our society. And a parent's voice can often be drowned out by the derogatory messages all around us.

It is for that reason we appeal to you, our lawmakers. The only antidote for unwarranted and harmful discrimination against minorities is leadership from the highest levels. As we have seen, government can contribute to discrimination by passing discriminatory laws that exclude gays, or it can pass laws to include gays and treat them equally. HB 444, by establishing civil unions, will at least provide gay couples, and thereby, their children with the opportunity to have the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of marriage. While it is a big step in our struggle to end the great human costs of discrimination against gays in our communities, this is

not a complete solution. Gays will remain excluded from actual marriage in our state. Separate but equal still sends a message of second class citizenship.

We all need to recognize that the social, emotional, and family problems caused by discrimination against gays is a problem for all of us. Gays are part of so many families, and extended families. They are among our valued friends, neighbors, co-workers, in every profession and line of work. When we hurt the gay members of our community, we hurt ourselves. For the health and well-being of all of us, and of all families, please kokua and do justice and fairness by passing HB 444. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

It was about 7 years ago when one of our four children came out to me, "Hey mom, I'm gay". I first considered not telling a soul. That lasted for about 5 minutes. Here I am today, telling all of Hawaii.

As an educator, I began to read books about sexual orientation. As a mom, I shared with other family members and found comfort in my very devote, Catholic father's words, "Don't worry, honey, God doesn't make junk." And as an individual, I began to look at how society would treat this child of ours. I have to admit, I had a lot to learn.

There was no question in our minds of unconditional love for all of our children. I also worried about their personal safety and this concern was intensified for our gay son. The JACL Hawai'i, Honolulu Chapter strongly supports HB 444, relating to civil unions.

Founded in 1929, the Japanese American Citizens League is the nation's oldest and largest Asian Pacific American Civil Rights organization made up of over 20,000 members. Locally, we are a strong civil rights organization committed to the protection of civil and human rights of all. The Honolulu chapter is a staunch supporter of the human and civil rights of all people, regardless of race, sex, religion, national origin, age, disability, and sexual orientation.

JACL was among many groups who fought relentlessly against the constitutional amendment denying the rights of same-sex individuals to marry. When the Alliance for Traditional Marriage waged an attack on Hawai'i's State Constitution to prohibit same gender marriage, the JACL Honolulu Chapter stood shoulder to shoulder with other civil rights organizations in working the phone banks, talking to voters and taking out advertisements to Protect Our Constitution. JACL also filed an amicus brief on June 2, 1997 arguing against the denial of the right to marriage based upon sexual orientation. The JACL National Council adopted a resolution supporting same-sex marriage in 1994.

We believe that a person involved in a relationship with a person of the same sex should be allowed the same rights and protections as those who are involved in a heterosexual marital relationship. Differential treatment of married couples and persons in a same-sex relationship is both unfair and unjustified.

JACL Hawai'i believes that HB 444 is an incremental step towards extending the litany of rights, benefits, and obligations conferred on married couples, but denied to same-sex couples who cannot legally marry. Therefore, we urge your support of HB 1667.

TESTIMONY BY JANICE PECHAUER Past President, Save Traditional Marriage '98

My name is Janice Pechauer, Past President of Save Traditional Marriage '98, the coalition formed to pass the Constitutional Amendment preserving traditional marriage.

HB 444 – Relating to Civil Unions subverts the will of Hawaii's citizens. After many years of Legislative wrangling and judicial intrusion, the Legislature finally allowed the people to decide the issue of homosexual "marriage" via a Constitutional Amendment ballot measure. In 1998 Hawaii's citizens voted overwhelmingly against homosexual "marriages." Winning a majority vote in every House District and by a margin of 70% they supported traditional marriage between one woman and one man only. As a trade off, Legislators passed a reciprocal beneficiary law.

Now, apparently, some in the Legislature do not consider those actions final and believe the 30% minority view should prevail. In 2003, 2004. 2007 and now here again in 2009, we have another Legislative effort to allow homosexuals to marry through a sleight of hand "civil union" designation. Passage of HB 444 would eliminate any legal distinction between homosexual civil union marriages and traditional marriage. Except for the marriage license, a civil union would be treated in the same way as a traditional marriage. Supporters have admitted their next goal is to exert pressure to legalize same-sex marriage.

When I lead the grassroots effort to preserve traditional marriage I spoke before forty-two different groups, and a common concern was a fear of homosexual sex being taught in schools. This fear is not unfounded, considering what was happening in our schools then and what has transpired in several states since then.

For example, then I was told that an Ewa high school sex education teacher told students that they needed to try both lifestyles before deciding what they were. At McKinley H.S. homosexuals were invited to speak to students in sex education classes, and in some private preschools, the books "Heather has Two Mommies" and "Daddy's Wedding" were in the classrooms - much to the shock of parents.

Indoctrinating students exists across the country. On March 25, 2000 the Massachusetts Depart. of Education sponsored a workshop for high school students. A description of it can be found at http://www.massnews.com/maygsa.htm. Please be advised that the contents are extremely graphic.

"The statewide conference, called "Teach-Out," was sponsored by the Massachusetts Department of Education, the Governor's Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth, and the Gay,

Lesbian and Straight Education Network. Among the goals were to build more Gay/Straight Alliances in Massachusetts and expand homosexual teaching into the lower grades. Scores of gay-friendly teachers and administrators attended. Teenagers and children as young as 12 were encouraged to come from around the state, and many were bussed in from their home districts. Homosexual activists from across the country were also there."

"To say that the descriptions of workshops and presentations of this state-sponsored event for educators and children are "every parent's nightmare," does not do them justice. It is beyond belief that this could be happening at all. One music teacher who attended out of curiosity said that she could not sleep for several nights afterwards and had nightmares about it."

If you pass HB 444, parents in Hawaii should be even more concerned and ever more vigilant with what their children will be taught in school, as the pressure is already there to teach homosexual sex to children.

The people of Hawaii strongly expressed their views that marriage is an institution to be protected. Creating counterfeit parallels to marriage, such as civil unions, diminishes the institution of marriage.

Please vote no on HB 444. Mahalo.

While the devastating effects of AIDS have not been confined to gay people, it is fair to note that nearly three-quarters of the HIV positive people assisted by Life Foundation over the years have been gay men. This has provided us with a unique vantage point to observe gay couples as they confronted life with or death as a result of AIDS. We have seen how existing laws and practices have prevented gay partners from decision-making related to healthcare and end of life issues and have seen long-term partners excluded from funerals and property dispositions.

As an AIDS organization, we find that our ability to positively impact a person's health related decision making is in direct proportion to the person's self worth. A person who feels empowered and valued will tend to do things that are more beneficial such as wearing a seat belt, limiting cigarettes, drugs and alcohol and avoiding unsafe sexual practices.

Americans for Democratic Action/Hawaii has long supported equal rights for all people. At our Annual Meeting on Jan. 31, 2009, we considered and passed unanimously the following Resolution:

WHEREAS: "Each individual's journey through life is unique. Some will make this journey alone, others in loving relationships - maybe in marriage or other forms of commitment. We need to ponder our own choices and try to understand the choices of others. Love has many shapes and colors and is not finite. It cannot be measured or defined in terms of sexual orientation." (From the Statement of Affirmation and Reconciliation by the Quaker meeting in Aotearoa.)

WHEREAS: The Declaration of Independence of the United States of America states: "All men are created equal, endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights."

THEREFORE: Americans for Democratic Action, Hawaii (ADA/H) concurs with the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund: "Because marriage is a basic human right and an individual personal choice,

RESOLVED, the State should not interfere with same-gender couples who choose to marry and share fully an equally in the rights, responsibilities, and commitment of civil marriage."

Yet ADAH recognizes that the current political climate is unfavorable to true and full equality. Therefore a logical step on the path to true equality would be the passage of a civil unions bill granting all rights of marriage without the title.

Good afternoon Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the House Committee on Judiciary. My name is Faye Kennedy and I am submitting testimony as President of the Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus in strong support of HB 444 Relating to Civil Union.

HB 908 extends the same rights and responsibilities of spouses to partners in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

Through civil marriage, couples are granted more than 1,000 federal rights, benefits and responsibilities under law, along with hundreds of state level rights and protections. The government uses the legal recognition of civil marriage to grant these rights, which include Social Security survivor benefits, hospital visitation rights and the ability to inherit a spouses' property without being taxed.

"In 1948, 19 years before the Supreme Court's ruling in Loving v. Virginia, the California Supreme Court ruled on an interracial case, Perez v. Lippold, with a four justice majority affirming the right of interracial marriages. The majority opinion said that each person seeking a license to marry the 'wrong' kind of person, 'finds himself barred by law from marrying the person of his choice and that person to him may be irreplaceable. Human beings are bereft of worth and dignity by a doctrine that would make them as interchangeable as trains." (Human Rights Campaign website)

Hawai'i lawmakers had the courage to pass out the Hawai'i Reciprocal Beneficiaries law which was enacted July 8, 1997. This law provides limited state rights to same gender couples, relatives and friends. At the time of passage, this law represented a commitment to provide substantially similar government rights to those couples who are barred by law from marriage.

HB 444 is the next step for Hawai'i to take to bring equality and justice to people who wish to enter into same gender civil unions.

I urge your Committee to pass this important measure that is long overdue and makes equal rights for same gender couples who enter into civil unions as with heterosexual partners.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony in strong support of HB 444.

Aloha Chair Karamatsu and entire Judiciary Committee,

My name is Carolyn Martinez Golojuch. I have been married for 44 years to Mike, a retired USAF officer; I am the mother of two adult children; a social worker with a masters degree and trained to stand up for equality and justice for all; besides I am a community organizer and leader as well as being the President of PFLAG-Oahu (Parents, Families and Friends of LGBTIQ children).

Today I address you in support of HB444 because it is a constitutional issue. One example is reflected when Hawaii Supreme Court Judge, Kevin Chang, ruled on December 3, 1996 that the State of Hawai i had failed to prove its case and that the state did not have a valid reason to deny marriage licenses to the three same-sex couples, and he ordered the state to issue the licenses immediately. However, the Hawai'i State Attorney General's office allowed an appeal, which was granted immediately. Thus our children were denied their equal rights by the minority that applied for the appeal.

This is my 14th year of speaking for social justice. My husband and I have a daughter and a gay son. Most people hear about our gay son. I love both of our children equally but my daughter does not need my constant working for her equal rights because she has always had them. Our son does not have equal rights ONLY because he is gay. Thus, I am before you today asking for the passage of HB444.

Historically here in Hawaii it is apparent that since before 1990, our children have been working for free access to equality in their lives. Here is a partial list of their work for equality:

- 1. In 1990 3 Hawaii citizens apply for marriage licenses;
- 1992 State Supreme Court statement: "Isn't it obvious, one judge asked, that male-female couples can go to the Health Department and get licenses, whereas same-sex couples cannot? Isn't that discrimination, pure and simple?"
- 3. September 1995 Governor, Ben Cayetano established the 2nd Governor's Commission on Sexual Orientation and the Law. http://www.hawaii.gov/lrb/rpts95/sol/pref.html which found that state did not have a valid reason to deny marriage licenses to the three same-sex couples, and he ordered the state to issue the licenses immediately. However, the Hawai'i State Attorney General's office requested an appeal, which was granted immediately. The judgment wasn't followed; in less than 24 hours the appeal stopped any licenses.
- 4. 1997 HB 118 "Reciprocal Beneficiaries" and would grant a minimal rights package "to those people who are otherwise not able to marry." Bill killed in the Joint Session.
- 1998 Constitutional Amendment to limit marriage to one man and one woman by the 2nd lowest voter turn out to date.
- 6. 2005 HB 1231: Civil Unions Bill passed over. even though the most violate
- 7. 2006 Gov Ben Cayetano "With regard to the separation of church and state, we believe that marriage as a religious institution should be a matter for the various religious groups who perform marriages, while civil partnerships should be controlled by the state governments and open to all who apply."
- 8. 2-7-07 HB 908 Civil Unions Bill passed over.

All this and more have kept us working for social justice, equality under the law because we believe all human beings should have the right to have their basic needs supplied and have the right to be treated equally, with no discrimination on the basis of age, ethnicity, skin color, race, sexual orientation or gender identity. We oppose any laws that would deprive anyone of equal treatment under the laws and in the work place.

My husband and I along with the membership of PFLAG-Oahu do not live in fear that our marriages would be hurt by our children having equal social justice, freedom to marry who they love because we believe the world needs love now more than ever and that our GLBTIQ children should be covered by the US Constitution to have equal access to the law in every way that our heterosexual is covered.

Please bring justice, equality and freedom to all our children. Anything less is discrimination.

Please pass HB444 for Civil Rights. I would prefer equal marriage rights but for today, please pass HB444 for any resemblance of justice.

Aloha Kakou. Thank you for this opportunity to testify on this very important human rights legislation. The American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) is a Quaker organization that works to promote peace and social justice based on values of nonviolence and equality.

We **strongly support HB444**, a bill to create a class of civil unions that would confer equal rights to same-sex couples as enjoyed by married heterosexual couples.

The AFSC has a long history of standing with oppressed groups in their struggles for justice. During World War II, we assisted persons of Japanese ancestry in Hawai'i who were victims of racist wartime policies that forced many from their homes or into concentration camps. Equal rights for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender persons is one of the foremost civil rights issues of our time.

Sadly, the current marriage laws in Hawai'i, and in most parts of the United States, constitutes an apartheid system, with same-sex couples excluded from basic protections of the law, and LGBT persons relegated to second-class status. I believe that in the future, we will look back upon today's discriminatory and exclusionary policies against LGBT with the same abhorrence we hold for Jim Crow laws and apartheid.

This kind of legalized discrimination has a rippling negative effect in the society by giving "permission" to more overt acts of bigotry. Through AFSC's work with Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) youth to create safer schools for all students, we witnessed that anti-gay attitudes and hostility became more accepted and prevalent in the aftermath of the tragic 1998 vote to ban same-sex marriage in Hawai'i.

Now, with HB444, we have a chance to repair some of the harm caused by the divisive campaign a decade ago.

HB444 does not interfere with anyone's religious beliefs or practices, nor does it undermine heterosexual marriage. Leave the sacred act of "marriage" to the domain of personal beliefs and religion. But you, the lawmakers have a duty to ensure equal rights and responsibilities of civil contracts between committed life partners. I urge your support of this bill. Thank you for your consideration.

My name is Peter Schaktman, and I am the rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, Hawai'i's largest and oldest synagogue community. The Temple is a part of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), linking it with over 900 other Reform congregations throughout the United States and Canada. I am also a member of the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR), whose roster includes hundreds of Reform rabbis all over the world. I have come to offer testimony to this committee today because I support House Bill 444, and because I believe this bill gives Hawai'i state legislators an historic opportunity to demonstrate their support for families, for communities of faith, and for freedom from unnecessary government intrusion in the lives of our neighbors.

HB 444, as you know, extends to partners in a civil union exactly the same rights, benefits, and protections that come as a matter of course to spouses in a marriage. It also holds such partners to responsibilities similar to those who are married. As a member of the clergy serving a congregational community, it is my sacred calling to strengthen family life in the context of faithful covenants made by individuals with one another, and between such individuals and God. In my synagogue, like a growing number of synagogues, churches, temples and other religious communities, the need for and right to such sacred covenants is not limited to families led by heterosexual couples. Rather, we understand that family life is strengthened – and the lives of children being raised by such families greatly enhanced - when a strong. publicly-validated commitment exists between the heads of the household. Civil unions, to the chagrin of those whose political or religious ideologies lead them to lobby against legislation like HB 444. are unquestionably pro-family, pro-faith, and pro-children. The state of Hawai'i must not sacrifice our families and our keiki on the altar of exclusivist or triumphalist ideologies that disguise themselves as religious faith.

And I am not alone in believing so. The Reform Movement in Judaism has been an advocate of gay and lesbian rights for over 40 years, first calling for human rights for homosexuals and the decriminalization of homosexuality and later affirming our support for civil unions, explicit workplace non-discrimination and civil rights legislation.

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More recently, both the URJ and the CCAR have adopted resolutions in support of gay and lesbian partnerships. In its 1993 resolution, the URJ resolved, among other things, to call upon congregations to extend the same benefits that are afforded to heterosexual spouses of staff members to homosexual partners of staff members. The CCAR, in its 1996 resolution on gay and lesbian partnerships, resolved to "oppose governmental efforts to ban gay and lesbian marriage." In 1998, the CCAR's Ad Hoc Committee on Human Sexuality issued a report which concluded that "kedushah (holiness) may be present in committed same gender relationships between two Jews and that these relationships can serve as the foundation of stable Jewish families, thus adding strength to the Jewish community." The most recent major Reform movement on the issue was the March 2000 passage of the CCAR resolution on "Same Gender Officiation," which held "that the relationship of a Jewish, same gender couple is worthy of affirmation through appropriate Jewish ritual."

As you consider this bill, I ask to consider as well the many couples here in Hawai'i who wish nothing more than to ground their relationship in the most traditional of social institutions, and who, because of misinformation and, in many cases, downright bigotry, cannot currently do. We can do better, much better. Please don't miss this opportunity. Please support HB 444.

Thank you for your hard work on behalf of the people of Hawai'i, and for your consideration of this bill.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii supports HB 444 Relating to civil unions.

We believe that scientific evidence points to the determination of sexual orientation as a natural state and not a matter of choice. Another convincing argument is that, given the obstacles confronting gays and lesbians in the market place for employment opportunities, home purchase and rentals, military service, child adoption and all of the other rights heterosexuals enjoy in general, why would anyone choose a lifestyle which only invites discrimination.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawaii ("ACLU of Hawaii") writes in support of H.B. 444, Relating to Civil Unions because it represents a substantial step forward toward ensuring that gay and lesbian couples are afforded equal treatment under the law.

• Civil Unions are an important step towards marriage equality

The ACLU of Hawaii commends those members of the House who, by sponsoring or supporting this bill, have recognized that it is just and appropriate to extend more protections to lesbian and gay couples than those currently provided under Hawaii law. H.B. 444 will further extend rights to gay and lesbian couples in several significant ways. To identify a few, current Hawaii law does not permit same-sex couples to adopt jointly a child in a single court proceeding. Additionally, the law does not require that private employers offer health benefits to same-sex couples. The law further fails to protect members of a same-sex couple in the event the couples chooses to separate — there are no provisions in the law for judicial dissolution of the relationship or for spousal support.

The ACLU of Hawaii strongly supports the current bill; however, we want to be clear that our ultimate goal is to obtain full marriage equality for lesbian and gay couples. Marriage is a unique legal status that is conferred and recognized by governments all over the world. Marriage brings with it a multitude of reciprocal obligations, rights, responsibilities and protections. In addition, marriage is a cultural institution, one that conveys to all the level of love and commitment between two people. Civil unions are not, and cannot be, the same as marriage because they create a separate institution for lesbian and gay couples. As history has taught us, separate is never truly equal. Thus, the ACLU of Hawaii will continue to press the Legislature for full marriage equality in the future.

Technical Observations and Suggestions for the Language of H.B. 444

As currently drafted, H.B. 444 may inadvertently prohibit those couples who have entered into valid civil unions or marriage in another jurisdiction from entering into a civil union in Hawaii. We suggest that the following language be added to the end of §-2(1) "with anyone other than his or her intended civil union partner."

Additionally, we believe that the exemption provided in proposed §-4(b), *i.e.*, that no clergy member shall be required to perform religious solemnization of a civil union, should be clarified to ensure that the exemption does not apply to public servants authorized to perform solemnizations.

The mission of the ACLU of Hawaii is to protect the fundamental freedoms enshrined in the U.S. and State Constitutions. The ACLU of Hawaii fulfills this through legislative, litigation, and public education programs statewide. 

Testimony in favor of H.B. 444 – CIVIL UNIONS

Pride At Work Hawai'i, an affiliate of the Hawai'i State AFL-CIO whose mission is to mobilize lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) workers and their supporters for full equality and to build mutual support between the labor movement and the LGBT community, strongly supports H.B. 444. As drafted, the bill would create civil unions for same-sex couples in Hawai'i, providing all the rights, benefits, and responsibilities of marriage.

Historically, labor support for the rights of LGBT workers began to grow in the 1970s as they began to come out, get involved in their unions, and add their issues (such as domestic partner health coverage and anti-discrimination clauses) to the list of bargaining items in negotiations. LGBT workers also came to understand that, given their extreme vulnerability, a strong union contract was an important protection against retaliation and discrimination and for fairness in the workplace. And heterosexual workers came to understand that their co-workers - their union brothers and sisters who they walked picket lines with and worked alongside - had the same needs as they did: to protect and provide for themselves and their families.

Today, as you consider this bill that would allow same-sex couples the option of becoming partners in civil unions, Hawai'i's labor movement has taken up the issue as well. The 2007 convention of the Hawai'i State AFL-CIO, in endorsing civil unions legislation, declared that, "while civil marriage is the only true equality under the law, if the government is offering civil unions as a way to provide protection, support, and respect for GLBT families, unions should support those efforts." The unions which Pride At Work Hawai'i's officers belong to - the Musicians' Association of Hawai'i, HGEA, and UNITE HERE Local 5 - have all endorsed civil unions.

Unions across the country understand that until the government legally recognizes same-sex relationships, many thousands of families will be deprived of the most important attributes of their labor: the ability to take care of and provide for their family members. To change this, many national and international unions have passed resolutions in favor of marriage equality, including: American Federation of Government Employees, American Federation of Musicians, American Federation of State, County & Municipal Employees, American Federation of Teachers, Communications Workers of America, National Education Association, Office and Professional Employees International Union, Service Employees International Union, United Farm Workers and UNITE-HERE. State and local labor federations which have endorsed marriage equality include the California Federation of Labor, the Connecticut AFL-CIO, the New York State AFL-CIO, the King County Labor Council (Seattle, WA), Northern Shore Labor Council (MA), Rochester and Genesee Valley Area Labor Federation (NY), San Francisco Central Labor Council, and Southeastern Massachusetts Labor Council.

In California, over 50 unions and labor groups have joined the latest effort to protect marriage equality there, pointing out that "unions often take political and legal action to protect their members, not only in connection with their employers, but in connection with broader social questions... [Unions] take the position that all... are entitled to be treated with equal dignity and respect." In New York State, the labor federation noted that "the denial of marriage equality hurts not just individuals, but also family members, neighbors and co-workers who care about the well-being of same-sex couples and the children in their care,... and discriminates against them and relegates them to second-class citizenship."

The labor movement knows that same-sex couples are devoted to each other and love their families, and that without official recognition, they are left vulnerable. In these difficult and uncertain economic times, it is more important than ever to give all workers a fair shake as they struggle to provide for their families. It is deeply unfair that same-sex couples and their families are forced to scramble to cobble together a patchwork of legal documents that still don't provide them with the security and protections they need and deserve. Passage of civil unions legislation is a step in the right direction.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of H.B. 444. On behalf of all LGBT workers in Hawai'i, and their families, we hope you will support this bill.

RESOLVED, To direct the International President's office to develop, coordinate and implement a plan to communicate the intent of this Resolution to all U.S. Senators and Representatives prior to the next session of Congress.

I thank the Committee and the co-sponsors of the legislation who also sit on the Judiciary Committee and recommend that HB 444 be reported out to the full House for adoption in the highest spirit of urgency.

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

My name is Suzette Tom, and I am testifying in support of House Bill 444. Several years ago, when Hawaii went through its fight for gay marriage, I submitted testimony and put a lot of time and energy into the effort. My partner of 11 years went down to testify in person, and even ended up on TV. We were both excited that the home we'd known since birth was one of the first states to consider equality for all of its citizens. As you know, the effort was defeated by a constitutional amendment.

I can't tell you how saddened and demoralized I was by this. People came out in droves to actively pass a law that would deny me my equal rights. People whom I knew and loved, who insisted that they weren't trying to discriminate, but that "marriage was different." Well, I don't necessarily agree with that. The history of marriage is not the "one-woman-one-man-for-love-forever" version that some people would have you believe. It actually started as a business arrangement to provide for inheritance, and could be changed and dissolved as needed. But that's beside the point.

What became clear to me was that some people felt strongly about their definition of marriage, and they felt it was somehow threatened by arrangements which weren't exactly like theirs. So I let it go. I swallowed the fact that I am no different from these people, that I am just as much a tax-paying citizen as any of them. Though I have worked just as hard at my job, though I have the same roots and family in these islands, though I have the same hopes and dreams – I am somehow a second-class citizen. I have to spend much more time and money trying to create arrangements to protect my loved ones, to provide healthcare for offspring and partners, to make sure I have the same authority to act for them in emergencies, to make sure they will inherit what I want them to have. And many rights that come with marriage I can't give them no matter how much time and money I spend.

I can't tell you how the unfairness of such things is like an acid that eats at your soul. But I told myself that it was just that people couldn't get over the concept of "marriage" being separated from its religious component.

Well, okay. Now you have a chance to make things right. You can retain the word "marriage" for the church and those who need it to be connected to what they consider sacred. (I consider my own love to be as sacred as anyone else's, but I won't argue the point.) You can also grant the rights and privileges earned by those who are willing to enter into a commitment with their life's choice. People who are NO DIFFERENT than any of you on the committee. Even if you don't realize you know any gay people, I can promise you that you do, and that they are the same as you. How fair is it that people like Brittany Spears can legally make a mockery of marriage, but two men or two women who have been committed to each other for decades cannot have their union recognized?

It is past time to give us equality, and it doesn't require you to call it "marriage." There are those who believe we don't deserve any rights at all, no matter what we call it. Please realize that that kind of thinking belongs in the past – as much as the belief that women shouldn't vote, or that people of different races shouldn't mix. At one time all kinds of arguments were used to "prove" such things were unnatural and against God's will. Now we know better.

In the spirit of a new beginning, a new era of hope, please finally give us the right to celebrate our love, our partnerships, and our families in the way we deserve.

Aloha Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, members of the committee, and members of the public.

I am a civil rights activist. Therefore I support this bill to create "civil unions" because it makes forward progress in civil rights. But I regret that the bill would still leave civil unions as a second-class form of marriage instead of providing full first-class recognition. We do not allow first-class and second-class citizenship; we do not allow "white" and "colored" drinking fountains; and neither should we allow first-class and second-class certificates granting governmental recognition to the legal merger of two people.

But my views are more complex, because I believe it's important to keep church and state separate. And there's the further question whether the status of two people's relationship with each other should confer government benefits or detriments by comparison with the benefits or detriments given by the government to two totally separate and unrelated people.

SEPARATING CHURCH AND STATE

Let's begin by sorting out the difference between personal mergers certified by the government versus personal mergers blessed by God.

I believe that the government should have nothing whatever to say regarding whether two people have a sacramental union of souls in the eyes of God. Sacramental union is a matter for a church, or a community of believers, or two people, to ratify in their own way, according to whatever religious or spiritual beliefs they hold.

Thus I believe that the only role of government is to certify a civil union between two people who freely choose to merge their financial assets, their place of residence, and to cement their privileges and responsibilities toward each other under the law. Any two people who wish to create such a merger should be able to do so, regardless whether they are of the same gender or opposite gender (except for parent/child, brother/sister, and other exceptions identified in the bill).

Thus the bill should be amended to allow civil unions for everyone, including people of opposite gender; and to make civil unions the only form of "marriage" recognized or certified by the government.

Marriage should be a sacrament within the confines of a religion or a spiritual viewpoint. Marriage should be the joining together of two souls who pledge their loyalty to each other in front of God. Marriage is a sacrament that changes two people's relationship in heaven regardless of what happens on earth. The government should have no role to play in marriage. "Render unto Caesar what

is Caesar's, and render unto God what is God's."

A man and woman, a man and man, or a woman and woman should be able to be joined in civil union regardless of their religious beliefs, regardless whether they choose to have their union further blessed by a church or other religious institution, and regardless whether they believe their merger of property on earth is also a union of souls in heaven.

There might be some couples (M/F, M/M, F/F) who pledge their hearts to each other and have their merger blessed by a church as a union of souls, even though they might choose not to seek a government certificate of civil union. That would be their personal choice, and the government should not interfere with it. But without a government certificate of civil union, they would have neither the rights nor the responsibilities enjoyed or cursed by those who get the certificate.

EQUAL RIGHTS UNDER THE LAW FOR CIVIL UNIONS WHETHER OPPOSITE GENDER OR SAME GENDER

We do not allow first-class and second-class citizenship; and neither should we allow first-class and second-class certificates granting governmental recognition to the legal merger of two people.

The thing I dislike most about this bill is the creation of two classes of personal relationship: first-class marriage for heterosexuals and second-class civil union for homosexuals. Creating such a distinction perpetuates the violation of equal rights under the law that is currently in place. But it's an improvement.

It's a matter of civil rights that all persons should be treated equally under the law. Failure to allow same-gender marriage

enlists the government in forcing every person to discriminate against half the population in choosing a life partner and creating a merger recognized by the government.

Personally, I have no desire for sexual relations with men. I feel strong revulsion when I imagine the things two men might do with each other. But I have no right to enact my personal emotions into law and to force them upon others.

Some defenders of traditional (heterosexual) marriage say that recognition of civil unions or marriages between homosexuals would somehow weaken the institution of marriage. I simply cannot understand that view. Those who have strong marriages will still have strong marriages. So far as public perception is concerned, the proposal set forth in this bill for civil unions would make civil unions a second-class form of marriage, whose members would be riding in the back of the bus. If anything, that would give greater prestige to traditional marriage. Fear not my married friends! You lose nothing by granting rights to others; indeed, you gain self-esteem by knowing you are generous in spirit.

SHOULD GOVERNMENT BE SUBSIDIZING CIVIL UNIONS OR MARRIAGES, GIVING PREFERENTIAL TAX RATES AND OTHER BENEFITS TO SUCH PAIRS OF PEOPLE?

Underlying the issues of marriage vs. civil union, and oppositegender vs. same gender, is this question: Why does the government care whether two people have a merger? Is there an advantage to society, and hence to the government, when two people come together to create a (theoretically) permanent union?

If we had a society where individual responsibility prevails, then government would not be expected to guarantee healthcare, housing, food, etc. If someone falls on hard times, he must rely

upon himself to stand up or else must hope his friends or community charities will provide help. Children would be the property and sole responsibility of their parents.

But to the extent people rely upon government to guarantee quality of life and to ensure that children have opportunities even when their parents are unable to provide for them, then to that extent government has an interest in encouraging individuals to form partnerships and help each other. Every time one person gets help from belonging to a stable partnership, government is relieved of the burden of providing what he needs. That's why in bygone times marriage was very hard to break, and each spouse had strong legal obligations to provide financial support and lifelong care for the other. "'Til death do us part."

Government saves money when couples in a strong, enduring relationship provide food, housing, and healthcare for each other so that if one partner falls ill or injured then the government will not be called upon for support. That's why it makes sense for government to give tax breaks to married couples, or to partners in a civil union, to encourage such partnerships.

It's also desirable for society, and the welfare state government, to have people in stable sexual relationships, so that predatory behavior and sexually transmitted diseases are minimized.

All the advantages to the government of having strong heterosexual marriages are the same as the advantages of having strong homosexual marriages or civil unions. It's better to have two people strongly committed to providing economic support for each other rather than placing demands on government handouts. And it's better to have two homosexual men or two lesbian women exhausting their sexual energies with each other rather than engaging in predatory behavior which spreads disease, and frightens or disgusts people with more conventional proclivities.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify before this committee. Our names are Louise Esselstyn, M.Div. and Robie Lovinger, PHR. Among our many roles, we are aunties who reside in lovely Makakilo. We would like to express our support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions. We emphatically believe that all people should be treated respectfully and equally under the law, as required by our amazing Constitution of the United States of America. HB 444 extends the same rights, protections, benefits, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union. This legislation is extremely important in our life together. Our hope is to live long enough to enjoy the benefits of Civil Unions in our Hawaii home.

We are mature and responsible American citizens and have been law-abiding and tax paying residents of O'ahu since 1985. We are not young in years, as we have a combined experience level of 109 years. In 1993 on O'ahu, we became life partners and have been in a committed relationship for the past 16 years. As leaders in our community, we are valued and respected. We are both professional women who work hard every single day, to contribute to the civil rights, employment, safety, and security of every citizen in our state.

We have consistently progressed through life with grace, dignity, education, and accomplishment. We are blessed by each of our large families; we have also been a blessing to them and to our large extended Ohana. We are patriotic Americans who pay our taxes without complaint, knowing that it is our contribution to the American way of life. We are Aunties, who deeply believe in God and in goodness. Our own prayer is to be acknowledged as valued members of the State of Hawaii citizenry, who are worthy of legal recognition of our commitment to each other.

We were among the very first to become Reciprocal Beneficiaries in the 90's. However, the revisions to the original legislation diluted the intent of that law, making it nearly meaningless in our lives. At its best, it never came close to providing us with the types of protections and responsibilities we had envisioned.

Long ago, our parents taught us the values of honesty and integrity. However, without legal recognition as a couple, we are forced to live a lie. For example, consider the Census, questionnaires, surveys, and legal documents. We are not each "single"; yet we are forced to be such because we are also not "married". As we were raised to be truthful, this is an especially uncomfortable consequence of not having the recognition accorded those of a Civil Union. Do you think this is fair and just?

On a financial note, there are significant consequences we bear, as a result of us not having legal recognition as a couple. We are unable to obtain employer sponsored health insurance for each other, a benefit that opposite sex married couples take for granted. Additionally, we pay considerably more in taxes every year, both to the State of Hawaii and to the US Federal Government, because we are legally prohibited from filing our taxes jointly. Funds that could be used to pay down our mortgage or to purchase long term insurance for our quickly approaching "golden years" are instead used for our increased tax burden and for higher medical premiums. We are forced to cover up the reality and truth of who we are, when we must bear significant costs of preparing updated legal documents to protect our assets and each other, unlike our opposite sex married friends and family. Is this fair and equitable?

We must tell you that the unequal treatment that our family experiences is completely unfair and unjust. How would you feel if you or one of your family members was treated in this manner? Civil unions are supported by the majority of the public, President Obama, and the majority of the Hawaii House of Representatives. The issue of equal treatment for same-sex couples is the civil rights issue of this generation. According to the White House Web site, President Obama "supports full civil unions that give same-sex couples legal rights and privileges equal to those of married couples."

Granting equal rights to same-sex couples in no way impacts the rights of opposite sex couples or religious communities. Religious communities will always be free to define marriage according to their specific traditions. Granting same-sex couples equal rights strengthens families. Families with legal protections are less likely to be a burden on society.

On a personal note, how does unequal rights and no legal recognition impact us and our family members on both an emotional and concrete level? We feel like second class citizens who are definitely devalued in America and in the State of Hawaii. We feel invisible at times, and discarded at other times. Is this fair and equitable treatment in America in 2009?

Equality is a simple concept; sadly equality has been out of reach for so many and for such a long time. With your leadership and wisdom to do the just thing, we look forward to being among the very first to celebrate our Civil Union in Hawaii. We depend on your sense of justice and support of civil rights for us as a loving and committed couple and as tax-paying voters, for your support of HB 444. Please remember our story as you carefully consider our life, as it is directly impacted by your support for HB 444.

Finally, we deeply appreciate your careful consideration of the worthiness of HB 444. It is wrong to deny us equitable civil rights. We truly are one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

Honorable Members of the Judiciary Committee,

Both myself and my wife oppose HB 444, not that we don't want rights and benefits withheld from members of our community or state. The family is ordained of God. Marriage between man and woman is essential to His eternal plan. Children are entitled to birth within the bonds of matrimony, and to be reared by a father and a mother who honor marital vows with complete fidelity. Happiness in family life is most likely to be achieved when founded upon the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ. Successful marriages and families are established and maintained on principles of faith, prayer, repentance, forgiveness, respect, love, compassion, work, and wholesome recreational activities. By divine design, fathers are to preside over their families in love and righteousness and are responsible to provide the necessities of life and protection for their families. Mothers are primarily responsible for the nurture of their children. In these sacred responsibilities, fathers and mothers are obligated to help one another as equal partners. Even though Bill worked publicly for the last twenty years of his life for equal marriage rights, among other issues, we both would have supported this bill as a positive step forward for Hawaii.

Support for Civil Unions in Hawaii has also been provided through resolutions approved by the State Democratic Party Convention Delegates in 2006 and 2008.

Personally, I can only tell you of the pain both Bill's brother and I felt when filling out the papers at the mortuary, when I could only be listed as Bill's "friend". If HB444 had passed before then, such a situation could have been avoided. It was greatly appreciated and of help emotionally to receive the formal declaration from the State House regarding Bill, including mention of my status as his husband. US Congressman Neil Abercrombie also used the same nomenclature in his letter to me and Bill's family. I am among the fortunate in that both our families fully embraced our marriage. I'm sure you may hear of the many who have not been that fortunate, with the additional injuries their lack of legal standing caused.

HB444 not only addresses civil rights equality, it will help provide certain economic benefits to the State of Hawaii, through those who may visit Hawaii due to our new status, but through reduction in certain expenses the State incurs such as when unrecognized couples (which often include their children) separate. Legal recognition of relationships not only provides certain benefits and responsibilities during the relationship, but very importantly addresses benefits and responsibilities when a relationship ends.

Hawaii's Reciprocal Beneficiary law mostly addresses issues surrounding illness and death, but largely ignores the responsibilities due to family members, and the various issues of life. This is yet again another reason a full recognition as provided in HB444 is a great step forward.

Again, on behalf of the GLBT Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawaii, and from myself, I deeply appreciate your favorable consideration of HB444.

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito, and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to present testimony to this Committee. I wish health permitted me to appear before you on person.

My name is Durell Douthit.

I practiced Family Law in all Circuits for most of 40 years. My practice not been active for several years and I retired this year. I remember with particular affection and respect the Honorable Shunichi Kimura and Ben Gaddis on the Big Island, the Honorable Doug McNish and Eric Romantic on Maui, and The Honorable Max Graham on Kauai. The Honorable Francis Q.Wong on Oahu remains a steady rock for us in this Circuit.

In my years I have seen tragedies that would break your heart. One situation that cries out for relief is that of partners of the same sex who break up after long years of living together. I have seen more of those in my practice than you might imagine.

Divorce law irritates about half of the people who are subject to it, and it is necessary to equalize money and power between married couples who, for whatever reason, decide that one partner will stay home and run the house while the other pursues a living. When they come to divorce there is an inequality that must be addressed.

It is also necessary, when couples separate, to have a court available to divide assets when the couple can't agree on how to do it. Even so simple a matter as who gets to keep the family dog can become n issue.

If it weren't for the equalizing authority of the Family Court when they separate we would see many more of our people forced on the welfare rolls or into the ranks of the homeless; and many more folks resorting to self-help.

Families whose partners have the same sex have the same issues as oppositely sexed couples. It often happens that one partner will forego a career advancement to support the career of the other partner

If the couple is married, Family Court may make all the difference. But for those stay-at-home partners whose partner is of the same sex, the law is very different. The only recourse to avoid poverty and homelessness, in many cases, is a palimony suit, which is expensive to bring and whose results are unsatisfactory, in my experience. The less-well-off-partner, in these separations, too often does end up on welfare or homeless, or working many part-time, low-paying jobs in sad hopelessness, while the other partner continues to prosper. It's not fair. It's not fair at all.

This is only one of many examples of the help that Family Court gives married families that families of the same sex don;t have.

Denying relief to partners of the same sex is a needless waste of our human resources -- and a shameful injury to the body politic. This waste, this shame, ends if the Legislature os the state of Hawaii agrees with our Supreme Court of the state of Hawaii and our President of the United States and passes the Civil Union Bill.

There will still be those who don't sign up for a civil union, just as there is an increasing number of people who opt not to get married. But for those who are serious about their relationship and want it to last, there are good reasons -- good family reasons -- to adopt the Civil Union Bill.

Note: nothing in this Bill affects marriage in any way. The family is strengthened, not weakened, and those for whom the sanctity of marriage is sacred will lose nothing whatever by the passage of this Bill.

On a more personal level, I at 75 years of age, will likely become senile or incapable in the foreseeable future. You will too, you who are younger, but the prospect is less pressing. Medicine has progressed so far, now, that we do not die naturally, barring accident. Science and machines keep us alive long after the body has any reason to go on living.

Abraham Kanamu has been my constant companion, working with me in my law practice, and now working in part to supplement our income. We have, for 34 years, shared with each other as equals, sharing material and spiritual matters equally.

Abraham *must* be treated as equal to a marriage partner as old age creeps up. He and he alone knows my wishes, when I am no longer able to express them myself. I trust only Abraham to order the plug pulled if I am unable to give the order. I have a living will, which may or may not be found, and may or may not be given effect. Only if Abraham has the legal position of a spouse can I rest secure in the knowledge that my wishes will be respected.

I won't mention matters of health insurance, inheritance, and the like. They are important, but I'm sure others will bring them to the Committee's attention.

Please help me secure the same rights that other committed couples enjoy. Equal justice seems to demand it, as our President has said. I respectfully request it of this Honorable Committee.

Thanks a lot for reading this short email. I'm sorry that health prevents me from meeting with you personally. Please call me if you have any questions.

STRONG OPPOSITION TO HB 444, Relating to Civil Unions

At some point in their lives, most Americans have studied history. In so doing, we inevitably learn something that we previously did not know. We study and embrace history, erect memorials regarding it, and record it in the hopes of avoiding having it repeat itself. When we need a glimpse of the future, we need only to look to our past. Let's embark on a history lesson with regard to the great Hawaii debate over "civil unions."

As a hot political topic in Hawaii, everyone should be asking themselves and the legislature, why enact a civil unions bill? What do we hope to achieve? What's the ultimate goal?

Well, not much is left to speculation.

A Jan. 24 *Honolulu Advertiser* article reported that "a new group, the Family Equality Coalition...has quietly been building support for civil unions.... Alan Spector, a social worker and co-chair of the Family Equality Coalition, said the long-term goal is to legalize same-sex marriage." That approach is confirmed by recent history elsewhere.

Wherever they are enacted, so-called "civil unions" and "domestic partnerships" have been nothing other than an alternative way of enacting "marriage" for same-sex couples. If the Hawaii Legislature chooses to drag within its walls the innocuous-looking Trojan horse of civil unions, it needs to understand the danger hidden inside of it: same-sex "marriage."

¹ Final Report of the New Jersey Civil Union Review Commission December 10, 2008 found that: "the separate categorization established by the Civil Union Act invites and encourages unequal treatment of same-sex couples and their children." And that "The Commission concludes that a marriage law would provide that remedy, despite the existence of a federal prohibition on the recognition of same-sex relationships."

The civil unions bill states, "Partners to a civil union...shall have all of the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities under law...as are granted to spouses in a marriage...."

It also states, "A civil union, domestic partnership, or marriage of two persons of the same sex...shall be recognized as a civil union in this State...."

Now consider the state of California, where the legislature enacted "domestic partnerships" that provided same-sex couples the full rights and benefits of marriage. Was that good enough? No. How about New Jersey and Vermont, which both did the same thing as California? Nope, not good enough for same-sex advocates there, who now demand legislatively imposed same-sex "marriage."

The same demands are being made in Maine, Washington, and New Hampshire, states which also provided legislatively enacted domestic partnership and civil union schemes. Most importantly, in both California and Connecticut, the existence of full domestic partnership and civil union schemes provided a platform for those states' supreme courts to judicially impose same-sex "marriage."

Thus, history shows us two important things: (1) that civil unions are wholly unacceptable to those who demand them; and (2) that the existence of civil unions has twice led to the imposition of same-sex "marriage" via judicial fiat.

The Hawaii Supreme Court in 1993 first assisted in the imposition of same-sex "marriage" in just this way. The fallout from what the court did would have quickly brought about same-sex "marriage" had the people of Hawaii not adopted a constitutional amendment that gave power to the legislature "to reserve marriage to opposite-sex couples." Then Hawaii enacted the reciprocal beneficiaries law, which opens up benefits to all who do not qualify for marriage. That was a fair and balanced response.

But while the current reciprocal beneficiaries law is open to all who are not permitted to marry, the proposed civil unions law is not. The definition excludes a man taking care of his sick grandmother, or a woman taking care of her adult brother with Down Syndrome. Why are they less deserving of benefits than unmarried persons in civil unions? The activists clamor for "family diversity," but apparently only in the way they wish.

Through the passage of a civil unions bill, the Hawaii Legislature is setting the stage for the extension of "marriage" to same-sex couples. The history of this process in other states should not be ignored, unless the people of Hawaii want to be caught off guard. No one should allow themselves to be fooled and let history repeat itself...again.

We are both proud and pleased to submit testimony in favor of House Bill 444 regarding Civil Unions. Our names are Greg Boorsma and William Linmark, residents of Waikiki. We both believe that the time is now for the State of Hawaii to extend the same benefits, legal protections, rights and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a recognized civil union.

We met in 1995 here in Hawaii and have been together now for over 13 years. We moved to the mainland for five years, living in Louisiana and Minnesota. In 1999, we were granted a Certificate of Domestic Partnership by the City of Minneapolis. We moved back to Hawaii in 2001.

Mr. Boorsma, 50, is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, and has been a flight attendant with Northwest Airlines since 1986. Mr. Linmark, 39, is an artist and currently is pursuing a degree in art history at the University of Hawaii. We own our condominium at the Waipuna in the house district of our neighbor, Rep. Tom Brower, a co-sponsor of HB 444.

Northwest Airlines, Mr. Boorsma's employer of over 22 years (soon to become Delta Airlines), has improved its recognition of domestic partners over the years. Some of the benefits we receive have come through managements' understanding of the right thing to do. Others have come through contract negotiations. But all of our domestic partner benefits come with a cost because our relationship is not recognized by the government. Mr. Boorsma must pay income taxes on medical, dental and flight benefits while his married co-workers do not. His pension ceases to exist upon his death. It is not inherited as with married co-workers. While Northwest Airlines has done almost everything it can within the law, the economic loss continues because our relationship is not legal and has no force of law.

These same economic injustices apply to the filing of Federal and State income taxes, future social security benefits, inheritance taxes and estate transference. In this time of economic turmoil, it is tremendously frustrating knowing that we are paying more than our fair share because we can't get married or apply for a recognized Civil Union.

We believe that the Constitution requires that all people be treated equally under the law. It's time to end discrimination, both real and economic, in the State of Hawaii and in the United States. Civil Unions are supported by our President, by the majority of the public, and by a majority of the Hawaii House of Representatives. 2009 is shaping up to be an historic year. We ask you to help Hawaii join many other states in the march to end all forms of discrimination. We ask that you support HB 444 and help us realize our dream of becoming a

recognized family here in Hawaii.

Dear Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

I am writing you to pass through your committee HB 444 and to recommend that you vote in favor of this bill when it comes before the entire legislature. I believe that not only does it redress the injustices done to our gay and lesbian families by our failure to give their committed relationships legal recognition and protections, but I also believe that passage of this legislation is in the best social and economic interests of all the people of Hawai'i. My parish, on its own initiative, has already written in favor of this bill. I would like to add my personal testimony.

I was ordained priest in the Episcopal Church in 2004. Prior to that, I was General Counsel of the US operations of the Munich Reinsurance Group, the world's largest reinsurer. I graduated from Yale, got my JD from Univ. of Penn. Law School, and my M.Div from Drew Univ. I served in Vietnam as a combat engineer. My partner, Mark LeDoux, graduated from Harvard and got his MBA form the Sloan School at MIT. Your average gay couple we are not. We have received many privileges for which we are thankful. On the other hand, we are not that unusual either. Gay people can be and are found in every profession, race, cultural group and economic strata. FACT #1 — we exist in every town and many families and we go to work and pay taxes like everybody else. There are those who deny this. That is their right, but it is thinking that does not deal with reality.

My partner and I have been in a committed relationship for almost 20 years. Following my ordination, we sold our home in NJ (which at that time did not recognize civil unions) and moved to Massachusetts where we bought a home. Massachusetts did recognize same-gender marriage and that was our primary reason for going there. We were married at our home on April 10, 2004 – surrounded and blessed by family and friends. We know many gay and lesbian couples who have been together as a committed couple for a long time, some for 50 years. FACT #2 – we are not single; that is a civil status imposed on us by civil law which does not reflect the reality of our lives, let alone the needed legal and economic protections of our relationships.

In 2005, I responded to a call to serve Holy Innocents Episcopal Church on Maui. In doing so, Mark and I gave up significant legal protections and human rights. Spending

money on attorneys to draft legal and medical powers of attorney, wills and other documents may be of some - but limited - help. Aside from the very real issues involving important matters like taxes, pensions, inheritance right, health insurance, property and liability insurance, etc., we often encounter banks, insurers, businesses and other organizations who simply don't know how to deal with our relationship. All too often their decisions seem to be based not on our needs (the same as any other couple's) but on their own economic interests or convenience. If we had children, the problems would be greater. FACT #3 - passage of civil union legislation would not only give our gay and lesbian citizens in committed relationship the legal status their lives need but would also clarify their status for government and business.

The lack of legal status here in Hawai'i weighs heavily on my mind. What would happen at a hospital if one of us was unable to speak for himself? If one of us died unexpectedly, would the other have sufficient economic resources? I love Hawai'i and I love serving my parish and the community, but I do ask myself if I am putting Mark and myself too much at risk by living in a State that by civil law treats us as if we are total strangers? This is not only my concern. As more and more States give civil union or civil marriage protection to all its citizens, more and more potential employees, doctors, nurses, teachers, etc. will be asking the same question when considering moving to Hawai'i. FACT #4 - the real life benefits that passage of civil union legislation would bring to Hawaii's economic competitiveness and to all it's citizens far outweighs the fears and dire warnings of its opponents. (Such fears and warnings have, in my opinion, proven unwarranted in all states which have passed such legislation).

As a priest, I support civil union legislation based on my baptismal covenant to "respect the dignity of every human being" and upon my understanding of the Gospels and the life, works and teachings of Jesus Christ. I respect that others may differ. They are free to set whatever doctrines and rules in their churches as others are in theirs. To establish civil law and rights on the basis of some denominations' beliefs without any other rational basis (especially when many faith communities disagree) is a violation, in my opinion, of Hawaii's constitution and the legislators' oaths of office.

Finally, I ask that you put yourselves in my position. If you were married to a second spouse after being previously married and divorced, how would you feel if you moved to Hawai'i only to find yourself treated as single and divorced: your current marriage not being recognized on the basis of the theological views of churches not your own? Is such a law right? Would it be right even if a majority believed such things? Impossible? Well, that used to be the case if an inter-racial couple married in Hawai'i moved to many States back in the 50's and early 60's. Think about it. How would you feel? What would such a situation mean for your family?

TESTIMONY

My name is Kathleen Sands and I'm a professor of American Studies at UH Manoa. I recently moved to Hawaii with Linda Hamilton Krieger (who's a professor at the Richardson School of Law). I'm here to testify in support of HB 444.

In Massachusetts, Linda and I are legally married. In Massachusetts and in Linda's former state (California), we could share the basic legal rights that all life partners need and deserve - buying, owning, and inheriting property, sharing health and life insurance benefits, public employee retirement benefits, parental and step-parental rights and so forth. The list, as you know, goes on and on.

So, although we both love Hawaii and UH, coming here was a serious loss for us Upon setting foot on this lovely island, nearly all these rights were lost to us, along with the basic respect and regard that we deserve as life partners, regardless of whether people are comfortable with our private life. And the loss we have undergone signals a problem and danger for the university as well, because no university can be first-rate unless it's

able to draw the best workers from a competitive labor market. Same-sex couples expect spousal recognition from universities, which is why most universities today go as far as they can do to provide it. It's a simple matter of institutional competitiveness.

There is, of course, the reciprocal beneficiary option in Hawaii and we availed ourselves of this option before buying our home. However, when Linda went to the Department of Health to obtain the necessary forms, the security officer actually denied that such a thing as RB's existed – all the while refusing to make eye contact with her. Eventually she located the appropriate office on her own, but the experience was vivid evidence of the disrespect and indeed contempt for same sex relationships that is encouraged when marriage equality is denied. Moreover, the rights of reciprocal beneficiaries in Hawaii are widely recognized as vastly inferior to those associated with civil union in other states, and even this short list of rights has been whittled away in the years since 1997.

I'd like to comment also on the moral and religious aspects of this issue. As a theologian and scholar of religion, I've had lots of opportunity to observe how moral maturation occurs, and also lots of opportunity to see (in my extremely diverse classrooms) how people with religious differences can create a healthy community. I've learned that a mature moral judgment is something quite different than a visceral reaction against something. I say this because so many people – including perhaps some of you – have what amounts to a visceral reaction against homoeroticism, and therefore against same-sex marriage or even civil-unions. At a "gut" level, it may seem jarring, ridiculous, even disgusting. This is how we all were raised when it came to homosexuality; this is how our "guts" were trained.

Gay and lesbian people were raised this way too, so most of us, growing up, struggled with feelings that we ourselves were wrong, ridiculous, or disgusting. But we had to grow up. We had to reach under those ingrained visceral responses and find the basic solid values we sought in our lives – love, satisfaction, security, family. Once we did that, the visceral reactions dissolved, and we found ourselves in the clear, sane space of plain old human love.

Not very long ago, most people in the U.S. had a similar visceral reaction against inter-racial marriages – at a gut level, these seemed wrong, disgusting, upsetting the normal order of things. Those were visceral reactions, but they were not morally mature judgments. If you have a visceral reaction against same-se marriage, I urge you to ask yourself whether the judgments you've made based on those reactions are really morally mature. I think you'll find, once you break through those ingrained reactions, that those visceral feelings will melt away, just as they have for mature gay and lesbian people.

Finally, let me say something about religious differences. The right and wrongs of sexuality are, for many people, religious issues. That is true, but it's true on both sides. It's not just opponents of marriage equality, but *proponents* who have religious views – groups like the Interfaith Alliance, the Metropolitan Community Church, the United Church of Christ, Temple Emanu-el, and many others. Precisely because this issue is religious and/or moral, the state should not prefer one side over the other. Hawaii should simply create the legal environment in which people are free to live out their own conscientious beliefs as long as they do not harm others. Religious opponents of same sex marriage have a firm constitutional right to perform only heterosexual marriages; that is not endangered by civil unions or by same sex marriage and it never could be. But they

have no right to harm or penalize me as I live out my own deeply held values and my own cherished love relationship. This in no way requires that opponents "condone" or "celebrate" my relationship. In the United States, we don't expect Mormons to "condone" Scientologists, or evangelical Christians to "celebrate" Islam. But neither are these groups allowed to deny each other health care, parental rights, bereavement leave or life insurance. Marriage equality requires no more than does equity among the many religious groups that already co-exist in our state. And it deserves no less.

I strongly support this bill because partners in a civil union deserve the same legal security that couples in a marriage are entitled to. The legal security would be beneficial in the event of an emergency. For instance, if an unexpected death of a partner in a civil union occurs, then the partner would have legal ties to the property in their joint home. This would prevent other family members (who may be distant relatives) from claiming the couples' joint belongings.

In the event of an unexpected illness, a partner would be allowed access to medical information regarding their partner. They would also gain visitation rights in a medical setting.

These are all rights that couples in a marriage take for granted. But, if those couples were ever denied their rights in their time of grieving they would feel helpless. I feel very strongly that it is completely immoral to deny couples the legal security that would assist them during crucial times. I do hope that as our nation continues to grow, we keep moving in the right direction by redistributing power so that all US citizens can be recognized as equal.

We are Colleen Murphy and Monica Grant, Kaneohe residents and homeowners and a same-sex couple for the past eight years. I am a Realtor with RE/MAX Honolulu, and Monica is Vice President of Resource Development with the YMCA of Honolulu. We stand in strong support of HB 444. We are honored and moved to be a part of this important discussion, and sincerely thank you for hearing these testimonies today.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify before this committee. My name is Gene Corpuz, and I am supporting House Bill 444 regarding Civil Unions. I am currently employed as a Health Educator for HMSA (17 years) and am a member of Dignity USA, and organization for gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender Catholics, where I serve on the national board of directors. I am supporting this bill because I believe that all people in the State of Hawaii should be treated equally under the law and that would include same-gender couples who reside here. Although my preference would be for full marriage rights, HB 444 would extend the same rights, benefits, protections and responsibilities of spouses in marriage to partners in a civil union.

My partner and I have been together for 18 years and we became Reciprocal Beneficiaries in 1998 when that was the only option for acknowledgement of limited rights for same gender couples. Due that law, since my partner was employed by the State of Hawaii, I could have been added to his health plan. However, I could not offer the same benefits from my employer to him since our relationship is not recognized as a family unit. Just recently, my employer released information regarding the Family Leave Act, and how employees can take a leave of absence to care for a sick family member and be able to return to their job without loss of status and pay. Again, same gender couples are not specified as a family unit, and therefore not recognized for receiving this benefit.

I just highlighted a few ways in which same gender couples are discriminated that mixed-gender couples are not generally aware of when they apply for joint benefits. Since I'm Catholic, the church will oppose this bill on moral grounds. This bill is supported by Dignity USA & the local group Dignity Honolulu and many other groups because it is a basic civil rights issue. Several states already offer benefits to same gender couples either through civil unions or marriage, and I believe that equal treatment under the law should be the policy in the State of Hawaii. I again ask for your support of HB 444 and appreciate your careful consideration.

This testimony is directed to the Judiciary Committee of the Hawaii State Legislature. The hearing is scheduled for Thursday, February 5, 2009 at 2:00 p.m. The measure I support is HB 444.

I had a relationship with a college friend in the early 1970s and I was seriously harmed after I made it clear that I support civil unions and even marriage for LBGT people. I rented a room near the campus and I was slipped an illegal drug by another student. After the drug took affect a third student taunted me with a Nazi flag and shouted at me, "You support peace and love and freedom. What are you doing here!!!?" It was made clear to me that there were a lot of illegal drugs in the house. At the same time a woman I had been getting to know told me that if I had the location of and information about the Irish Republican Army (IRA) and told the authorities, the IRA "would put a loaded shotgun behind" my "knee and pull the trigger." I was very frightened. I thought the drug and the threats were causing me heart failure, however, people just laughed at me. That's just one reason why I am against all kinds of illegal drugs. I ran to the University Health Center in panic. My tuition check was stolen and my family was called.

At the same University, I had been assigned a dorm room a few years later. I went to visit a friend and when I returned, all of my possessions – minus a few items -- had been dumped in the hallway and my dorm room lock changed. They said that they did that to me because I am gay.

My family felt appalled that I am gay and had me hospitalized for that reason. Until 1973, the American Psychiatric Association considered sexual orientation a mental health issue.

Also in the early 1970s, I remembered that my then-missing father had approached me previously and encouraged me to get a job with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I called the FBI and was encouraged to gather information about organized crime "for \$400.00 a week." I told the special agent that I needed to contact the Drug Enforcement Administration and he said that he could not legally allow me to do so. Later on he said that he couldn't hire me, nor could he pay me, because of my sexual orientation.

Just after that, I was attacked at a hospital while trying to place a call to a human rights agency. I had been requested to call at a certain time. Another patient had been on the phone for 30 minutes and I assertively pointed out that the rules and a sign in plain sight said calls are strictly limited to ten minutes. The patient brutally attacked me and I still have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder from the incident.

I know I said some things I shouldn't have said after I was illegally drugged and beaten.

I don't seek revenge, and I don't wish to offend anyone; I just hope and pray the next generation of LGBT people will have a better quality of life than I had, and that all citizens can live in harmony.

If you have compassion for your fellow citizens, you will support the bill allowing civil unions. God's commandment is to love your neighbor, not just your heterosexual

neighbor. Jesus Christ never said one word against LGBT people. People who are adamantly against sexual orientation rights are that way, the psychology books said, because they fear similar suppressed feelings in themselves, and so they think they have to repress it in society and our culture.

I have been beaten three times or so and I am permanently crippled. For the love of God, support human rights and civil rights for all people. I am proud to be an American. Please support the Civil Unions House Bill 444.

My name is Fritz Fritschel, a retired Lutheran clergyman speaking in favor of House Bill 444. I want to thank the committee for considering this bill and for the many members of the house that have already indicated support for it.

I consider this bill a significant step forward in the extension of civil rights to an important population of our society. While we may quarrel about words at times, marriage and/or civil union, I believe the impact of this bill can recognize and support meaningful relationships and partnerships in our communities. That is something that should happen.

I might say that our own religious community has deliberately announced and officially adopted practice of inclusion of the LGBT [Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transsexual] community as full participants in our congregational life. We passed that provision about 15 years ago. Since then, members of the LGBT group have been an invaluable asset to our life together, taking active roles with other members and families as they choose.

Aloha,

I am writing in support of same-sex civil unions in Hawaii. Thank you for considering my testimony as you deliberate HB 444.

I am an entertainment producer and musical performing artist born and raised in Hawaii, and I have lived most of my life here. I have always appreciated the encouragement and celebration of diversity by the people of Hawaii, as well as their intolerance of discrimination.

Unions between two willing persons who love one another, whether they are of the same sex or of opposite sexes, enrich the world around them and form part of the essential firmament upon which a successful society is built.

Defining and/or allowing marriage only as the union between a man and a woman excludes others of the same sex who seek to unite, build a life together for themselves and enrich the world. This narrow definition thus openly violates the civil rights and freedoms of a significant portion of our citizens, as outlined by the US and Hawaii Constitutions; it also challenges the separation of church and state outlined by the US Constitution by seeking to impose what could be called a "biblical" definition of marriage upon all citizens, regardless of their beliefs.

Allowing equal rights to same-sex couples does not negatively impact the rights of opposite-sex couples or religious groups in any way. All people and all faiths currently have and will retain the right to define marriage in their own way, without divisive legislation to narrow or strictly define marriage.

Further, allowing equal rights for same-sex couples only strengthens families and "family values," as families with legal definitions and rights are less likely to be a burden to society. While I am only a layman, I am aware of many statistics & studies that point to the utmost health & success of children (our most valuable asset as a society) within the framework of a two-parent family, regardless of the sexual orientation of those parents. I am also aware of, and have personally observed, the ever-rising divorce rates among opposite-sex couples, as well as many same-sex couples whom I have personally known to provide a family life environment by virtue of their commitment to one another that is just as stable, if not more stable, than the family life environment of opposite-sex couples.


I am a Hawaii resident living in Thailand. For over a decade, I spent all my free time working on gaining partnership rights for same sex couples.



Thank you for this opportunity to testify before this committee. My name is Mark A. Koppel and I am am here to express my support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions.

My partner, Barry A. Brandes and I have live in Hakalau, on the Big Island, and have been together for over 36 years. We both feel that Hawai'i, more than most states, has always stood for diversity and tolerance. A Civil Unions bill is simply an extension of this spirit of aloha. I write not just for us, but for the many other Lesbian and Gay Big Island couples, who have asked us to testify for them.

I remember walking once in Waikiki and wondering why there were so many limousines on the streets. Then I realized that people come to Hawaii from all over the world to be married. Yet, my partner and I cannot have any legal recognition beyond an RBR. Why must one group of people be denied the rights allowed to all other groups?

Let me emphasize that this is not at all an attack on religion. No religious freedoms or practices would be change at all. No church would have to perfom a Civil Union ceremony if it did not wish to. A few states have had Civil Unions for years, without any ill effects.

My name is Dr. Jon-Paul Bingham, Professor of Biochemistry, at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and I am here to support your decision in making a positive impact on the lives of many committed gay couples in the State of Hawaii. Your support of House Bill 444 "A Bill for an Act relating to Civil Unions" is a civic duty to help end unequal treatment of loving same-sex households and families in the eyes of our present state laws.

As a husband in a loving same-sex relationship, we've been married for 9.5 wonderful years now in which our love has not wavered. We have faced the same hurdles as any couple; yet it is our vowels to each other that keep us strong and in love. Our pursuit of happiness has lead us to enter a Civil Union in Vermont and legally marry in Canada – but on the shores of our home, Hawaii, our family is melted down to a patch-work of a few civic protections.

As we grow older, as we will do together as new homeowners in Kaneohe, we are both worried about how future unequal laws will effect us economically such as accessing retirement and health benefits, as well as the uncounted number of Hawaiian marriage-laws and statutes which provide uncertainty and complexity to our own Canadian marriage status. Unfortunately same-sex couples and families are faced with greater legal uncertainties; we are personally reminded daily of these inequalities.

This weekend we attended a wedding for two of our friends, oh what a joyous event – it took me back to when I said, "I do" nearly a decade ago. Our heterosexual friends expressed their love and commitment to each other, in sickness and in health, and witnessed by all who attended. Yet seeing this, both my husband and myself felt a difference, sadness sank in as we realized that what was conveyed in protections, obligations and rights under law by the State of Hawaii, we as a same-sex committed couple have no full equal access to.

Yes we are presently granted a second-class citizenship by the limited 'grey' areas of reciprocal beneficiaries, but this is very far from providing full coverage or equal access to the law. Should we not be afforded, as state taxpayers, equal representation under all state civil marriage laws?

Civil Unions will provide these much needed reassurances that we seek in gaining equal legal protection in Hawaii. As a same-sex committed couple we are prepared to accept the responsibilities as conveyed by Civil Unions, these being equal to those conveyed to heterosexual couples.

This would have several extremely important implications for my partner and I, who have been in a stable, loving relationship for seven years.

Despite our registration as Reciprocal Beneficiaries, significant problems currently arise with a seemingly endless number of matters that are routine for opposite-sex married couples, such as:

Financial and medical decision-making when a spouse is incapacitated Retirement benefits

Consideration of partners as "immediate family" by banks, credit unions, etc.

Spousal coverage on liability and other types of insurance

Access to safe-deposit boxes

As noted by the Hawaii Commission on Sexual Orientation and the Law, out of the approximately 300 marriage-based protections identified by the commission, only about 50 have been extended to Reciprocal Beneficiaries. This is clearly unequal treatment under the law.

It is also important to note the tremendous swing in public opinion in the past few years. The majority of the public supports civil unions, as does President Obama. Thank you for this opportunity to send in testimony to this committee. My name is Isabel Yang and I am writing this email to express my support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions. I believe that all people should be treated equally under the law and this is something required by our Constitution. HB 444 extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

My partner and I have been together for 15 years. Well, actually she is more than just my "partner" ... she is, in fact, my "spouse" – recognized legally in Canada as we were married in Vancouver in September 1996. The words "partner" and "spouse" do not always convey what I feel that we truly are – life partners, soul mates, best friends. She is my beloved, as I am hers. I feel so blessed to be sharing our wonderful life together. Our Canadian marriage commissioner aptly described our feelings during our wedding:

We have yet to discover a better way of life than sharing it together in a lasting and responsible way. This meets our deepest human need for love and companionship, for someone with whom we can share, in an intimate and trusting way all of the hopes and joys and dreams of life. This love brings with it caring as much about the welfare and happiness of another person as about our own. It is not total absorption into each other, it is looking outward in the same direction together. Love makes burdens lighter because they are divided. It makes joys more intense because they are shared. It makes us stronger, so we can be involved with life in ways we would not risk alone.

One of the ways to care for each other is to ensure that we both have health insurance. We are fortunate that we each have individual health insurance from our respective employers (I am currently employed at HawaiiUSA Federal Credit Union and my wife/partner works at Pearl Harbor). However, as a result of us not having legal recognition as a couple, if I needed to use my employer sponsored health insurance for my partner, I would have to pay additional tax since those benefits are considered imputed income. Basically, we are paying more for the same health insurance benefits than an opposite sex married couple pays. Additionally, I believe we pay considerably more in taxes every year both to the State of Hawaii and the US Federal Government because we are unable to file taxes jointly.

This inequality of benefits and inability to file joint taxes is unfair and unjust. At this time, it is not "equal pay/benefits for equal work." I am hopeful that soon, certainly within our lifetime, if not within the next few years, marriage equality will be reality in our country. Civil unions are a good step towards that reality. My name is Suzanne Kalikolehua King. I was born and raised here in Hawaii and am a member of a well established local family. I graduated from Punahou School just one year before our current President of the United States. While I have voted in every election since I turned 18, I have never considered myself active in politics or have ever testified in support of legislation. First I had to get the courage to approach my employer and ask if they would allow it. While I feel strongly that we should have these rights afforded to us, you see I tried asking before with another employer back in the 90's and was told, "we probably could do it but, you know, it's going to affect everyone else's rates if we do that, is that what you want?" Well I am not one to impose my lifestyle on others so needless to say, I backed off. But times are different now and every penny matters so that's why I took a chance and asked again. And I am so grateful that my company said yes this time!

I guess my point to all of you is, why did I have to ask? And more importantly, what if they, too, said no? We need HB 444 so that basic rights, like access to our partner's health care, are a given and not something that we have to take a chance on getting.

Earlier I had mentioned that I come from a well established local family. Well we are also a very private family so coming here before you today and sharing my story is not easy to do. But I realize *it's time* that I start standing up for myself and my family; that it's *okay* that I do that; and that it's the *right thing* to do.

As my classmate, Barack Obama, our 44th President, has said, "at its core, this issue is about who we are as Americans. It's about whether this nation is going to live up to its founding promise of equality by treating all its citizens with dignity and respect." ¹

I humbly ask that you pass HB 444 so that all of our same-sex families in Hawaii can begin to achieve the dignity and respect that we deserve.

As a private citizen, I very much appreciate this opportunity to express my support for House Bill 444 regarding the establishment of civil unions.

This is an idea whose time has come. Indeed, it is long overdue as a means to extend fairness and equal justice under law to same-sex couples.

There are those who argue that civil unions should not be established because at least a decade ago, the people of Hawaii ratified a constitutional amendment to disallow same-sex marriages, and that civil unions are nothing more than same-sex marriages under a different name. However, this argument is fundamentally flawed.

The traditional-marriage amendment to the Hawaii Constitution merely empowered the Legislature to restrict marriage to opposite-sex couples, at its discretion. It did not create a permanent, unalterable ban on legal recognition for same-sex relationships.

Furthermore, civil unions are clearly not the full legal and social equivalent of marriage. They are not transportable from state to state, they are not accorded the same social status as marriages, and participants in civil unions are denied access to more than one thousand federal benefits that are freely available to married opposite-sex couples.

Nevertheless, the establishment of civil unions would be a substantial step forward in putting into practice our nation's commitment to liberty and justice, not merely for the heterosexual majority, but for all. We simply cannot continue to shield our eyes from palpable inequities which have negatively affected same-sex couples and which cry out for timely correction.

As Thomas Jefferson so eloquently stated, "The foundation on which all our constitutions are built is the natural equality of man." He also stated that "laws and institutions must go hand in hand with the progress of the human mind. As that becomes more developed, more enlightened, as new discoveries are made, new truths disclosed, and manners and opinions change with the change of circumstances, institutions must advance also, and keep pace with the times. We might as well require a man to wear still the coat which fitted him as a boy, as a civilized society to remain ever under the regimen of their barbarous ancestors." (Emphasis added.)

Aloha Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito and Members of the Committee:

My name is Kat Brady and I am a social justice advocate. I am testifying tonight in support of HB 908 – civil unions. Hawai`i's unique history – the overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom, the arrest and incarceration of our people based solely on their Japanese ancestry, and the imposition of martial law in World War II - has informed our strong commitment to civil rights. It is imperative that Hawai`i continue to embrace equality and comply with the provisions outlined in our Constitution:

Article I RIGHTS OF INDIVIDUALS

Section 2. All persons are free by nature and are equal in their inherent and inalienable rights. Among these rights are the enjoyment of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and the acquiring and possessing of property. These rights cannot endure unless the people recognize their corresponding obligations and responsibilities.

How can we say that we comply with this provision when we are creating a separate class of people and basically, legislating who one can love and choose as a life mate? How do we comply with – liberty and pursuit of happiness – in this section when equality has not been achieved for all of our citizens?

EQUALITY OF RIGHTS

Section 3. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State on account of sex. The legislature shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this section.

HB 908 is the first step in achieving equality, but please understand that we are not there yet.

DUE PROCESS AND EQUAL PROTECTION

Section 5. No person shall be deprived of live, liberty or property without due process of law, nor be denied the equal protection of the laws, nor be denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of race, religion, sex or ancestry.

Civil Unions would provide some legal status for the families of our people who have not been permitted to marry or choose not to marry. Recognition and legal protection of same sex or unmarried families provides their children the security they deserve. These children should not be penalized because their parents are either not married or are not permitted to marry.

According to the study by the Commission on Sexual Orientation, unmarried couples in lifelong relationships pay higher taxes and are denied basic protections under the law. They must pay state income taxes on their employer's contributions toward their domestic partner's health insurance. They also may pay significant penalties when they inherit from their partner.

I urge you to pass HB 444. Mahalo for this opportunity to testify.

"Aikane is a nest of fragrance"

"sweet indeed is a good friend"

Civil Unions are pressing in both local and national agendas into this climate a debate has arrived some recent historical research from me as I'm a Native Hawaiian Studies Teacher, of history, hula, chant and culture showing that Homosexuality was apparently widely accepted in old Hawaii and also shaped some of Hawaii's most significant historical events.

Hula and chant continues to be the focal point for the Hawaiian Gay Community and continues to be a forefront to this day. Traditional use of love stories in hula and chants, most significant of those is the epic chants and dances through the pele series, known as the History of Gay Romance behind hula chants.

To reconstruct the "Hawaiian History, The term "Aikane", which in post missionary times was redefined to mean platonic friend. I want to break down the word "Aikane" for you. "Ai", meaning to have sex or to be correct and "kane" meaning man or male. "Aikane"

is a very special word to all Native Hawaiians and it would be a terrible loss if we forget its true meaning and ancient pass and to discount that it ever happened. Activist and University of Hawaii Hawaiian Studies Director, Lilikala Kame'eleihiwa says's that her research of "Aikane" stretched from Kamehameha the first through the fifth. Usually most of the chiefs were bi-sexual and most of them had wives as well. She then points out that women were bisexual as well, but there is little evidence of that and that is all we know about it. King Kamehameha the second (Liholiho) had a group called Hulumanu a group noted for his favorite "Aikane". Kamehameha the third, fourth and fifth liked men and women as well. It was the Hawaiian way of thinking, living and cultually excepted through out Hawaii. It was a way to survive, to live fully with pride and honor. The wide acceptance of "Aikane" was rigidly ruled by blood lines, Mana-power and Pono-moral uprightness and property. If a handsome man would be talented he would be considered as "Aikane". After living in court at the time he might get lucky and be taken as a lover by an Ali'i (chief). The God "Lono" was a patron of those arts that celebrated human sexuality and these were included in is path to "Mana". (power). As Native Hawaiian traditions sees it. Hawaiian Society, Homosexual men and women are still family, still one. still

ohana. As a small island let us remember that we as a people cannot ostracize those who are different. Civil Unions is about "kuleana" (responsibility), It is about "Malama" (taking care of each other) and "Ho'omalu" (protection)

Protecting for the good of all people from Hawaii.

The Alabama Sanctity of Marriage Amendment of <u>2006</u>, also known as Amendment 774, is a "<u>defense of marriage amendment</u>" that amended the <u>Alabama Constitution</u> to make it unconstitutional for the state to recognize or perform <u>same-sex marriages</u> or <u>civil unions</u>. The referendum was approved by 81% of the voters. [11]

The text of the amendment states:

- (a) This amendment shall be known and may be cited as the Sanctity of Marriage Amendment.
- (b) Marriage is inherently a unique relationship between a man and a woman. As a matter of public policy, this state has a special interest in encouraging, supporting, and protecting this unique relationship in order to promote, among other goals, the stability and welfare of society and its children. A marriage contracted between individuals of the same sex is invalid in this state.
- (c) Marriage is a sacred covenant, solemnized between a man and a woman, which, when the legal capacity and consent of both parties is present, establishes their relationship as husband and wife, and which is recognized by the state as a civil contract.
- (d) No marriage license shall be issued in the State of Alabama to parties of the same sex.
- (e) The State of Alabama shall not recognize as valid any marriage of parties of the same sex that occurred or was alleged to have occurred as a result of the law of any jurisdiction regardless of whether a marriage license was issued.
- (f) The State of Alabama shall not recognize as valid any common law marriage of parties of the same sex.
- (g) A union replicating marriage of or between persons of the same sex in the State of Alabama or in any other jurisdiction shall be considered and treated in all respects as having no legal force or effect in this state and shall not be recognized by this state as a marriage or other union replicating marriage. My name is Gene J. Parola, I reside in Manoa and am a retired Professor of Cultural History.

I represent no organization, but feel that I must support HB444 simply because I wish to be a good citizen. I'm a 'depression kid.' I have lived many years in America and have witnessed this nation's continuing attempts to live up to its ideals. We are in an era in which that struggle has hopes of being more fully realized.

The language of the Declaration of Independence clearly states that all men are created equal, and we have come to interpret that to mean women as well. The symbolic meaning is clear. We are *all* equal under the law.

In some respects laws like HB444 are not necessary because the Constitution goes on to say that no laws should be made to curb those 'unalienable rights'. So a repeal of repressive laws seem more appropriate. And certainly no law should be necessary to simply preserve a right that already exists.

I would beg the Committee to carefully examine the personal and financial burdens that laws preventing civil unions place upon that segment of our society. No one of us would want to be deprived of the visit, or participate in the treatment of, an ill spouse in the hospital. Nor would we want a spouse to be deprived of rights relative to inheritance issues.

It needs to be remembered that such rights for 'gay' people would in no way prevent the rest of the community from enjoying their rights.

Thank you for your wisdom in practicing the "American art of government" for yet another realm of individual variation.

I am a gay man. My partner and I have just celebrated our 27th year together on 1/21//09. All without the benefit of marriage or civil union. We have raised two fine sons who are both straight, happily married, and love us dearly.

At age 64 & 68, we are both worried about end of life issues. We need to be able to make decisions on each other's medical problems, not to mention the financial and real estate decisions that will have to made. We've seen men & women refused from seeing their partner in cases that ended in death because the parents of the dying refused to let them into the hospital room or contribute in any way in the funeral process. We have see parents, siblings, and even Ex's challenge wills and insurance payments, up money for the person left behind; some succeeded in obtaining the funds, and some didn't. Either way it was a sorry state of affairs.

I appreciate your taking the time to enable the public to testify before this committee on HB 444 – Civil Unions.

I wish to express my strong support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions because I believe that all people should be treated equally under the law. HB 444 extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

I have had two long-term relationships in my time. My first was for 21 years. I lived with a man who was ill much of the time, and there were times I needed to take off work to care for him. Since our relationship was "not recognized," I lost time from work, missed income, and worried that if he fell into a coma, I would not be able to be by his side should his family take over.

I have been in a relationship with my second partner for seven years now. We have had a Reciprocal Beneficiaries agreement for several years, but I feel that it's simply not enough. The language in it is too vague, and I feel uncomfortable depending on it. Civil Unions as they exist in Connecticut grant the following rights to same-sex couples:

- Financial and medical decision-making when a spouse is incapacitated
- Retirement benefits
- Consideration of partners as "immediate family" by banks, credit unions, etc.
- Spousal coverage on liability and other types of insurance
- Access to safe-deposit boxes

As noted by the Hawaii Commission on Sexual Orientation and the Law, out of the approximately 300 marriage-based protections identified by the commission, only about 50 have been extended to Reciprocal Beneficiaries. This is clearly unequal treatment under the law.

Public opinion has changed since 1996 when this issue was first brought before the people of Hawaii. Many people across the United States now support civil unions, as does President Obama. In fact, President Obama "supports full civil unions that give same-sex couples legal rights and privileges equal to those of married couples."

Let's show the world the unique meaning and sense of *aloha* by extending Civil Unions to same-sex couples!

I ask that you support HB 444.

SUPPORT

Herewith, I respectfully present testimony in support of House Bill 444, Relating to Civil Unions - Extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

Members of the Committee will no doubt hear vigorous and emotional testimony from both proponents and opponents of civil union. I offer my personal testimony to give voice to those who support this measure but will not come forward because they justly fear disclosure may put them in harm's way. Despite our nation's best effort to protect and preserve justice and liberty for all, racism, class bias, sex discrimination, hate crimes, and ridicule directed at same-gender orientation are still prevalent in these United States.

That which follows is the premise upon which the United States of America was born:

"When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, —That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness..." (The Declaration of Independence, In Congress, July 4, 1776)

As a free people, we have made significant strides in enacting laws that hold firm to that voice of justice which gave rise to our declaration of independence from tyranny. History tells us, when leaders govern with fairness and justice for all over self-interest and

prejudice there is peace and harmony in the land. It took our nation more than two hundred years to elect a black president and when we did the world celebrated with us.

As a state and as a nation we are not without failings but in every case of strife and conflict we rise from the ashes with our aim on even greater heights for humanity. Hawaii's native culture was nearly lost due to prejudices and the ethnocentrism of a dominant group who was set on imposing their values onto all others. It took a civil war to stop slavery in America. Interracial marriage was, at one time, looked upon with disdain and shame but in Hawaii today we enjoy the mix of cultures and ethnicities.

For what purpose do we build institutions of higher learning and confer degrees of academic achievement or give status to expertise in a given discipline if not for the betterment of society and community. We aggregate and organize information into useful form; and, we establish professional organizations and associations to help us make sense of it all. Should we not seek the knowledge and judgment of our scholars and the learned, and consider their opinions when instituting public policy. America is still a very young country in comparison to other nations but the world looks to us for leadership because we represent and strive for the highest of ideals for civilization.

The American Psychological Association (APA), "has long-established policy dating back to 1975 that deplores all public and private discrimination against gay men and lesbians and urges enactment of civil rights legislation at the local and state and federal level that would offer [gay men and lesbian] citizens the same protections now guaranteed to others... Psychologists do not consider sexual orientation to be a conscious choice that can be voluntarily changed. Human beings cannot choose to be either gay or straight. Sexual orientation emerges for most people in early adolescence prior to any sexual experience... Psychological research (which forms the basis of APA policy) provides no evidence to justify discrimination against same-sex couples and families." (APA Briefing Sheet: June 2006)

Additionally, the APA policy statement on Sexual Orientation & Marriage (adopted by the APA Council of Representatives July 28 & 30, 2004) states: "Psychological and psychiatric experts have agreed since 1975 that homosexuality is neither a form of mental illness nor a symptom of mental illness."

The American Psychiatric Association is explicit in their support of "civil" marriage. As written in the Association's position statement on this matter: "... Civil marriage is associated with a unique set of benefits that provide legal and economic protections to adults in committed relationships and to their children. Equal access to the institution of civil marriage is consistent with the American Psychiatric Association's opposition to discrimination based on sexual orientation. Therefore, be it resolved that: In the interest of maintaining and promoting mental health, the American Psychiatric Association supports the legal recognition of same-sex civil marriage with all rights, benefits, and responsibilities conferred by civil marriage, and opposes restrictions to those same rights, benefits, and responsibilities." (Support of Legal Recognition of Same-Sex Civil Marriage, position statement approved by the Board of Trustees, July 2005)

The American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP) is composed of over 7,500 child and adolescent psychiatrists and other interested physicians. Its members actively research, evaluate, diagnose, and treat psychiatric disorders and pride themselves on giving direction to and responding quickly to new developments in addressing the health care needs of children and their families. The AACAP states: "Parents need to clearly understand that sexual orientation is not a mental disorder. The cause(s) of homosexuality or bisexuality are not fully understood. However, a person's sexual orientation is not a matter of choice. In other words, individuals have no more choice about being homosexual or bisexual than heterosexual. All teenagers do have a choice about their expression of sexual behaviors and lifestyle regardless of their sexual orientation... Gay, lesbian and bisexual teens can become socially isolated, withdraw from activities and friends, have trouble concentrating, and develop low self-esteem. Some may develop depression and think about suicide or attempt it. Parents and others need to be alert to these signs of distress because recent studies show that gay, lesbian and bisexual youth account for a significant number of deaths by suicide during adolescence... It is important for parents to understand their teen's sexual orientation and to provide emotional support. Parents may have difficulty accepting their teen's sexuality for some of the same reasons that the youngster wants to kept it a secret... Therapy directed specifically at changing sexual orientation is not recommended and may be harmful for an unwilling teen." (Facts for Families, No. 63, Updated January 2006)

The AACAP further states: "There is no evidence to suggest or support that parents with gay, lesbian, or bisexual orientation are per se different from or deficient in parenting skills, child-centered concerns and parent-child attachments, when compared to parents with a heterosexual orientation. It has long been established that a homosexual orientation is not related to psychopathology, and there is no basis on which to assume that parental homosexual orientation will increase likelihood of or induce a homosexual orientation in the child." (Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Parents Policy Statement, June 1999, Policy Statement of the AACAP)

In closing, while I would prefer enactment of same-sex civil marriage which would give same-sex couples all the rights and privileges, and the more than 1,049 Federal benefits and responsibilities, enjoyed by heterosexual married couples, passage of HB444 will help to curb the social stigma associated with same-gender sexual orientation and this, for many, is as important an issue as access to benefits and privileges.

I respectfully ask for your support in passing HB444.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify before this committee. My name is Tara O'Neill and I am here to express my strong support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions. At the heart of this bill is the belief that all people should be treated equally under the law and that our state Constitution serves to protect the economic and civil rights of all its citizens. HB 444 extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

For the past ten years, I served as a public school high-school and middle-school science teacher and recently became an Assistant Professor at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. While still teaching seventh grade science, in June 2008, my long-term partner and I held a private commitment ceremony, where we dedicated our lives to each other. As a sign of this commitment, we exchanged rings. It is important at this point for me to explain that I do not regularly wear jewelry, and the only "iewelry" I am know to wear at school is a Timex sports watch. Thus, when I returned to teach following our commitment ceremony, my commitment ring was noticed immediately by eagle-eyed seventh graders. Before I could finish explaining the class activity for the day, a student raised her hand and asked, "Did you get married?" I told her and the my students, "Not exactly but I will explain after class to those of you who are interested." And science class continued as planned.

When the students were dismissed, five elected to stay behind in an effort to get to the bottom of the marriage question. I explained that my partner and I had a commitment ceremony. To which a student asked, "Why didn't you get married?" I said that we did not get married because my partner is a woman and same-sex couples are not allowed to get married or have civil unions based on state and federal law. The five students were quiet for a moment and then one asked in thoughtful tone, "Are you worth less than other couples?" It is this student's response that has made the issues of civil unions in Hawaii central to my heart. While I was touched by how much love and support my

students showed me in their genuine joy for my happiness, they were upset that this was the first they had heard of my partner or my commitment to her and troubled at the idea that our love somehow counted for less.

I have had many students with two mothers, with gay and lesbian siblings, aunts or uncles, and students who identify themselves as gay and lesbian. The idea that my students question the worth of their gay parents' love and/or the value of themselves and their gay teachers, friends and family due to the lack of state and federal government action to uphold the civil rights of its gay and lesbian citizens brakes my heart.

The majority of the public, President Obama, and the majority of the Hawaii House of Representatives support civil unions. The issue of equal treatment for same-sex couples is *the* civil rights issue of this generation. Equality is a simple concept yet sadly has been out of reach to so many. Therefore it is in society's best interest to extend Civil-Union legislation to all citizens regardless of gender.
- 2. A Civil-Union is a civil contract. It is not marriage. It is a way of providing equal rights for same gender couples. It leaves the religious issue out of it. Churches are still free to marry or not marry people. We think this bill is a good compromise position for those opposed to marriage, but who still want to extend equal rights to same gender couples.
- 3. This is a Civil-Rights issue. All Americans are entitled to equal rights. It is unfair to deny benefits to same-gender couples. Historically we have denied rights to blacks and to women. It is embarrassing now to look back at how our treatment of them. But over time we recognized our prejudice and unfair treatment and we changed the law to reflect our new understanding. Now is another such time. By enacting this law, you can help move us forward in the long human struggle for liberty and justice for all.

I am testifying strongly AGAINST HB444.

This Bill refers to "Civil Union," section 9 and 10 (1) of HB 444 but states that they will be treated as marriage. The people of Hawaii do not want to recognize same sex relationships as mandated in Section 10 of the Bill. The residents of Hawaii think this issue was resolved defining marriage as only the union of one man and one woman. Most Hawaii residents don't know that there are activists constantly working to overturn their decision. This Bill treats Hawaii voters with contempt and puts children at risk. There are numerous studies that show children do better in families comprised of one man and one woman. It is irresponsible to ignore these findings. Psychologist Trayce Hansen has written extensively on the negative implications of legislation like this.

Although Section - 4b states "...Nothing in this section shall be construed to require any person authorized to perform solemnizations of marriages or civil unions to perform a solemnization of a civil union, and no such authorized person who fails or refuses for any reason to join persons in a civil union shall be subject to any fine of other penalty for such failure or refusal" -- it is only a matter of time before there will be a law suit to remove this protection of religiously faithful ministers and priests. Catholic Charities cannot perform adoption services in Massachusetts because they don't put children into the sub-optimum situation of homosexual couples/families. Doctors in California are being sued because they won't inseminate homosexual couples. A Catholic hospital in California was sued by a man who wanted to have them surgically mutilate his body by placing women's breasts on his body. Even when these suits fail, they cost financially to be involved. When they succeed, they deny a Constitutional right, freedom of religion.

Hawaii already has a compassionate accommodation for people who love each other and want to share obligations and responsibilities. It is called Reciprocal Beneficiary and is

not discriminatory against any group based on familial relationship or sexual practices. Reciprocal Beneficiary bestows benefits without anyone having to advertise activities of their private life. Their private life remains private. There is no reason to give one group eligible for this alternative more benefits than any other group but that is what SB458 attempts to do. All loving relationships other than marriage between one man and one woman can be accommodated under this provision. SB 458 discriminates against other non-marriage relationships.

Another reason to oppose this Bill is the excess workload this accommodation will impose on the State of Hawaii. I'ebruary 4, 2009, it was announced that the first same sex couple (lesbian) who married in Massachusetts in 2004, filed for divorce. The article indicated that they announced they were separating in 2006. A study by an AIDs researchers, published in 2003 in the journal AIDS, reported that the average duration of committed relationships among gay steady partners was 1.5 years. These relationships are not long lasting. There is no reason to create a new accommodations. It is my understanding that Reciprocal Beneficiary provisions are rarely requested therefore, it is unreasonable to create new subsets of relationships.

Someday people will classify those OPPOSED to HB 444 as practicing "LOVE SPEECH" because they cared enough about their fellow man to speak the truth, not what was politically expedient or politically correct. Homosexual activities are risky and should be discouraged. The most unethical thing Hawaii legislators could do is pass a Bill like IIB 444 and give the impression that homosexual activity is a healthy option that should be given special status. Evidence of the risks are documented. For example, a January 14, 2009 article in the Los Angeles Times reported: "In 2000, public health officials believed that syphilis was close to being eliminated, but a dramatic jump in infections among gay and bisexual men reversed the downward trend. Men who engaged in homosexual sex made up 65% of the 11,466 cases reported in 2007, roughly the same as in 2006." In a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report titled HIV/AIDSs among Men Who Have Sex with Men, revised in June 2007, stated "In the United States, HIV infection and AIDS have had a tremendous effect on men who have sex with men (MSM). MSM accounted for 71% of all HIV infections among male adults and adolescents in 2005 (based on data from 33 states with long-term, confidential namebased HIV reporting), even though only about 5% to 7% of male adults and adolescents in the United States identify themselves as MSM [1, 2]. Thank you for letting me testify. My name is Tracey Bennett, and I am here in support of House Bill 444 - Civil Unions.

My question is this: What's holding you back? These rights should have been given to same-sex couples years ago. In 1996, we had a two-week trial about whether the state had the right to deny marriage to couples. I gotta tell you, for the most part, it was a boring trial.

But the decision was not boring. Based on the state's evidence, Judge Kevin Chang had to rule that gays are entitled to the rights and benefits—yes, and obligations, too—of marriage.

Spain did not fall into the ocean. These are healthy societies who do not discriminate against their gay brothers and sisters.

name. If they're married, I invite them to swap their marriage license for a civil union bill and see how it fits.

It is with a mix of frustration and restrained happiness that I submit this letter in support of House Bill 444. For four and a half years, I have been in a committed relationship with my same-sex partner. As you well know, the current safeguards under Hawaii law are insufficient to properly protect same-sex relationships. Though we have registered as reciprocal beneficiaries with the State of Hawaii, we have faced higher costs for health care coverage (after going through numerous extra steps not required of married couples in order to convince my partner's employer that I should be recognized as a dependent) and the inability to file state taxes jointly, as well as the corresponding prejudices that accompany state-sanctioned discrimination, such as queries by hotel staff when, on vacation, we checked into a room with only bed. When deciding that we wanted to affirm our relationship in front of family and friends, we did not have the option of civil recognition of the life-long commitment we were making to each other.

I speak in favor of HB 444. As one of the old war horses of the 1996, 1998 marriage battle, I have never fully left the topic of same-sex marriage, civil union, domestic partnership, or reciprocal beneficiary. I have studied it as an undergraduate, and as a master's thesis and doctoral dissertation.

In 2006 I took the time to analyze the HRS §572-C Reciprocal Beneficiary Statute and was more than disconcerted. I discovered that it did not cover many areas of law that I had thought to be included. I retrieved from my files a copy of HB118HD1SD1 and review the bill to determine what had happened. To my shock and subsequent regret I discovered that out of the 146 laws of protection and rights only 83 or 56% were actually included in the final statute. And of those 83, 11 were removed by court decision so the final tally is 49% of the initial HB118HD1SD1 RB Bill became HRS §572-C. This information caused me to undertake a more extensive review of the laws of Hawaii and discovered the following:

Reciprocal Beneficiary	83	Statutes
Marriage	191	Statutes
Spouse	505	Statutes
Children	633	Statutes
Family	452	Statutes

I discovered that upon marriage the 191 marriage laws, 505 spousal laws, 633 children's laws, the 452 family laws apply as they are all connected due to statutory language. That is a total of 1781 laws that protect, support, and privilege legalized relationships that are committed to one another. BUT, when you write a letter to enter into a RB you get the 83 RB laws and a few spousal laws, a compliment of children's laws that totals 177 laws. The male and female who have the right to a legal marriage are in pursuit of happiness to better their lives, their families and the lives of their neighbors and community. These two people have the full backing of the state and so do their children. The children are an area of my greatest concern for me.

I have been an advocate for children in Hawaii for some 25 years; as legislative vice president of the state PTSA to Chair of the State Board of Education. Today I hope to continue that effort by speaking in support of this bill.

In Section 3 you reference that "marriage" shall equally apply to civil unions and that and in (1) you include references to "married" will apply equally to partners in a civil union. In (2) you likewise reference "husband", "wife" shall apply equally to a partner in a civil union. What I do not see clearly and am seeking reassurance on is that all references to "children" and "family" that are statutorily connected to marriage will also equally apply to civil union. As it is not clearly articulated and my research has shown words matter I am concerned that these connections maybe overlooked as the bill moves through the process. Too many of Hawaii's children have been without protections, supports, and fundamental basic rights in their family life. The statutory responsibility is to value our families, all our families and all our children; I thank you for making that change now.

Civil has to do with citizens, and to matters of, relating to, or based on civil law, according to Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, 10th Edition. So, what benefits should the government be extending to groups and why? Obviously there are duties of the government to the citizens of the state, such as protection and enforcement of laws and regulations. Other legal benefits are less obvious, and many have arisen when government officials attempt to correct some social injustice or provide a more equitable playing field for all. Marriage rights were introduced as government recognized the role of families in teaching not only legal but moral values to children, who then adopted those values as they grew to adulthood. Government officials wanted to strengthen that institution, and help ensure its continued viability as a primary vehicle for establishing and re-enforcing the social and legal values of the people.

Over time, the values have shifted, and we have seen a significant move by government officials to re-define those social values, and they have not always tried to protect those values held by the majority of citizens. Rather, vocal minorities and special interest groups have effectively purchased decisions and policies and laws which serve their special interests. As a result, our nation has seen our primary core values eroded and perverted to the point that we no longer recognize many of our original driving values. For example, we currently support tolerance over fidelity and a woman's right to do what she wants with her body (and anything that might be growing on or in that body) over an unborn child's right to live, to be born and to enjoy the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

I consider the current effort to build a legally recognized and protected "civil union" relationship as an attempt to further redefine our moral definition of good and bad as related to sexual preference. A person's right to choose with whom and in what way they can enjoy sexual experiences is now being held up as more important than the longdemonstrated process of bearing and nurturing children, including instilling in them a love of country and those things for which it stands.

While I don't want to harm anyone in the pursuit of happiness in their lives, I do believe that society, and the government that protects that society, need to do value those things which will strengthen and preserve the core values of the society. I believe that sexual pleasure should be limited to the safe and proven bounds of a legal marriage between a man and a woman, and that government should not legally recognize a person's right to choose otherwise, since this will not strengthen the culture in the long run, but confuse it. Civil unions may have their place, as government seeks to support and encourage activities and relationships which are positive, and healthy. But government officials need to be very careful not to be misled by arguments that miss the main point and lead to distractions.

Thanks for letting me share my viewpoint. I will be happy to discuss this further if you would like to.

Testimony Supporting HB 444

You are being asked to vote on House Bill 444 to allow civil unions in the state of Hawaii. I am writing today to ask for your affirmative vote.

Opponents of civil unions might argue, quite persuasively, that same sex unions must not be sanctioned by the state. The assumptions that inform this position are several and often rooted in religious doctrine that places a high value on the heterosexual couple that procreates. Of course, not all heterosexual unions result in children—because of biology or by choice. However, any heterosexual couple of consenting age may marry, even if they just met, even if they don't love each other. They simply have to pay the fee and prove that they're not related. And they may marry, within reason, where they wish, in a church or elsewhere. And that union may be blessed in a religious context or it may simply be legally sanctioned. And that couple may say, regardless of where and under what circumstances their union becomes officially recognized, that they have married. And that couple may continue to call their relationship a marriage as long as they two shall live. My partner, Bill, and I may not marry; nor, under current law, may we enjoy the legal benefits of a sanctioned union.

Perhaps opponents of civil unions might reconsider their position if they knew Bill and me. The issue might no longer represent such an abstraction. Bill and I have been together for six years. We met at a going away party for a mutual friend. After some scheming, other friends put us together and we had a first date. A month or two later I caught the flu and Bill left work early to bring me cold medicines, popsicles and chicken soup. Except for business trips we haven't been apart since. I have children from an earlier marriage, and Bill has lovingly welcomed them into his life as his step-children. Both of our employers recognize us as a committed couple. He is uncle to my nieces and nephews, and I for his. My siblings are ready to embrace him as brother-in-law when, this summer, we fly to Boston to marry each other in one of only two states where that is legally allowed--regrettably, that ceremony will be, in the eyes of the federal government and, more notably, here in Hawaii, merely symbolic. Bill's family has been scraping together money to travel from the west coast to witness our commitment ceremony; they, too, have lovingly welcomed me and my children into their family.

What's remarkable about our story is that it is essentially like so many other peoples' stories. Like other people in committed relationships, I can't imagine my life without my partner, and I know he feels the same. We are lovers, companions, friends, and we are each other's husband, or at least we think of each other that way.

What we lack is not just a certificate, though. I dare say that those of you who are married regard your bond as deeply as Bill and I regard ours. Those of you who are waiting to marry understand, as we do, the commitment that the marriage certificate implies.

Lawfully recognized or not, Bill and I will remain together, and should one of us require hospitalization, the other should be able, if required, to make end of life decisions for the other. Our fortunes should be combined. All the benefits that one spouse may share with the other should be ours, too. Lacking the legal acknowledgement of our union, we must rely on the good and reasonable discretion of hospital administrators, employers, family members and judges.

Bill and I know that we have loving, accepting and supportive families and friends whom we trust to do well by us. We also know other same sex couples who don't enjoy the kind of support we do. Please, vote for all our civil rights.

Support for HB444, Relating to Civil Unions

Rep. J. R. Karamatsu and the Committee on Judiciary:

I am Dr. Rebecca Stotzer, an Assistant Professor of Social Work at the University of Hawaii Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work. I am submitting this testimony to express my support of HB444 which proposes to legalize civil unions for same-sex couples. According to the American Community Survey of the U.S. Bureau of the Census, there are 1,418 gay male couples and 1,427 lesbian couples currently residing in Hawaii who are being denied the right to marry or enter into civil unions. Many people claim that enacting legislation that legitimizes gay marriage and civil unions only benefits the gay community, there is increasing evidence that this type of legislation benefits the entire community. Although our parents have always told us that "doing the right thing" is rewarding in-and-of itself, there is also social science research that supports this fact in a more concrete way.

The benefits of having less discrimination based on sexual orientation reverberate throughout a society at all levels. For example:

- Legalizing gay marriages in many states have resulted in a significant economic boon. As reported in the Star Bulletin, the Williams Institute at the UCLA School of law has estimated that Hawaii stands to make over \$200 million over the next three years if same-sex weddings were legalized. Although states that have civil unions do not see the same economic benefits as those who legalize same-sex marriages, even a portion of that \$200 million would be an important contribution to the struggling economy in Hawaii.
- Dr. Richard Florida has discussed the phenomenon of "brain drain", where communities that are seen as more discriminatory or unsupportive of gay people and culture often see their "best and brightest" residents (both gay and straight) leave for more accepting and open communities. He argues that this brain drain is also closely linked to the valuing of the gay community and culture that locations that have a thriving gay community often have the other qualities that attract high levels of social capital and fiscal resources of the best and brightest, including technology related companies and other business opportunities. Thus, passing HB444 is a positive step toward retaining locals who excel in their fields, as well as attracting new entrepreneurs and resourced individuals to invest in Hawaii.
- An article by Dr. Perry Silverchanz found that students who report that their campus has fewer incidences of derogatory name calling and violence based on sexual orientation have more academic and psychological well-being. This effect was true for both gay and straight students, that a discriminatory environment compromised the academic success and well-being of ALL students. Thus, ensuring a more just environment has the potential to benefit all of our keiki and college students and their academic success and psychological well-being.

Besides the moral imperative to create a just state that honors diversity and values equality, there is evidence of significant gains to be made by the state overall, including improving schools, attracting and retaining more business, and in dollars spent on civil union ceremonies for both resident and tourist same-sex couples. These are just a few of the benefits identified by researchers, and it does not require an expensive social program or enactment process, it simply removing and barrier and righting a wrong. This research also suggests that this issue is not just a "gay issue", but an issue that concerns us all. Thus, I support House Bill 444 Relating to Civil Unions for same-sex couples, both to support the human rights of all couples regardless of their sexual orientation, but also because of the benefits the entire state and its people would receive for having a more stable economy and more just society. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

The Impact of Civil Unions on Hawaii's Economy and Government

Testimony Summary

How would passage of HB 444 (civil unions) affect 1) tourism arrivals to Hawaii; 2) state government revenues; 3) state government spending; and 4) health insurance coverage and employer spending on employee health insurance plans by private firms and government agencies? After examining the experience of five other states with civil unions, I conclude that civil unions in Hawaii are likely to generate small positive impacts on tourism arrivals to Hawaii and government revenues. Civil unions are unlikely to have a major impact on government spending, the workload of critical state government agencies, health insurance coverage, or employer spending on employee health insurance plans.

Background

Five states (Vermont, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Oregon, and California) have enacted legislation providing for civil unions that are equivalent to marriage. I use Vermont's experience with civil unions as a benchmark for understanding the impact of civil union legislation in Hawaii. Vermont's experience provides a good benchmark for Hawaii, as there are many similarities between the two states (and obviously some big differences). Vermont is a small, rural state, with 638,000 people. Like Hawaii, Vermont has a state income tax, a state sales tax, a large tourism industry, an agricultural sector in transition, and great natural beauty. ¹In April 2000, the Governor of Vermont signed legislation authorizing civil unions, effective 1 July 2000. The Vermont Secretary of State reports that between July 2000 and August 2006, the Secretary of State's office registered 1,286 civil unions of Vermont same-sex couples and 8,058 civil unions of out-of-state same-sex couples. The 2,572 Vermont residents who entered into civil unions during the relationship contract's first six years represented just 6/10th of 1 percent of the state's 2005 population between the ages of 18 and 65.

Does Vermont's experience with civil unions provide a reasonable prediction of the propensity for Hawaii residents to enter into civil unions? If Hawaii residents have the same propensity to enter into civil unions as Vermont residents, then the Department of

Health would register 2,292 civil unions of Hawaii same-sex couples between July 2009 and August 2015. This would translate to 382 civil unions per year, with more civil unions occurring towards the beginning of the period. A cross-check of this estimate comes from U.S. Census data which indicate that 3,262 self-declared same-sex couples resided in Hawaii in 2005 (SOURCE). If 50 percent of the 3,262 same-sex couples entered into civil unions between July 2009 and July 2015, this would amount to 1,631 same-sex civil unions. If, however, legalization of civil unions causes more same-sex couples to become more public about their relationship, then the estimate derived from the Vermont experience may have some plausibility. For the rest of this testimony, I use an average of the two estimates for the number of civil unions (1,962).

Impact of Civil Unions on Tourism Arrivals to Vermont and Hawaii Legalization of civil unions by the State of Hawaii could affect visitor flows to Hawaii in two main ways.

First, tourism flows could be affected by the change in the character of the destination, e.g., that it has become more supportive of same-sex couples and gay, lesbian, and bisexual residents. However, the passage of civil rights legislation for gays and lesbians in such cities as Los Angeles, Seattle, San Francisco, Boston, and New York City has not been associated with declines in visitor arrivals or the growth rate of visitor arrivals in these cities. The rise of a more visible gay community in Singapore has also not been associated with declines in visitor arrivals or the growth rate of visitor arrivals. The absence of bad news associated with gay and lesbian civil rights legislation is significant, as each of these cities hosts over ten million tourists annually.

To date, there is also no evidence that the recognition of same-sex marriages by Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New York, and (temporarily) California and the recognition of civil unions by New Hampshire, Vermont, Oregon, California, or New Jersey has adversely affected tourism arrivals to any of these states.

Second, the legal recognition of civil unions in Hawaii will motivate some same-sex couples residing in other states that recognize civil unions or their equivalent (Vermont, New Jersey, Oregon, New Hampshire, and California) to visit Hawaii for their civil union or domestic partner commitment ceremonies rather than to have them in the dreary Oregon rain or New Hampshire sleet. Many will be accompanied by relatives and friends. Similarly, some civil unions ceremonies for resident same-sex couples will induce off-island relatives and friends to visit Hawaii for the ceremony and to expend resources here.

How many more visitors should Hawaii expect if it legalizes same-sex civil unions?² In 2007, the number of visitor days from visitors coming to Hawaii to get married totaled 1.17 million. In 2007, the number of visitor days from visitors coming to Hawaii for a honeymoon totaled 3.82 million. Over 43% of the visitors coming to Hawaii to get married and over 49 percent of the visitors coming to Hawaii for honeymoons were from

the United States. Consider that civil unions are currently legal in states with 16.7 percent of the U.S. population. If Hawaii received 3% more visitors from these states consisting of same-sex couples coming to Hawaii for a civil union or a honeymoon, then 11,969 additional visitor days would be generated. If Hawaii receives 5% more visitors, then an additional 19,948 visitor days would be generated. Assuming that each visitor spends \$174 per day, this would generate \$2.1 million and \$3.5 million, respectively. Multiplier effects would lead to additional income gains.

Impact of Civil Union on Hawaii State Government Revenues

Public finance economists have convincingly demonstrated that a progressive income tax —such as the Hawaii personal income tax—cannot ensure that couples with equal incomes pay equal taxes AND that a couple's tax bill will not rise solely as a consequence of their marriage, civil union, or domestic partnership. If HB 444 were to be enacted, then Hawaii's personal income tax code would treat parties to civil unions like married couples. Married and civil union couples are more likely to pay a "civil union" penalty in Hawaii when both parties are working, their incomes are similar, and they both earn incomes that are taxed at less than the maximum marginal tax rate, i.e., the couple's joint tax bill increases due to their status as a civil union couple. Alternatively, if only one party is working, the couple's incomes are very different, and one partner is already being taxed at the highest marginal tax rate, then the civil union couple typically receives a marriage subsidy, i.e., the couple's joint tax bill falls due to their status as a civil union couple. A marriage tax is more likely than a marriage subsidy due to the high percentage of individuals in same-sex couples who are employed (77%) compared to individuals in married couples (60%). My conclusion is that estimates of changes in tax revenue to the State of Hawaii from Hawaii's personal income tax are likely to be positive and small—less than \$1 million—and are too speculative to discuss at length.

Civil unions will, however, generate additional revenue from the issuance of civil union licenses. At \$60 per license (the cost of a marriage license), an estimated 1,962 civil unions for Hawaii residents will generate \$117,720 between 2009 and 2015 and an estimated 4,000 to 8,000 civil unions for out-of-state visitors will generate \$240,000 to \$480,000 over the same six-year period.

Civil unions will, also generate additional excise tax revenue from the additional spending on civil union ceremonies and celebrations by resident and visiting same-sex couples. Depending on the multipliers used, civil unions would likely generate additional visitor spending of roughly \$2-5 million annually. Using a gross excise tax rate of 4.35%, this would generate excise tax revenues of \$87,000 to \$217,500 annually. These estimates do not take into account additional spending by in-state couples on civil union ceremonies or honeymoons or additional visitor spending per day by couples getting married or on a honeymoon.

Impact on Hawaii State Government Agencies

Two states—Vermont and New Jersey—have issued reports on the implementation of civil unions in these states. The Vermont Commission issued its second and final report, Report of the Vermont Civil Union Review Commission, in January 2002. The Report

concluded that "Act 91 (Civil Unions) has had minimal impact on state government operations," a "negligible impact on state courts", and that "Act 91 is working as intended." In particular, the Commission observed that five important agencies had "reported minimal impact [on their operations]: the Department of Health, the Office of the Secretary of State, the Department of Banking, Insurance, Securities, and Health Care Administration, the Department of Personnel, and the Department of Taxes.

The Final Report of the New Jersey Civil Union Review Commission, *The Legal*, *Medical, Economic & Social Consequences of New Jersey's Civil Union Law*, was issued in December 2008. "The State Departments testifying before the Commission unanimously confirmed that the implementation of the [NJ] Civil Union Act has resulted in minimal costs to the State" (p. 27). Administrators of these departments found that the transition was "seamless" and "smooth".

The main costs to Hawaii's government would result from changes in forms, reprogramming, and training sessions for employees at the Dept. of Taxation and Dept. of Health. There is no reason to believe that government agencies in Hawaii would bear higher costs than Vermont's agencies to implement relevant provisions of HB 908. In fact, there are a number of reasons why Hawaii state and local officials and agencies should have lower adjustment costs to civil unions: They can learn from vital statistics forms, tax forms, real estate forms, etc. as guides for revision of a myriad of Hawaii government forms; and they can consult with Vermont and Connecticut officials who have extensive and recent experience in resolving problems with implementation of civil union legislation.

Impact on Healthcare Insurance Coverage

Enactment of civil union legislation in Hawaii is unlikely to lead to substantial increases in the percentage of Hawaii's population covered by healthcare insurance due to (1) the small number of same-sex couples in Hawaii, (2) the high percentage of Hawaii's population already covered either by government or private health insurance plans, and (3) the small percentage of employees with same-sex partners who sign up their partners for health insurance when it is offered by their employer.

Suppose that 50 percent of Hawaii's same-sex couples (1,962) decide to enter into civil unions. How many of the couples are already covered by health insurance? The U.S. Census Bureau estimated that during 2006-2007 around 91.5 percent of the population was covered by public or private health insurance (Table 8, Current Population Reports P60-235, August 2008). This means that the percentage of same-sex couples in which both parties have health insurance has a potential range of 83.7 percent (1,642 couples) to 91.5 percent (1,795 couples). The estimated number of same-sex couples in which only one party of the two parties has health insurance is 166 couples.³

Suppose that all employers offering health insurance to one of the partners of these 166 same-sex couples offers it to spouses and civil union partners. How many of the civil union partners will accept the health coverage? Studies of the experience with civil

unions and same-sex marriage in other states show that few parties to civil unions or same-sex spouses adjust their health insurance coverage after they marry or enter into civil unions. The primary reason is that federal tax law imposes huge burdens on such choices, as the lack of federal recognition for civil unions and same-sex marriages imposes taxes on otherwise untaxed premiums paid by employers for non-spouse partners who are added to a worker's healthcare plan. Lee Badgett, Research Director at the Williams Institute, UCLA School of Law and Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Massachusetts, and Mercer Human Resources Consulting have both independently found "that less than 1% of employees with a same-sex partner sign up for domestic partner benefits when a company offers them." If we apply the Massachusetts experience to the 166 same-sex couples in which one party has health insurance and the other does not, we would expect that two couples would accept coverage from a partner. While this estimate is surely too low, it indicates that passage of civil unions in Hawaii would not substantially increase the percentage of the population covered by health insurance or substantially increase expenditures on public and private insurance.

Conclusions

- A reasonable expectation from the experience of other states enacting civil
 unions is that the State of Hawaii's adjustment to the passage of civil union
 legislation will be smooth and will cost little.
- There is potential for a small but significant increase in visitor arrivals and spending by same-sex couples from other states recognizing civil unions who travel to Hawaii to enter into civil unions.
- Passage of civil union legislation is unlikely to lead to substantial increases in the percentage of the state's population covered by public and private health insurance or health care expenditures by public and private employers.
- Passage of civil union legislation is unlikely to result in substantial changes in revenues from the state income tax but will produce additional revenues from marriage registration fees and the state's gross excise tax.

For the thirty five years my partner and I have spent together we have needed to be very careful to use all legal means available to us to ensure that our finances and obligations to each other were clearly arranged so as to mimic the rights and obligations of marriage. This was expensive and at times complicated. We needed the services of attorneys to arrange that which was automatically granted to opposite sex couples. While we were lucky to have had good education to assist us in the process, many people we know did not have either the money or the knowledge to wade through the process. Equality of access should be available to all Hawaii residents.

In my thirty year career in critical care/emergency nursing on Kauai I witnessed several instances in the death situation or extreme trauma where the meticulous plans of committed same sex couples were disregarded and disrespected by family members. Hospital staff usually bowed to the loudest voice in the room. Without clear legal protections and expectations the remaining partner was denied what everyone else takes for granted.

Whether in opposite or same sex relationships, all citizens wishing to establish stable and committed unions should receive equal respect and be afforded the opportunity to shoulder equal responsibilities.

My name is Hiroshi Douglas Matsuoka and I am a straight, 57 year old, lifelong resident of Hawaii. I've been married once and have been in a couple of subsequent marriage-like situations although I wasn't legally married. By the way, I'm still good friends with my exwife and ex-girlfriends. And I'm still heterosexual.

I think much of the controversy surrounding civil unions has to do with the issues regarding heterosexuality and homosexuality.

Although the tradition of marriage has to do with the production of offspring and assumed the union of heterosexual couples, there is no statute requiring that married couples be heterosexual. Otherwise, more than a blood test would be required. People marry for a variety of reasons, and people can also engage in sexual activity without being married to one another. These facts find accommodation under current statutes.

Marriage is about two adults who consciously enter into an exclusive mutual agreement regarding rights and obligations and declare that agreement to the civil authorities under the laws of the land. As I grow older the importance of forming such a mutual arrangement becomes more important as matters of sexual orientation becomes less important. Why should I or anyone else be limited to someone of a particular gender to fulfill this important role?

HB444 takes no position on sexual orientation, is consistent with the current marriage laws, and would benefit the community as a whole.

Dear Chair Karamatsu and members of the Committee:

I respectfully submit this testimony in <u>strong support of HB 444</u>. I am an attorney licensed in Hawai'i and New York. The experience which informs my support of this bill includes the following:

I have worked as clerk of the health committee in the State Senate; for the Queen Liliuokalani Children's Center, the Hawai'i and New York Legal Aid Societies; the Hawai'i Anditor's Office; 7 years as the director of the affirmative action program/assistant professor of law at the William S. Richardson School of Law; and 11 years at the Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission. I testify as an individual only and not as a representative of any of the foregoing entities.

My experience has taught me that the civil liberties guaranteed in both the Federal and State Constitutions, and in case law, must encompass the right of persons, irrespective of sexual orientation, to join in a civil union with full rights and duties of marriage. I will not give a lengthy legal justification for this conclusion; I leave that to law scholars.

However, I think it is telling, indeed, that civil unions and domestic partnership laws in the United States are <u>now recognized</u> in at least <u>8 states</u>, (including the District of Columbia): Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, New Hampshire, Maine, Washington, Oregon, and the District of Columbia. Further, another (Massachusetts) legally permits same-sex marriage. Same sex unions are now being seriously considered in <u>another 7 states</u>: Illinois, Maryland, New Mexico, New York, Rhode Island, California, and Hawai'i. Accordingly, <u>16 states</u>, including the District of Columbia, have already adopted or are close to adopting legislation or court vindication, similar to HB 444.

The trend for civil unions is both national and global. Among the more prominent nations that recognize civil unions and related laws are: Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Israel, Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.

Hawai'i must join in with all these States and nations, as granting simple justice to all who wish to join in civil unions. As the very phrase, "Aloha State", implies, this State stands for tolerance and acceptance. Those principles underlie the heart of this bill.

The voters spoke in November 1998. We said no to same-sex marriage. HB 444 would institute same-sex marriage with another name, but no essential difference. Why are you disregarding the will of the people of Hawaii?

The HB 444 as written says:

"§ -9 Same benefits, protections, and responsibilities as

8 marriage. Partners to a civil union lawfully entered into

9 pursuant to this chapter shall have all the same rights,

10 benefits, protections, and responsibilities under law, whether

11 derived from statutes, administrative rules, court decisions,

12 the common law, or any other source of civil law, as are granted

13 to spouses in a marriage validly entered into pursuant to

14 chapter 572."

How then is this proposed civil union any different from marriage? There is no difference according to HB 444. Same-sex civil unions will have de facto marital status.

Democracy means that every citizen has a right to an opinion and a right to vote (unless you're in jail), but democracy does not mean that everyone is entitled to get things their way. When everyone gets everything their way, that's anarchy. When the will of a few overrides the will of the many, that's oligarchy.

Just prior to 11:30 am today (Feb 4), a University bulletin was circulated at Brigham Young University Hawaii under the subject "Strongly Opposing HB444." Reasoning from the teachings of BYUH's sponsoring church, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, it asked those receiving the email to oppose HB444. Although the message correctly acknowledged that the church had not actually taken a position on the issue and that any action should be taken as individuals rather than church members, the message (at least from my point of view) misrepresented the church's position on civil rights for gay and lesbian individuals/couples generally (which is that the church has no opposition to such rights as long as marriage itself is defined as between a man and a woman). The email bulletin message did not identify who was asking the campus community to oppose HB444.

At 1:56 pm., a bulletin was sent around clarifying that "We were asked by lobbyists to share the included information for those interested in providing testimony. The language of the original e-mail was modified and the intent was to provide information for those that wanted to participate or provide testimony" -- again without an identification of who "we" was (whether university administration or email bulletin administrators, for example).

In any event, though regret that I saw the emails too late to make the 2 pm deadline, I simply want to register my SUPPORT FOR HB444 as a resident of Hawaii, Laie, and the BYUH community.

My name is Brooks G. Bays, Jr. I am a resident of Honolulu, and would like to express my support for House Bill 444 (Civil Unions).

My life partner, James R Ness, died five years ago from complications of lupus and cerebral vasculitis. It was not unexpected, which did not make it less crushing. Although we were together richer and poorer; in sickness and in health; loving, honoring, and cherishing each other; and forsaking all others until death did us part, in the eyes of the law we were nothing more than friends or business partners. Although we had jumped through all the legal hoops we could, setting up powers of attorney and joint accounts and living wills and other legal documents, they still provided only a fraction of the legal protections our married brothers and sisters take for granted. The process was burdensome and stressful, and was still incomplete when he died. If we could have had a civil union that provided those protections all at once, it would have been a great help and comfort.

We were considered "lucky" that his doctors treated me as a member of his family, allowing me to participate in his care more completely, which reduced his stress and helped me to help him. I was considered "lucky"

when, on the night he died, the emergency medical team treated me with respect and sympathy - as more than just a housemate. I was "lucky" that because his family respected our relationship, they did not try to challenge his will, or try to turn me out of the house we built - out of the home we made. Despite all that "luck" I was still unable to get answers from the coroner's office because I was "not a family member" and so had to rely on his parents for information.

I do not pretend that civil unions are marriage, and I respect that there are those who wish to reserve the word "marriage" for mixed-sex couples. I do believe, however, that our relationship was as deserving of protection and support as are our brothers' and sisters' mixed-sex relationships.

Supporting couples who love and care for each other strengthens the family, and strengthens society as a whole.

I appreciate your time in considering my comments, and I appreciate the great honor in being able to participate in this process.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify before this committee. My name is Nicole Silver and I am writing to express my support for House Bill 444 - Civil Unions. I believe that all people should be treated equally under the law and this is something required by our Constitution. HB 444 extends the same rights, benefits, protections, and responsibilities of spouses in a marriage to partners in a civil union.

I still remember the summer of 1994 when my dad, sister and I drove seven hours from Delaware to Boston to witness my uncle and his partner bound together in a church ceremony. My uncle's church was actually the first non-gay church in Boston to officiate a gay wedding. The wedding may not have been legal at the time but it was one of the happiest moments in my uncle's life. My father still tears up when he thinks back to how excited and proud his brother was on that day. Although there was some debate about whether to hold the ceremony among the church members, most of them attended the ceremony to show their support for their union. My uncle was an active and appreciated member in the church as their treasurer and youth educational director.

Unfortunately, not every day in my uncle's life was as happy as that one. After receiving his masters of education he went to teach high school in Bennington, VT. When a parent found out he was gay, he wasn't directly fired but his life was made quite uncomfortable by his employers and co-workers and he felt he had to leave VT. He moved to Boston because he felt it was a more open-minded community and there met the man he would eventually wed. One of his regrets in life was being unable to adopt a child with his partner, but it wasn't even an option they could consider at that time because of public opinion.

Civil unions are supported by the majority of the public, President Obama, and the majority of the Hawaii House of Representatives. Dear Rep. Oshiro and Members of the Judiciary Committee:

I urge you to vote NO on HB 444 and NOT to pass the said Bill out of this Committee.

No matter how the relationship is couched in HB 444, THE SAID BILL IS SIMPLY A "MARRIAGE" between to 2 persons no less. The effect of HB 444 is to destroy the nuclear family with the consequent destruction of society itself. This is so because marriage between a man and a woman, with its attendant benefits and obligations will be rendered meaningless, and HB 444 will encourage other relationships to the detriment of traditional marriage, i.e. between a man and a woman.

The passage of HB 444 flies in the face of the voters of Hawaii who just recently voted 70 to 30 to preserve marriage between a man and a woman. The changing of the wording of marriage to "civil unions" insults the will of the people of Hawaii.

The prescient words of Judge Walter Heen (dissenting judge in the landmark case of Baehr v. Lewin (later Miike), should serve as an admonition to this committee when it considers HB 444,

"This court should not manufacture a civil right which is unsupported by any precedent, and whose legal incidents — the entitlement of statutory benefits (conferred upon unmarried persons through a certification system) will reach beyond the right to enter into a legal marriage and overturn long standing public policy encompassing other areas of public concern. This decision will have far-reaching and grave repercussions on the finances and policies of the governments and industry of this state and all the other states in the country."

The passage of HB 444 will have the following consequences, among other consequences, (this list is not exhaustive of a myriad of religious, moral, societal and economic considerations):

- 1. It will destroy the importance of marriage between a man and a woman as a social institution, thereby destroying the very fabric of society and civilization.
- 2. It will discriminate against and violate the religious beliefs and freedom of conscience of many Christians, Jews, and Muslims, and others who believe marriage to be the union of opposite sex couples, and no other relationship should supplant or supplement that ideology.
- 3. It will leave children vulnerable to the whims of adults who cannot provide, generally speaking, a stable environment which a traditional married couple can.

4. It will encourage persons to push for other relationships, such as polygamous marriages, because the very definition of "marriage" takes on a different meaning.

There have been numerous studies conducted to determine the effects on married couples, children and society at large where the institution of marriage has been weakened such as "no fault" divorce. The devastating impact on children has been noted especially. A strong correlation has been found between the family breakup and child homelessness, drug abuse among the young, the physical abuse and neglect of babies and children, high rates of teenage pregnancy and a continuing cycle of broken relationships. Clearly, once traditional marriage becomes marginalized or rendered irrelevant with the passage of HB 908, the seeds of destruction of society will have been sown.

A recent U.S. District Court ruling (February 23, 2007) in Lexington,

Massachusetts, if left standing, will have profound effect elsewhere where civil unions or

same sex marriage are recognized. David Parker, et. al., Plaintiffs v. William Hurley, et.

al. Defendants, C.A. No. 06-10751-MLW. In that decision, the District Court judge

dismissed the lawsuit of concerned parents of public school children, who have been

forced to learn that "normalizing homosexuality to young children is 'reasonably related

to the goals of preparing students to become engaged and productive citizens in our

democracy." "It is reasonable for public educators to teach elementary school students

about individuals with different sexual orientations and about various forms of families,

including those with same-sex parents, in an effort to eradicate the effects of past

discrimination, to reduce the risk of future discrimination and, in the process, to reaffirm

our nation's constitutional commitment to promoting mutual respect among members of our diverse society."

The District Judge further held that the parents of the school children cannot have their children opt out of the curriculum teaching the "normalization of homosexuality." Instead, he gave a "TAKE OR LEAVE IT" stance. He said if the parents don't like it, they can send their children to private schools that do not teach the normalization of homosexuality or to teach their children at home.

If your committee passes HB 444 out of committee, and if HB 444 is passed as law, it will be only a few years when what happened in Lexington, Massachusetts may become a reality in Hawaii, i.e. parents of public school children will not be able to "opt" their children out of classes teaching the so called normalization of homosexuality even though such teaching contravenes the religious beliefs of the parents and their school children. Moreover, the "forced" teaching of the normalization of homosexuality may cause teachers to file lawsuits against the State DOE because their religious beliefs too will be infringed.

Once again, I urge you to vote NO on HB 444, and not pass the said Bill out of committee.

Dear Representatives of the Judiciary Committee:

I am strongly opposed to the proposed Civil Union HB 444 for the following reasons.

As an attorney who believes in democracy and a government for the people and by the people, I was disappointed to see that so many legislators in the House have ignored the will of the people and have co-sponsored a discriminatory bill, particularly one that contains many legal defects. Over a decade ago, we, the people of Hawaii, voted by an overwhelming seventy percent against allowing a plurality of the justices on the Hawaiii Supreme Court in Baehr vs. Lewin to determine that same-sex marriage would be the law of the land. We trusted you and the democratic process over the Court and voted to give you, the Legislature, the authority to define marriage.

Consistent with the will of the people, you passed legislation that defined marriage as the union of one man and one woman. You also passed legislation to give reciprocal beneficiary rights to unmarried persons.

Unlike the Civil Union bill before this legislature, the Reciprocal Beneficiaries law is non-discriminatory because it gives benefits to unmarried persons, including relatives and same-sex couples. While the benefits under the Reciprocal Beneficiaries bill may be less than those given to married couples, the answer is not to pass a discriminatory bill, like the Civil Union bill, but to enact laws which expand the benefits given to reciprocal beneficiaries. Unlike the Civil Union bill, the Reciprocal Beneficiaries law is morally neutral; it does not judge or favor one type of relationship/behavior over another. Why should the Legislature enact discriminatory and morally controversial laws, like the Civil Union bill, when improving the non-discriminatory, morally neutral Reciprocal Beneficiaries law would achieve the same just outcome for all unmarried couples?

Once again, we ask that you heed the voice of the people of this state and to vote against same-sex marriage. In my view, because the civil union bill mirrors the marriage laws of this state, a civil union is same-sex marriage — it simply has a different name.

Credible research confirms that children do best with two opposite-sex parents, and that the absence of a father or a mother can make a lasting difference in a child's development. Children of a same-sex relationship could be permanently deprived of a legal mother or a legal father and an opposite sex role model.

Furthermore, as a family law attorney, I was surprised at the number of legal defects in this poorly drafted bill. For example, the Civil Union bill appears to allow Civil Unions between a great grandparent and a great grandchild, although such relationships are not allowed between parent and child, or between grandparents and grandchild. And the list of defects go on and on.

According to the Department of Health, since 1997, there have been approximately 1,577 reciprocal-beneficiary relationships, or about 131 per year. Is there a pressing need to pass a legally flawed bill?

Our state and country are facing an economic crisis of epic proportions. We should focus on solving our pressing economic problems rather than using our limited resources to redefine marriage contrary to the express will of the people.

The devastating impact on children has been noted especially. A strong correlation has been found between the family breakup and child homelessness, drug abuse among the young, the physical abuse and neglect of babies and children, high rates of teenage pregnancy and a continuing cycle of broken relationships. Clearly, once traditional marriage becomes marginalized or rendered irrelevant with the passage of HB 908, the seeds of destruction of society will have been sown.

A recent U.S. District Court ruling (February 23, 2007) in Lexington, Massachusetts, if left standing, will have profound effect elsewhere where civil unions or same sex marriage are recognized. David Parker, et. al., Plaintiffs v. William Hurley, et. al. Defendants, C.A. No. 06-10751-MLW. In that decision,

the District Court judge dismissed the lawsuit of concerned parents of public school children, who have been forced to learn that "normalizing homosexuality to young children is 'reasonably related to the goals of preparing students to become engaged and productive citizens in our democracy." "It is reasonable for public educators to teach elementary school students about individuals with different sexual orientations and about various forms of families, including those with same-sex parents, in an effort to eradicate the effects of past discrimination, to reduce the risk of future discrimination and, in the process, to reaffirm our nation's constitutional commitment to promoting mutual respect among members of our diverse society."

The District Judge further held that the parents of the school children cannot have their children opt out of the curriculum teaching the "normalization of homosexuality." Instead, he gave a "TAKE OR LEAVE IT" stance. He said if the parents don't like it, they can send their children to private schools that do not teach the normalization of homosexuality or to teach their children at home.

If your committee passes HB 444 out of committee, and if HB 444 is passed as law, it will be only a few years when what happened in Lexington, Massachusetts may become a reality in Hawaii, i.e. parents of public school children will not be able to "opt" their children out of classes teaching the so called normalization of homosexuality even though such teaching contravenes the religious beliefs of the parents and their school children. Moreover, the "forced" teaching of the normalization of homosexuality may cause teachers to LAW OFFICE OF JOHN

file lawsuits against the State DOE because their religious beliefs too will be infringed.

Once again, I urge you to vote NO on HB 444, and not pass the said Bill out of committee.

Thank you for allowing me to submit this testimony rather than appear in person before your committee. I live on the neighbor island of Maui, and will be attending class that day at Maui Community College. My testimony is in support of House Bill 444 - Relating to Civil Unions.

My reciprocal beneficiary (what a mouthful!) and I have been together for almost 17 years. We have already experienced the pain and humiliation of not being allowed access to each other during emergency hospital situations. Not only was this shocking and hurtful, it was also at the expense of my partner's health as I had the knowledge and ability to inform emergency personnel of the different medications she was being administered at that time. When I mentioned this to hospital staff, I was told that I would be allowed to inform her family, whenever they were able to arrive from the East Coast, and they in turn would apprise the medical staff. Fortunately for us, my partner regained consciousness, heard my pleas to staff and requested that they allow me access to her emergency room. Score 1 for having a loud voice.

So often, I read and hear people say, "You don't need special rights; you can just visit with an attorney and draw up all of the necessary paperwork to protect one another." Oh, if it was only that easy and believe me, there's nothing special about what we are trying to attain. In the aforementioned scenario, would I have even had access to (think safety deposit box) or the wherewithal to grab the necessary paperwork prior to rushing to the hospital? What about during vacations? Do you travel with all of your important paperwork?

There is also a HUGE amount of financial costs associated with us not being equal to our heterosexual counterparts. There is, of course, the inability to file joint taxes, but that is merely the tip of the iceberg. Unless President Obama is planning on saving social security by using all gay and lesbian contributions towards the general populace, I find it quite unfair that neither one of us can receive each other's social security benefits upon the death of the other.

Here's another example: My partner has approximately \$50K in a pension from a former employer. Were she to pass on tomorrow, that money, then destined for a spouse only, would return to the pension fund.

In addition, under the State of Hawaii's current reciprocal benefits program, I am now covered under her health plan, but if she were to lose her job, I will not have access to

COBRA. What ever will I do if this occurs? With the economy being in the state it currently is, believe me when I say I am losing sleep over this. Just yesterday I read about the possibility of COBRA being expanded under the new federal stimulus package. I marvel at what great news that is for some, but unfortunately, not all of our peoples. And I am tired of not being part of that inclusive 'all.'

I could go on and on about the inequality and unfairness that is currently accepted by our society in this regard. Suffice it to say that this is the civil rights issue of our generation. Personally, I believe Hawaii will return to the forefront on this issue, just as it was back in 1993.

Please, follow your conscience and include ALL of us in our diverse society. I respectfully ask that you support HB 444.

However, in the pursuit of this dream I am faced with unique worries. I worry that I will not be able to adopt a child if my partner and I have no legal relationship, and no way of forming one. I worry that if I choose to have children myself, that my partner will not be able to act as their guardian. I want to start a family someday, yet I feel daunted by the obstacles set in my way.

I believe it is unfair that I should have these worries because my partner is of the same sex. All citizens deserve the same opportunities for happiness, regardless of race, sex, religion, or sexual orientation. I believe that providing legal benefits for committed same-sex couples will help to achieve this. I ask for you to support equal rights for families by supporting House Bill 444.

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IN SUPPORT OF MARRIAGE EQUALITY

I am a Hawaii citizen and public high school teacher of 18 years, living in Maui. My grandfather, a Pearl Harbor submarine gunner, fought in WWII to defend Hawaii while under attack. My father and uncle witnessed the attack, and they with my grandmother were evacuated from the islands during the war. In defending our nation, my grandfather fulfilled his duty, believing in the righteousness of our country's systems. He would have hoped that his own grandson would inherit our constitution's guarantee of equal protection under the laws.

In 1998, Hawaii's Judge Chang ruled that I had the right to marry my loved-one. Then the clerks were prevented from issuing licenses until our Hawaii constitution was amended through political opposition. Through this amendment, majority of voters took away my rights. This mean-spirited action, which catered largely to views supported by religious preferences, ought to have been disallowed for constitutional reasons. Minority rights ought to have been protected and preserved as the courts attempted to do, as Judge Chang ruled correctly. The politicians understood that, but quietly ignored acknowledging it. This experience was hurtful and very upsetting. Most people never even fully understood the actual argument- that it involved discrimination on the basis of sex. -that a woman is equally qualified as a man to fulfill the role of spouse to a woman.

In 2004 I flew to San Francisco and married my love-one there at City Hall on a Tuesday morning. I shared my happiness afterward with my family as well as with my students and friends at school. Six months later my marriage was forcibly annulled by the California courts. That was very humiliating and depressing.

In 2008, the California Supreme Court approved same-sex marriage. Although the voters there later amended their constitution, as was done here in Hawaii, that action is being challenged in their courts right now. – Why? – BECAUSE A MAJORITY OF VOTERS IS NOT ALLOWED TO REMOVE CIVIL RIGHTS FROM A MINORITY GROUP, AND IN CALIFORNIA, THEY WILL NOT GET AWAY WITH IT. The truth will prevail eventually in California, and everywhere else, and then Hawaii will have to face up to the mistake made 10 years ago.

You can begin correcting the wrongful practices of Hawaii's past right now. Please restore my right to equal protection, so that I can finally live in peace and pridefully live up to the promise of America that my grandfather fought to preserve forever.

I am opposed to the proposed House of Representative Bill No. 444 regarding civil unions. This bill "mirrors" our current marriage law. It is simply an attempt by some to pass same- sex marriage legislation under another name.

Seventy percent (70%) of Hawaii's voters along with myself voted against allowing same sex-marriage to be recognized in Hawaii. That vote was in response to the ruling by the Hawaii Supreme Court in **Baehr v. Lewin**, which was found unacceptable to the majority of the voters. This was a clear mandate to the Legislature to limit marriage to the union between a man and woman.

I wanted to take this moment to write a letter sharing my opposition to HBB 444, regarding Civil Union for the following reasons:

The people have spoken. In 1998, the people of Hawaii sent a clear message that marriage in Hawaii must remain between one man and one woman.

Hawaii already has a reciprocal beneficiary law. In 1997 the Reciprocal Beneficiary Act HRS §572C (RBA) became law. This law allows two persons who are legally prohibited from marrying one another under state law to register their reciprocal beneficiary relationship by filing a notarized declaration with the state director of health.

Those who would redefine marriage often insist that the only necessary qualification for marriage is "love." Yet if one accepts that rationale, then there can logically be no boundaries as to what constitutes marriage; any combination or number of consenting individuals must ultimately gain the same legal and societal sanction as traditional marriage. While love is vital, it is not the definitional element of marriage. We love many people we do not marry.

Traditional marriage and family should not be undermined. The data is clear and irrefutable - children do best in stable, healthy homes with both a mom and dad. Hawaii's children must have healthy examples. Today, with 25 million children fatherless, it is callous to the extreme to be rewriting our most basic marriage laws to suit the desires of adults.
