#### RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

House Bill No. 991, H.D. 2, establishes a Hawaii Medical Doctor Loan program that would provide financial support to students who complete a State-approved medical school program at the University of Hawaii, or graduates of a medical school who have received medical training from a Hawaii-based medical program. Graduates that agree to practice in rural areas of the State would be eligible for the program. The program would be financed by the Hawaii Medical Doctor Loan program revolving fund created by this bill. House Bill No. 991, H.D. 2, appropriates unspecified sums from the general fund each year of the biennium for deposit into the revolving fund to carry out the program.

As a matter of general policy, this department **does not support** the creation of any special or revolving fund which does not meet the requirements of Sections 37-52.3 and 37-53.4 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Special or revolving funds should: 1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. It is difficult to determine whether the fund will be self-sustaining.

Chairs Ige and Tokuda and Committee Members:

My name is Jackie Boland and I'm an Associate State Director for AARP Hawaii. AARP is a membership organization of people 50 and older with nearly 160,000 members in Hawaii. We are submitting testimony in support of HB 991, HD2 which establishes the Hawaii Medical Doctor Loan Repayment Program for University of Hawaii medical school graduates and medical school graduates with training from a Hawaii-based medical program working in rural areas of the state.

It is no secret that Hawaii experiences a critical shortage of physicians and that the problem is getting worse as doctors retire or leave the islands. This is a measure that would help to address the growing problem of physician shortages in the state, especially in rural areas and on the neighbor islands. We believe the situation will only worsen with the health care needs of Hawaii's aging population. AARP notes that the number of people age 65 and older in the state is projected to grow by about 86% in the next two decades. Our own AARP members on the neighbor islands report that they are having trouble getting care when they need it.

AARP believes that all individuals have a right to health care services and that government has the responsibility to develop a system that ensures access to health care services for all individuals. This should include physical and mental health services with special consideration to ensuring access for minorities, people with disabilities and those who reside in medically underserved communities.

We urge you to pass this measure that would support physician recruitment and retention in underserved areas in Hawaii.
