Relating to Emergency Contraceptives for Sexual Assault Survivors


This would greatly help prevent pregnancies from victims of sexual assault, which is a tremendously traumatic incident by itself.

Testimony in Support of House Bill 991 RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

The Hawaii Primary Care Association urges your support for this bill. We believe loan repayment programs are a very powerful tool for recruiting and retaining health care professionals in underserved areas. It is all too apparent that Hawaii has a crying need for such a program at this time.

We would like to request the following change to the bill in §304A-A:

"There is created the Hawaii medical doctor loan program to be administered by the University of Hawaii, to provide financial support to students who graduated from a school of medicine with training based in Hawaii [complete a state-approved medical school program at the University of Hawaii] and who agree to practice in rural areas of the State, as designated by the University of Hawaii."

This preference is appropriate as Wai'anae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, in partnership with an accredited Medical school in Arizona, is also offering medical training with a focus on developing physicians oriented toward delivering primary care in a community health center-based setting. We greatly respect JABSOM but believe that these additional candidates should also be prioritized for loan repayment.
