Representative Hanohano and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) is willing to work together with the Judiciary and all county Police Departments to evaluate any problem regarding warrants and to develop a realistic plan to resolve any issue that exits. PSD had over 75,000 warrants on file in 2003, however, today there are approximately 35,000. Of those approximately 35,000 warrants, approximately 900 felony warrants are issued every year including Grand Jury warrants, Parole warrants, Intake Service warrants and Drug Court warrants. The bulk of the remainder are traffic warrants. All agencies work hand in hand to ensure that when an inquiry is made by an officer of an individual, the officer has instant verification of any outstanding warrant, on a 24/7 basis.
