HCR 217/HR 187 Requesting the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents to Develop Plans for a Scholarship Program for Hawai'i Residents to Study Abroad

Chair Chang, Chair Manahan and Members of the Committees:

The University understands and values the importance of our students, in particular those who are Hawai'i residents, studying abroad as both ambassadors of the United States and the State of Hawai'i as well as recipients of a broader worldview in an increasingly globalized society. While the University supports the idea of encouraging resident students to study abroad, we instead would like to suggest that the resolution request the UH campuses with study abroad programs to study the feasibility of creating such a scholarship, augmenting an existing scholarship for study abroad students, or exploring alternative avenues for funding.

The reasons for the request are:

- Students who study abroad have access to some funds. They can retain their
 financial aid if they have financial need or augment their aid due to increased study
 abroad costs. They also have access to apply for several sources of funding, such
 as the national Gilman funds or national Freeman funds to study in Asia, Freeman or
 Honda funds (if UH community college students), and federal Foreign Language and
 Area Studies (FLASS) funds. UH Manoa students currently have access to some
 study abroad scholarships at UHM as well.
- 2. The resolution as written only reflects UH Manoa students, and those Manoa students who study through the UH Manoa Study Abroad Center. In fact, UH Manoa students can also study abroad through various other mechanisms, such as through international exchanges, where students pay the UH tuition and then attend tuition-free at the international partner university. UH Manoa actually has 61 such options for students and is very cost-effective. Furthermore, the UH system offers study abroad options through Kapiolani Community College and Leeward Community College, both of which have very active study abroad communities.
- 3. The UH Board of Regents has a comprehensive financial assistance program, created in 2006, which provides for an increase of financial aid and scholarships for students. The program in particular increases aid for Hawai'i resident students, in keeping with the University's mission and strategic goals. It also allows for campuses to develop their own scholarships based on financial need or merit/service, and certainly could allow for the creation or increase of study abroad scholarships, should it be a strategic priority for the campus.
- 4. Since the creation of a study abroad scholarship is not currently one of the UH Board of Regents approved priorities, we remain concerned about the cost implications generated by this proposal, in light of budget challenges and varying priorities.

Thank you for this opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of the University of Hawai'i.

REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII BOARD OF REGENTS TO DEVELOP PLANS FOR A SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR HAWAII RESIDENTS TO STUDY ABROAD.

WHEREAS, a National Geographic global literacy survey found that 87 percent of students in the United States between the ages of 18 and 24 cannot locate Traq on a world map, 83 percent cannot find Afghanistan, 58 percent cannot find Japan, and 11 percent cannot even find the United States; and

WHEREAS, according to the Coalition for International Education, institutions of higher education in the United States are struggling to graduate enough students with the language skills and cultural competence necessary to meet the current demands of business, government, and educational institutions; and

WHEREAS, through the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001 et seq.), the United States Congress recognized that the security, stability, and economic vitality of the nation in an increasingly complex global age depends largely upon having a globally competent citizenry and the availability of experts who specialize in world regions and foreign languages; and

WHEREAS, with today's increasingly complex trade relations, concern for the preservation of our global environment, and the constant goal of world peace, international education becomes increasingly important to our national security, foreign policy, economic competitiveness, and capacity for tolerance; and

WHEREAS, educating students through study abroad programs is an important way to share the values of Hawaii and the United States, to create goodwill for Hawaii and the United States around the world, and to work toward a peaceful global society; and

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WHEREAS, study abroad programs help students from Hawaii to be more informed about the world and to develop the cultural awareness necessary to avoid offending individuals from other countries; and

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WHEREAS, study abroad programs not only open doors to foreign language learning, but also empower students to better understand themselves and others through a comparison of cultural values and ways of life; and

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WHEREAS, because tourism and foreign trade are key sectors of Hawaii's economic future, it is vital that this state promote mutual understanding between the people of Hawaii and citizens of other countries through international education programs; and



WHEREAS, Hawaii's educational institutions must continue to increase opportunities for local students to acquire the linguistic and intercultural skills needed to interact effectively within the changing multicultural context of the state; and

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WHEREAS, ensuring that the citizens of Hawaii are globally literate is the responsibility of Hawaii's educational system; and

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- WHEREAS, the University of Hawaii-Mamoa (UH-Mamoa) provides
16 study abroad programs in 11 different countries, and



WHEREAS, UH-Manoa provides scholarships for students who are United States citizens or restantations who achieve at least a 3.0 grade point average, but does not set aside scholarship moneys specifically for Hawaii residents to travel abroad; and

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WHEREAS, for a Hawaii resident, the cost of tuition for a semester-long study abroad program is estimated to be between \$4,000 and \$10,000 more expensive, depending on the program, than the cost of full time resident tuition at UH-Manoa; and

whereas, for a nonresident, the cost of tuition for a semester long study abroad program is estimated to be between \$500 less expensive to \$5,000 more expensive, depending on the program, than the cost of full time nonresident tuition at UH.

I am a University of Hawaii graduate (for both my BA, MA and Ph.D), a faculty member and Director of the Study Abroad Center Advisor. In my 19 years of service I have written numerous letters for former study abroad students who wish to pursue graduate education or who wish to apply for work in various areas such as business, social work, teaching, law, engineering, psychology, forensic science etc. I am proud to say that today many of them are all gainfully employed here in the State of Hawaii and are contributing to this great State.

All of the study abroad alumni have some very important traits in common. They all have completed their academic work and lived in different cultures with excellence. They have graduated on time. They have been able to build ties, develop friendships, and acquire a sense of cultural sensitivity and awareness. They have been able to develop the ability to see through the eyes of the peoples of other cultures and understand "their reality". In my opinion these are the very same qualities that one would need to become successful in the 21st century in order to successfully build alliances and facilitate vibrant working environments.

It is true that UH Manoa offers an education with a global perpsective. However, as many of our study abroad students can attest - course work and cross-cultural contact reinforce one another and that each has a way of highlighting the virtues of the other. Study Abroad offers them this opportunity. All of the graduates become valuable assets and will make many meaningful contributions to Hawaii's.

However, studying abroad does cost more than studying solely at UH Manoa. Currently students fund their programs through securing loans/grants through UHM finanical aid, and very little designated scholarship support. At the present time 464 students study abroad. Therefore, if we had a scholarship fund designated for our students to study abroad think how many more students would be able to study abroad and how much more the State of Hawaii would benifit as well. I am thus asking you humbly to act on HCR 217/HR 187.

I know the benefits firsthand of studying abroad and how important it is for Hawaii residents to get a more global experience. As an undergraduate at UHM, I was a local girl who had never really travelled much, and I dreamed of studying abroad. The primary obstacle for me was a lack of money. I, however, was fortunate enough to receive a UHM Scholarship specifically for study abroad, and that made all the difference. I was able to spend a semester in London, which was hands-down the best experience of my collegiate years. I studied Shakespeare in his birthplace and took an art course that utilized the many and varied museums of London. In addition to taking courses, I was able to experience a different culture and see things from a another perspective. The education I got on that UHM Study Abroad Center program went far beyond the classroom and really educated me for life.

I now have the privilege of advising UHM students who want to study abroad. For the vast majority of students that I advise, the primary factor standing in the way of them studying abroad is money. The UHM resident tuition is fairly low in comparison to the cost of attending school overseas on study abroad programs. We would like to be able to offer UHM residents scholarship monies to support their participation in UHM Study Abroad Center programs.

I am an associate professor at UHM and have had the privilege of serving as a resident faculty advisor for the the Florence, Italy program of UHM's Study Abroad in Spring 2007, where I taught two classes and kept a close eye on our group of ten bright-eyed Hawaii students. This semester was a wonderful, life-changing experience for them, and for me as well.

Study abroad is clearly a golden ticket to the world for Hawaii students. There is no doubt they come back wiser and with a strong feeling of their responsibilities as global citizens.

Our UHM Study Abroad program is truly exceptional, thanks to Director Sarita Rai and her wonderful staff. As a UH Professor of English for 30 years, and a former Resident Director for the London Study Abroad Program, I can attest first hand to the extraordinary impact of this program. Students have good reason to describe this as the most formative experience of their college years, and it should be made available to as wide a variety of students as possible. They return to Hawai'i with an understanding of the complex intersections between different parts of the world.
