I am Jeanne Ohta, Executive Director of the Drug Policy Forum of Hawai'i. Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in support of HCR 154/HR 124: REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO REVIEW ITS EFFORTS OF PROVIDING REENTRY SERVICES TO ALL INMATES RELEASED FROM CUSTODY.

Reentry programs can help reduce recidivism and therefore the amount of taxpayer money spent on incarceration. The Department of Public Safety must be held accountable for providing effective reentry services to all inmates released from custody. Approximately 90% of those incarcerated will be released back into the community. Successful reintegration should be a priority for the department.

Incarceration is extremely expensive. As more of the state budget is spent on incarceration, it is difficult to fund other priority areas such as education and health. It is the responsibility of the Department of Public Safety to help reduce costs by implementing effective programs that help people successfully transition from prison back into the community so that they do not return to prison.
