

SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENT

Good morning, Chair Kim, Vice Chair Tsutsui and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means. I am Faye Kennedy representing the Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus and submitting testimony in support of SB1103 SD1 which establishes a Commission on Effective Legislation, to be administratively placed under the Ombudsman. It requires the Commission to be composed of representatives from the Executive departments, University of Hawaii, Judiciary and other appropriate State entities to identify existing laws that are obsolete, redundant, conflicting, or ineffective. The measure requires the Ombudsman to report to the Legislature.

SUGGESTED AMENDMENT: The Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus agrees with the amendments made in SD1, however, would like to change the effective date to July 1, 2011 rather than 2070 "to facilitate further discussion." It's ironic that the Senate Judiciary Committee thinks it would take 61 years of further discussion to understand this measure.

The Legislature passes hundreds of bills each session. How does anyone know if those bills are being enforced and effective? And to what extend is law effective? Who is accountable? This bill would help to provide this information through a review of the laws in a systemic method and keep departments and officials accountable that the letter of the law is being enforced.

The Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus was established in 1981 and is a multi-partisan organization committed to increasing women's participation in the political process and increasing their representation in elected and appointed office. HWPC also supports male candidates committed to its goals. HWPC is dedicated to equality in employment, stopping all violence against women, and improving the health and well-being of women and families.

On behalf of the Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus, I urge your Committee to pass this measure with a more reasonable effective date. Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony in support of SB1103 SD1.
