
S.B. 1105, Relating to Legislative Hearings and Procedures

Testimony of Chiyome Leinaala Fukino, M.D. Director of Health

February 12, 2009, 9:30am

- 1 Department's Position: The Department of Health (DOH) believes we understand what this bill is
- 2 attempting to accomplish, but we are confused by its seemingly contradictory language. If this bill
- moves forward, we respectfully recommend that the ambiguities be clarified.
- 4 **Fiscal Implications:** Potentially significant but unquantified additional work load for both the executive
- 5 and legislative branches.
- 6 **Purpose and Justification:** Every year, the DOH prepares and submits approximately eighty reports to
- the Hawaii State Legislature. The DOH has the largest number of such reports across departments.
- 8 These reports are required of the department through statutory mandate, Act, resolution or budget
- 9 proviso. The DOH has been committed to providing reports that are informative, critically developed,
- and submitted in a timely manner to assist the Legislature in its charge. Generally speaking, the DOH is
- proud of its diligence and commitment to provide complete and comprehensive reports.
- In the preamble and in the new part being proposed, the bill speaks to "reports to the legislature
- of <u>studies and audits</u>, including annual reports." In a subsequent section the bill states that it does not
- apply to annual reports or reports of a "routine nature." We respectfully suggest that all statutorily
- mandated annual reports are, in fact, routine by design. In fact, the majority of the reporting DOH is

- required to do is routine. Audits and studies are most commonly done by the legislative auditor and the
- legislative reference bureau, not the executive agencies, so this measure would seem to primarily target
- those two legislative offices. They are included in the bill's mandate.
- The department suggests that language be developed that brings the intent of the measure more
- 5 closely into focus. Otherwise, the department suggests that the measure is potentially more cumbersome
- and confusing, especially since the Legislature has existing authority that it can and does exercise when
- 7 it currently requests briefings of departments, at will.

Good morning, Chair Taniguchi, Vice Chair Takamine and members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Government Operations. I am Faye Kennedy representing the Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus and submitting testimony in support of SB1105 which requires any report of a study or an audit made by an Executive department or agency, and by the Legislative Reference Bureau or Auditor, to be submitted to the Clerk of each House, Senate President, Speaker of the House, and Chairs of the appropriate subject matter committee of each house. It also requires a public hearing or informational briefing, except if waived by the President of the Senate. It excludes certain annual or routine reports.

This bill holds accountability by the Legislature to follow up on legislative studies, audits and reports that have been approved. It creates procedures for the filing and consideration of the reports, studies and audits and will minimize them from slipping through the cracks.

The Hawai'i Women's Political Caucus was established in 1981 and is a multi-partisan organization committed to increasing women's participation in the political process and increasing their representation in elected and appointed office. HWPC also supports male candidates committed to its goals. HWPC is dedicated to equality in employment, stopping all violence against women, and improving the health and well-being of women and families.

On behalf of the Hawaii Women's Political Caucus, I urge your Committee to pass this measure Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony in support of SB1105.
