This testimony is in support of Senate Bill 1263 (HB1499). Our coalition supporting this bill consists of 15 licensed tattooists, representing 10 shops, along with a number of health professionals and community members. As spokesperson for the coalition, I will briefly introduce myself. I am a professional tattooist who has been licensed in Hawai'i since 1992. Although I am a long-time resident of O'ahu, I primarily tattoo in California; thus I have no personal advantage or gain in these efforts, other than to see that tattooing her is practiced in a safe manner, and that both our Statutes and Departmental Rules and Regulations are reasonably up-to-date. I hold a Master's Degree in Anthropology from the University of Hawai'i and completed Ph.D coursework and fieldwork on the revitalization of tattooing in Polynesia (primarily French Polynesia and Rapa Nui). I have extensive experience in teaching hygienic tattooing in these and several other island groups.

In summary, our current tattoo statutes and regulations were written in 1981 and have been revised only very minimally. Currently there is no opportunity for temporary permits and licensing of tattooists, which makes conventions and demonstrations at museums and universities impossible. We have been quite active this last year in organizing the tattoo community to address this and other issues, hosting meetings, and compiling the concerns and viewpoints of the licensed tattooists in our state. Both Sucher and myself have also had numerous meetings with staff at the Sanitation Branch of DOH (our licensing agency) and with staff members in the Infectious Disease Branch, seeking their input. We feel that revision is necessary, and that temporary permits and licenses should be obtainable, but with specific safeguards to protect the health of both the tattoo community, and Hawaii's residents and visitors. SB1263 is based on a preliminary draft that myself and several others worked on over the course of the past year. Our draft accounted for the opinions of a number of professional tattooists and medical practitioners in Hawai'i, taking into consideration all necessary safeguards as well as practicalities.

As you know, SB1263 was passed by the HTH and CPC Committees, with amendments. Sen. Baker and Sen. Ige specifically asked that our coalition worth with Rex Mitsunaga, Director of the Department of Health and Sanitation (our regulatory branch of DOH) to include any revisions of the current Statute that they see as needed. I have met with Mitsunaga several times since the hearing, and have had near-daily e-mail contact in order to draft a revision that suits both their needs as well as those of the tattoo community. The final draft, unfortunately, was not approved by their Deputy AG in time for the last decking deadline. We will provide it at the hearing, or beforehand, if possible. I should make you aware, however, that the DOH must oppose the bill for other reasons, not on the grounds of it's content, as it has been a cooperative endeavor and does meet with their approval.

I am submitting this testimony in favor of Senate Bill 1263 (HB1299).

I am a Hawaii State licensed tattooer, board member, lecturer, editor and health instructor for the Alliance of Tattooists and board member, lecturer and journalist for the National Tattoo Association. I also write an information column on Safety and Professionalism in Tattooing for Oceanic Cable at www.aroundhawaii.com. I hold a bachelors degree from Purdue University. With over 28 years experience in the tattoo business I have seen a huge evolution of the industry in the last five years.

I have been very active with the coalition of tattooers of Hawaii working toward revising our very outdated regulations from 1981. Last year a bill was introduced that would have abolished nearly all regulations regarding tattooing and would allow conventions and gatherings to occur without any health related oversight from the DOH. With my experience as the (retired) Security Director for the National Tattoo Association conventions and my close involvement with the Alliance of Professional Tattooists Rendezvous convention, I understand how a safe and professional gathering MUST be conducted. With no oversight from both the event promoter AND the DOH, a gathering can be an extreme health risk to both the public in attendance and to the participants.

On the mainland, large tattoo events occur weekly and are quite frightening. With no established guidelines, an invasive procedure such as tattooing with possible exposure to blood borne pathogens the likelihood of cross-contamination poses a tremendous threat to all

present. It is our goal with SB 1263 to contain the scope of any such gatherings here in Hawaii. With a substantial registration fee and site overview from the DOH we hope to provide a safe haven for those wishing to participate. By limiting the number of tattooers present it is a manageable task unlike the large Tattoo Expos' I've witnessed with hundreds of tattooers, piercers, body brandings and suspension booths. It is our goal to limit conventions to a reasonable size (no more than 40 participants) with adequate safety precautions.

In this bill there are allowances for smaller, educational demonstrations to occur at locations such as the Bishop Museum, and Universities, provided the public is not being tattooed for monetary gain.

Many states with tattoo regulations have established guidelines for any gatherings outside of licensed and inspected shops, or are now addressing the issue and revising their regulations. I am traveling to Concord, NC this spring for the 30th National Tattoo Association Convention and our booth holders must present strict criteria to the DOH of NC in order to be temporarily licensed to practice their trade.

As Hawaii was one of the first states to regulate tattooing in 1981 we should again set a high standard for conventions and exhibitions. We've been fortunate to have input from numerous sources here in Hawaii, not only tattooers and body piercers but health practitioners, CDC representatives and our own Health Department. We do not take lightly our responsibility to our clients, the public and our fellow artists.

This bill has been passed by the HTH and the CPC Committees with amendments. The amendments are extremely important to truly represent the need to continue to provide safety and professionalism for our industry. I respectfully ask that you approve the bill and it's amendments.
