My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a community initiative working to improve conditions of confinement for our incarcerated individuals, enhance our quality of justice, and promote public safety. We come today to speak for the 6,000+ individuals whose voices have been silenced by incarceration, always mindful that more than 2,000 of those individuals are serving their sentences abroad, thousands of miles from their homes and loved ones.

SB 149 establishes a correctional industries work program to allow work lines to rehabilitate existing state-owned lo-income housing units and grounds.

Community Alliance on Prisons is in strong support of this measure. When Hawai'i sent our first 300 men to Texas, they built the prison there! Many incarcerated individuals have told us that they want to give back to the community and would love to build or refurbish housing and schools.

Any program that can help individuals acquire marketable job skills, especially in the construction trade because of the stimulus packages being presented in Hawai'i and at the federal level, is a great way to reduce recidivism and facilitates successful reentry.

Please pass SB 149.
