SUBJECT: SB 1679 – RELATING TO THE EMERGENCY AND BUDGET RESERVE FUND

The position and views expressed in this testimony do not represent nor reflect the position and views of the Departments of Health (DOH) and Human Services.

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **SUPPORTS SB 1679 with proposed amendments**. The purpose of the bill is to appropriate moneys from the emergency and budget reserve fund of the State of Hawaii to maintain the levels of programs determined to be essential to education, public health, and public welfare.

With respect to page 2, lines 1-16, the Council brings to your attention the shortfall projected for DD services in the current fiscal year. The amount stated as the projected shortfall is \$5.4 million. That amount included \$5 million for the Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program and \$400,000 for the Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program. DOH, DD Division's budget (HTH 501) for FY 2009 includes the elimination of the PICL Program and a reduction in services for individuals with DD/Mental Retardation (MR) in the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program. In addition, DD Division is experiencing a shortfall of \$267,420 for crisis services network for the current fiscal year.

The Council proposes the following two amendments for your consideration:

- 1. Incorporate the provisions of SB 422-Relating to Health into SB 1679. SB 422 addresses the reduction in funds for the DOH Respite Program.
- 2. Revise the appropriation amount from \$5.4 million to \$7,963,340 for FY 2010 and the same amount for FY 2011. That amount includes:
 - A. \$7 million for the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program,
 - B. \$500,000 for the PICL Program, and
 - C. \$463,340 for the DOH Respite Program (SB 422-Relating to Health).

Attached are information about the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program, DOH PICL Program, and DOH Respite Program to explain the above figures.

The Council is hopeful that the passage of the Economic Recovery and Reinvestment Act by Congress and signed by President Obama will provide Hawaii with some level of fiscal recovery. Hawaii will benefit from the proposed enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage. The increase in Federal reimbursements will result in a decrease in the State's share and would allow for State funds to be redirected to other priority areas not matched by Federal funds. This may include the DOH PICL and Respite Programs.

We appreciate your consideration of the proposed amendments and recognize that SB 1679 is a work in progress. We will continue to work with the Legislature on this measure throughout the session.

Thank you for the opportunity to present our testimony in support of and amendments to SB 1679.

Department of Health (DOH), Developmental Disabilities (DD) Division Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities/Mental Retardation (DD/MR)

- Provides individuals with DD/MR support and services that will enable them to live as independently as possible in the least restrictive environment. Services include:
 - Adult Day Health
 - Personal Assistance
 - Respite
 - Habilitation
 - Habilitation-Supported Employment
 - Skilled Nursing
 - Specialized Services
 - Personal Emergency Response
 - Non-Medical Transportation
 - Specialized Medical Equipment
 - Environmental Accessibility Adaptations
- An individual must be eligible for Medicaid and require Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded (ICF/MR) level of care.
- For FY 2008, 2,532 individuals were served, and \$107,145,000 was expended.
- DD Division will need about \$7 million more for FY 2010 in order to add 125 people into the waiver and continue level of services for those currently in the waiver.
- The budget remains at \$71million for FY 2010 and 2011.
- A letter from DOH, DD Division was mailed to over 2,500 participants in the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program to inform them of a reduction in services for individuals with DD/MR.
- Based on the State's economic conditions, DD Division "must reduce all participant services by 15% in order to sustain our system of supports and maintain services."
- To do that, DD Division asked participants to tell the Division where the individual could make the reductions.
- Individuals were asked to complete a Budget Reduction Worksheet that contained their monthly target budget for February to June 2009 and a list of services.
- The reduction in services began on February 1, 2009.
- Services that are affected include:
 - 1. All levels of Personal Assistance Habilitation (including Chore),
 - 2. Adult Day Health,
 - 3. Consumer Directed (including Chore),
 - 4. Skilled Nursing, and
 - 5. Respite.
- The reduction in services will impact individuals in receiving necessary personal assistance and other services to live independently in the community.
- Over 2,000 participants have completed and returned their budget reduction worksheets.
- DD Division has sent out Notice of Action letters to those participants that included information on their right to appeal the decision of DD Division.
- Over 250 participants have filed an informal appeal with DD Division. Informal hearings have been scheduled beginning January 30, 2009.

Department of Health (DOH) Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program

- Prior to the proposed elimination of the program, PICL's budget was \$1.4 million.
- A mandatory reduction of \$1.2 million was made in August 2008.
- Remaining \$200,000 was eliminated in the Governor's proposed budget for FY 2010 and FY 2011.
- Contracts with providers were terminated in December 2008.
- In accordance with Hawaii Revised Statutes, Section 333F-2(e), "...Only those
 individuals eligible for community services but not eligible for Medicaid waiver
 services or other federally reimbursed programs or for whom such services are
 not appropriate or not available based on their individual service plan shall
 receive services and supports with one hundred percent state funds."
- All participants, however, must first apply for Medicaid and the Developmental Disabilities/Mental Retardation (DD/MR) Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program prior to the receipt of any DD Division-funded services.
- The intent of PICL was to be a flexible source of funding to allow individuals to self-direct their supports to live in the community.
- For individuals with DD who are ineligible for Medicaid or any other federally-reimbursed services, PICL is their only source of support.
- Individuals receive services in the following cases:
 - 1. Pending determination for Medicaid waiver services;
 - 2. Medicaid eligible, but the Medicaid waiver or other program does not cover the service or item; or
 - 3. Ineligible for Medicaid or any other federally reimbursed services, but eligible to receive community services.
- Services include, but are not limited to:

Adaptive equipment

Adult community activities

Companionship

Clothina

Cleaning, kitchen, bathroom household supplies

Day program costs not covered by Medicaid waiver

Dental

Emergency supplies

Emergency placement supports

Legal services

Personal care items

Specialized youth program

Transportation

Technology supports

- Funding was limited (\$2,000 per referral), and referrals were on a first-come, first-served basis.
- For FY 2008, there were 1,404 referrals with \$1,153,519 expended.

Department of Health (DOH) Respite Program

The DOH Respite Program's budget has been administered under the Health Resources Administration (HRA). The budget has taken its share of reductions of \$375,872 during the past 18 years resulting in \$624,128 for the program. Below is the breakdown of the budget and its reductions.

During the past year, the budget was affected by the four percent legislative reduction (\$30,732), transfer of funds to cover the payroll shortage for HRA (\$16,165), and adjustment for personal services (\$4,419). Those reductions left the program with \$572,812, until the Governor's proposed adjustments to the Executive Budget Request for FY 2010 and FY 2011 included the deletion of \$412,024 for respite services. The total reduction in the respite budget is \$463,340. Current budget for respite services is \$160,788. That amount divided by each of the six program areas means \$26,798 for each target group. Information about the DOH Respite Program and impact of the reduction in the budget is included in the attached FACT SHEET.

FACT SHEET

Department of Health (DOH) Respite Program

What is Respite?

- Respite provides temporary relief for a family, which helps to preserve the family unit by
 decreasing the individual and family stresses associated with caregiving so that families
 can continue to care for their loved ones. It is beneficial not only for the family caregiver,
 but also for the child or adult with special needs. It allows the family to engage in daily
 activities, decrease a feeling of isolation, increase the ability to cope with daily caregiving responsibilities, and maintain stability during crisis situations.
- Respite provides substitute support for a child or adult with special needs in order to
 provide a period of relief or rest for the family caregiver. Respite can allow time for the
 family caregiver to address personal needs, other business, or an unexpected
 emergency.
- Respite is an important part of the continuum of services for families who care for an
 individual with special needs. This support for families prevents burnout of the caregiver
 and reduces the possibility for out-of-home placement.

Who Receives Respite?

Families caring for a family member who is:

- An infant or toddler three years of age or younger with a developmental delay
- A child or adult up to age 21 with a serious or terminal illness
- A child with a serious emotional disturbance
- A child or an adult with a developmental disability
- An adult with a serious mental illness

Who Provides Respite?

Currently, the Respite Program affords respite to the families of clients from six program areas of four divisions of DOH, per the intent of Act 324, SLH 1990. Each of these six program areas split the respite funds equally (approximately \$104,000 per program area - before budget reductions). In addition, the programs work together and have transferred funds between programs to cover shortfalls experienced by one or more of the other programs.

- Family Health Services Division Early Intervention Section (EIS) Provides respite support to families in two program areas medically fragile children or youth up to age 21 and infants and toddlers with developmental delays three years of age or younger.
- Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division (CAMHD) Provides respite support to families for children with a serious emotional disturbance.
- Developmental Disabilities Division (DDD) Provides respite support to families in two program areas – respite is available to families of individuals (children and adults) with developmental disabilities and/or mental retardation (DD/MR) who are <u>not</u> in the DD/MR Home and Community-Based Medicaid Waiver Program.
- Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD) Provides respite services via a single, statewide provider, Mental Health Kokua. A respite housing pilot was initiated that will present a valuable resource to families and providers in the community and a formal contract modification was completed. Due to the recent budget reduction of \$25 million

to the AMHD budget, the contract with Mental Health Kokua was terminated effective January 15, 2009. Respite funds were being used to supplement funds provided through the AMHD operating budget (approximately 25 percent of the total contract expenditures).

What are the Budget Expenditures for Fiscal Year 2008?

What is Extent of the Budget Reduction?

The respite program budget sustained a discretionary reduction for FY 09 of approximately \$51,316. The Governor's recommendation in the executive budget for the FB 2009-2011 further reduces the amount for respite by \$412,024, resulting in a total appropriation of \$160,788 to be shared among the six program areas.

What is the Impact of a Budget Reduction?

Overall, the budget reduction would have an adverse impact on the provision of respite for families and individuals with special needs. As respite is reduced, families will become more "at risk" for out-of-home placement, foster care, and possibly higher levels of care. In addition, it is more cost effective to provide respite funds to families than to pay for foster care or out-of-home placement if families are unable to care for their loved ones at home.

Family Health Services Division – Early Intervention Section (EIS) –

- A determination will need to be made as to whether to reduce the number of families served or reduce the respite hours per month.
- o The waitlist for respite services is expected to increase.
- Reduction in Federal grant funding general funds from the respite appropriation have been used as a "match" required to leverage the Federal Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention Grant.

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division (CAMHD) –

 Possible increases in out-of-home placements and higher levels of care, such as therapeutic foster care, community-based residential care, or hospital-based residential care, which are much more restrictive and costly.

Developmental Disabilities Division (DDD) –

- Allotments for respite services of children and adults would decrease, with a more significant reduction of respite allotment for Neighbor Islands.
- Anticipates that it will be receiving more requests for respite services that will exceed their annual portion, particularly from families who do not qualify for Medicaid, are not eligible for the DD/MR Medicaid Waiver Program respite services, or have had a reduction in respite services under the waiver program.

• Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD) -

O AMHD Respite services contract with Mental Health Kokua was terminated effective January 15, 2009. All consumers with open authorizations for respite as of January 1, 2009 were transitioned to AMHD Peer Coaching services that provide similar support for consumers and respite for caregivers delivered by a peer.

Purpose of Bill:

Appropriates moneys from the emergency budget and reserve fund to maintain levels of programs for education, human services, and health.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports Senate Bill 1679, as long as this appropriation would be additional funds and would not decrease our base budget. The Department would recommend to the Board of Education that any additional funds appropriated over and above the base budget approved by the Board, would be allocated to the Weighted Student Formula (WSF) for the most flexibility in supporting student achievement and providing needed services, supplies, and equipment to our students, including textbooks or other instructional materials. Schools would have more flexibility to contract for various therapist services as student needs were determined, or hire personnel for the school level supports to ensure all students are progressing academically, emotionally, physically, and socially. The flexibility in the use of WSF funds would provide the maximum ability to teach and support the whole child.

The Department supports Senate Bill 1679.

Chair Chun-Oakland and Chair Ige and Members of the Senate Committees on Human Services and Health, my name is Stella Wong and I am the Vice President of Programs at Catholic Charities Hawai'i. I am testifying in support of SB1679, relating to the EMERGENCY AND BUDGET RESERVE FUND.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH) is a tax exempt, non-profit agency that has been providing social services in Hawai'i for over 60 years. CCH has programs serving elderly, children, developmentally disabled, homeless and immigrants. Our mission is to provide services to the most vulnerable of the people in Hawai'i.

With the current economic situation, we see these numbers growing. There are more people coming to our food pantry and for emergency assistance. With funding cuts we probably will see a need to reduce services.

Losing one's job in many families with young infants adds much more stress. Programs such as Healthy Start play a critical role, pro actively, in facilitating positive parenting in stressful times. In addition, cuts to services for seniors and individuals with developmental disabilities place these populations at risk of institutionalization which is a cost that eventually becomes a taxpayer burden. Our "safety net" is getting very thin.

The safety net for all social services that affect our most vulnerable in the state is already stretched and will be in shreds if nothing is done. There will be many more people faced with health and safety issues that will cost the State more in the long run if we do not do what we can to maintain them in the community.

I'm sure I don't have to say it, "It's Raining". Please help restore programs to protect the most vulnerable in this State. I strongly urge your committee to pass SB 1679.

Healthy Start, Hawaii's nationally recognized and evidence-based child abuse prevention program is first cut 29% in FY 09 and then eliminated from the Governor's proposed budget for FY 10, FY 11. 4,000 families at risk of child abuse will have no alternative program if Healthy Start is gone. 200 employees in nonprofit organizations all over the state will lose their jobs costing an estimated \$2.5 million in unemployment costs.

Adults struggling with mental illness had their services reduced from 3 hours a week to 3 hours a month in a major budget cut from the Adult Mental Health Division. Many employees were laid off by the organizations that received these funding cuts.

A 15% cut to services to the developmentally disabled has been announced for February 1, 2009.

How much further can we erode the services to these at risk populations before we are facing tragedies due to child abuse, suicides, or other serious problems?

Child & Family Service supports SB 1679 because it seeks to protect and/or restore services in key areas of education, human services, and health. This is an excellent use of Rainy Day Funds so that the most vulnerable in our community can continue to receive services that will help them stay safe and maintain or improve their overall functioning. The use of these funds will reduce the risk of more serious problems occurring due to programs closing or shrinking. Don't we owe it to our community to protect our keiki, ohana, the mentally ill and disabled, and our kupuna?

Chairs Chun Oakland and Ige and Committee Members:

My name is Barbara Kim Stanton, State Director of AARP Hawaii. AARP is a membership organization of people 50 and older with nearly 160,000 members in Hawaii. We are committed to championing access to affordable, quality health care for all generations, providing the tools needed to save for retirement, and serving as a reliable information source on issues critical to Americans age 50+.

AARP strongly supports SB 1679. This bill would appropriate moneys from the emergency budget and reserve fund (commonly known as the "Rainy Day Fund") to maintain levels deemed to be essential to public health, safety, welfare, and education.

The critical budget shortfall has created hardship for our most vulnerable residents at unprecedented levels and numbers.

- More than one fifth (21.2%) of Hawaii adults aged 60 and older have an income below 200% of the poverty threshold.
- Almost 13% of Hawaii's children are being raised by grandparents—the highest percentage in the nation. These grandparents often forego attending to their own healthcare needs which often compromises their longevity and well-being.
- 64% of our residents stated that they were concerned whether they would be able to afford Rx drugs according to our 2008 AARP survey. One in ten reported delaying the filling of a RX or not filling it at all because of cost, splitting pills to make them stretch, or cutting back on food, fuel or electricity to afford the Rx.

We surmise that with the non-funding of the grants-in-aids in 2008 and the rapid erosion of our safety net services this past year, the number of keiki, elderly, and disabled residents falling between the cracks of society is even greater.

We are at a point where such basic services as meals-on-wheels, and bathing services twice a week to the disabled and the aged, are being curtailed or discontinued in its entirety. These kinds

of services clearly fall in the category of public health, safety and welfare, which is what the Rainy Day Fund was meant to address.

We strongly urge the legislators to protect our most vulnerable population by appropriating the necessary funding to meet our residents basic health and safety needs.

TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL 1679

Chairs Chun Oakland and Ige:

My name is Anthony Lenzer. I am a Professor Emeritus of Public Health and former Director of the Center on Aging at the University of Hawaii. I am testifying on behalf of Kokua Council, the oldest senior advocacy organization in Hawaii. Kokua Council strongly supports the purpose of this bill, which is to appropriate moneys from the emergency and budget fund of the State of Hawaii to maintain programs essential to education, public health, and public welfare. The bill clearly states the reasons why it is necessary to use this fund for these purposes.

In considering which programs to fund, we respectfully urge the Legislature to consider supporting both the Kupuna Care and the Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) programs. Funding for these programs is critical to meet the needs of vulnerable elders in our state. At present, there are of very substantial unmet health and human services needs in this population. For example, according to the Elderly Affairs Division of the City and County of Honolulu, the greatest number of unmet needs are for information and assistance; outreach; congregate meals; adult day care; chore services; and health maintenance. These are services funded through the Kupuna Care program. The ADRC is also a critical service, because it provides a way for seniors to identify available services without having to go through the difficult and confusing task of trying to contact many individual agencies for assistance which may or may not be available to them.

Kokua Council believes that it is especially important to utilize these so-called rainy day funds because other State funds may not be available, given the current financial crisis. We are especially concerned because the federal stimulus funds which may be coming to Hawaii do not seem targeted to meet these types of needs. Therefore, we must be prepared to utilize what is available locally.

Chairs Ige, Chun Oakland and members of the Senate Health and Human Services Committees, I am Debbie Shimizu, Executive Director of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW), Hawaii Chapter. NASW is the largest professional organization for social workers in Hawaii. We are testifying in **SUPPORT of SB 1679.**

During the past decade, the state has been slowly handing over its responsibility of providing direct services to individuals and families to the private, nonprofit sector through purchase of service contracts. The Governor in her state of the state address was proud of the many achievements the state has made working with its' community partnerships. However, now when the state is in a fiscal crisis, the state is cutting funds to those contracts. This will ultimately result in dismantling many of the programs that the state was proud of.

The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities (CBPP) is a policy organization that works on federal and state fiscal policy and public programs that affect low- and moderate-income families and individuals. In a report in February 2008, CBPP cautioned states from implementing across the board cuts to address its fiscal crisis. Instead CBPP fiscal advisors recommended that policy makers be more careful about cutting programs that affect low-income residents. They encouraged the use of rainy day funds to minimize the need to cut programs that are designed to assist state's residents the most during economic downturns.

Now is not the time to be cutting services that help vulnerable populations. I urge your favorable consideration of SB 1679.

Goodwill Industries of Hawaii, Inc. ("Goodwill") submits this testimony in support of Senate Bill 1679. Goodwill receives funding from the Department of Health-Developmental Disabilities Division ("DOH-DDD") via a DHS Medicaid Waiver Contract to operate Adult Day Health and Personal Assistance/Habilitation programs for individuals with significant developmental disabilities on Oahu and in East Hawaii (Hilo). Participants in Goodwill's programs and their families are Medicaid Waiver recipients who have limited socioeconomic resources. Waiver programs are essential for the public health, safety, welfare and education of individuals with developmental disabilities.

The projected budget shortfall for developmental disabilities services in the current fiscal year resulted in DOH-DDD mandating that individuals in Medicaid Waiver programs reduce services by 15% or greater, depending on the individual or families' utilization rates, effective February 1, 2009. Individuals and families were forced to immediately reduce critical services and necessary programs, such as those operated by Goodwill. In some cases, families are choosing between taking a shift at their jobs or caring for their dependent disabled family member creating more difficult economic circumstances for families.

In addition, since services have been reduced, Goodwill has also felt the effects resulting in our need to cut back our staff who provide direct service hours in our Waiver programs, and experienced employees have been laid off.

Goodwill is in strong support of Senate Bill 1679. The emergency and budget reserve fund should be used to maintain the previous level of Medicaid Waiver programs which are essential for the health, safety, welfare and education of individuals with developmental disabilities. The DOH-DDD's mandated budget reductions should be reversed as soon as possible.

Hawaii Waiver Providers Association (HWPA) Position Statement on Recent Budget Reductions

WHO WE ARE

HWPA is a statewide association comprised of 19 service providers affording leadership to collaborate and shape the service system to meet the needs of people with developmental disabilities. Founded in 2001, HWPA's mission is to provide the necessary resources to develop, strengthen, and attain the highest standards of excellence for the developmental disabilities community.

SYNOPSIS OF SITUATION

Approximately 2,500 individuals statewide with significant disabilities and limited socioeconomic resources were impacted by the recent mandated budget reductions set forth by the State of Hawaii Department of Health-Developmental Disabilities Division ("DOH-DDD"). The specific reductions have affected the Developmentally Disabled/Mental Retardation ("DD/MR") Medicaid Waiver recipients reducing services for people with disabilities of 15% or greater, depending on the individual or families' utilization rates, effective February 1, 2009.

CONCERNS AND POTENTIAL IMPACT

The primary goal of the DD/MR Waiver is to promote community inclusion in the least restrictive environment and to prevent institutionalization. The Hawaii Waiver Provider Association (HWPA) is deeply concerned that the budget reductions will reverse the intended goal the Waiver was intended to promote and presents the following concerns and potential impact the service reductions will have.

Lack of Timely Notification

The entire stakeholder community of all participants, families and provider representatives did not receive proper notice and sufficient time to respond, plan and prepare for the reductions. The abbreviated timeline only allowed legal guardians a maximum of ten (10) days to analyze the letter and make the important decision about which services must be immediately reduced. Primary care providers are being forced to make decisions about their own work schedules in order to care for family members. This work schedule reduction will pose undue economic hardship on Medicaid dependent families with limited socioeconomic resources.

Insufficient Notice of the Appeal Process

Individuals and families were not adequately notified and informed of the right and process to appeal the DOH's decision to reduce Medicaid services by 15%.

Lack of Assessment to Determine Risk of Safety and Health Issues

There was an inadequate assessment of safety and health needs to determine the individual health and safety impact of reductions for each service recipient to include identification of alternate resources. This has left recipients without service for a minimum of 1-2 full days a week potentially totaling 15-20 hours per week. There is the potential for care providers to select an unqualified person to support the recipient, further comprising the individual's health and safety.

Individual Plans Being Revised to Meet State Needs

Individual service plans, which are required by the Federal government, are being revised to reflect what the State can afford and not what individuals actually need on a daily basis. Legal guardians and primary care providers unable to retain support may be faced with alternate residential placements for their family members in long-term care facilities, which this program is specifically designed to prevent.

Crucial Services Provided by Agencies Are Compromised

Agencies providing crucial services are reporting actual losses of up to 40%. Operationally agencies will have one week to analyze the impact after receiving final confirmation of each individual's revised service budgets. Provider agencies will need to immediately reduce staff and the availability of services. Service providers will not be able to sustain the loss of business resulting in the closure of provider agencies and ultimately a weaker community infrastructure for persons with severe disabilities.

RECOMMENDATION

In the unlikely event future reductions may be necessary, the DOH must ensure that all participants, families and provider representatives receive adequate notice with complete information and sufficient time to respond, plan and prepare for the reductions.

Immediately ensure that all individuals and families receive notification and complete information of their rights and of the process to appeal DOH's decision to reduce services.

Develop a comprehensive risk assessment and response plan to address all potential health and safety issues that will arise from mandated service reductions.

Develop and establish the Individual Budgeting process to include sound assessments procedures. Follow the methodical and fair process that was implemented for the age thirteen (13) and under recipients.

DOH-DDD must analyze the process in which these significant reductions were implemented and determine best practices and procedures. DOH-DDD should start fiscal year July 2009 with specific solutions in place.

Determine other potential budget reduction possibilities within the DOH to include internal administrative functions that do not directly compromise the health and safety of Hawaii's citizens with developmental disabilities.

Secure the necessary funds to meet the critical needs of vulnerable populations. Strongly advocate for an increase in the FMAP (Federal matching funds) to reestablish safety net services for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony supporting Senate Bill 1679.

We are the agency mandated by federal law and designated by Executive Order to protect and advocate for the human, civil and legal rights of Hawaii's estimated 180,000 people with disabilities.

We strongly support this bill and are delighted to see the legislature acknowledge that despite our economic difficulties at the moment, we cannot as a society allow the neediest and weakest amongst us to fall through a safety net of basic, necessary services. In recent months, our office has been extensively involved with clients affected by recent budget cuts. We represent many individuals with mental illness who have been affected by cuts in the AMHD Budget. Currently, we are in the midst of representing many families who are affected by the cuts experienced at the Developmental Disabilities Division.

We are particularly concerned that in this area, the problems facing the DD Division have been somewhat self inflicted by the Administration. For the past several years, they have been budgeting year to year with a heightened dependence on emergency appropriations. Last year, the Division requested a larger base budget than they were permitted to seek from the legislature by the Governor. At that time, they were told that if they ran short of funds, they should simply seek another emergency appropriation. However, this year, the Governor

has instructed them they cannot seek that emergency appropriation. That is why they are in the fiscal predicament they face and must cut services.

This example illustrates the importance of securing a solid, accurately planned out, base budget. Recognizing that general funds will be stretched thin to support a variety of necessary and worthwhile efforts, we support this bill and the legislature's desire to use the emergency budget and reserve fund. We believe that the circumstances facing the state justify the use of these funds for these purposes,

I am submitting testimony in STRONG SUPPORT OF SB 1679. This bill makes an emergency appropriation from the emergency and budget fund of the State of Hawaii to maintain the levels of programs determined to be essential to education, public health, and welfare. Specifically I am supporting appropriations to restore lost funding for the Department of Health Respite, DD Division DD/MR Waiver, and the DD Division Partnerships in Community Living (PICL Programs.

Our son, Michael, is a 43 year old man with Cerebral Palsy and Mental Retardation. He still lives at home with us and receives personal assistant services with Easter Seals Hawaii. Michael's needs have increased over the years; he now needs physical assistance with bathing, grooming, toileting and other hygiene tasks. He is not able to cook for himself, do his laundry or manage his money. He cannot independently access public transportation. He cannot manage his medical care and must have someone make his appointments and then attend the appointment with him. It is even hard for Michael to communicate when he is sick or in pain, so a vigilant caregiver must observe his behavior and problem solve when changes are observed. In the event of an emergency or natural disaster, he has no self-preservation skills and must be supervised 24/7. He is partially paralyzed on the right side and recently started walking with a cane due to a frequent high rate of falls due to his physical deterioration. Michael's self help skills are not going to improve; over the rest of his lifetime, we can only expect his skills to continue to decline.

My husband and I are also aging and experiencing our own health issues. We are finding it increasingly difficult to provide care for Michael. With Easter Seals Hawaii's help, however, we have been receiving 61 hours of help every week. Michael's care givers assist him with bathing and hygiene tasks each day. His caregivers help him with meals, physical therapy and provide him with opportunities to socialize with his peers and access the community (shopping, going to the movies, going to the park, etc.) These care givers accompany Michael to his doctor and

dentist appointments. These services have allowed Michael to continue to five at home with us, rather than place him in a group home or a foster home. These services also save the State of I lawaii a significant amount of money for Michael's care. Certainly, if he was in a group home, the cost to The State would be much higher than it is now.

Recent budget cuts have cut Michael's service hours down to 42.50 hours per week. This is putting tremendous pressure on our family. My husband and I will have less time to care for ourselves and maintain our own health. The increased physical stress of caring for Michael will surely have a negative effect on our physical health. Michael is frequently moody and has behavioral outbursts related to his disability. This is uncomfortable for many people and limits our ability to maintain a daily schedule and complete daily tasks. Our days are ruled by Michael's "current mood" and interrupts tasks, errands, socializing and family contact on a daily basis. In short, I expect that our family will soon be in crisis and The State of Hawaii will be faced with finding Michael a group living placement AND picking up the bill for those services.

I am also inclined to seek out legal help to advocate for the rights of my son. He should be able to live at home and be adequately supported with community services rather than move into a group home. It simply makes no sense.

I strongly urge you to reconsider recent budget cut backs and understand the devastating effects that this will have on our disabled citizens and their families.

If the emergency appropriation is not approved as soon as possible, the state will be putting at risk the thousands of families that are or were served each month in these very valuable programs. Joshua needs to be monitored 24 hours a day. We never know when the next medical emergency will happen. Even when we go into the community, we have a cell phone with us at all times in case of emergency... which happened once walking down South King Street.

Also, because we have all the equipment needed for most medical care we are able to avoid hospitalizations; again a saving to the State. This past Christmas Eve is an excellent example. We were at the Queen's Emergency Room where they discovered Joshua had pneumonia. Because we had the equipment, i.e., oxygen, specialized bed, and pulse-oximeter at home, we were able to save the State the cost of four days hospitalization.

We do everything in our power to provide the safest healthiest environment for our son so that he is safe. When Joshua's health allows, he participate in meaningful activities that allow him to have a life just like every other citizen. Without the services provided under the MR/DD Waiver, our son's health and safety are seriously jeopardized.

Joshua needs to be monitored 24 hours a day. We never know when the next medical emergency will happen. Even when we go into the community, we have a cell phone with us at all times in case of emergency... which happened once walking down South King Street.

Also, because we have all the equipment needed for most medical care we are able to avoid hospitalizations. Again, a saving to the State. This past Christmas Eve is an excellent case in point. We were at the Queen's Emergency Room where they discovered Joshua had pneumonia. Because we had the equipment, oxygen, specialized bed, pulse-oximeter at home, we were able to save the State the cost of four days hospitalization. We do everything in our power to provide the safest healthiest environment for our son. and that he is safe. When Joshua's health allows he participate in meaningful activities that allow him to have a life just like every other citizen. Without the services provided under the MR/DD Waiver, our son's health and safety is again jeopardized.

Specifically I am supporting appropriations to restore lost funding for the **Department of Health Respite**, **DD Division DD/MR Waiver**, and the **DD Division Partnerships in Community Living (PICL Programs**.

Our son, Michael, is a 43 year old man with Cerebral Palsy and Mental Retardation. He still lives at home with us and receives personal assistant services with Easter Seals Hawaii. Michael's needs have increased over the years; he now needs physical assistance with bathing, grooming, toileting and other hygiene tasks. He is not able to cook for himself, do his laundry or manage his money. He cannot independently access public transportation. He cannot manage his medical care and must have someone make his appointments and then attend the appointment with him. It is even hard for Michael to communicate when he is sick or in pain, so a vigilant caregiver must observe his behavior and problem solve when changes are observed. In the event of an emergency or natural disaster, he has no self-preservation skills and must be supervised 24/7. He is partially paralyzed on the right side and recently started walking with a cane due to a frequent high rate of falls due to his physical deterioration. Michael's self help skills are not going to improve; over the rest of his lifetime, we can only expect his skills to continue to decline.

My husband and I are also aging and experiencing our own health issues. We are finding it increasingly difficult to provide care for Michael. With Easter Seals Hawaii's help, however, we have been receiving 61 hours of help every week. Michael's care givers assist him with bathing and hygiene tasks each day. His caregivers help him with meals, physical therapy and provide him with opportunities to socialize with his peers and access the community (shopping, going to the movies, going to the park, etc.) These care givers accompany Michael to his doctor and

dentist appointments. These services have allowed Michael to continue to live at home with us, rather than place him in a group home or a foster home. These services also save the State of Hawaii a significant amount of money for Michael's care. Certainly, if he was in a group home, the cost to The State would be much higher than it is now.

Recent budget cuts have cut Michael's service hours down to 42.50 hours per week. This is putting tremendous pressure on our family. My husband and I will have less time to care for ourselves and maintain our own health. The increased physical stress of caring for Michael will surely have a negative effect on our physical health. Michael is frequently moody and has behavioral outbursts related to his disability. This is uncomfortable for many people and limits our ability to maintain a daily schedule and complete daily tasks. Our days are ruled by Michael's "current mood" and interrupts tasks, errands, socializing and family contact on a daily basis. In short, I expect that our family will soon be in crisis and The State of Hawaii will be faced with finding Michael a group living placement AND picking up the bill for those services.

I am also inclined to seek out legal help to advocate for the rights of my son. He should be able to live at home and be adequately supported with community services rather than move into a group home. It simply makes no sense.

I strongly urge you to reconsider recent budget cut backs and understand the devastating effects that this will have on our disabled citizens and their families.

I am a supervisor for Easter Seals Hawaii on Maui. We provide services to 57 individuals with developmental disabilities on Maui and Lanai. I know of several families who now, because of recent budget cuts, must leave their developmentally disabled family member at home alone. One case is especially concerning. This 30 year old man is diagnosed with Mental Retardation and Cerebral Palsy. He has lost all of his Saturday services due to budget cuts. Therefore, he must stay home alone each Saturday because his parents work outside of the home. This man does not have any self preservation skills. He does not know how to respond to a fire, a smoke alarm or other possible in home emergencies. Even if he knew to respond, his walking ability is so impaired that he wouldn't be able to remove himself from the home. In addition, he does not understand the concept of a "stranger" and is an easy target for a predator.

Another disturbing case involves a 16 year old young man with Down Syndrome and his single mother. They have been hard hit financially by the recent events in the economy. Even though this mother works full time, they are close to losing their home. This young man's after school and weekend services were cut from 36 hours per week to 25 hours per week. Now, this mother must choose between working and providing supervision for her son. She has told me that they might need to move into a homeless shelter soon. In addition, the staff member that used to provide the 35 hours of service per week is now looking for more work in a time where there are few jobs available.

This will have an extreme impact on our family, I will lose my medical coverage and the cut in pay will be difficult. Please pass SB1679 to help restore the lost funding.



Aloha, Chairs and distinguished members. My name is Alan Johnson, Chairperson of the Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition, which is a hui of 22 treatment agencies throughout the state.

HSAC supports SB1679

HSAC applauds the Legislature for recognizing the current and impending situation that jeopardizes the safety net of basic human service, health, and education needs for Hawaii's residents and families. And while all of Hawaii's residents will be affected by the economic situation, gap group families and families closest to the poverty line will suffer the most.

Treatment Works and Saves Money!

According to Department of Health outcomes, treatment is effective for both adolescents and adults. The outcome data is available at http://hawaii.gov/health/substance-abuse/prevention-treatment/treatment/adtrtwo.htm

Given the recent substantial advances in treatment methodologies over the last several years, treatment is more cost effective that customary alternatives. Treatment can save huge dollars in each and every year.

- 1. Fact: Alcohol and drug abuse cost over \$166 billion each year in lost productivity, law enforcement, criminal case processing, treatment and health care costs.
- 2. Fact: In 1997, almost 10% of the adult population and 6% of adolescents need treatment in Hawaii.

- 3. Fact: Treatment is 7 times more cost effective in reducing cocaine consumption than the best supply control program in the United States.
- 4. Fact: Treatment is far less expensive than the likely alternatives. One year of treatment costs \$11,500. One year of incarceration costs \$39,600. One year of untreated addiction costs society an estimated \$43,200.
- 5. Fact: \$1 invested in substance abuse treatment saves taxpayers \$7 in future costs; that \$1 invested in treatment could save \$11.54 in combined medical and social costs; for every \$1 spent on substance abuse treatment \$5.60 was returned in reduced welfare, food stamps, Medicaid, crime courts, and imprisonment.

Substance abuse treatment reduces crime

- 1. Fact: Thirty three percent of all criminal justice costs relate to substance abuse.
- 2. Fact: State court data shows that the majority of state felony convictions in 1994 were for drug (31%) or property offenses (32%). Also 33% of all murders or manslaughter incidents and over 50% of spousal murders are drug or alcohol related.
- 3. Fact: Over 1.6 million adults (55%) in probation and parole programs need alcohol or drug treatment.
- 4. Treatment works: Results of a treatment study report significant declines in criminal activity.
 - Reports of arrests of selling drugs decreased by 78.2%, from 64% to 13.9%.
 - Reports of arrests of shoplifting decreased by 81.6%, from 63.7% to 11.7%.
 - Reports of "beating someone up" decreased by 77.6%, from 49.3% to 11%.
 - Reports of arrests for any crimes decreased by 64.2%, from 48.2% to 17.2% in the comparison years.
 - Drug sales dropped by 68%;
 - Breaking and entering dropped by 61%;
 - Selling sex dropped by 54%;
 - Use of weapons or physical force dropped by 75%.

Substance Abuse Treatment Reduces Health Care Costs

1. Fact: More than 70 conditions requiring hospitalization (including cancer, heart disease, and HIV/AIDS) have risk factors associated with substance abuse; and \$1 of every \$5 Medicaid spends on hospital care is attributable to substance abuse or a related condition.

- 2. Fact: On the average, untreated alcoholics generally incur general health care costs that are at least 100% higher than those of the non-alcoholic. In the 12 months before treatment, the alcoholic's costs are close to 300% higher.
- 3. Treatment works: Substance abuse treatment reduces overall hospital admission rates by at least 38%. Hospital admissions for drug overdose decreased by 58% among those who had been treated.
- 4. Treatment works: *Alcohol Health & Research World* reported findings that 50 percent of the costs of alcohol and drug abuse treatment are offset within one year by subsequent reductions in medical costs by the affected family, and not just the primary patient.

Substance Abuse Treatment and Women, Mothers and Infants

- 1. Fact: Over 5% of women who gave birth in the US in 1992 used illegal drugs sometime during their pregnancy; and over 750,000 women (18.8%) used alcohol at some time during their pregnancy.
- 2. Fact: Over 60% of all pediatric AIDS cases are related to maternal exposure to HIV through drug use or sex with a drug user.
- 3. Treatment works: In a CSAT funded program, 95% of women reported uncomplicated, drug-free births after one year of treatment; and \$43,000 to \$145,000 can be saved for each pregnancy and delivery uncomplicated by alcohol or substance abuse.
- 4. Treatment works: Injecting drug use is the primary mode of transmission of HIV among women and is responsible for 71% of AIDS cases among women.

Substance Abuse and Business

- 1. Fact: Untreated addictions cost American businesses from \$50 to \$100 billion each year in increased medical claims and disability costs from illnesses and injuries, theft, absenteeism, and decreased productivity.
- 2. Fact: Thirty eight to 50% of all workers' compensation claims are related to the abuse of alcohol or illicit drugs in the workplace.
- 3. Treatment works: Employment increased by 44% during treatment, and stabilized at an increase of 94% after one year of treatment.
- 4. Treatment works: Annual earnings for those who completed treatment ranged from 49% higher for those who completed outpatient treatment to 136% higher among those who completed methadone treatment.

- 5. Treatment works: Colorado found that substance abusers who completed treatment had an average salary increase of \$2,760 a year; and the percentage of clients employed improved by 70%.
- 6. Treatment works: Following treatment, worker absenteeism in Ohio decreased by 89%, tardiness by 92% and on-the-job injuries by 57%.

The Hawaii Primary Care Association strongly supports this bill to ensure adequate funding for essential services in the face of our state and national economic crisis. We ask that you include in this bill funds for the uninsured.

- The State Department of Health eliminated \$3.5 million in funds to pay for health care for the uninsured at Community Health Centers and other providers. This program serves many of the 31,000+ uninsured people who are cared for by CHCs every year. State funds have been available for this purpose for more than 15 years.
- The State Department of Human Services, Med-QUEST Division eliminated <u>\$550,000 for the Immigrant Health Initiative</u> which pays for outpatient care for legal immigrants who meet eligibility criteria for Medicaid but are not entitled to public means-tested benefits because they've been in the country for less than five years. Last year 1,667 people were served by this program, 42% of whom were aged 65 and older and another 33% were aged 45 to 64. This program has been in existence since federal welfare reform barred immigrants from benefits in 1996.

Thank you for the opportunity to support this measure and for considering the needs of the growing number of uninsured residents of Hawaii, as well as many other people who are more vulnerable than ever during this unsettling time.

I submit this testimony in favor of SB 1679, as a volunteer involved with the prevention of child abuse, since the early days when Hawaii's Healthy Start program became a model for the rest of the country through the Healthy Family America initiative. The vision began here. Mahalo to the Hawaii State Legislature, for launching the prevention intiative and funding it throughout the years. Endless statistical evidence supports your rationale...prevention is the key! Healthy Start cannot....must not... end here, especially when families have the added stress of this economic downturn and may lash out in frustration at the most innocent under their roof. I am not a provider. I am not employed by an organization supported by state contract funds. But as I trust all of you do...I care about the consequences of ripping away the safety net of prevention, hospital based identification of at-risk families, home visitation and referrals to the necessary agencies where identified by Healthy Start teams.

I am a former reporter, who has interviewed families grateful for the support of this program and proud to show how the program has helped them grow great kids. They have told me that without the program, they would have 'lost it'. I have covered the ugly cases of families who did not take advantage of Healthy Start, and caused heartbreaking harm to their keiki. I have covered other agencies trying to stay afloat with overwhelming case loads. What will happen, when the preventative attention provided by Healthy Start no longer wraps the family in support and those agencies are overwhelmed by unexpected cases? I know what will happen, and so do you. That's why we elected you.

Yes, Healthy Start is a voluntary program. What program funded by the DOH isn't!! Yes, there is Enhanced Healthy Start to serve the at risk families....but they see them AFTER THE FACT...AFTER THE HARM HAS BEEN DONE!

Healthy Start has been evaluated more than any program I know, and for families that stay 12 months or more in the program, in FY 08, more than 99% had no report of child abuse. This rate compares very favorably to programs using our model all over the country...in at least 35 states. Healthy Start is cost effective...every one dollar invested in child abuse prevention returns at least three dollars in benefits and cost avoidance. You have scores of documents to support this.

Eliminate this program, and 4-thousand families at risk of child abuse will not have an alternative program...an alternative way out. Eliminate Healthy Start, and we will all wait together, until reporters describe the grizzly details of child abuse on the evening news and in the paper, and we sit back and say....you know, we could have prevented this, by investing in prevention. I don't want to sit back and say that. And neither do you. Preserve our keiki and family safety net, by restoring funding to Healthy Start.

Good Morning Senator Chun-Oakland, Senator Ige,, Senator Ihara, Senator Green and members of the Committees on Human Services and on Health.

I am grateful for the opportunity to present testimony to your Committees this afternoon. My name is JoAnn Bishop Freed and I am the Executive Director of Family Support Services of West Hawaii on the island of Hawaii. Family Support Services of West Hawaii will celebrate its 30th anniversary in 2009. Since 1979, the agency has been fulfilling its mission to "support families and communities in providing love and care for our children." Begun by a group of community volunteers concerned about the victims of child abuse and neglect, Family Support Services of West Hawaii (FSSWH) has been in the forefront of establishing innovative programs and activities designed to support all families as they strive to raise healthy, happy children on the island of Hawaii.

Throughout Hawaii's history, parents have used all kinds of support systems outside of their immediate families to help them raise their children. These have included informal networks of friends and neighbors, Tutus and aunties who gave advice and care, religious organizations, doctors, teachers and other professionals who helped when they were needed. It is a fact of modern Hawaiian life, however, that these support systems are less available to families than they used to be, while the challenges facing all parents and children are greater than ever.

Today, times are particularly rough for families—our local economic factors have resulted in families having less time and resources to devote to their children; changes in family structure have altered traditional bonds among family members; geographic mobility has stranded young families far from the support of extended family or friends; and growing poverty has left many families without the means to meet basic needs. The stress caused by such changes has left many adults less able to provide support to each other when it is needed most, and we now know the toll that early and excessive stress takes on the neurological development of the brain of vulnerable infants. Parents know very well what they are up against and are struggling to do the best they can for their children.

If ever young families needed the benefit of a safety net it would be now, before the life-long effects of the stress of living in poverty and other adverse childhood experiences takes its toll on the development of our youngest, most vulnerable children. The stress caused by poverty can corrode family relationships, including parents' relationships with their children, making it more difficult for many parents to provide consistent and involved parenting. Parental stress particularly impacts upon the developing child, but excessive stress, regardless of source, disrupts the neuron pathways of a child's developing brain. This can cause lifelong problems in learning, behavior, physical and mental health.

Research on resiliency highlights the protective factors for individuals that may reduce the impact of poverty. Research has shown that having access to another involved significant adult outside the family helps a child cope with stress. Such relationships may also help to develop a sense of belonging to a community, which in turn leads to informal supports and collaborations. There is also evidence that home visiting programs such as Hawaii's Healthy Start have a positive impact on families.

I hope you will support Senate Bill Number 1679: Relating to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund. This bill proposes to appropriate moneys from the emergency and reserve budget fund of the State of Hawaii to maintain the levels of programs determined to be essential to the education, public health and public welfare of our citizens—including our littlest ones.

Children born into disadvantaged environments are more likely to experience compromised childhoods unless interventions and supports are provided to offset the effects of poverty. That is why we cannot abandon our children because "there is no money," any more than we would expect a family to abandon its children for the same reason. My fear is that is exactly what will happen in Hawaii without its safety net.

My name is Ellen Ching and for the past 25 years, I have served as the Executive Director of The Arc of Kauai. The Arc of Kauai is a private non-profit organization that was formed by parents in 1961. Our primary mission is to secure for all people with developmental disabilities the opportunity to realize their goals and to choose where and how they learn, live, work and play. To this end, The Arc of Kauai develops implements and maintains a variety of programs and services for approximately 191 individuals.

I am writing this letter in strong support of SB 1679.

This bill will restore funding for the Department of Health's Respite Program, the Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program and the DD/MR Waiver Program.

The budget cuts have resulted in the termination of the PICL Program and the loss of \$395,505.00 in services to children and adults on Kauai. The budget reductions to the DD/MR Waiver Program at a minimum will result in the loss of approximately \$162,850.64 in services. The full impact of the loss of DD/MR services is still unknown as families are appealing the budget cuts and service reductions.

The real tragedy however is human suffering and the burden this puts on our families...a single elderly mom with two adults with developmental disabilities that was counting on the PICL funds to provide services to her son for eight weeks while she is in Honolulu with her daughter who needs treatment for breast cancer. She was also counting on MR/DD services for her daughter whose prognosis is about another 4 years.

A mother suddenly dies on December 24, 2008 and leaves behind a grieving family that includes an ailing husband and a daughter with developmental disabilities. Her other daughter, moves her sister with a developmental disability into her home but she doesn't even know her sister's social security number or the numerous things involved in caring for her sister. On January 2nd, a letter is received telling her she must make a decision to cut her sister's services which will result in the loss of one day of service by January 12th. She and her husband work and cannot take care of her during the week. On January 3rd, they buried their mom.

While we are fully aware that budget cuts are necessary, we do not believe that the process in which families were asked to make these cuts was fair or equitable throughout the MR/DD Waiver Program. Without clear or full information, most of the families felt intimidated and reduced their services. However, many families have also chosen to exercise their appeals rights and some of the families have joined together in a class action law suit.

Just when we need to really come together to find a solution to this economic crisis, we are at serious odds with each other. We hope that should we be faced with a similar situation, a rate reduction will be instituted so that families can continue to support their loved ones with developmental disabilities.

These services are provided to our consumers by their Circle of Friends and they are here to also assist families and guardians in need due to many of their own personal reasons.

Many of these consumers will be affected by these changes because they may be not familiar with the issues or situations that are arising due to these circumstances. Who will be there to instruct them with the best plan of action to the outcome that they will be expecting? Who will be there to fight for their rights and equality? Not many family, friends, and guardians were aware of these services offered to them.

Our consumers' services are determined by level of care. We have many consumers that have medical issues and behavioral issues to where their level of care may be higher than most. Many consumers know their daily routines and do have difficult times adjusting to new changes brought upon them. Teaching and guiding them adjust to these changes are a lot of work, especially when it comes to having new workers. Not many consumers are okay with having to have new workers because these new workers are strangers to them. Consumers need to feel that security and trust with their workers and it does take a lot of time for that to be accomplished. Our consumers are very much similar to us in that matter. We will not just trust anyone new that comes into our lives instantly. How do we expect our consumers to interact with the community when they are limited to services? How do we expect our consumers to learn and grow with the world?

Due to the budget cuts that took effective February 1, 2009, our consumers have lost services, which has affected their daily and/or weekly routine. I observe changes in their behavior mentally and physically. Their health and safety has been compromised and it is up to their families, friends, caregivers, and direct support workers to assist them in coping with these changes. It is as if their rights, to have their own choices and needs in services, are being limited to each of them. What would you do if you were in this position? Would you feel it is fair? I honestly do not feel that eliminating services or time will benefit our consumers at all. Why? They will eventually regress and lose what was taught to them resulting that all the hard work put in by everyone involved was just a waste.

I have worked with the DD/MR population for over 8 years, and as an advocate and employee of an agency that works with the DD/MR population, I am deeply concerned with the reductions in services for our consumers. Not to mention the families that are struggling to care for them as well as for themselves and other family members. And what of those individuals who have no family to care for them? What of their quality of life? We are a state that have no institutions, and with these reductions, there is a great risk for creating an institution to place our individuals in that will more likely not give them independence, a greater quality of living, and potentially a rise in behaviors and possibly a decline health.

The services that our agencies and workers provide, gives our DD/MR population a chance at a better quality of living, either on their own with assistance from direct support workers, or caregivers that care for them, or living with their family and receiving assistance in living and working out in the community. Its gives our DD/MR population a sense of normalization and independence. With reduction in services, it may cause a greater decline in opportunities to grow and advance in life. And what of their health and safety?

Families depend on our workers to care for their family and be with them when the families go to work to provide for their loved ones. When there is a decline in services, there will be less supervision to our DD/MR consumers, which leaves family to miss work and stay to care for their loved one thus putting a dent in the family's income. And with less supervision as well to our consumers by trained staff, consumers may start to regress and fall back to old behaviors that have been under control or diminished with constant, regular redirection through use of programs that are targeted to help the individual live normally and safely either for themselves or towards others.

Due to the budget reduction that took effect as of February 1, 2009, many of our consumers have not been able to attend day program or school on a regular basis and have been staying at home, some with no stimulation/activity (decrease in PAB services, no family, family working, lack of one-on-one) some changes in behavior. A particular consumer of mine knows and enjoys going to day program M-F and used to have behaviors that were controlled through redirection when there was no program to go to on the weekends. Now with the reductions and ADH has been lessened, behaviors arise due to consumer staying at home on a day that he/she usually goes to day program, and with their mentality, it is difficult for them to understand why they can't go to day program, when it has already been routine for them to go on certain days.

Another client would lose their PAB services or have them drastically reduced, causing family (which is very limited due to work as well as lack of family members) to not work and adding to the economic hardship.

To summarize, with the budget reductions, the health and safety of our DD/MR populations are at great risk and having them put in institutions is also a great possibility. Quality of life will decrease for our individuals and all that we have done and worked to attain normalization and greater quality of life for them will be diminished. I strongly urge support for our DD/MR population to regain and maintain their quality of life and safety for themselves as well as for others.

I would like to show my support for SB 1679 with the addition of monies earmarked for our Kupuna.

As a Social Worker in the field of Gerontology for the past 20 years, I recognize that a strong family is the backbone of our society which includes our elders. Hawaii's strength comes from it's 'Ohana, we recognize the purpose of out Kupuna is to lead the family and to then be supported by them. We believe that supporting our seniors will also help us to stabilize our economy by preventing premature institutionalization which in turn will increase the state dollars needed to pay for long term care for our Kupuna.

The State's population is growing older faster than any other state, according to DBET. In 2005, 18.7% of Hawaii's population is 60 years of age and older (seventh in the nation), and 28.7% of Hawaii's households has at least one person 65 years of age and older (2nd in the nation). Life expectancy nationally is 77.5 years, while the age for Hawaii is 79.8 years (1st in the nation).

In the 2008 State of Hawaii, Older Adult Needs Assessment, a report prepared for the Joint Legislative Committee on Family Caregiving, those sampled had a higher percentage of individuals with Activities of Daily Living (Eating, Dressing, Personal Hygiene, Bathing, Toileting, Transferring and Mobility) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (Prepare Meals, Shopping, Take Medications, Manage Money, Use Telephone, Housework, Use Public Transport) impairments. Over half required assistance with personal care and other ADLs and almost the same amount (51.5%) needed assistance with arranging for their own care.

The Kupuna Care Program started in 1999 with the goal that Hawaii's older adults will have access to affordable and quality - home and community based services that are client centered and family supported allowing them to live with independence and dignity.

Following guidelines set by the state the program offers case management, assisted transportation, home delivered meals, attendant or companion services, chore or homemaker services and personal care. Together with other senior services in Hawaii, the Kupuna Care Programs provide a safety net to our frail, isolated and low income seniors. Without this net of protection our seniors face continued decline, hospitalization and institutionalization.

In 2008 Kupuna Care Services assisted 9,253 individuals in Hawaii. On average a senior may receive 2-3 meals a week (121 meals per year), 1-2 hours per week of personal care (68 hours per year), 1 round trip transport per week (56 one way trips per year), 4 hours of chore service per year or 17 hours of case management per year. As you can see the assistance provided falls short of the need but is enough to supplement other sources of support to help seniors stay at home.

The Kupuna Care Program is cost effective. In 2008 voluntary contributions accounted for almost 16% of the Kupuna Care expenditures. Kupuna Care Programs expand services by utilizing volunteers. For example Lanakila MOW uses 1,344 volunteers who provide 24,543 hours of service delivering meals. The value of this service is \$184,075 and without it a full 2/3 of the meals would not be delivered.

By caring for our Kupuna we are in turn caring for their family members. The economic impact of family caregiving is significant. In Valuing the Invaluable: The Economic Value of Family Caregiving, 2008 Update, a study conducted by the AARP Public Policy Institute, found the value of caregiving at \$1.25 billion in Hawaii. The cost of this care continues to rise as the number of individuals needing care increase. If these costs were shifted to health insurers, including Medicare and Medicaid, it would dramatically increase health care costs and this increase would impact us all. We know that family members are impacted by the stress of caregiving, often taking time off work or quitting their jobs. According to the assessment over 25% of Hawaii's households have at least one individual providing informal unpaid care for an adult aged 60 or older with physical or cognitive disabilities. Over 55 percent of these caregivers are employed and of this total, over 26% indicated that their employment was affected by their caregiving responsibilities. Over 77% took time off from work to deal with caregiving responsibilities. Caregivers stated they work less hours, turn down promotions and take leaves of absence. Caregivers who do not have access to adequate relief from their duties and who lack knowledge of the aging process and their reactions to caregiving can suffer from emotional and physical exhaustion. In many situations, such exhaustion can lead to inadequate care, abuse or neglect of the senior and sometimes premature institutionalization.

Evidenced-based studies have reported that early intervention is the key to better outcomes for seniors requiring supportive services to remain in their community. A 2002 study reported in The Gerontologist, "Effects of a Community-Based Early Intervention Program on the Subjective Well-Being, Institutionalization, and Mortality of Low-Income Elders", "those elders who received the intervention (case management) had significantly higher subjective well-being and were less likely to be institutionalized or die than those in a comparison group (remained on waiting lists for case management) across the 18-month period." The study states that the implications of the results are that they "make a strong case for the importance of community-based programs to the well-being of elders".

I am the mother of a 21 year old daughter (Janelle Duncan) who has a diagnoses of MR and seizure disorder. Under the DD/MR waiver contract I provide 40 hours a week of services to Janelle. Janelle's sister also provides 26 hours of service a week to Janelle. Janelle requires 24 hour total care for all of her needs including: grooming, dressing, feeding, oral care, exercise, toileting, bathing, and medication assistance. As her mother, I already provide Janelle with 24 hour care around the clock with the exception of the 26 hours that Janelle's sister works with her. I feel extremely overburdened and exhausted from lack of extra help and support from more Personal Assistants. Janelle's budget was already deficient to begin with which is why more Personal Assistants could not be hired to provide services for her. With the budget reduction Janelle will lose 21 hours of service per week. Janelle's sister will lose 21 hours of paid employment a week and her medical and dental benefits as well. That is a huge cut that Janelle cannot afford. The risk of institutionalization is very real for Janelle should this budget reduction occur. If I should become sick there will be no one to care for Janelle. Quite often I do get sick because of the level of stress I am under to provide good care for my daughter with little or no outside support. If her budget is reduced, Janelle's health and safety will be at risked and on top of that she may have to be institutionalized because I simply may not be able to provide her with the level of support that she needs.

I am the mother of an 11 year old daughter Kamalani Eugenio. Kamalani has several developmental disabilities including Pallister-Killian syndrome, seizure disorder, MR, limited eye vision, and limited hearing abilities. Kamalani requires total care 24 hours a day. Currently, the amount of hours allocated in Kamalani's budget are 60 hours a week. Kamalani's auntie Harridene provides 40 hours of service a week. My husband and I both work full time to provide for our other 3 children as well as Kamalani. Kamalani is completely dependent on other people to provide her with care. Kamalani is able to receive the care she needs because Harridene provides her with 40 hours a week of personal assistant services. Harridene often works more hours above and beyond what she gets paid.

Kamalani's budget was reduced to 29 hours a week. The impact of this cut will jeopardize Kamalani's health and safety because she must have someone to assist her at all times. Kamalani requires total care. She needs assistance in grooming, bathing, toileting, feeding, exercising, and going to appointments. Her personal assistant Harridene takes Kamalani to all of her appointments (i.e. dental, physical therapy, primary care physician) as well as to church and to recreational activities. All these services will be decreased with this cut.

Another disturbing case involves a 42 year old woman with moderate Mental Retardation. She has a history of violent behavior and depression. Her family lives here on Maui, but sees her only once or twice a year. This woman lives in a foster home but her placement is in jeopardy due to her behaviors. We do not have enough behavioral resources on Maui to tap into to provide behavior consulting services. This woman's Waiver services get her out of the home and gives her care givers a break, maintaining her foster placement. Her hours were recently cut from 72 hours to 60 hours per week. Even though it is only 12 hours per week, I fear that this loss will negatively effect her placement and result in this life long Maui resident being moved off island to find support.

I work with another family that may soon be in crisis due to having their hours cut. The mother has Asperger's Syndrome and the 17 year old daughter has Autism. The father works long hours, especially since he had to lay off 10 of the staff where he works due to the economy. While this family has done an excellent job raising their daughter, the mother needs consistent respite from the needs of her daughter so that she can maintain her own disability issues.

I know of another young man who has Down Syndrome. His mother has spent an enormous amount of time helping him to get a job with a work crew and helping him to get a HUD apartment. Her intention was to get him set up with the services he needs to live as independent as possible so that in the event something happens to her, her son is taken care of. With the recent budget cuts however, this young man will not have the necessary supervision he needs and is at risk of having to move into a group home or foster care home.

These are just a few examples of the negative impact recent budget cuts have made here on Maui. If the emergency appropriation is not approved as soon as possible, the state will be putting at risk the thousands of families that are or were served each month in these very valuable programs. I am the mother of five school age children, two of whom have developmental disabilities. One of my boys will need significant care for the rest of his life being that he is unable to care for himself and needs much assistance. Because of their disabilities, my husband and I have changed the way we do everything in order to give all of our children a stable, happy, and healthy environment. As a family with disabled children our activities are limited. What simple things other families take for granted, we struggle through or are unable to do at all. My disabled boys are on a waiver program from Easter Seals on the Big Island of Hawaii. This is wonderful organization which truly works to make these kids lives more normalized and appreciated. These services have been a God Send. I am able to work from home and my husband is able to run a small business where he can have a flexible schedule in order to cope with the demands disabled children bring. With out these services and personal assistance it would turn a difficult situation into a absolute heartbreak.

I applaud the efforts of the State Government to cut spending especially during this economic down turn. As a citizen and taxpayer, I am appalled and angered at the wasteful spending, and many programs can be cut. But it is a moral crime in our society to take funds from those who absolutely cannot care for themselves. Specifically I support appropriations to restore lost funding for the Department of Health Respite, DD Division DD/MR Waiver, and the DD Division Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Programs. I respectfully write my testimony to all of you to ask that you support SB1679. Although I myself did not participate in Healthy Start, I know many of my friends and family members have over the years and have learned so much about how to be the best parents they can be and protect their children from harm. I believe that this program really helps parents learn how to raise their children in a safe and loving home.

I have an understanding of how difficult it is to raise children with little community support and family support, and know that I myself would have benefited from this program had it been offered to me when my children were born. You see, I am a single, widowed mother of three teenage boys. My husband passed away when my children were 3, 5, & 7 years old due to a substance abuse problem. As a family, we struggled with his addiction and I felt I had nowhere to turn. I didn't know what to do and longed for help everyday. I always think to myself, what would it had been like if we had a program like Healthy Start in our lives at the time? (Then it wasn't a statewide program.) Would they have been able to help us? Would my husband still be alive? Would he had finally been offered the help he needed to recover from his addiction?

Unfortunately, we were forced to endure not only through my husband's addiction when he was alive, but also through the very hard road we traveled after his death. It is so hard being a single parent, let alone a single parent who knows little about how to get help when all seems to be crumbling around you. I consider myself to be one of the lucky ones. I had enough sense to stay away from drugs, although I am not a perfect mother I never believed in violence, and I did all I could to ensure I stayed off welfare and got an education. Most are not as lucky as I am, as we see and hear about it in the news and through our family and friends every day.

So, once again I ask that you help to keep Healthy Start in Hawaii and pass this bill to help fund the program. Our 'Ohana need it now more than ever before. With the unstable economy and jobs lost everyday, the risk of child abuse and neglect will rise. Our child protective services cannot handle the caseloads they have now, let alone the likelihood of increased reports because this prevention program ceases to exist. I don't want to see a program such as this disappear because we chose to beautify our lagoons, rather than invest the dollars in our children when money is tight.

If we lose Healthy Start in the midst of a tight budget, then we lose more than just a prevention program. Our 'Ohana deserve better than to be prioritized such a way.

TESTIMONY BY GEORGINA K. KAWAMURA DIRECTOR, DEPARTMENT OF BUDGET AND FINANCE STATE OF HAWAII TO THE SENATE COMMITTEES ON HUMAN SERVICES AND HEALTH ON SENATE BILL NO. 1679

February 10, 2009

RELATING TO THE EMERGENCY AND BUDGET RESERVE FUND

Senate Bill No. 1679 appropriates unspecified amounts from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 and Fiscal Year 2011 to the Departments of Health, Human Services, and Education to maintain levels of programs determined to be essential to education, public health and public welfare.

We are opposed to this bill. Rather than using the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to supplement general funds, in light of the critical budget shortfall facing the State, we believe it is more appropriate to use the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general funds. Accordingly, in Senate Bill No. 882, we have proposed to use \$60 million from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general funds that are currently appropriated for the health care payments program in Fiscal Year 2009. In addition, in Senate Bill No. 883, we have proposed to use another \$15 million from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general fund appropriations for the health care payments program in Fiscal Year 2010. This will leave the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund with projected balances of \$6.2 million, \$3.5 million and \$15.7 million in Fiscal Years 2009, 2010 and 2011, respectively.
