Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Brower, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Coalition of Caregivers (HCCG) **strongly supports SB190** which allows a married couple who are not using federal/state aid to reside and receive care in the same community care foster home under certain conditions.

HCCG believes that allowing married couples to live together in the same home will result better health and well-being, physically and emotionally, for residents. Indeed, preserving one's personal relationship, especially a close relationship one has with a spouse, is central to one's sense of independence, self-worth, and dignity. This sense of independence results in a better quality of life for our residents.

Indeed, the purpose of community care foster homes is to allow elderly and disabled to remain integrated in the community as opposed to being institutionalized. This bill would further this purpose and create good policy, by fostering environments where elderly and disabled can maintain close personal relationships so dear to their hearts.

In summary, HCCG reiterates its **strong support of SB190** that would allow elderly and disabled residents to maintain their marriages and dignity.
