Subject: S.B. 564, S.D. 2 Relating to Fire Protection

I am Kenneth G. Silva, Chair of the State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The SFC and the HFD support S.B. 564, S.D. 2, which proposes to amend the two-year requirement to five years for county fire departments to inspect buildings and properties, except public schools, which are inspected annually, and state airports, which are the responsibility of the state.

This bill would allow a county fire department to inspect buildings according to its fire and life safety risk. As our state community and population continue to grow, fire department personnel have not increased proportionately, thus making it difficult, if not impossible, to inspect all buildings in two years.

Thorough and complete fire inspections reduce the risk of fire but are time-consuming because repeated follow-up inspections are conducted until full compliance is achieved. Fire departments can utilize their limited resources most efficiently and effectively by focusing on higher-risk occupancies, such as assemblies and high-rises.

In addition to inspecting privately-owned buildings and facilities, county fire departments are tasked with conducting inspections of state and county facilities, including public schools, harbors, state university properties, and government institutions and offices without the assistance from a State Fire Marshal's office, which does not exist. Several states, such as Colorado, Rhode Island, and Washington, have statutes that do not have time requirements, thus allowing fire departments to prioritize fire inspections based upon life safety risk.

## TESTIMONY TO THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

RE: SB 564 SD2 - Relating to Fire Protection

Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Robert Witt and I am executive director of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS), which represents 97 private and independent schools in Hawaii and educates over 30,000 students statewide.

The Association is in strong support of Senate Bill 564, Senate Draft 2 – Relating to Fire Protection, which proposes to broaden the scope of fire inspections conducted by the county fire chiefs to include all buildings and facilities except state-owned airport facilities, and reduce the frequency of inspections of buildings other than public schools.

In addition, we would like to respectfully request that this measure be amended so that the standards regarding annual fire safety inspections for public schools are equally applicable to the private schools in Hawaii. Specifically, we ask that subsection (b) of Section 132-6 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes (line 1 on page 3 of SB 564 SD2) be amended to read: "(1) At least once each year at all public and private schools."

Student safety, including fire safety, is an issue of the utmost importance to HAIS. This concern is reflected by the accreditation standards of our association, which include specific requirements regarding regular fire safety inspections of school buildings. Given the significant amount of time that students spend on their school campuses and the unique challenges associated with the protection of children, we believe that the fire and life safety risks of school buildings – those of private and public institutions alike – are higher than those of other types of buildings. For this reason, we feel it is imperative that the language of this measure be amended so that, like their public counterparts, private schools are exempt from the less frequent fire inspection requirements of other types of buildings and are subject to fire inspection at least once each year.
