TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SENATE BILL NO. 586

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION, INTERNATIONAL AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

Senate Bill 586 allows medium-speed electric vehicles to be operated on roads with a posted speed limit of 45 mile per hour or less. The legislation also proposes that the director of transportation shall adopt rules as may be necessary to regulate the use of medium speed vehicles.

The Department of Transportation (DOT) opposes this bill.

In the Federal Register dated September 26, 2008, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) denied a petition for rulemaking that would establish a new class of motor vehicles known as medium speed vehicles, which would have a maximum speed capability of 35 mph. The petitioners contemplated that these vehicles would be subject to a set of safety standards greater than those that apply to low speed vehicles but substantially less than the full set of safety standards that apply to other light vehicles such as passenger cars. NHTSA was of the opinion that the introduction of such a class of motor vehicles without the full complement of safety features required for other light vehicles such as passenger cars would result in significantly greater risk of deaths and serious injuries.

In addition, while NHTSA agrees with the importance of environmental issues, the agency believes that it is not appropriate to significantly increase the risk of deaths and serious injuries just to save fuel. We agree with the position of NHTSA.

Subject: S.B. No. 586, Relating to Highways

The City and County of Honolulu is opposed to S.B. No. 123 which will allow medium speed electric vehicles to be operated on roads with a posted speed limit of 45 miles per hour or less.

Since the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has denied the medium speed manufacturers' petitions to create a new class of motor vehicles known as medium speed vehicles, we do not register or title such vehicles. According to the NHTSA, "After carefully reviewing the petitions, we are denying them because the introduction of such a class of motor vehicles without full complement of safety features required for other light vehicles such as passenger cars would result in significantly greater risk of deaths and serious injuries. While NHTSA agrees with the importance of environmental issues, the agency believes that it is neither necessary nor appropriate to significantly increase the risk of deaths and serious injuries to save fuel."

The City and County of Honolulu recommends that S.B. No. 586 be held.

In support of SB 586

Dear Sen. English and members of COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION, INTERNATIONAL AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS,

I strongly support SB 586 creating a new class of Medium Speed Electric Vehicles.

There is tremendous concern about our global environment and what we are doing to it. There is no question that global warming is real and is having an incredibly detrimental impact on the world. Air pollution caused by vehicles is a major contributing factor, particularly here in Hawaii. January 30 there were articles in all Hawaii newspapers about greenhouse gases having increased 53% from vehicles in the past 15 years according to the University of Hawaii. What are we going to do about it?

The governor, the Legislature and county governments have all made strong words about decreasing the dependence of Hawaii on imported oil. What are we going to do about it? The easiest and best way is to facilitate dramatically increased use of electric vehicles in Hawaii.

At the moment state and federal law recognizes low-speed vehicles, LSV which are limited to 25 mph on roads with speed limits not exceeding 35 mph. All of these vehicles are electric. However there is very little public interest in Hawaii for electric vehicles that can only go 25 mph. Full size, full speed,100% plug-in electric vehicles are still on the drawing board. But there is a solution available today.

By creating a new class called "medium speed electric vehicles" allowing a maximum speed of 35 mph on roads with speed limits not exceeding 45 mph, interest and use of 100% plug-in electric vehicles would dramatically increase. Safety requirements for LSV are included in both state and federal law. In creating this new class of MSEV, safety requirements are increased to accommodate the slightly increased speed.

There are already MSEV laws in five states; Washington, Montana, Minnesota, Oklahoma, and Tennessee. In addition to Hawaii, MSEV bills have been, or will be, submitted for the 2009 legislative session in, New York, Georgia, South Carolina, Louisiana, New Mexico, and hopefully Florida and Connecticut. There may be others that I'm not aware of. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has not yet adopted rules or guidelines for MSEV. The individual states are taking the initiative just as they did in establishing laws for low-speed vehicles.

An extremely important issue that must be added to SB 586 is that "nothing in this law shall preclude modification or conversion of existing low-speed vehicles or conventional vehicles to meet MSEV requirements." The reason is that there is not a single MSEV manufactured anywhere in the world today, but many existing LSV can be upgraded to MSEV standards. In addition, this nation achieved its greatness through individual initiative and creativity. We have largely gotten away from that characteristic by standardization and excessively restrictive laws. We need to recapture that pioneering spirit, we need change.
