In consideration of S.B. 735 RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Chair Sakamoto, Vice Chair Kidani, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support_of Senate Bill 735 with amendments.

This bill authorizes the counties to identify and designate affordable housing receiving zones. The zones will qualify for incentives and exemptions that are tailored to encourage and expedite affordable housing development. Counties are encouraged to identify potential sites for affordable housing receiving zones in their general and development plans. The bill also prohibits establishing an affordable housing receiving zone on conservation or important agricultural lands.

The Administration recommends amending the bill to clarify that the counties are encouraged to identify potential affordable housing receiving zones in the <u>next</u> scheduled update to their general and development plans. It would be unreasonable to expect counties to add a new element to plans that are currently in development or are close to completion.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in strong support of this bill.

SUBJECT: Testimony Opposing Senate Bill 735, Relating to Affordable Housing

The subject bill would require each County to identify and nominate up to twenty sites for approval by Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation as affordable housing receiving zones. HHFDC would review and approve such designations, and create rules for development in the zones that would supersede all other inconsistent ordinances and rules relating to use, zoning, planning and development of land in the receiving zones. Incentives, waivers and regulatory flexibility would be determined at the time of designation of the zone, would apply to the zone in its entirety, and would be binding on the County. A minimum of twenty per cent of housing within such zones would be required to be affordable to households earning up to 140% of the Median Household Income.

Although we recognize that the bill attempts to establish zones where the exemption powers of 201H are pre-established and pre-approved, to expedite the development of affordable housing, we respectfully oppose SB735, for the following reasons:

- 1. We believe this is contrary to county home rule, and may conflict with the intent of HRS Chapter 46, in which various powers have been given to the counties.
- 2. Ordinance No. 860, the Housing Policy for the County of Kaua'i, is an inclusionary housing policy that requires up to 30% of all housing units to be affordable to households at specific incomes. Further, it requires that a minimum of 51% of a project's units must be affordable for the County's use of exemption authority pursuant to HRS 201H-38. We believe the proposed bill may be exclusionary, and allows the use of exemptions for entire districts that would contain substantially less affordable housing.

3. We question whether authority is given to the Counties and HHFDC for some incentives as proposed in 201H-H, which may include exemptions from state environmental law, state procurement law, state wage requirement, other State and County laws relating to utilities and public facilities.
