The Inter-Agency Council for Immigrant and Refugee Services requests your committee's support to move the Office of Community Services from the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to the Department of Human Services. Although we had opposed this move in the past we believe that the Department of Human Service's focus on employment and economic self sufficiency is in line with the employment and job creation programs of the Office of Community Services. With strong possibilities of continued OCS program funding reductions in the DLIR we see a more hopeful future for immigrant employment programs in the Department of Human Services.

We also request that the amendment to SB 905 to separate the job creation and employment core programs for immigrants and low income participants be rescinded and that these programs also transfer with all the other Office of Community Service programs to DHS. We feel that a separation of these specific programs will result in the eventual loss of immigrant employment programs within the Department of Labor due to continued funding reductions and the loss of a strong administrative support by the Office of Community Services.

In summary, the Inter-Agency Council supports the proposed move of the Office of Community Services to the DHS and also request that all current programs move with the office to DHS.

Pacific Gateway Center, formerly known as the Immigrant Center has been serving the community over 35 years. We are an exempt 501 (c) 3 organization providing services in social services, employment training, and placement, economic development and community building. Our organization was a part of the community initiative in the formulation of the Office of Community Services (OCS) 1984 and presently has several contracts with OCS.

We are also a member of the InterAgency Council (IAC) formed to coordinate and collaborate on issues and provision of services to the immigrant population. The IAC has discussed the bill and PGC is in support of the move of the Office of Community Services from the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to the Department of Human Services. PGC is in agreement that all programs of OCS move to DHS.

PGC is also in agreement with the concerns are noted as per the testimony of the IAC. In particular, that OCS will be allowed to maintain their independence and continue their timely method of payments to service providers. This is a critical issue as DHS has not had a good history of payments on time in the past. However, in recent years, we understand that the problem has improved and with the independence of OCS, timely payments should not be an issue.

The concerns of job placement and job creation as being part of the mission of DHS were also addressed by DHS. In speaking to the staffers at DHS, IAC has learned that in recent years, priority has been given to placing clients in job training, job placements and job creation, thus more in line with the mission of OCS. This information is of great importance to PGC.

We had also heard that DHS is not friendly to immigrants and at one time, was cited by the Federal government for their treatment of immigrants. However, PGC has learned that since then, DHS has changed in their treatment of this population and in fact hired several foreign-born personnel in an effort to outreach to this population. Thus we support the move of OCS to DHS.

The Hawaii Immigrant Justice Center ("the Justice Center") supports SB 905 SD 2, which transfers the Office of Community Services ("DHS") to the Department of Human Services ("DHS").

The Justice Center is a tax-exempt, non-profit agency that provides legal and social services to indigent immigrants in Hawaii. The Justice Center is also a member of the Inter-Agency Council, which is composed of eleven other government and community-based organizations.

The Justice Center believes OSC should be transferred in its entirety for the following reasons:

- The mission of OCS is better aligned with DHS than the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations ("DLIR");
- The transfer of OSC to DHS will strengthen the delivery of services to the needy and indigent;
- · Both departments, DHS and DLIR, agree that OCS belongs with DHS; and
- Programs supported by OCS will be better protected under DHS than with DLIR.

The Justice Center also believes that the employment-based services of OSC should not be separated from and transferred with other programs of OCS for the following reasons:

Several community-based agencies has more than one contract with OCS;
 fragmentation of OCS would result in fragmentation of these contracts, disparate oversight of these contracts, and confusion over enforcement of these contracts;

SB90S

- Community-based agencies currently provide holistic services for their clients through employment- and social services-based contracts with OCS.
   Fragmentation would adversely affect these holistic services; and
- Fragmentation would actually increase the cost of keeping OCS as a single agency; separating OCS into two pieces will create overhead expenses for an additional agency.

Please transfer OSC in its entirety to DHS by passing SB 905 SD 2.

Relating to the Office of Community Services

We applaud the legislature for its leadership in the area of supporting human services. The Office of Community Services (OCS) has demonstrated leadership in its innovative programs to support immigrant populations to attain self-sufficiency. We believe that integrating OCS within the Department of Human Services will provide one-stop ease of access for people seeking those services while helping realize efficiencies in social services delivery.

However, the Committee on Labor and Public Employment made changes by stipulating that employment core services and employment creation programs for low-income individuals, immigrants, and refugees shall remain a function of DLIR. Although these programs are for the purposes of employment, the nature of the populations serviced, low-income individuals, immigrants and refugees, require the skills of social service activities as part of the program in order to ensure its success.

For this reason, we can only support this measure if the component of core employment services and employment creation programs for low-income individuals, immigrants and refugees remain functions of OCS after the transfer.

Goodwill Industries of Hawaii is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization providing educational and career development programs. Goodwill works with people who have employment barriers, including welfare dependency, economic and resource barriers, lack of education/work experience, illiteracy and disadvantaged youth. Last year, Goodwill served more than 9,400 individuals throughout the state in its career development and training programs and placed over 1,800 into jobs.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on this matter.
