SB91 – SUPPORT

RELATING TO COMMUNITY-BASED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Chair Fukunaga and committee members
Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **SB 91** which would:

- Authorize the Hawaii community-based economic development revolving fund to receive funding from any source;
- Repeal prohibition on reallocation of funds from loan program to grant program;
- Reduce the maximum interest rate on loans from 10% to 6%;
- Reduce limit on applicant's total loan balance from \$500,000 to \$250,000

The Hawai'i Alliance for Community-Based Economic Development (HACBED) is a statewide 501(c) 3 organization established in 1992 to encourage increased investments in sustainable and community-based approaches to economic development. Our mission is to address social, economic, and environmental justice in Hawai'i through community-based economic development.

HACBED is confident that **SB 91** will not only remove barriers for community-based economic development projects, but will also increase the state's ability to respond to the needs of Hawaii's communities' through increased opportunities for community-based ventures. The introduction of **SB 91** comes at a critical time in Hawaii's economic history, dovetailing four important changes to current HRS culminating in greater financial flexibility on the part of the Hawaii community-based economic development revolving fund and providing greater incentives for communities-based organizations to grow their mission and expand their services and reach.

We believe that State support for CBED projects for communities is crucial because they are:

- Addressing critical social and community issues through initiatives with economic impact getting to the "double bottom line";
- Leveraging limited resources through creative public, private, and community partnerships; and
- Empowering families and communities to have choice and control over their own futures.





Community Voice, Collective Action

We pursue our mission by helping community-based economic development organizations (CBEDOs) increase community control of their assets and means of production. We accomplish this in many ways -- by providing technical support to help CBEDOs deal with organizational issues; by networking on a local and national basis for funding and financing for community-based efforts; and, by advocating for communities to play a more active role in the political process in order to effect systemic change.

We therefore ask for your support of **SB 91** and the continuing efforts on the part of communities to exercise greater control over their own futures.

As a former Community-Based Economic Development Program grantee on the Island of Hawaii, we have first hand knowledge of the efforts that have been made by the CBED Program in facilitating and assisting community entrepreneurship throughout our State.

The CBED Program leverages limited State resources to develop sustainable projects within a community. The economic development programs that are funded by CBED grants provide hope and strengthen community relationships. It is truly a grass-roots effort that encourages and supports residents becoming engaged in the long term stability of the community in which they reside.

Because of the State's budgetary shortfalls, it is vital that the CBED Program be provided the flexibility to:

- 1. Access additional funding from other sources besides the State's General Fund and deposit these funds into the CBED Revolving Fund;
- 2. Provide from smaller loans amounts and reduce the interest rates on such loans; and
- 3. Serve a broader network of people by clarifying the definition of "community of interest" to mean a group of people who may not live in the <u>same geographic</u> area, but who are bound together through common economic interest.



During this period of economic instability and uncertainty, the CBED Program continues to provide a cost-effective approach in developing strong, reliable, stable and self-sufficient communities.

We humbly ask for your support of the CBED Program and the passage of SB No.91.
