Title: SCR 105, Urging Public and Private Agencies to Encourage Their

Parent Clients to Turn On Closed Captioning When Their Children

Watch Television.

Purpose: Television; Use of Closed-Captioning For Children.

Department's Position: The Department of Education (Department) opposes

SCR 105, the use of closed captioning as children watch television for

the following reasons.

- Caption Quality is an issue. Fewer than 10% of the companies
 offering captioning services have met the strict standards of the
 Described Captioned and Media Program, Office of Special
 Education Programs, U.S. Department of Education. Captions
 may not be accurately transcribed as the dialog does not match
 the written word, and typographical/spelling errors may be
 present setting a poor model for students with learning
 disabilities;
- The timing of captions will vary depending on the different captioning companies, and this delay or sequential time code may confuse students. Some captions run so quickly that even

- a mature reader may not be able to read them and students may become frustrated;
- Sound effects are often written into the captioning which may further confuse students;
- Captions are all white uppercase (capital) letters which may confuse beginning readers who are learning that capital letters occur at the beginning of the first word of a sentence.

For the reasons stated above, the Department opposes SCR 105.
