#### ON THE AVAILABILITY OF AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE INTERPRETERS

Senator Suzanne Chun Oakland, Senator Les Ihara, and Members of the Senate Committee on Human Services

My name is Francine Mae Lehuanani Aona Kenyon. I am in support of SCR 135, requesting a study on the availability of American Sign Language (ASL) Interpreters as an avid deaf advocate with many hats because of three major reasons: (1) compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA); (2) Lack of availability of ASL Interpreters; and (3) financial concerns.

We have already faced the shortage of American Sign Language Interpreters in the state but this study will help us resolve the problems by increasing the number of ASL interpreters and promoting the job opportunities with benefits to ASL students.

My daughter-in-law took American Sign Language in lieu of foreign languages at her high school where she and my son graduated the same year. St. Francis School for Girls in Honolulu offers American Sign Language courses as part of foreign language for graduation. So why not offer American Sign Language vclasses at high schools in lieu of foreign language as graduation requirement so that more high school graduates could go on to Kapiolani Community College Interpreter Education Program and prepare themselves to take the certification or credential exams.

I myself am volunteering as ASL interpreter but I am not yet certified as Certified Deaf Interpreter (CDI)
